Austin, Texas— Veterans land sale scandals overshadowed lawmaking in both branches of the Legislature for another week.

Investigations spread still wider. Involved were three departments of the state, both chambers of the Legislature, grand juries of Travis, Bexar and DeWitt counties, and probably others.

More of the approximately 80 "block deals" were brought before investigators.

Mike Rowan, a former executive secretary of the Veterans Land Board, testified that several legislators had exerted "unusual influence" to push veterans' applications through.

He named Senators Doyle Willis of Fort Worth and Warren McDonald of Tyler and Representative Douglas Berman of Dallas. Rowan said it was "unfair" but he couldn't remember names of the others.

Dennis Wallace, longtime chief clerk of the Land Office, reported that his name had been "signed" by someone else, to minutes of the Veterans' Land Board.

So far Atty. Gen. Shepperd has filed nine suits for forfeiture of block sales and recovery of a total of \$1,539,505 to the state.

TAX SLOW DOWN

With land sales taking legislative precedence, taxes, the Legislature's big problem, have taken a back seat.

Rep. Jerry Sadler sharply reminded the House revenue and taxation committee that the session was one-third over and no revenue bills had been reviewed or acted upon. He demanded an "immediate" hearing on his bill for a \$3.30 per barrel hike on beer tax.

Rep. Charles J. Kirkham of Cleburne offered a new plan—a "road use" tax, as a substitute for the administration's two-cent gasoline tax hike proposal. So far the gas tax hasn't been heard by committee.

Kirkham's plan would levy a \$5 fee on commercial motor vehicles, plus a graduated tax scale based on gross weight, ranging from six mills to 22 mills, all estimated revenue to go to highway purposes.

INSURANCE CLEAN-UP

Final passage of the first major bill to "clean up the insurance mess" was voted by the House. Control of the stock and securities of insurance companies, under the bill, will go to the Board of Insurance Commissioners.

This bill is in for a fight in the Senate where a counter measure would give insurance stock supervision to the securities division of the Secretary of State's office. The Senate bill has been heard and parked in sub-committee.

WATER BILLS, TOO

Favorable report has been given by a Senate committee to the administration's \$100 million state bond issue plan for aid to water districts. Rival measures for the same amount of bonds have been put in House sub-committee.

Passed by the Senate were two of the water bills, regulating pollution from oil wells, and requiring reports to the state by water districts.

Advertising and Newspapers Representative Vernon E. Smith of Fort Worth introduced a bill specifically prohibiting the Board of Examiners in Op-

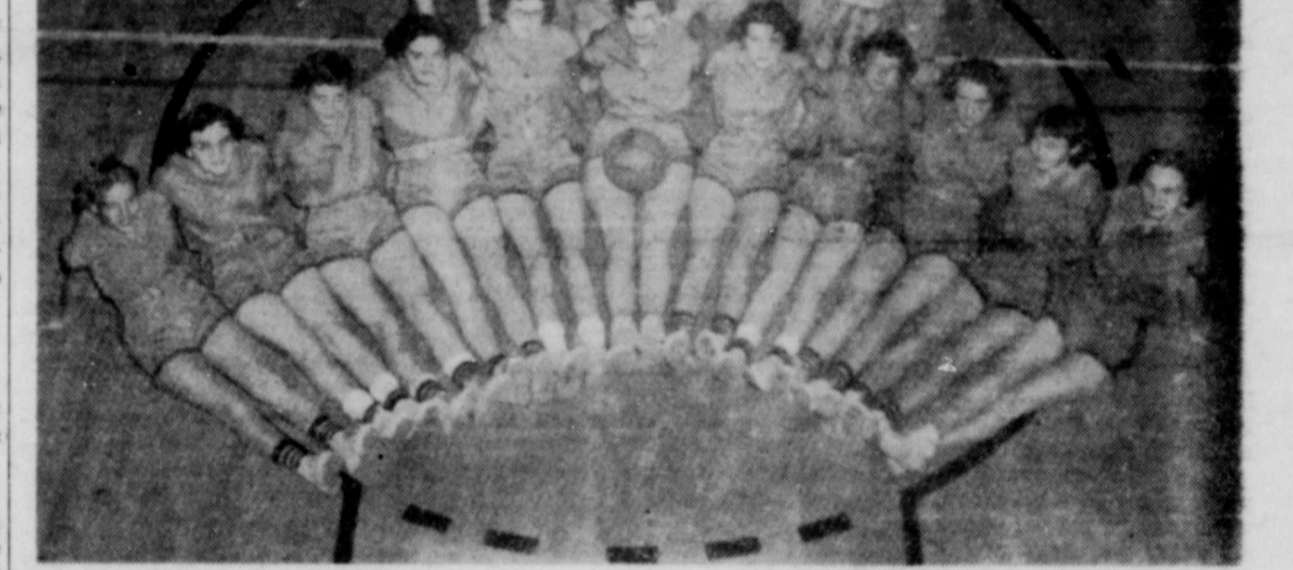
GHS Girls Are District 23-A Basketball Champions

