White Elephant Sale Is Success

According to announcement by Norman Duren, president of the Lions Club, R. L. Steen, president of the Livestock Raisers Association and Glynn Collier secretary of the sale, a little more than \$400 was realized from the event. The secretary had received \$407.81 and proceeds from the sale of two goats was still to be reported.

As a result of this undertaking \$400.00 was paid on the indebtedness on the show barns. This leaves a balance of \$500.00 still outstanding.

Officials expressed their sincere appreciation for the fine response by many to help make the sale a success.

Ray Standley Is Named As Head Coach

Ray Standley, who resides five miles East of Goldthwaite was named head coach of Goldthwaite Schools by the board of trustees in a special meeting last Saturday night.

Mr. Standley is a graduate of T. C. U., class of 1941, where he played football until he received a leg injury that kept him from the game. He received his B. S. degree from T. C. U. with a major in physical education and double minor in Social Science and Sciences.

He entered military service in 1942 under the Gene Tunney Physical Fitness program training young men in military and physical drills in Navy Boot training before boys were sent to duty.

In 1943 he was named company commander at the Navy V-12, Marine Unit as a specialist in physical education training teenagers for Navy and Marine Officers. Later he received a commission as Ensign and was assigned to the destroyer DT 703 Lind. He served on this assignment until the Japanese surrender, as Damage Control Officer and Athletic Officer over 110 men, mostly 20 years of age or younger.

Stassen Again Candidate For Nomination in 1960
New Cabinet - Level Post Boost's Minnesotan's Chance

WASHINGTON—President Eisenhower's selection of Harold E. Stassen to serve as a Cabinet-level adviser on peace and disarmament policies has revived chances that the former Minnesota governor may become a candidate for the presidency.

Stassen, who sought the Republican nomination in 1948 without success, has disavowed any presidential ambitions in 1956 when Mr. Eisenhower is expected to be a shoo-in candidate for a second term. However, he has not ruled himself out of the running for 1960 and he is still young enough to be strongly in contention.

Mr. Eisenhower, in selecting Stassen as his "Secretary of Peace," moved him into the inner White House circle and the 1960 Republican nominating convention could well turn out to be a contest between Stassen and Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

MARKET PROBE—When the Senate Banking committee issues a report on its investigation of the stock market, you can expect it to be very far from sensational or even definite about the current boom. The reason is that both Democrats and Republicans are extremely anxious to avoid saying or doing anything that might upset the market.

Democrats, of course, as sponsors of the probe, will be held responsible for any ill effects. Republicans don't want their first administration in 20 years to be marred by a market crash that might duplicate the one that took place when they were last in power.

So, when the final report is written, both the majority and minority will be anxious not to cause any untoward incidents on Wall street.

LIGHTER PLANES—The aircraft industry says the "new look" in small utility planes for 1955 will be lighter weight, less horsepower—and lower costs.

According to Planes, publication of the Aircraft Industries association, the new idea translated into dollars and cents means that small planes will provide safer transportation for less cost.

Because of their lightness the 1955 models will require less horsepower and will fly just as far as older models with one-fourth less fuel. A small plane which cost \$11,785 in the 1940s, the association points out, would sell for approximately \$23,570 today. A comparable 1955 model, however, sells for \$12,950.

The association estimates that the light plane industry will manufacture 3,500 of these planes during the year to meet current demands.

SQUIRRELS—You may not have heard the end of the White House squirrel case. While the White House and even Senator Richard Neuberger (D), Oregon, a leading defender of the rodents, say they consider the matter closed, it is still a political issue.

Many Democratic politicians feel that they can win votes at the polls if they keep reminding the public of how three White House squirrels were trapped and deported to nearby parks because they damaged President Eisenhower's putting green.

It is just such little things, they believe, that arouse the emotions of the voters. These Democrats cite the sympathy that the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt won when Republicans made remarks about his pet scottie, Fala.

WHITE HOUSE INVITATIONS—Few realize the terrific pressure put on President and Mrs. Eisenhower to get them to attend functions in every part of the country.

An example of how far ahead the invitations come in is being supplied by the senior Girl Scouts. One of them, Mary Lynn Gravelle of Pontiac, Mich., is delivering a personal invitation to Mrs. Eisenhower this month to attend the Girl Scouts' national encampment, though the event will not be held until the middle of the summer of 1956.

The Girl Scouts are also presenting a white pine tree for the Gettysburg farm to which the Eisenhowers plan to retire some day.

