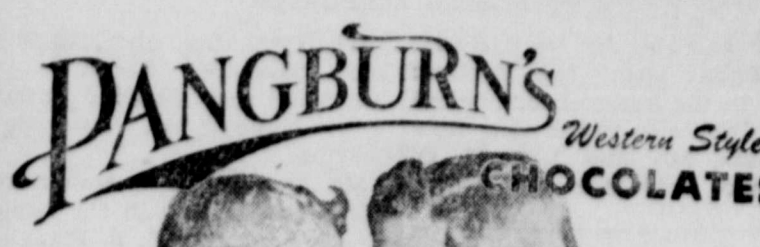

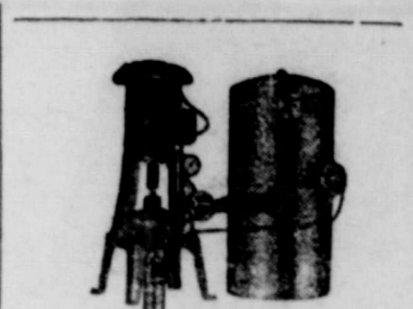
Folks Must Prove Age To Quality For Social Security Payments

Many of the Texas farm operators, farm workers and household employees who will become eligible for the expanded Social Security Act coverage in 1955 are among an estimated 40 million Americans who do not have birth certificates or other means of officially proving their ages, a necessary requirement in qualifying for Social Security benefits, according to Supervisor Charles E. Fay of the U. S. Census Bureau's district office in Dallas, Texas.

These persons, however, may obtain this vital information from the historic records of the U. S. Bureau of the Census. During the last decade, the Census Bureau has handled more than two million requests for copies of Census records from individuals for use in qualifying for Social Security benefits in settling estates and insurance cases and for other purposes where it is necessary to furnish evidence of identity, age or citizenship.

Transcripts of personal cen-

sus records can be obtained from the Census Bureau upon payment of the cost of searching the records. Federal funds are not appropriated for this service and the fees charged are used to pay the salaries of the searchers and to cover the cost of the necessary office supplies. A fee of \$3.00 is charged for searches of two censuses of one individual, given routine handling. Expedited handling can be obtained for a fee of \$4.00. Routine handling generally requires from four to six weeks to complete while expedited handling is usually completed in one or two weeks. Personal information recorded by the

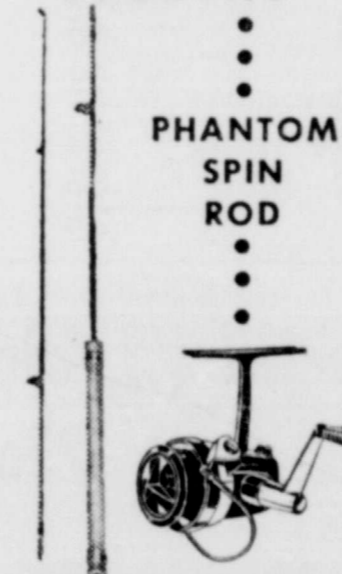

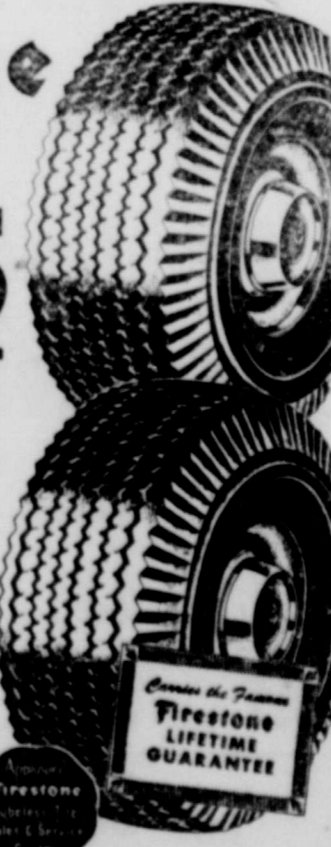

Clementine Wilmeth Briley Writes From Temporary Home In El Paso

A letter from Clayton Eggei this week said they had about an inch of rain April 9, and it really made things look different. But of course it can't last unless they have more. We have had quite a bit of cloudy weather around El Paso this week, so I'm hoping it means rain somewhere.

Sunday afternoon (April 17) Grace and Johnny and I went to the Coliseum to see the El Paso Annual Flower Show, sponsored by the garden clubs. This immense building really housed a lot of beauty. Such beautiful displays; grass floors, water running over rocks, and flowers galore. Such beautiful beds of them. It was all done by flowers in pots. The small border flowers in tiny pots; others in larger pots. I climbed up a few steps to peep over at the running roses at the back to see what they were in. Their containers looked like some big old cut-off square cans.

