## Central Texas Sheep And Goat Sales Show Big Increase During Four Years

Central Texas Sheep and Goat sales have shown a tremendous increase during the last four years according to annual report released by Mills County Commission Company. The report shows that the firm sold 374,765 head of sheep and goats in the year 1954. This number included 234,247 sheep and 140,518 head of goats. The total reflects an increase of 150,000 head over 1951 when they sold 224,765 head.  
Sheep sales show an increase of 89,218 during the past four years. In 1951 the firm sold 55,029 head while in 1954 they sold 234,276. Sales in 1954 increased 62,988 head over the previous year when they sold

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Prosperity During 1955 Administration Convinced Labor Secretary Reveals Expansion in Employment

Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON—The Eisenhower administration is convinced that the nation swings into the new year with economic conditions auguring good times throughout 1955.

The Federal Reserve Board is taking cognizance of the return. It plans to allow the money market to remain "easy," but to exercise due precautions against development of inflation.

Corporate dividends for 1954 hit well over \$9 1/2 billion, almost nine per cent above the previous all-time high, recorded in 1953.

Tennessee Valley Authority—and TVA supporters are likely to back the President.

Up to now, of course, TVA has been financed out of annual appropriations by Congress.

Friends of TVA—who have been critical of almost everything the President has done in regard to the authority since he entered the White House—seem pretty certain to go along with his proposal.

They will do so because Congress each year has grown more reluctant to appropriate all the money that TVA feels it needs to boost the power output.

In this way, too, private power combines—such as the Dixon-Yates utilities group—would have no reason for stepping into the Tennessee Valley.

ENVOY TO INDIA—Senator John Sherman Cooper (R), Kentucky, who was defeated for re-election by former Vice President Alben W. Barkley, appears to be the odds-on favorite for the post of ambassador to India.

Other possible candidates include Dr. Ralph Bunche, Nobel Peace Prize winner and a top United Nations official.

● FIELDS CASE—The United States will take no more official interest in the case of Noel and Herta Fields, the American couple who asked for asylum in Communist Hungary after pressure from Washington helped effect their liberation from Red imprisonment.

Actually, the Fields' decision to stay behind the Iron Curtain came as no surprise to State department officials.

However, the United States did file several protests against the couple's imprisonment, and did work hard for their freedom on the grounds that the two were American citizens and entitled to protection as such.

The American government would have been interested in questioning the Fields about life behind the Iron Curtain and certain other matters, though it is felt in high government circles that the couple, in any case, could add little to what is already known.

### PARENT PROBLEMS

#### The Right Way to Help A Youngster to Learn

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

ASSIGNMENT at school of lessons to study at home, especially in primary grades, has rapidly declined in some areas and wholly disappeared in others.

Occasionally, a teacher will ask parents to help the child who lags at school in one or more subjects. Then there's the parent, who on discovering that her child is not doing so well at school, sets out on her own initiative to help him.

#### Parents Assign Homework

Some parents of children under eight or ten, seeing these children with no homework, will assign some themselves: so many sums to do in arithmetic, so many words to spell, so much to read. Unless they know well what the child has achieved at school in these directions, such parents can, in this way, hinder a child's learning progress, especially if they make assignments too long and hard.

Of course, if they choose well, and help the child win success and like the challenge, the results might be good. It's not easy for the child to feel he is getting justice at home if he is driven to do lessons his parents have imposed on him when none had been assigned at school.

#### Some Good Ways

There are good ways by which the parent can help the child who

has been assigned no homework. Say he is in the first, second or third grade. He might then be shown how well he can read, in which case there should be some one at home to listen eagerly as he reads and to appreciate his achievement.

#### Set the Stage

The skillful parent may well set the stage so this will happen. Know a few parents who let an older child earn a bit of extra money by reading regularly to a younger child. Some poor readers around eight or ten have in the way become good readers.

It's well for the poor reader, the child at about these ages, to have children's magazines, books, other than his school reader, with easy, interesting reading matter he will enjoy.

#### A Good Helper

When the school child of whatever age asks you to help him with his reading, spelling or arithmetic, you need to prove to him that you are a good helper: that you are kind and calm and patient; that you never let your voice rise, never show the least anger at his slow responses or errors. When at your best, you don't even feel any vexation with him. Unless you can so manage yourself, you are hardly fit to try to help your child at his lessons.