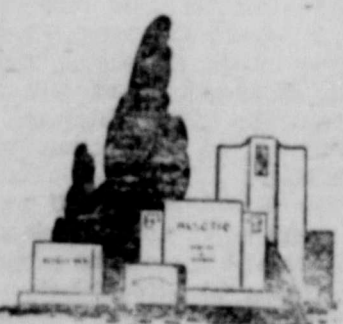

Broilers And Fryers On Plentiful List

COLLEGE STATION, (Spec.) — Rising spring production returns broilers and fryers to the plentiful foods list for the first time this year.

Raisins also are highlighted on the U. S. Department of Agriculture's May list of abundant foods.

After the regular, monthly survey of food stocks in this area, the USDA has found that supplies of more than a dozen items are large enough to rate a position on May's list.

They include: beef, pork, canned tuna, frozen halibut fillets, milk and other dairy products, rice, small size prunes and vegetable fats and oils.

Only fresh fruits for May are oranges and grapefruit. Also, processed citrus products are in good supply.

She had been up till one or two o'clock several night last week finishing Jill's and Jan's Easter dresses. Marjlyn was up till 5 a. m. getting Brenda's finished. Carol Jean and her roommate, Ann Chaney, came Friday night with Harold and Beth Everett who were going to Orange to spend the Easter weekend with Beth's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Austin Cawyer. It had been a wonderful weekend. The letter had a happy melody. It mentioned a raise for Dad and an orchid, wired from Abilene, for Carol Jean.

Billy and Johnny each had a nice new Easter suit, and did they look nice! Johnny has learned to comb his "hair." He drags a chair into the bath room and stands on it to see the mirror. He emerges with his hair looking pretty nice, though rather oil-soaked with plenty of oil on his forehead and clothes. He also gets his Grandad's shaving brush and mug and says he has to shave his whiskers off. He is a real Southerner—does not sound his r's. 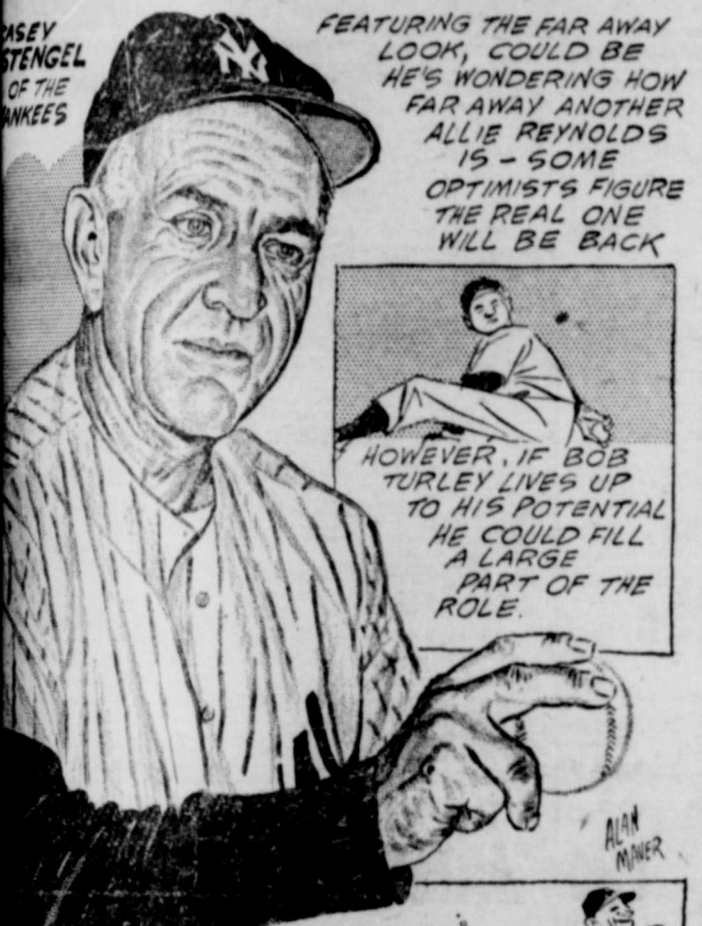

