AUSTIN, TEXAS—Two big proposals for the state's water conservation program won in the Senate.

One is Sen. Dorsey Hardman's \$100 million state bond issue for aid to local projects. It calls for a constitutional amendment vote in September. The other is an enabling bill to start operation if and when the amendment is passed.

House sponsors on this, and on the Parish \$200 million bond bill to aid local projects have delayed calling for final action. They don't think they have enough votes.

TAX BLANK
An openly hostile revenue and taxation committee shunted Rep. Jerry Sadler's \$160 million a-year gas processing tax bill to sub-committee.

It would levy a 1-cent tax on all Texas gasoline and repeal the 4-cent gas sales tax. Opponents said it would bring a 19-cent cut in crude oil prices, costing Texas \$190 million a year.

The committee left buried the two bills embodying Gov. Shivers' original tax program. It included a 2-cent hike in the 4-cent gas tax and 1-cent boost in the 4-cent cigarette tax.

This confirmed last week's report that administration forces had abandoned the two single-shot revenue bills and pinned new hopes on Revenue Chairman Stone's omnibus bill. It would permit increases in any of the 100-odd present taxes.

The billion and a half dollar House general appropriation bill (for two years) was passed by the Senate which substituted its own version.

When the House refused to concur in Senate changes, the way was opened for a joint conference committee to resolve the differences. Lieutenant Governor Ramsey has named five Senators to the committee and House Speaker Jim Lindsey five.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Television Aided Choice Of GOP Convention Site Short Sessions Expected With Early Eve Windup

WASHINGTON—The nations millions of television fans constitute a major reason why the Republicans can go to San Francisco for their 1956 national convention, while the Democrats must remain in Chicago.

The California city was chosen by the Republican national committee on the assumption that President Eisenhower and Vice President Richard Nixon will be renominated without opposition. Thus, the GOP can confine its nominating session to a relatively few hours, including demonstrations.

Even if there are favorite son candidates or possibly a candidate of the Republican "Old Guard," it is doubtful that more than two or three names will be presented to the Republican convention.

The entire session could be staged in the late afternoon or early evening and television audiences across the nation would have ample opportunity to view the proceedings.

The Democrats, however, face the possibility of a half dozen or more names being placed in nomination. Speeches and demonstrations would run into the wee hours, even if the session began at noon.

Eastern TV watchers likely will find themselves sitting before their sets until after midnight with the Democrats meeting in Chicago. Were the convention in San Francisco, it is likely that dawn in the east would greet the last nominating speeches on the West Coast.

● EXPLOITATION—Democrats in Congress are all set to make the most of real or fancied differences between the State and Agriculture departments over farm export policies.

There is, basically, considerable reason to believe that Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson would like to move much faster than State is willing to go in getting rid of surplus commodities under special bilateral agreements with other countries.

In any case, a Senate subcommittee under Senator James O. Eastland (D), Mississippi, is preparing to get the facts from the principals on both sides.

It is perhaps significant that Eastland's colleague in the House, Rep. Jamie Whitten (D), Mississippi, first brought the question of a conflict of interests between State and Agriculture into the open.

Benson apparently tried in advance to smooth the troubled waters by stating in a recent speech that 500,000 bales of cotton—the commodity in which the two Mississippians are chiefly interested—will be sold under the special program.

● MYSTERY SUB—The Navy is particularly interested in reports that a mysterious submarine has been sighted off the Florida coast and both air and surface lookouts are being kept for the unexplained U-boat. There is no fear that the Soviet Union is planning any sneak atomic attack launched from a submarine, or that saboteurs might be smuggled ashore.

The Navy's interest stems from a desire to spot and study the characteristics of the latest-type undersea vessels of the Red navy and check performance against the American submarine flotilla.


Despite Russian claims of superiority in all fields of atomic energy, military experts do not believe the Reds have put in operation a nuclear-powered sub like the USS Nautilus, now cruising successfully as the first of the United States "fission fleet."

However, there is always the possibility that the Soviets have pulled a surprise and in any case the Navy wants a long, close, hard look at any foreign submarine whose fins are flirting with American territorial waters.

Lon Myers of Corsicana, Texas, former resident of Mills County, came to town a few days ago and while here did some inquiring about old friends and neighbors. Mr. Myers attended school at North Brown, in this county, as a boy before moving away from here sixty years ago. This was his first visit to Goldthwaite in forty years. He said he found that he was not able to contact too many of the 'Old Timers' he knew and grew up with while living here. He was quite impressed with the changes and progress made in Goldthwaite since he last saw the city.

Commenting on the recent cold wave that did considerable damage to early crops in Mills County A. O. Dunlap said: "I've lived in this county a long time and this is the coldest weather for this late in the season that I have ever seen. We had some English Peas that were about a foot high and blooming. They were frozen to the ground. I've never seen peas freeze like that before." Mr. Dunlap lives on Route 1, Mullin, in the Mullin-Priddy area.