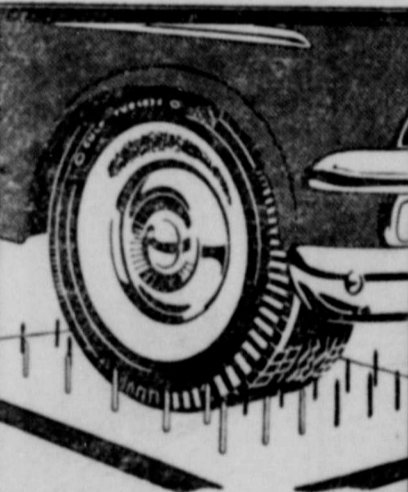

### Questions And Answers On Filing Returns And Paying Income Tax

**FILE EARLY**

Question: If I have until April 15, 1955 to file my 1954 income tax return, why should I file earlier?

Answer: If you have overpaid your tax, you have a refund due. These refunds are made in the order the returns are received; therefore, the earlier you file, the earlier you will receive your check.

Question: But suppose I haven't overpaid, what then?

Answer: It is always wise to file early. Getting the information together is the big job. This you should start doing as soon as possible after the end of the year. Often you may find it difficult to gather important information and an early start gives you more time to get up the information on those hard

to find items.

Question: Will the Internal Revenue Service prepare my return for me?

Answer: The personnel of your Internal Revenue Service would gladly prepare your return if it were possible. Unfortunately due to the tremendous amount of work that has to be carried on, we can prepare returns only for those taxpayers who cannot read or write, or who are physically unable to assist themselves.

Question: If the Internal Revenue Service will not prepare my return, then what am I to do for assistance?

Answer: Although the Internal Revenue Service will be unable to prepare your return, there has been set up an assistance program whereby with a little work on your part, you can prepare your own return.

Question: In what way will the Service assist me?

Answer: For those taxpayers who need to telephone for information or come in for help on some question, after reading the instructions furnished with the blank form, we will set aside certain days on which we can furnish you assistance by answering your questions. Every Monday morning during January from 8:30 to 12:30 has been designated as Taxpayer Assistance Days. These days are January 3, 10, 17, 24, and 31. We will also have taxpayer assistance days all day Mondays from 8:30 a. m. to 5:00 p. m., beginning March 14 through April 11; i. e. March 14, 21, and 28, and April 4 and 11.

If you have to come to the office, you should come on Taxpayer Assistance Day. We will not have any one at smaller offices, and we will not be set up to help you at most larger offices on other days.

### Current Population Survey Includes Annual Work Experience Questions

Special questions, designed to provide information on the annual work experience of the Nation's population, will be asked in the January Current Population Survey, according to Supervisor Charles E. Fay of the U. S. Census Bureau's district office at Dallas, Texas.

The work experience questions will provide information on how many people were regular full-time workers throughout 1954, how many were seasonal workers, and how many worked the greater part of the year but only at part-time jobs. Additional questions covering migration and major source of income will be asked of farm wage workers.

The special questions in the January Current Population Survey are in addition to the regular questions on employment and unemployment. The Current Population Survey will be conducted locally and in 229 other sections of the country during the week of January 10. Current Population Survey interviews are made locally by Mrs. Nella P. Casbeer of Lampasas, Texas.