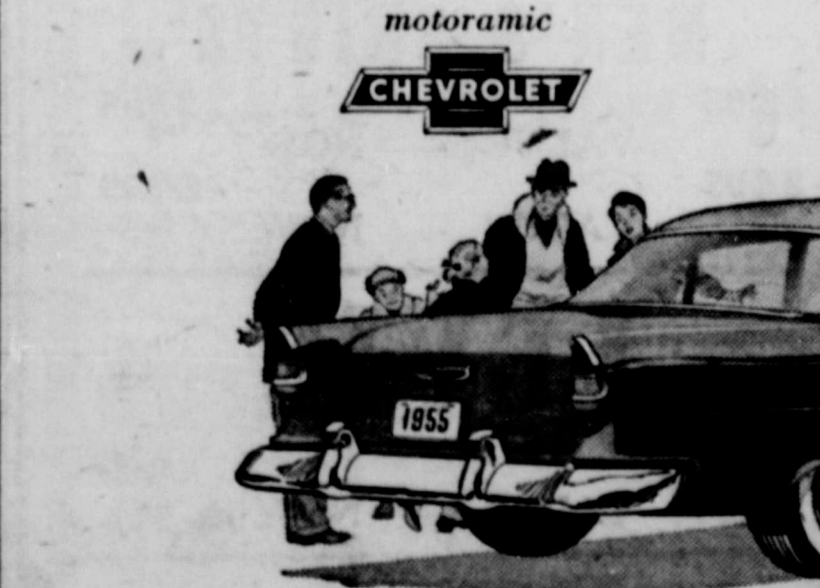

**POULTRY DISEASE
EXPERIMENT**

A cancer-like poultry disease, lymphomatosis, is costing U. S. poultrymen an estimated \$50 million a year in chicken and egg losses. This amount represents about the annual worth of Texas chicken and egg production.

Recent experiments by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, however, indicated that the tide may be turning in the fight to control and reduce this huge annual waste. Dr. B. R. Burmester is heading a project at East Lansing, Mich., which promises to provide high resistance or

immunity in chicks hatched from eggs of vaccinated hens.

Lymphomatosis is the most destructive of all poultry diseases. It is infectious, contagious and malignant. The disease affects chickens much as cancer affects man. It is caused by a virus and attacks the internal organs of chickens, causing tumorous enlargement of the liver.

Experiments have shown that immunity to the "big liver disease" can be passed from vaccinated hens to their chicks. Researchers believe that vaccination causes a buildup in the mother hen's blood of protective antibodies which are transmitted through the eggs to the chicks.

For the East Lansing experiments, 44 White Leghorn hens of a strain known to be highly susceptible to the disease were vaccinated. Most of their 300 chicks proved immune or highly resistant to the disease. Their immunity was shown by giving them potent injections of the active virus. Only 3 to 13 percent of these chicks died from lymphomatosis, depending on the dosage of virus received. Even then, the few susceptible birds survived much longer than most chicks given the injections without benefit of prior vaccination of the mother hens.

Young chicks, themselves, cannot survive the immunization. Since all chickens gain resistance to the disease as they grow older, only mature birds are injected with the vaccine. Before these research findings can be put into general use however, the techniques of vaccination must be simplified and the production of the vaccine must be put on a practical, commercial basis.

