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Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Suppose Ike and Adlai Bow Out—What Happens? Harriman or Kefauver; Veep Nixon, Knowland?

WASHINGTON—President Eisenhower and Adlai Stevenson remain the overwhelming choices to head the presidential tickets again in 1956...

The problem for the Republicans is probably more acute. GOP leaders frankly admit that they are in trouble unless Mr. Eisenhower chooses to seek a second term.

However, the Democrats would have their problems, too, if Stevenson should bow out. The unsuccessful presidential candidate in 1952 can keep the various elements in his party together better than anyone on the scene right now.

In the Republican picture, a free-for-all probably would develop if Mr. Eisenhower unexpectedly said "No." Although two Californians, Vice President Richard Nixon and Senator William F. Knowland, are the best bets at the moment...

Should Stevenson not run, or fail to get the Democratic nomination, the favorites would be New York's Gov. Averell Harriman or Michigan's Gov. G. Mennen Williams. However, both are identified with the strong liberal branch of the party and face some southern opposition.

Another Democrat who certainly cannot be counted out of the presidential picture is Stevenson doesn't run—and maybe even if he does—is Senator Estes Kefauver of Tennessee.

Kefauver inadvertently has come up with the leading role in two investigations which may provide him with almost the same headline potential that precipitated him into the Democratic race in 1952 after he conducted his sensational crime investigation.

Democrats on the Senate Judiciary committee carefully maneuvered so that Kefauver could not become chairman of a group which will conduct a study on monopolies. They did so because they feared that he would reap too much publicity.

However, Kefauver will wind up empowered to look into other subjects which will serve him even better than a complicated monopoly investigation.

These two are civil defense and juvenile delinquency—issues that are of extreme importance to every mother and father in the nation and also are very easy to understand.

As a result, Kefauver is in an excellent position to keep his name before the voters this year and next. And even though he has not declared his intentions to seek the presidential nomination, he has a pair of potent springboards if and when he makes the bid.

C-BOMB—Rep. Wright Patman (D), Texas, says the United States has discovered how to build the cobalt bomb—a bomb described by nuclear experts as the most destructive weapon ever dreamed of.

FARM FANTASY—Prospects are slim that the government will permit a group of Russian farmers to visit this country as a midwestern newspaper has suggested.

To begin with, it is known that the State department didn't take to the idea. President Eisenhower has questioned whether they legally may be allowed to enter. Those are two very important strikes against the plan.

The proposal was endorsed by the Soviet government-controlled press, which didn't help matters any. An official blessing by Moscow is, in itself, enough to make the State department highly suspicious.

There is good news too. Changing Times, the Kiplinger magazine, recently released some statistics which compete favorably with many of today's headlines. For instance: 1. There are 162,922,000 Americans who are not members of the Communist Party.