Amounts contributed by communities and various activities are as follows: Ebony, 9.00; Rattler, 8.25; Ridge, 17.12; Regency, 22.42; Caradan, 5.43; Mullin, 40.00; Star, 58.73; Priddy, 109.69; Goldthwaite Mothers March, 230.19; Goldthwaite Ladies Bake Sale, 61.10 Goldthwaite Schools, 47.70; Stacy's Coffee and Domino hours, 67.47; Jernigan Auction Barn Collection, 24.45; Special Donations, 195.00; Tuesday Study Club, 5.00; Goldthwaite Gym Sports event, 64.20; Coin Collectors, 213.93; Goldthwaite Business and Labor, 138.00; Center City Study Club, 5.00.

Supplies and expenses amounted to 60.94 leaving a balance of \$1,262.34. Fifty per cent of this amount, \$631.14 goes to the National Foundation and a like amount goes to the Mills County Fund, the report stated.

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INSIDE WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Administration Keeps Eye On Stock Market Activity
Stevens - to - Resign - Soon Reports Persist in Capital

WASHINGTON—The Eisenhower administration continues to be deeply concerned over the activities of the booming stock market, and may take further steps such as even higher margin requirements.

There is little belief that the action of the Federal Reserve board in increasing from 50 to 60 per cent the amount of cash which customers must put up for stock will have any lasting effect.

The mild gesture was purely "psychological," and after a two-day shakeout of the market resulted, the upward trend was resumed. The reason is that actually a large part of the buying is for cash.

Should signs develop of a speculative orgy such as the type that plunged the nation into depression in 1929, you can look for the Federal Reserve board to further increase margin requirements, probably to 75 per cent.

There also may be further moves toward tightening credit. This would be a last resort, however, because such action would be reflected not only in lower stock prices but in lower business activity generally.

Secretary Stevens • STEVENS OUT—Despite his statement that "I have no intention of resigning," reports still persist in Washington that Army Secretary Robert T. Stevens plans to quit his post in the next few months.

Some quarters in the nation's capital feel that the Army's release of the lengthy report on the discharge of Maj. Irving Peress is a further indication that Stevens will step out.

A Pentagon official close to the secretary, in denying the flood of resignation reports, pointed out that Stevens has official obligations through March and intends to stay on.

In this respect, it must be noted that when reports circulated last summer that Stevens was going to quit, Pentagon spokesmen said he would remain on the job at least until early 1955. March falls in this category.

SCHOOLS—The outlook for federal aid to school construction now looks brighter than it ever has in the past. President Eisenhower's request in his state of the union message for early action won quick support on Capitol Hill.

Both Democrats and Republicans want to give top priority to school legislation. In fact, each party wants to get the credit for spearheading the drive—certain to get the hearty endorsement of the nation's voters.