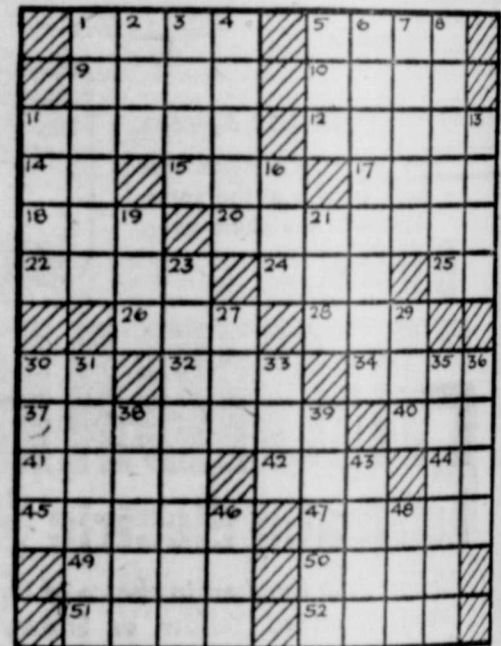

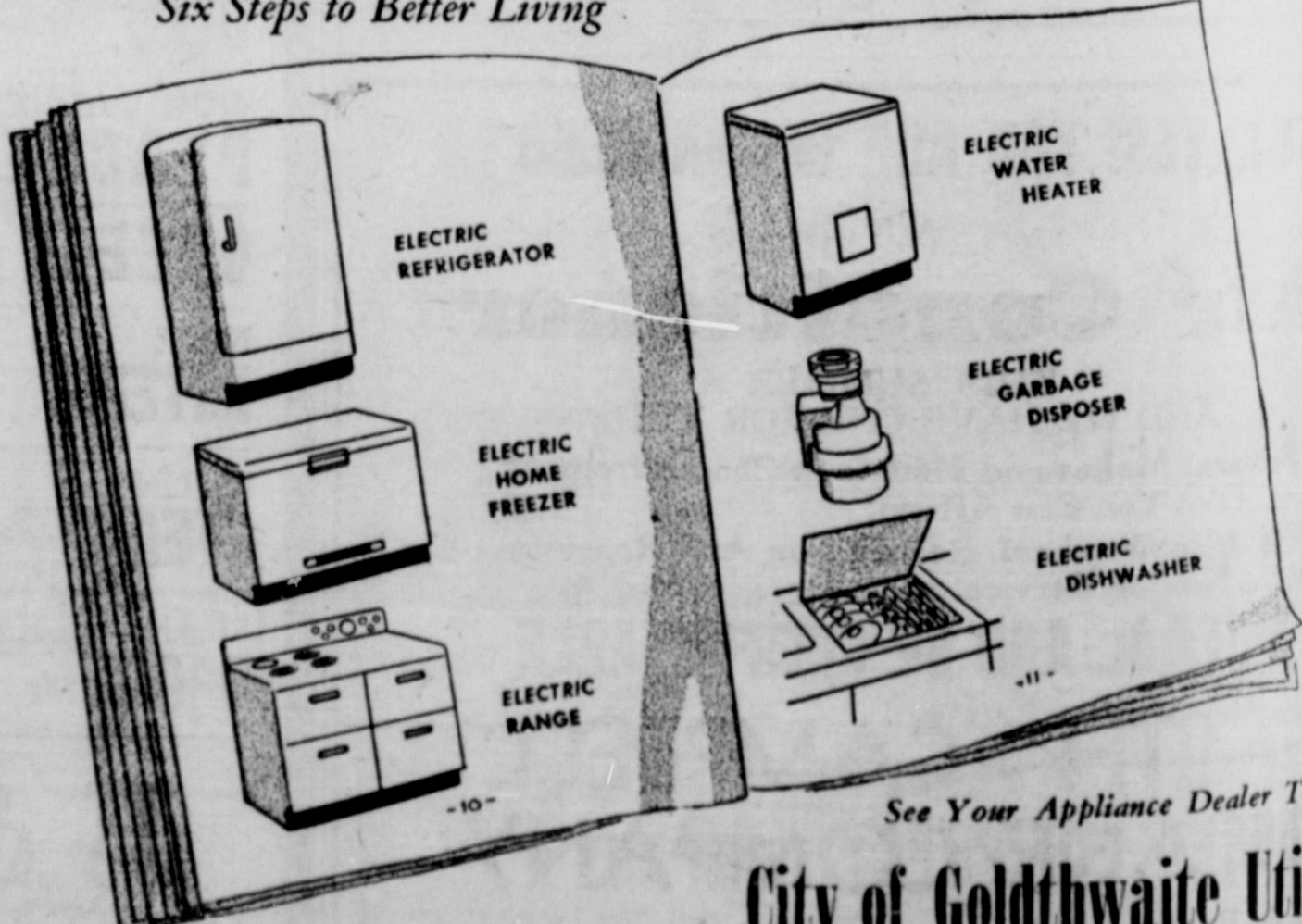

Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

By CHARLES HAENISCH
The board of supervisors of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District in a meeting held at Goldthwaite April 20th with the Mills County Commissioners Court, representatives of the

Goldthwaite Lions Club, and landowners of the Bennett Watershed announced that a preliminary investigation of the Bennett Creek Watershed had been made by the Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service.

The purpose of this investigation was to determine the need, practicability and feasibility of intensive watershed treatment for flood prevention. This treatment consists of construction of necessary detention reservoirs or floodwater retarding structures such as those in the Brady Creek, Deep Creek, and Greens Creek Watersheds in coordination with proper land treatment above these structures.

Members of the investigating team have been active throughout the watershed for the past week. They have been gathering information relative to flood damage and making tentative site selection for the detention dams. The investigating team will submit a report of their findings to the State Soil Conservation Board and to the State Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service. From the information contained in this report the watershed will be approved or disapproved for Federal assistance as provided in the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act of 1954.

The application for assistance of the Bennett Creek Watershed was made in September of 1954. This application was sponsored by the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District Supervisors, Mills County Commissioners Court, and the Goldthwaite Lions Club.