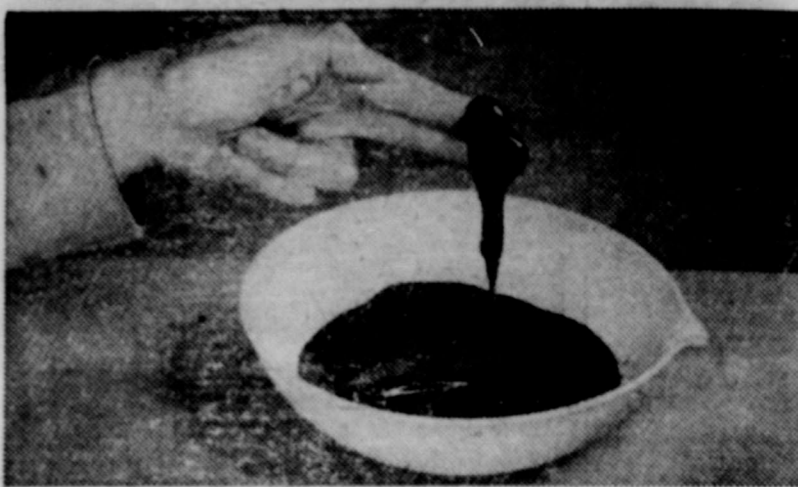

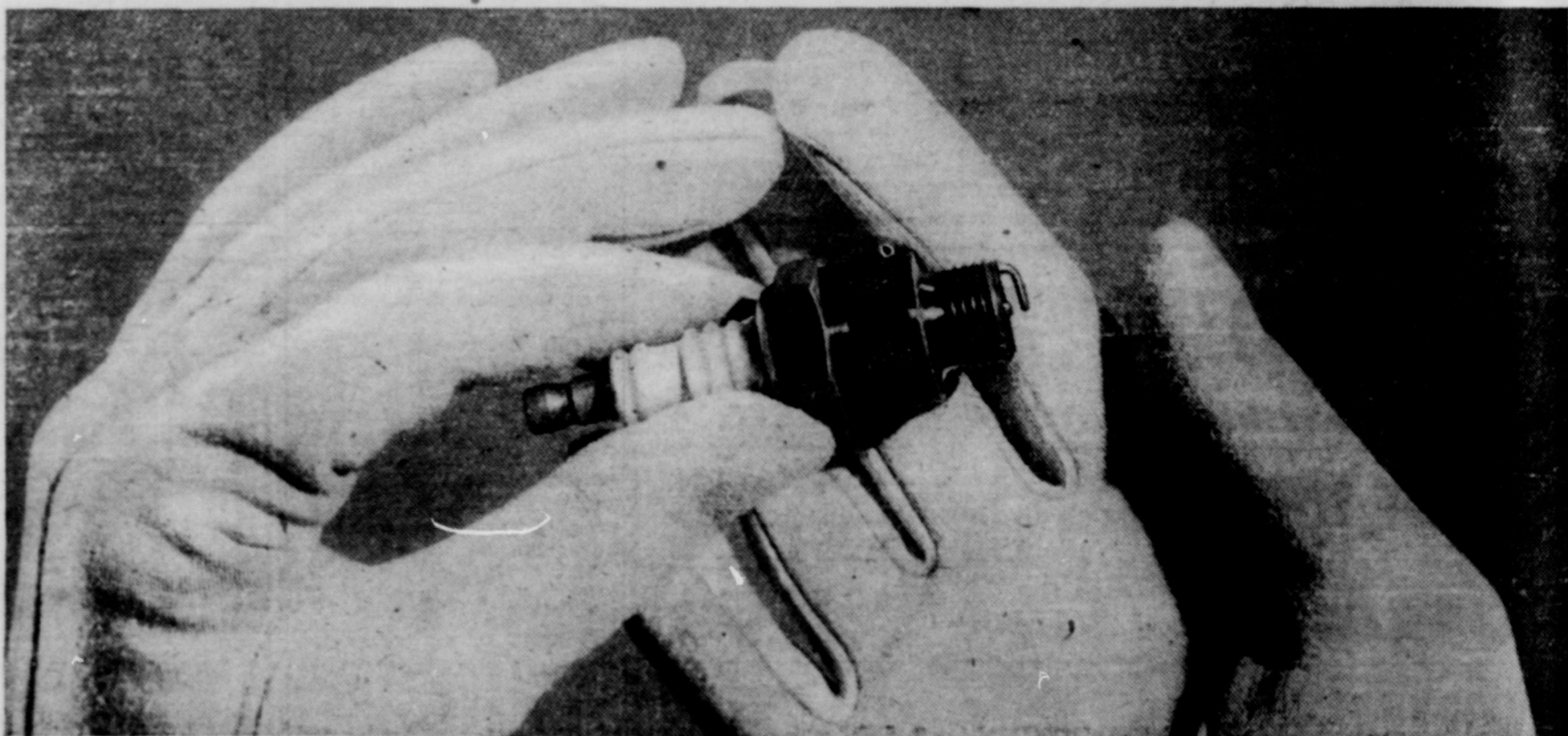

Cotton Insect Control Guide Is Available

COLLEGE STATION, (Spec.)—Entomologists are trying to stay ahead of their worst enemies—cotton insects. The 1955 guide for controlling cotton pests is already out and available from county agents.