The maneuvering already is going on. Senator H. Alexander Smith (R), New Jersey, has urged the administration to get a draft of legislation to Congress as quickly as possible.

On the Democratic side, Chairman Lister Hill (D), Alabama, of the Senate labor and public welfare committee, promises to give top priority to obtaining federal funds for school aid.

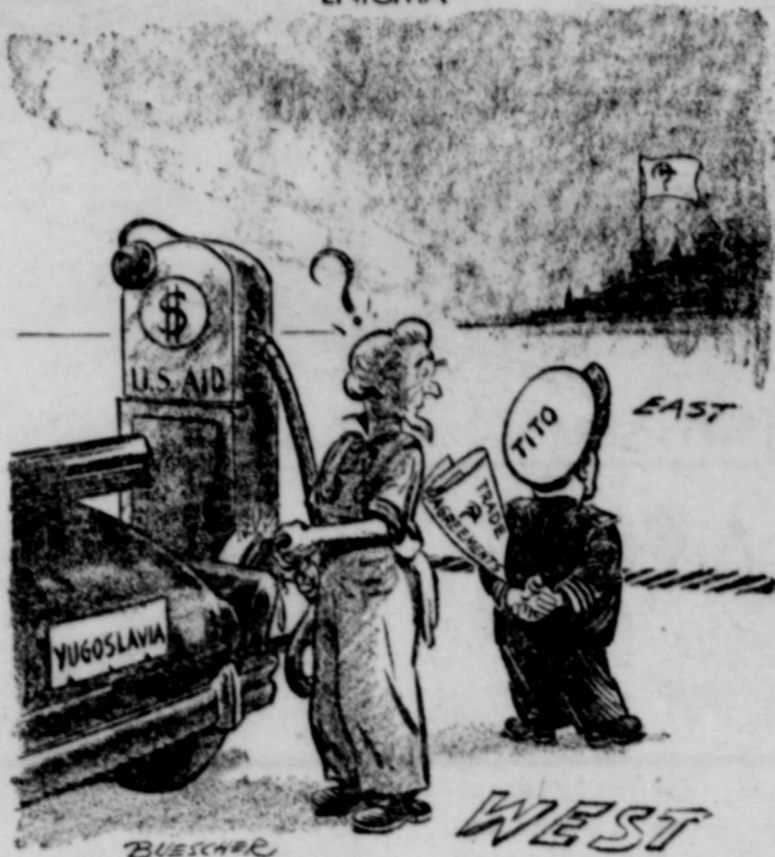

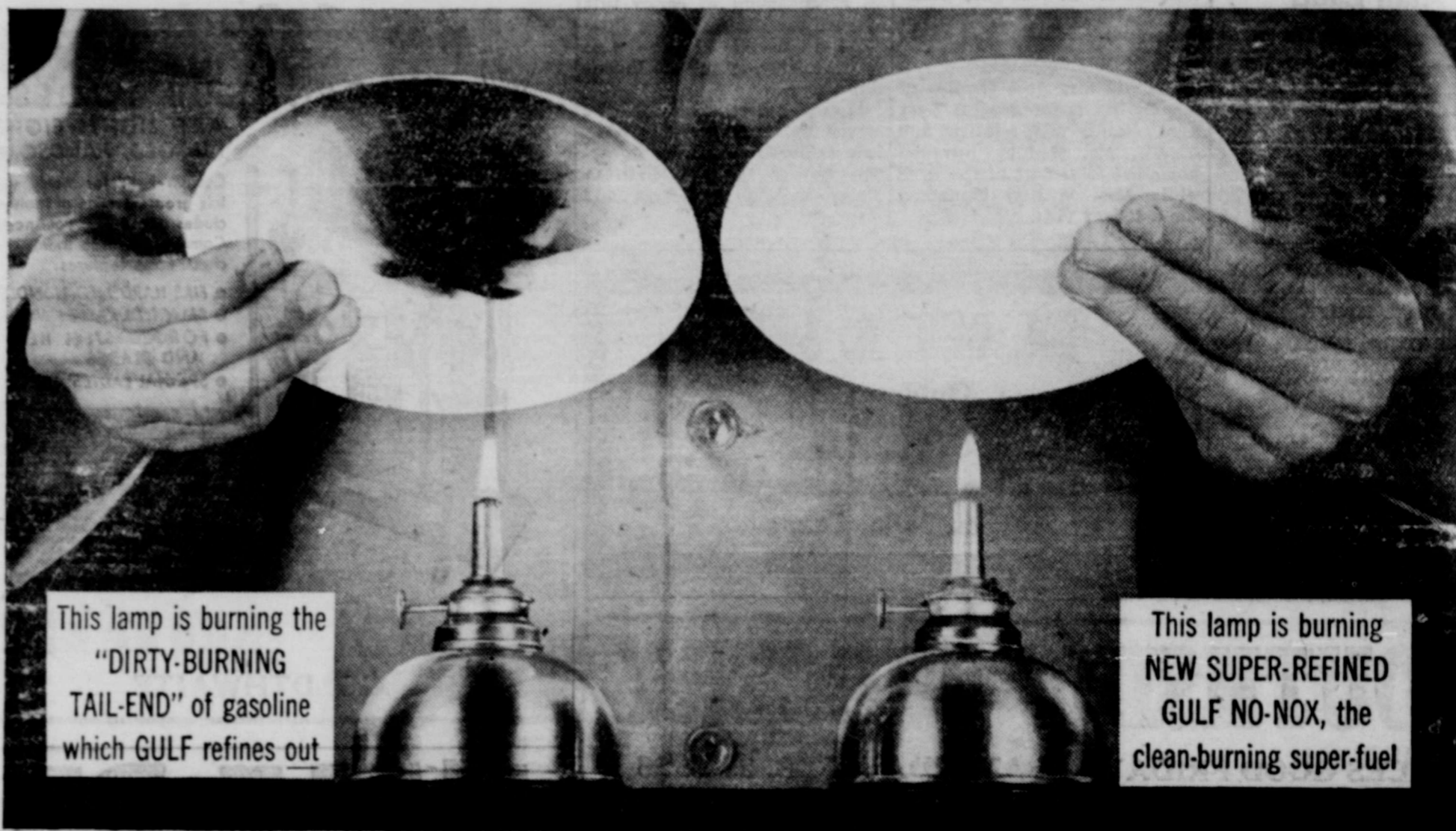

Questions And Answers On Filing Income Tax Returns For Year 1954

GETTING YOUR 1954 INCOME TAX FORMS
Question: When do we get the forms and instructions for filing this year's income tax returns?

Answer: Every taxpayer who filed a return last year should have received by mail before December 31, the 1954 tax forms and instructions. If you have not received your forms and instructions, you may get them from your local office of the Internal Revenue Service or at your local post office. Most banks will also have them.

Do not wait until April 15 to think about filing your 1954 return. The instruction pamphlet furnished with each return is presented in a clear, concise, and readable manner and covers the various types of income that are either taxable or non-taxable, the exemptions that may be claimed, and the expenses that are allowable as

deductions. Read the instructions very carefully. This will not only simplify the preparation of the return, but will also enable you to take advantage of all the changes in the new law that may save you a substantial amount of money. A short study of these instructions will be both interesting and profitable.

If you have any questions, either write or phone your District Director of Internal Revenue. His address is 2101 Pacific Avenue, Dallas, Texas. His telephone number is STerling 5011.

File your return as soon after the first of the year as possible. You will not only help your Internal Revenue Service, you will also help yourself if you have a refund due. The returns are processed in the order they are received so the sooner filed, the sooner you will receive your check.

DROUTH HAY PROGRAM NEARS CLOSE

A recent order by the United States Department of Agriculture proclaimed a Feb. 15 deadline on applications for emergency hay under the Texas drouth relief program.