Sick Lawns Should Be Checked According To Extension Entomologist

COLLEGE STATION, (Spec.) —Spotty damage to lawns, or a general unthriftiness for which there is no obvious cause, may be the result of work done by beetle grubs.

Remaining in the soil throughout their larval stage, these grubs feed upon the roots of grasses and other plants. If a sufficient number are present in the lawn, whole root systems are destroyed and the grasses

able powders or emulsifiable concentrates that can be mixed with water and used in a sprayer. The dust forms may be applied directly to the lawn.

When treating for grubs it is a good practice to sprinkle the lawn after the insecticide is applied, adds Fuller. This will wash the poison down into the soil where it can reach the insect.

L-199, Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants, available from local Extension Agents, gives full details controlling the white grub as well as other insects.

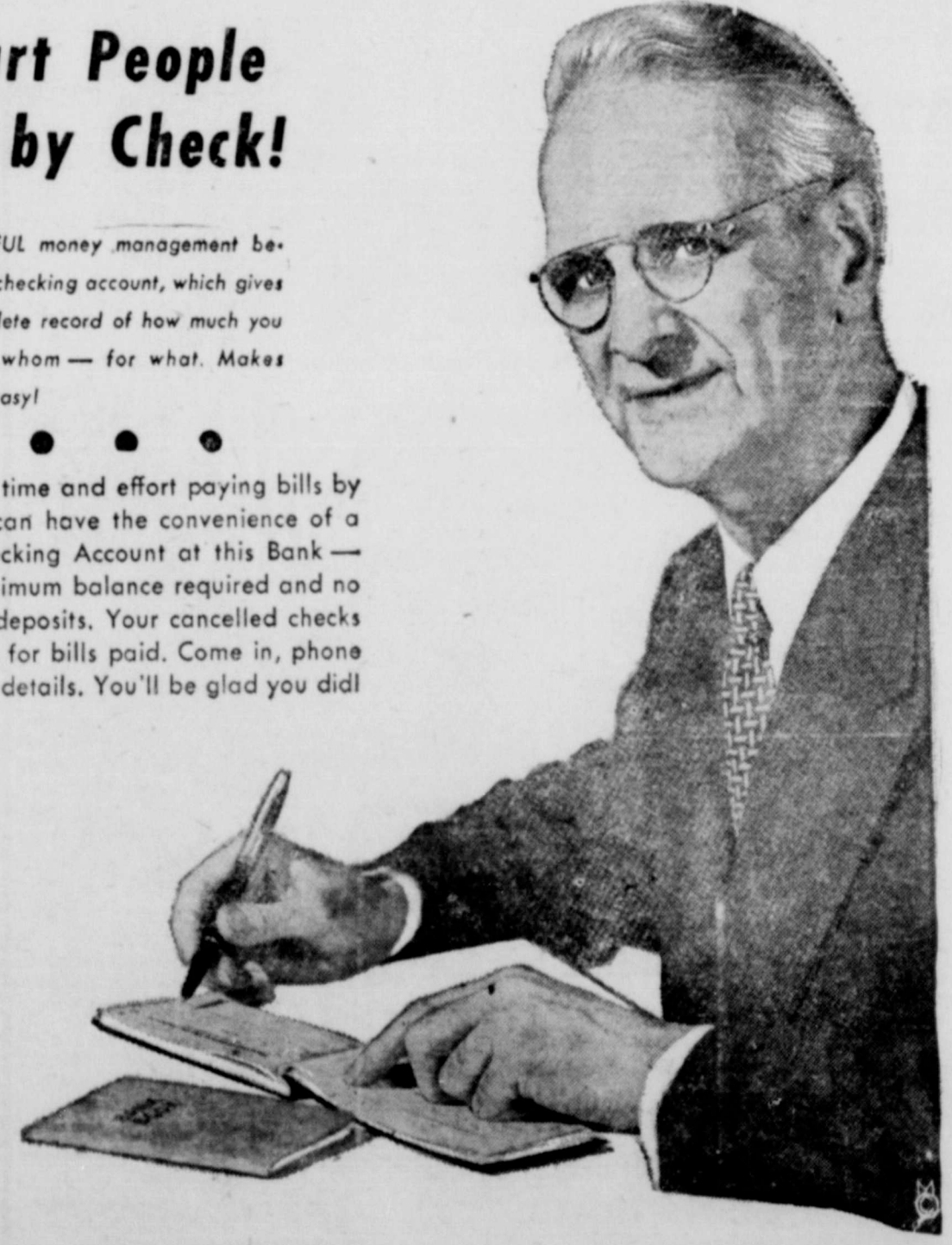