The guide lists each insect, the insecticides best suited for its control and includes proper insecticide dosages. A spray program for both early and late season control is given in simple, easy to understand form.

The bulletin gives information on how to make insect infestation counts and tells when to spray.

Again in 1955 the control program is divided into three phases—early season control, late season control and early stalk destruction and farm cleanup.

This bulletin should be a helpful and profitable guide to every cotton grower.

Copies of L-218, Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects in Texas, 1955, are available from county agent's offices or from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

TEXAS SMALL CROP PROSPECTS

Dry weather, record freezes and blowing winds in the past few weeks have done their bit in adding to the burdens of Texas farmers this year. Many crops not actually destroyed were severely set back, meaning millions of dollars lost in time, labor, seed and crop value.

The peach crop will be almost a complete failure in Texas as well as nine other nearby southern states. The freezes which took the peaches also caused extensive damage to early season vegetables in the state.

Most late spring potatoes in Central and Northeast Texas were frozen to the ground and harvest will be delayed two to three weeks. Early acreage watermelons of the Lower Valley and Falfurrias areas were not damaged by the cold but have suffered some damage from high winds. Considerable acreage in South and Central Texas was lost but not late enough to prevent replanting. The real problem was whether or not enough moisture would be available for re-seeding.

Also in South Texas, low temperatures delayed maturity of early-spring tomatoes and high winds whipped vines and scared the fruit. The real tomato loss was in Eastern and Northeast Texas. Most tomatoes at Yoakum and nearby sections were killed. In the Jacksonville

area, limited acreage which had been set was killed and considerable damage was suffered by plants in cold frames. Replanting will depend on the availability of plants.

A few cantaloups were lost in the Winter Garden area but no damage to this crop occurred in other South Texas producing sections. Strong winds have whipped vines in these areas however. The freezes caused heavy loss of cantaloup acreage in Central Texas but replanting was still possible.

Most onions in the southern area survived the killer northers and no serious delay in maturity is expected in the advanced irrigated fields. However, yield prospects on non-irrigated onions at Raymondville and along the Coastal Bend were reduced. One of the most significant

PARENT PROBLEMS

Let Clock Tick Off Child's Punishment

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

I COVET a reputation for having made chair-sitting a popular kind of punishment among many young parents. To my knowledge, I was the first to advocate in print this type of punishment, and I have consistently advised it for a number of years.

Substitute Punishment

It enables the parent to pension her tongue and abandon spanking before the child is four or five, using this punishment as a substitute, and still to maintain good control of the youngster. Well established, it can safely be delegated to a baby sitter or other parent substitute.

Avoids Further Trouble

Chair-sitting is better for the tot 2-6 than sending him to his room, where he can find amusement or get into more devilry. Besides, there may not be many in the family from whom to be isolated. Having been set in the chair where you can easily see him, he is kept from getting into further trouble.

Don't begin this measure of control till you are pretty sure the child will stay in the chair for the designated period. Make sure that any time he ventures to leave the chair earlier than the time set, he will get immediate physical pain, as by spanking with your flat hand on his bare thigh.

Make Time Definite

Don't tell him to "sit there till I say you may get down." Always say "for—minutes." Having a

clock on which you show him where the long hand must be before he is free, is helpful.

And don't shorten or lengthen the sentence on the basis of how he acts while in the chair. Otherwise, you may tempt him to cry, scream, beg, make promises and the like.

Always let the clock announce the end of his ordeal. It never has a headache, never gets angry or soft-hearted or nervous. No one can argue with the clock. It just ticks on and on without feeling.

Don't Explain

Having pronounced the sentence, you need have no occasion to say more, except to announce, perhaps, when the time is up. Don't explain to the child why he was punished. If the reason was not apparent to him in the first place, he hardly should have been sent to the chair at all.