Judging from letters to the Texas Department of Agriculture, some confusion exists among buyers and hay dealers alike, as to the exact meaning of the order.

The February deadline affects eligible farmers who have not yet applied for relief but had intentions of doing so. Local

Farm Home Administration offices were instructed to issue no more allotments after that date.

However, the TDA will continue to use state and federal funds for making payments under hay contracts through March 31. If the farmer already has his allotment, he can make his purchase and obtain delivery before the end of March and still be eligible for reimbursement.

The railroad's 50 percent reduction in rate for hauling hay was also set to expire Feb. 15. The government will continue to pay half the actual cost of transporting hay up to \$10 per ton on all deliveries to eligible farmers and ranchers until midnight, March 31.

Requests for reimbursement of hay transportation costs should be forwarded to the Texas Department of Agriculture, Capitol Station, Austin, as soon as possible after the deadline date, if not before.

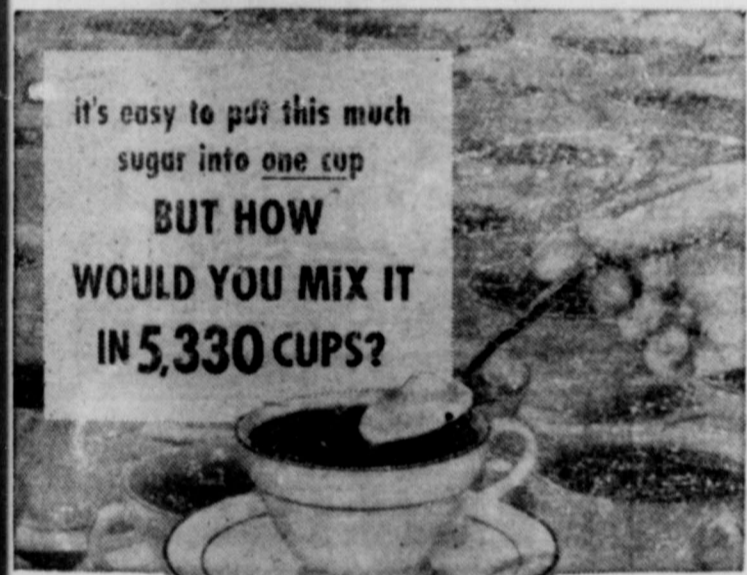

Gas Industry Develops New Water Heater Tank

The natural gas industry has scored another first with the development of an aluminum alloy water heater storage tank.

"No red rust, the bane of the homemaker, can be produced inside this aluminum alloy storage tank", L. J. Ward, manager of Lone Star Gas Company's Goldthwaite office said today.

"This fully-automatic water heater also affords constant replenishment of the hot water supply at the proper temperature even while it is being used. It is only necessary that the homemaker equip the home with a water heater of sufficient capacity to meet the requirements of the entire family.

"A water heater with a storage rating of 36 gallons, for example, should serve the requirements of a family of three to five persons. It will supply normal bath water requirements to

a single shower or tub on a practically continuous basis, or will support continuous operation at 160-degree tub-temperature of automatic clotheswashers requiring up to about 7 gallons per cycle.

"The 36-gallon aluminum alloy water heater has a laundry, or recovery, rating of 40 gallons. In other words, it will furnish 76 gallons of 160-degree water per hour continuously.

"As an added feature," Mr. Ward added, "both the aluminum alloy and monel water heaters furnish two different temperatures of hot water from the same tank at the same time. The homemaker obtains 180-degree (160-degree tub-temperature) water for use in the automatic clotheswasher and 125-degree water for bathroom and other uses. This two-temperature feature, called duotemp, is optional.