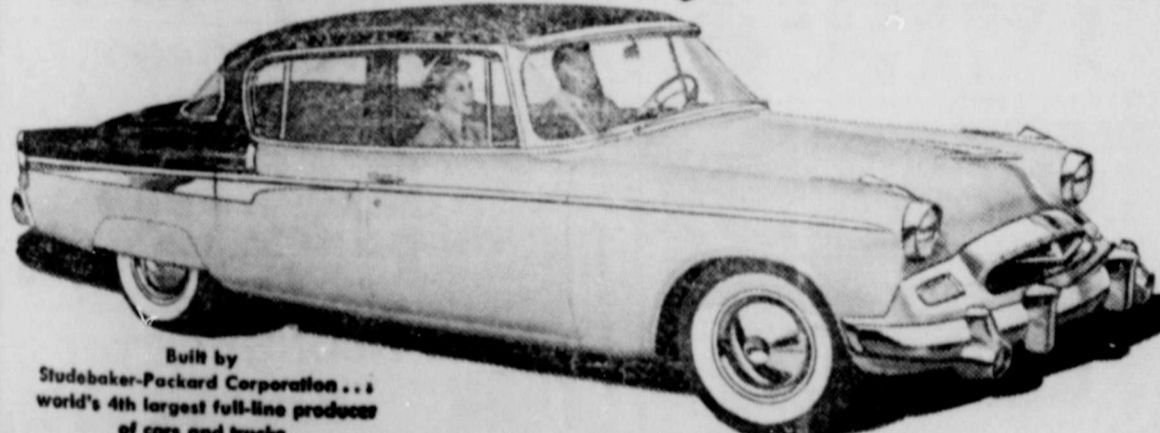

## ONE STAR Agriculture

By John C. White, Commissioner

Texas cotton farmers will be allowed to plant 7,612,779 acres of cotton this season.

The question now arises: Has the pendulum swung too far in favor of controlled production?

In Texas, agriculture has been hard-hit by a four-year drouth. In many areas, the few acres allowed for cotton under the allotment program failed to produce at all. This brought economic hardship where cotton is the main cash crop.

This year, the cotton farmer needs to make money on his crop. However, price alone, guaranteed by a parity program based on reduced acreage, does not insure farm prosperity. It is price times volume that will determine profits in 1955.

After all, it is what remains in the farmer's pocket after the bills are paid—his net income—that measures whether he has had a good year or a bad one.

Deeper crop cutbacks are ordinarily used as a basis to support the parity program. They act as a temporary restraining force to prevent a burdensome surplus that would break the market price. This has been the practice in former years and in many cases has worked to good advantage.

But these days in Texas, due to the drouth, are not ordinary

in any sense of the word. The Texas farmer will need to plant more cotton this year and still be assured of a good price. Instead, present plans call for cutting last year's acreage back by an additional 16 percent.

At the very minimum, Texas should have at least as much acreage as it had last year, if not more. Now that our farmers are under economic stress, it is no time to bolster the price of cotton by further reducing the acreage.

This year, the farmer needs price plus volume.

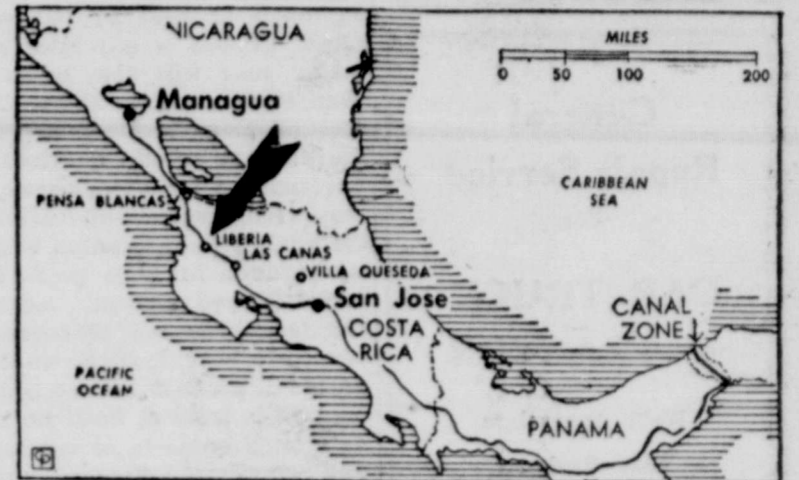

### News About Social Security As Effecting Farmers Beginning 1955

Many farmers in the Central Texas area have begun to show a keen interest in the new social security law as it will affect them in 1955 and later, according to James B. Marley, District Manager of the Austin office of the Social Security Administration.

In visits to every town in the Austin service area, representatives of the district office are having numerous questions and inquiries from self-employed farm operators about what they need to do now and later, and

what it will mean to them and to their families in the way of future retirement or survivor monthly benefit checks.

In general, self-employed farm, ranch and cotton gin operators, who earn as much as \$400 net profit in 1955 and in 1956 will become fully insured in April 1956. Those then 65 years of age or older, or survivors of those who die insured after that date will be due monthly checks subject to the retirement or earnings test contained in the 1954 Amendments.