You can be sure you can never predict just what a youngster will come up with next, in their remarks, with respect to conditions that may confront them in their daily activities. Mothers and their pre-school age boys and girls attended pre-school day at the local grammar school one day recently. This has been the custom for the past two or three years to acquaint children with school and some of its activities before enrolling officially for the fall term. According to superintendent J. T. 



San Angelo (Spec.)—A special directors meeting to further discuss the National Wool Act with special reference to Section 708 of the Act and the American Sheep Producers Council has been scheduled for April 12 in Ozona, R. W. Hodge, Del Rio, Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association president, has announced. The meeting is called for 10:00 a.m. in the County Court Room.

Section 708 provides for the promotion of lamb, wool and mohair through a producer operated organization. It will be financed through a mandatory deduction of one cent per pound from the incentive payments due the producer, Hodge stated, but the deduction for the program will not be made unless it is approved by growers of two-thirds of the wool in a referendum to be held later in the summer.

Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

By CHARLES HAENISCH
How much water will a stock tank hold? The average stock tank in the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District holds about 2 acre feet of water. If all of the water from a 1-inch rain ran off from 36 acres it would fill a tank of this size. A 2-inch rain on 18 acres or a 3-inch rain on 12 acres will fill it, if no water goes into the soil.

If the soil on a 160 acre farm will soak up a 1-inch rain it will hold 13 acre feet of water. If it soaks up 2-inches of rain it will hold 26 acre feet of water, and if it soaks up 3 inches of rain it will hold 40 acre feet of water. The soil around us is a huge reservoir for storing water if we will but take advantage of it.

A good cover of grass on the pastures and deep rooted legumes in the fields make this reservoir available for the storage of moisture for grass and crop production.

How much does it cost to store water? The average stock tank that will hold 3 acre feet of water costs in the vicinity of \$320.00. A pasture that has a good cover on it will store about 16 inches of the 27 inches of rainfall which is our average. To store this 16 inches of water from a 160 acre farm, 213 acre feet, in average stock tanks of \$22,720.00.

Runoff plots will be set up in the near future by cooperators in the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District. Those farmers and ranchers making these plots will gather information regarding the effects of rainfall on rangeland with a good grass cover versus the same rangeland with a poor cover. Information such as the amount of rainfall, the amount of runoff from each plot, and the depth of penetration in each plot will be recorded and sent to the Supervisors of the District for their use.

Farmers and ranchers in the District that have been digging post holes lately have noticed that there is a great difference in the depth of moisture where a good grass cover is present.

R. L. Burdette, south of Goldthwaite, found moisture 12 to 14 inches deep where a fair grass cover was present. Only a short distance away where the cover was absent, dry soil was found at only 4 inches.

Applications for assistance in developing a farm or ranch conservation plan was received by the Supervisors of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District this week. Farmers and ranchers requesting this assistance were: Tommy Karnes, 4 miles NW of Goldthwaite; John R. Parker, 4 miles south of Goldthwaite; W. O. Kemp, 3 miles south of Goldthwaite; Dick Hughes of the Shady Oaks Ranch, 8 miles south of Goldthwaite; Leon Johnson, Silas Burk, and O. R. Gunn, 15 miles south of Goldthwaite.

Coordinated conservation plans will be developed with these farmers and ranchers in the near future.







HYBRID GRAIN SORGHUM PROSPECTS

The first large-scale seed stock production of hybrid grain sorghums will be initiated in Texas this year by about 100 seed growers, paving the way for commercial stocks by 1957.

This will be good news for farmers interested in new hybrids. Comparison tests show increases in production of from 20 to 30 per cent over sorghum varieties now commonly grown.

Hybrid grain sorghum is the result of many years of experiment and study conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations. It had its beginning as far back as 1927 and was eventually developed at the Chillicothe and Lubbock stations, thanks to efforts of Chillicothe men, Supt. J. Roy Quinby, and Mr. J. C. Stevens, as well as Dr. Nicholas W. Kramer and R. E. Karper of Lubbock.

The Seed Division of the Texas Department of Agriculture will have its role in production, also. Seed stocks will be released to responsible seed growers who will produce small plots under TDA supervision. This program will be conducted with the cooperation of the Extension Service of A & M College.

Present plans call for the distribution of this hybrid seed to farmers in sorghum producing areas for field trial and comparison in 1956. Seed growers who participate in production this year will be eligible for larger and more extensive production next season, also. This should result in the availability of a large supply of hybrid sorghum seed in 1957.

Production methods are somewhat technical, requiring the

planting of two rows of pollinator seed adjacent to six rows of male sterile growths. The hybrid seed is produced from the male sterile rows and the pollinator seed rows are discarded for seed purposes.

Inspection will be made by TDA men. Rules and regulations of production have been tentatively adopted by the State Seed and Plant Board. These "Seed Certification Standards" help assure the producer of high quality seed.

These objectives are the primary purpose of field seed certification activities of the Texas Department of Agriculture.
