Prosperity During 1955 Administration Convinced

Labor Secretary Reveals **Expansion** in Employment

Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON-The Eisenhower administration is convinced that the nation swings into the new year with economic conditions auguring good times throughout 1955. Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell notes expanding employment in such key industries as automobiles, metal and metal products. The Commerce department reports an increase in United States exports.

The Federal Reserve Board is taking cognizance of the unturn. It



plans to allow the money market to remain "easy," but to exercise due precautions against development of inflation. There will be a constant check on sales and production figures, and any halt in industrial output gains will mean liberalization of credit.

Corporate dividends for 1954 hit well over \$915 billion, almost nine per cent above the previous all-time high, recorded in 1953. The railroads, which have encountered hard going in recent years, are anticipating a sizable traffic increase in 1955. This, of course, would mean a boost in capital spending-and more jobs.

Secretary Mitchell . TVA-You can expect President Eisenhower to propose a new method next year for financing the

Tennessee Valley Authority-and TVA supporters are likely to back the President.

Up to now, of course, TVA has been financed out of annual appropriations by Congress. Mr. Eisenhower may suggest that the authority start selling revenue bonds to the public

Friends of TVA--who have been critical of almost everything the President has done in regard to the authority since he entered the White House-seem pretty certain to go along with his proposal.

They will do so because Congress each year has grown more reluctant to appropriate all the money that TVA feels it needs to boost the power output. A public financing plan would end the annual battles over money, allow TVA to expand and produce all the electricity it can sell.

In this way, too, private power combines-such as the Dixon-Yates utilities group-would have no reason for stepping into the Tennessee Valley. TVA boosters like that idea best of all. . .

ENVOY TO INDIA-Senator John Sherman Cooper (R), Kentucky, who was defeated for re-election by former Vice President Alben W. Barkley, appears to be the odds-on favorite for the post of ambassador to India.

Other possible candidates include Dr. Ralph Bunche, Nobel Peace Prize winner and a top United Nations official. However, Cooper, a former State department adviser and United States delegate to the United Nations, seems to have the inside track. One contributing factor is that George V. Allen, the retiring ambassador, has been nominated to be assistant secretary of State.

• FIELDS CASE-The United States will take no more official interest in the case of Noel and Herta Field, the American couple who asked for asylum in Communist Hungary after pressure from Washington helped effect their liberation from Red imprisonment.

Actually, the Fields' decision to stay behind the Iron Curtain came as no surprise to State department officials. They had been convinced that the Fields had strong ties Decision in the Communist country.

Of Fields However, the United States did file several protests against the couple's imprisonment, and did work Expected hard for their freedom on the grounds that the two were American citizens and entitled to protection as such.

The American government would have been interested in questioning the Fields about life behind the Iron Curtain and certain other

matters, though it is felt in high government circles that the couple, in any case, could add little to what is already known.