Farm employees who are paid as much as \$100 by one employer in 1955 or any later calendar year will also begin to earn social security rights. The test of being insured depends on what is called "quarters of coverage". A farm employee gets one such quarter of coverage for each \$100 in taxable wages, up to four in each year. The self-employed person receives his farm quarters of coverage for each year that he reports as much as \$400 in net profit. No one is insured until he has at least 6 quarters of coverage, and the requirement rises through the future years to a maximum need for 40 such credits.

F. P. Bowman of Goldthwaite, member of the Advisory Council of Southwestern Medical Foundation, has urged that "everyone interested in medical progress in the Southwest attend the dedication service."

#### Navy Enlistments

It was announced today that former regular Navy enlisted men who hold certain ratings may enlist now in the regular Navy after three months but within one year of discharge and retain the rate held at the time of discharge or release to inactive duty.

The land that had been cultivated would absorb only an inch of rain in an hour, while the protected soil could absorb as much as a six inch rain in an hour.

were Mrs. Philip Nickols, Mrs. Mohler Oglesby, Mrs. John L. Patterson and Mrs. J. H. Randolph.

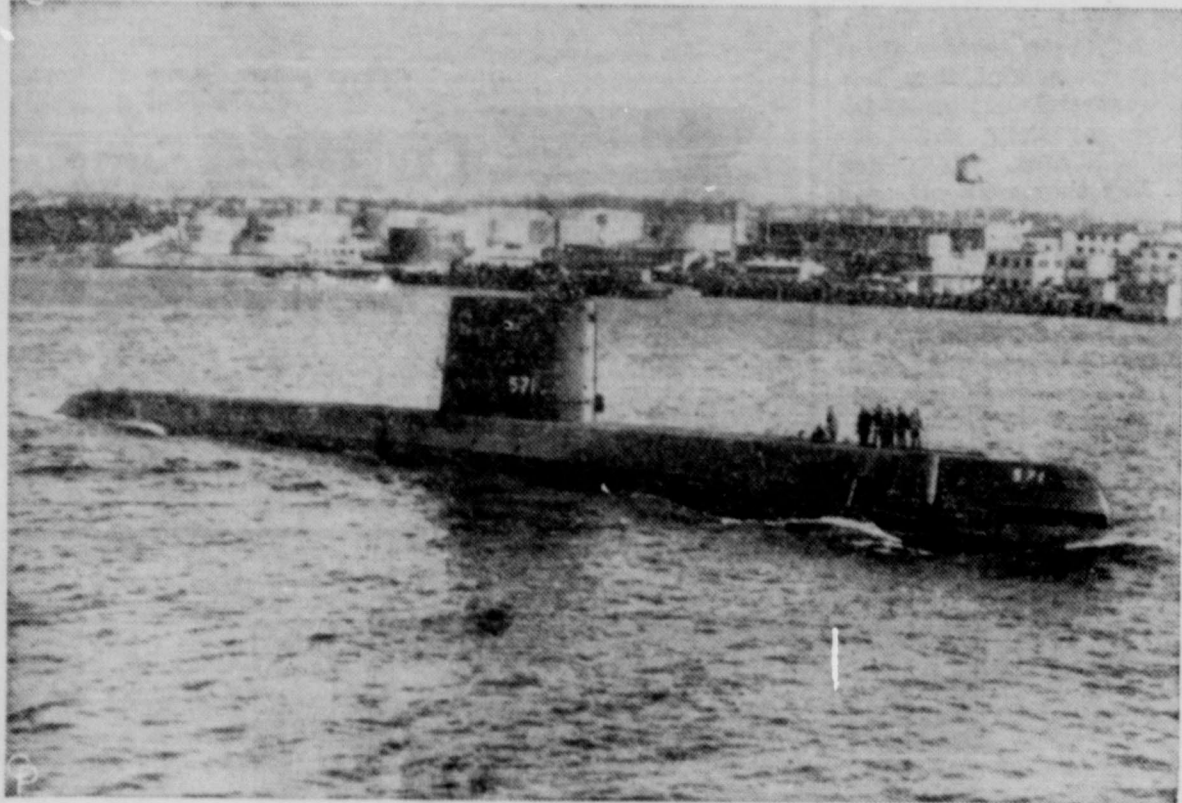