There were petunias, ruffled, double, and plain. I like mine plain. There were parrot tulips, immense, beautifully-colored, and queer-shaped. I like mine to look like tulips. There were double daffodils, but I like mine single with trumpets in the center. There were plenty of every kind. The Iris display was exquisite. I did not know there were so many beautiful varieties. El Paso wishes to be known as "The City of Irises." There was an azalea display, and also a few camellias and orchids. The Texas Highway department had a display of Texas wild flowers—bluebonnets, wild verbena, bitter weed, yucca, peotillo, and several others. I could hardly believe my eyes. I thought, "Is it time for the wild flowers to bloom." I hadn't seen a one this year.

I had a dream of flaming red Comanche Chief petunias bordered by white sweet alyssum like a picture in the Household

Magazine. I paid 50c for a small packet of the petunia seed. I had no tub, pan, or box to plant them in, but I fixed a corner of my front flower bed as good as I could. The soil seemed in perfect condition. The seed were so fine I could hardly see them. I planted them as best I could. I covered them with burlap and made small holes in a tin can for a watering can. Not a seed has come up. This ground crusts so bad and dries out so fast it is really hard to get small seed up. I guess I've lost out for this year. But next year I'll either get my plants from the nursery, or fix a cold frame on the south side of our north rock fence and start my plants early.

I have zinnias up in the back yard and cosmos and marigolds planted. My front flower bed is the brightest spot in our neighborhood. My pansies are as large and beautiful as those at the flower show. My Dutch Irises are equally as lovely, and so are our daffodils. The chrysanthemums I brought from Abilene are growing luxuriantly, and some of the daisies are budding. The ranunculus have furnished more color than anything else. We have two rose bushes with buds. So after all we have plenty to encourage us, and maybe next year we shall accomplish more.

Before I came to El Paso last fall, my friend, Mrs. Claud Cross of Fort Worth, wrote me that Chester Durham's widow, Mrs. Edna Durham, lives here and she wanted me to meet her. Soon after I got here, I looked for her name in the phone book, but did not find it. I had her address, and I thought I would write her, or we would go by to see her, but Grace has such little time for visiting we had not gone. Last week I discovered the phone in Chester's name. Today (April 20), just out of a clear sky, I got a letter from Maud Durham (Chester's sister) from Los Angeles. She said the last time she saw me was in 1913 when she and her mother visited us in Dallas just before they left for California.

She wrote me at Ebony. She had heard that my sister, Grace, was living in El Paso and she wanted her to meet her sister-in-law. Of course they got it

mixed up. It is my daughter, Grace, who lives here. My sister lives in Fort Worth. Anyway I called Edna Durham tonight, and we talked a long time. She seemed like an old friend, and we are to see each other soon.

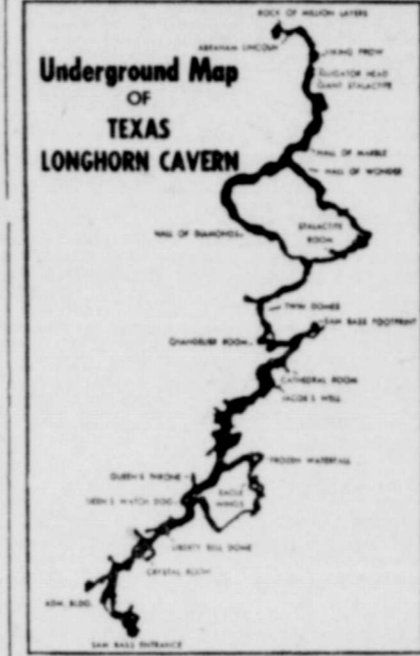

Most Destructive Insect Pests In Texas Are Listed

COLLEGE STATION, (Spec.)—Cotton bollworms, grasshoppers and boll weevils were the three most damaging insects to Texas crops last year.

Aphids, rice weevils, cutworms, spider mites, thrips, armyworms and plant bugs complete the list of the state's 10 most destructive insect pests in their order of "economical importance," according to a report by Dr. J. C. Gaines of the department of entomology of the Texas A. and M. College System.