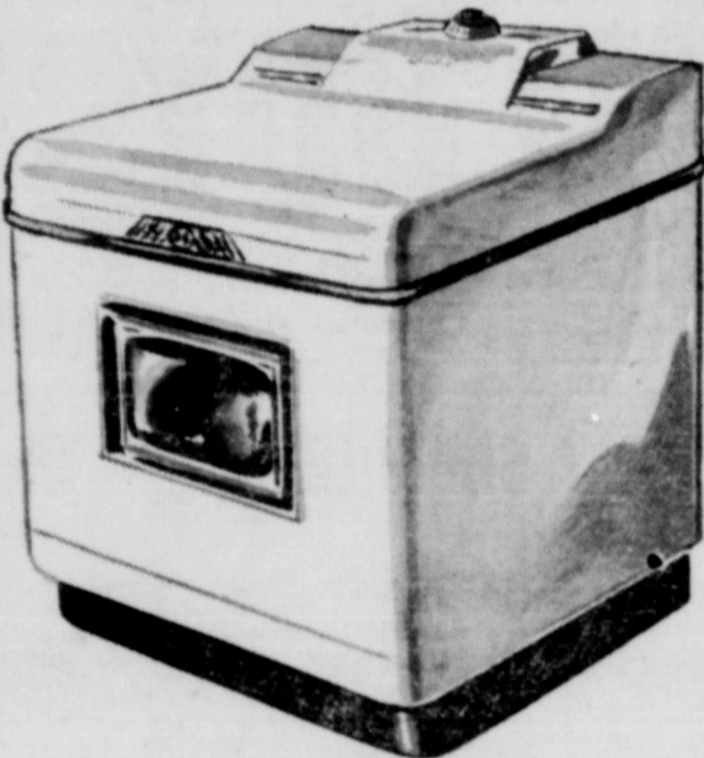

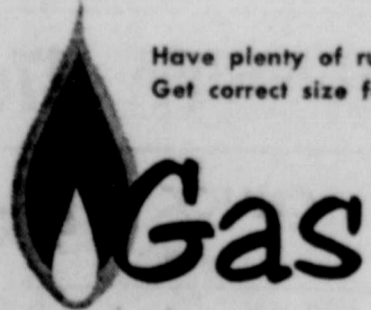

Charles Butler, Green Mankin, Howard Campbell, Arthur Hunt, V. C. Bradford, Harry Welch, and W. G. Saylor have recently ordered fish for spring delivery.

