


See Congress Row Over Air Navigational Systems

July Equipment Changeover Would Run Into Millions

WASHINGTON-Congressional investigators will soon make headlines with a major row over one of the most complicated situtions ever to face them.

civilian and military authelds must use the same navigation equipment to guide planes. It cost the government and private industry \$200 million to install the present system. Now, it would cost millions more to make the switch. Everybody seems unhappy about the whole thing, and Congress is going to look into it.

What will complicate matters is the complexity of the old and the new systems. It may take some time before the investigators can understand the differences, much less decide what to

Mundt recalls, for example, an anti-pollution bill he introduced in 1940-his second year in Congress. "It was one of my first bills," Mundt says. "I was as proud of it as a hunter with a new gun. However, just before committee action was completed the bill was amended and weakened."

The legislator said further amendments adopted on the floor finally made the measure more effective in delaying pollution control than

Even though the bill carried my name," Mundt concludes, "it was so definitely a backward step that I spoke and voted against it on the floor of the House


"It was an embarassing experience, but it taught a stern and simple lesson. If a legislator is to do his job correctly he must be free to act on the floor of Congress or the legislature in conformity with the precise proposals then before him."

• HIGH ROAD OR LOW ROAD-Controversy over the administration's highway program is centered on a traditional dispute-secondary and farm-to-market roads versus interstate heavy traffic arteries.

Principal emphasis in President Eisenhower's pro gram was on a modern interstate system to be built over 10 years. Opponents claim that this would take most of the tax money available for highway building and leave little for lesser roads.

Administration supporters contend the President's program is necessary for defense and cite many deficiencies in the present system. Essentially, the problem is: How much can government at all levels spend and how should the maximum amount available be divided?

Another controversy rages over the proposal to borrow some \$25 illion to construct the interstate system. Since the loan would not e repaid for 30 years or so, opponents say this will mean that more than half of the money would be needed to pay interest on the bonded

> Mr. James B. Marley, district manager of the Austin social security office stated that these ten million more individuals coming under the Social Security Act for the first time on January 1, 1955, are made up principally of farm operators and self-employed accountants, architects, engineers, and funerel directors. Also included are state and local government employees under retirement systems, homeworkers, and fishermen. Through a change in the law, domestic workers and farm qualify by filing an oath and workers who were unable to qualify before may now secure coverage under social security.

Mr. Marley pointed out that nine out of ten working Ameri- County Clerks to approve Notcans will be affected directly by changes made in the new law. Starting next year, more than 57 million civilian workers will be in jobs covered by OAIS. More than 110 million social security cards have been issued.

Space restrictions prohibit a detailed explanation of the various specific portions of the new law, but answers to such questons as those newly covered, benefit improvements, retirement test, disability freeze, "drop-out" provision, and refiguring benefits may be secured at the Austin social secur-

Time is swiftly bringing the Hundreds of bills will die on the calendar and never reach the inish line.

But, hundreds have passed. House members took a quick ook at a long, uncontested bills alendar, then passed 164 meaures on to the Senate in two

Senators are now considering hese bills and scrambling to et the House-passed tax bill inder the wire before adjournnent on or about May 10.

Subject to Senate approval is two-cent gasoline tax inrease, a one-cent-perpack inrease in cigarette taxes, plus a tax on cigars, snuff and packged tobacco. Also in the omni ng stamps and uranjum ore. A ike in beer dealers' license fees imminent. Contemplated too freeging of the present natural gas production tax at 8 per cent- originally due to drop to per cent in 1956.

It is estimated that the tax bill, as written, will produce \$25, 000,000 a year in additional res \$5,000,000 short of the appropriation bill. So, there will have o bemore levies, or the appropriation bill cut.

VETERANS LAND BILL

Both houses voted to submit constitutional amedment to he people, in November of 1956, calling for an additional \$100. 000,000 for the veterans land program. Replacement of the Governor and Attorney General as members of the Veterans Land Board, by two appointed nembers, is specified in the bill.

Governor Allan Shivers and Attorney General John Ben Shepperd repudiated the minutes of the board as compiled by Bascom Giles, former Land Commissioner, and the Board ordered the minutes corrected.

The "Ford Motor Bill" was softened, then passed, subject to Senate concurrence. It prohibits unemployment compensation benefits to workmen idled by a strike in other plants owned by heir employer. It exempts the workman who makes a goodfaith offer to return to his job.

Modified by the House labor ommittee, and reported favorably, was Parkhouse's bill to eliminate "Port Arthur" strike situations. It would stop unions from picketing plants where the najority of the workers were non-union.