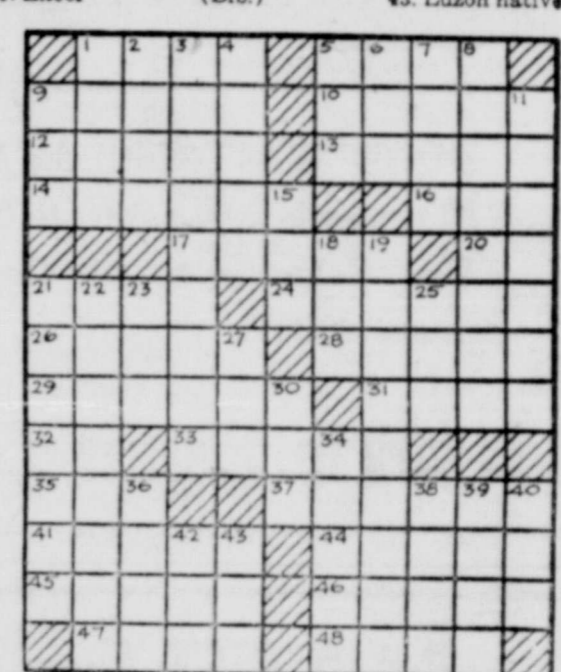
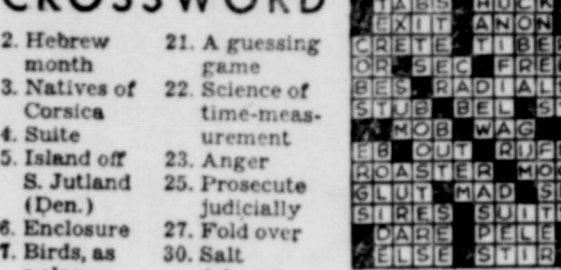

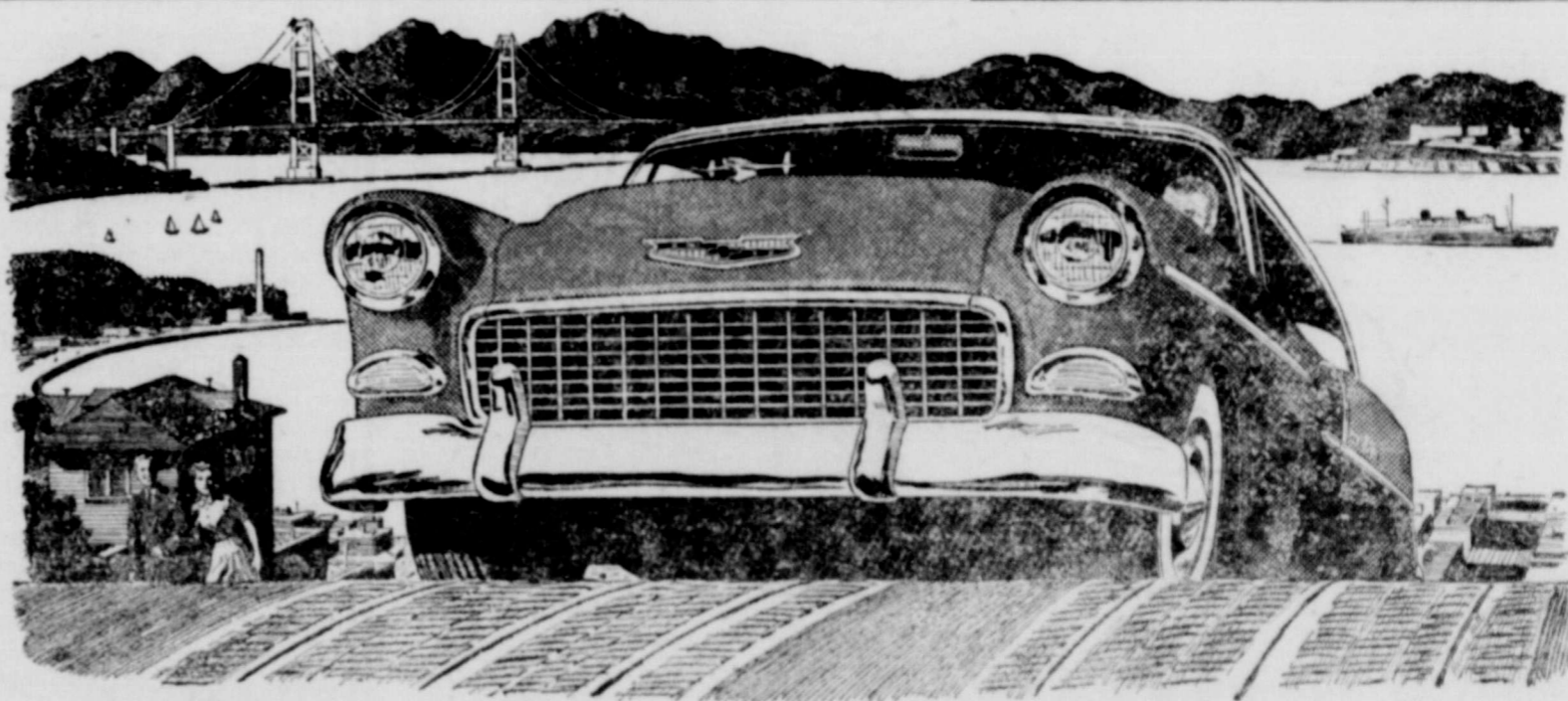

Texas Manufacturing Up 8.7 Percent According To Census Bureau Report

Value added by manufacture in Texas in 1953 was \$3,486,240,000, up 8.7 percent over 1952, according to 1953 Annual Survey of Manufactures estimates released today by Acting Supervisor Charles E. Fay of the Census Bureau's district office in Dallas.