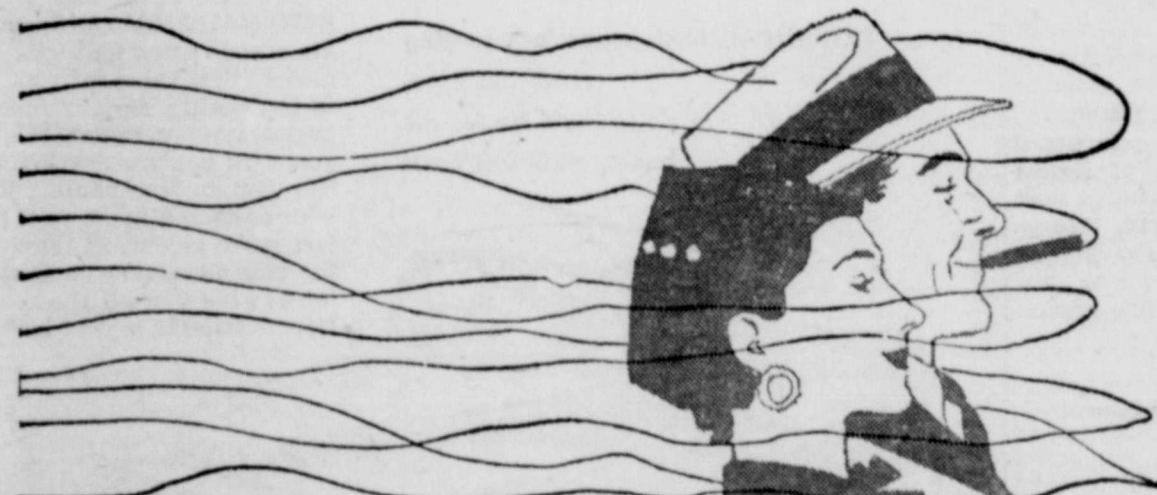

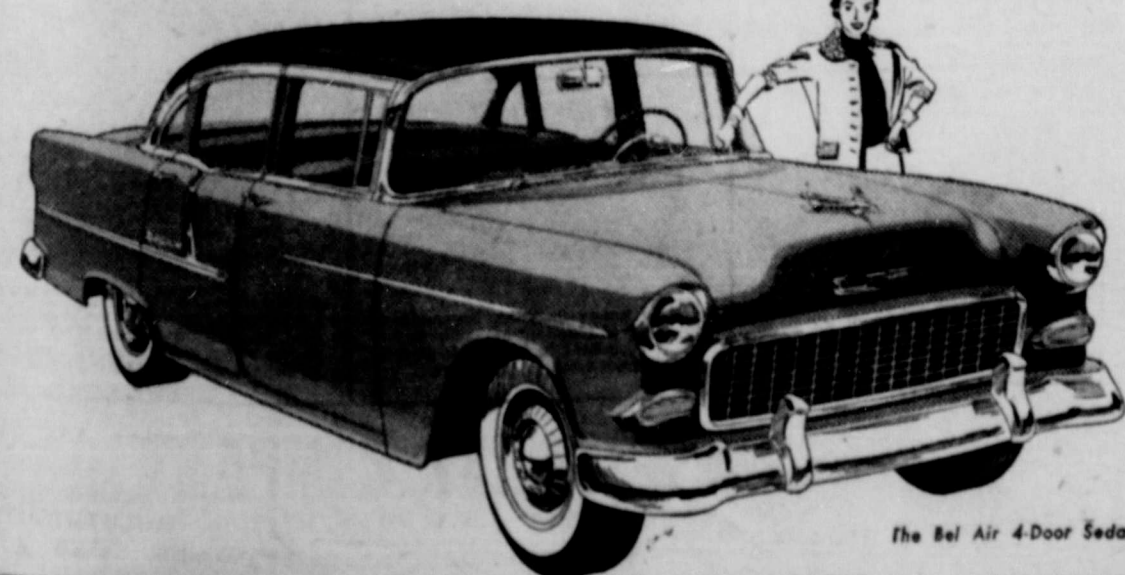

Attorney General Shepperd had previously ruled void, such an order made by the board but rescinded.

Rep. E. "Kika" de la Garza of Mission introduced a bill to prohibit any court, grand jury or legislative committee from attempting to compel a newspaper or press service employee from revealing the source of his information.

RUDDER HONORED

Newly appointed Land Commissioner J. Earl Rudder received honors this week. He has been promoted from colonel to brigadier general in the U. S. Army Reserves.

He also received appointment to a commission to revisit the Normandy Invasion Beachhead, where he made part of his out-

standing military record in the Invasion.

RED INK

"In the Red" for the first time in 13 years is the State Treasury's general revenue fund.

Treasurer Jesse James announced that banks have agreed to cash warrants without discount. Treasury calls were set for the 5th and 20th of each month, and James said the time lag would not exceed 20 days. The general fund is to get back on a cash basis around May 1.

AUTO DEALER'S FIGHT

Authorized car dealers won the first round of a bitter fight with the "Independents" or used car dealers. A Senate committee voted a favorable report on Sen. Gus Strauss' bill to license all dealers. The bill also would prohibit sale of new cars by dealers not having agreements with manufacturers or distributors.

George Parkhouse's labor bill, to prohibit payment of unemployment benefits to workers in an integrated industry was favorably reported by the Senate state affairs committee. The bill is based principally on a case in which Texas Ford Motor Co. employees were idled because of a strike in the East. . . . Offices of the federal district attorney for West Texas are being moved from Austin to San Antonio. San Antonian Russell Wine has succeeded Charles F. Herring of Austin as US district attorney.