Don't ask him to make promises. Say nothing. Close the issue forever, and act, from then on, as if nothing had happened.

Don't Talk About Offense

If, while serving sentence, he wishes to converse with you, do so as though he were free, but don't talk about his offense or punishment.

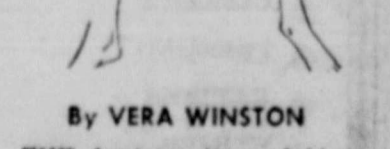

Social Security Questions Will Be Answered By Representative Here

Some people have misunderstood the provisions of the 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Act, according to James B. Marley, manager of the Austin District Social Security Office.

"We have been asked quite often whether one will be able to qualify for benefit as a farmer if he is already age 65 or over," Mr. Marley said.

"The answer is that the farmer already past his 65th birthday who is continuing to operate a farm, WILL qualify even sooner than the younger farmer. Age does not disqualify an individual from entering into the program. If he is actually operating a farm, he is required to participate by keeping his records in 1955, paying his social security tax on his farm income in 1956, and then doing the same thing for 1956. This second payment, made in 1957, would qualify him for benefits if he is age 65 or older by that time."

Questions On Income, Migration And Family Characteristics In Survey

Supplemental questions on consumer income, migration and family characteristics will be asked in the U. S. Census Bureau's Current Population Survey in April, according to Supervisor Charles E. Fay of the Bureau's district office at Dallas, Texas. The supplemental question will be in addition to the regular employment and unemployment inquiries asked each month.

Supplemental questions on family characteristics asked in the Current Population Survey in April of last year revealed that the estimated number of households in the United States increased from about 43.6 million to 46.9 million, or 8 percent, between March 1950 and April 1954. The average annual growth in number of households during these approximately four years was about 800,000.

The Current Population Survey will be conducted locally and in 229 other areas of the country during the week of April 11. Local interviews will be handled by Nella P. Casbeer of Lampasas, Texas.

Supervisor Charles E. Fay emphasized that all information about individuals furnished to the Census Bureau is held in absolute confidence under Federal law. It is used only to obtain summary figures such as totals, averages, and percentages for various groups in the population and not to show information for particular families or individuals. Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

Grassland is one of the most important resources in the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District. Farmers and ranchers in this district are becoming more concerned over the conservation of this resource. R. E. Cox, Wilford Schuster, J. C. Miles, C. D. Owens, Mrs. H. D. Ford, Nina Verser, R. L. Burdette, John R. Parker, and Walter Weatherby have begun deferring portions of their rangeland. This practice when used will allow the grasses to gain in vigor. If deferrals are continued through October the choice grasses will seed, scattering the seed to the bare areas in the pasture thereby healing over the bare areas.

Construction work is being done this week by farmers and ranchers in the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District. The C. D. McMillan Ranch near Caradan and J. J. Witty near Star are having farm ponds built. The pond on the McMillan Ranch is an enlargement, making an inadequate structure capable of supplying water for livestock in a 100 acre pasture. Mr. Witty is having a new pond built in a portion of a pasture that at present time has no water supply. Both ponds will better distribute the grazing in each pasture. The McMillan pond is being constructed by Lee Parker, local contractor and the Witty pond by Fred Walls, County Commissioner of Precinct No. 2.

Supervisors of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District are now receiving requests for orders of fish for fall delivery. These fish, furnished by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, are made available to District cooperators for stocking their farm ponds. Cooperators re-

questing channal catfish for their ponds are: Jim Soules, Star; Oscar Burns, West of Goldthwaite; Bob Black, Star; and H. B. Curtis, south of Goldthwaite. Lee Walton, south of Center City, plans to stock one of his ponds with channal catfish and one with a combination of bass and bluegills.

The Supervisors of the District urges all cooperators wanting fish this fall with which to stock their ponds to contact the Soil Conservation technician in the basement of the west wing of the Courthouse.

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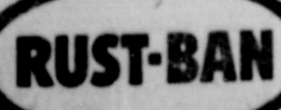
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