Texas ranked eleventh among the States in value added by manufacture in 1953. Average number of manufacturing employees in Texas in 1952 was 420,462, with salaries and wages of \$1,628,705,000, up from 383,187 employees paid \$1,421,126,000 in 1952.

Texas' chemicals and allied products industry had value added by manufacture of \$777,092,000, an average of 37,808 employees, and salaries and wages of \$173,981,000 in 1953, an increase from value added of \$691,783,000, an average of 34,406

employees, and salaries and wages of \$149,605,000 in 1952.

The petroleum products industry in Texas had value added by manufacture of \$542,104,000 in 1953, down from \$552,608,000 in 1952. Employees in this industry numbered 41,372 with salaries and wages of \$215,363,000 in 1953, compared with 39,365 employees paid \$193,814,000 in 1952.

Information on manufacturing activities in 1954 is now being collected in the 1954 Census of Manufactures and statistics for States, their counties and cities, covering all important industries will be published before the end of this year.

AUSTIN, Tex.— All eyes are on the clock now as Legislators vie for position at the Speaker's post, to "run" with their favorite bills.

Time is swiftly bringing the Legislative "race" to a close.

Hundreds of bills will die on the calendar and never reach the finish line.

But, hundreds have passed. House members took a quick look at a long, uncontested bill calendar, then passed 164 measures on to the Senate in two days.

Senators are now considering these bills and scrambling to get the House-passed tax bill under the wire before adjournment on or about May 10.

Subject to Senate approval is a two-cent gasoline tax increase, a one-cent-perpack increase in cigarette taxes, plus a tax on cigars, snuff and packaged tobacco. Also in the omnibus tax bill is a levy on trading stamps and uranium ore. A hike in beer dealers' license fees is imminent. Contemplated too is freeing of the present natural gas production tax at 8 percent—originally due to drop to 7 percent in 1956.

It is estimated that the tax bill, as written, will produce \$25,000,000 a year in additional revenue for the general fund. That is \$5,000,000 short of the appropriation bill. So, there will have to be more levies, or the appropriation bill cut.

VETERANS LAND BILL

Both houses voted to submit a constitutional amendment to the people, in November of 1956, calling for an additional \$100,000,000 for the veterans land program. Replacement of the Governor and Attorney General as members of the Veterans Land Board, by two appointed members, is specified in the bill.

Governor Allan Shivers and Attorney General John Ben Shepperd repudiated the minutes of the board as compiled by Bascom Giles, former Land Commissioner, and the Board ordered the minutes corrected.

Senator Jimmy Phillips, members of the Senate investigating committee, immediately seized, for photostating, all the old minute books. Phillips said he did this, under committee subpoena, "to make certain that there is a permanent record of the minutes as they were originally entered."

LABOR LEGISLATION

Three Bills by Sen. George Parkhouse, all fought by organized labor, moved ahead in the House.

The "Ford Motor Bill" was softened, then passed, subject to Senate concurrence. It prohibits unemployment compensation benefits to workmen idled by a strike in other plants owned by their employer. It exempts the workman who makes a good-faith offer to return to his job.

Modified by the House labor committee, and reported favorably, was Parkhouse's bill to eliminate "Port Arthur" strike situations. It would stop unions from picketing plants where the majority of the workers were non-union.

Another Parkhouse bill authorizes suits for injunctions and damages.

WORKMEN'S BENEFITS

Benefits for workmen are destined to improve.

Passed by the House was a bill by Rep. Garth Bates, increasing the workmen's compensation rate from \$25 to \$35 a week.

A Senate bill by Parkhouse increases benefits under unemployment compensation from \$20 to \$25 a week, while restricting those who may receive jobless pay.

SHIVERS HAS 1,000 GUESTS

Governor and Mrs. Shivers were hosts to some 1,000 guests at a formal reception at the Mansion.

The biennial affair, given for legislative members, state officials and their wives, was the big party of the week in Austin.

APPOINTMENTS CONFIRMED

Twenty-nine appointments made by Governor Shivers were approved by the Senate. These included:

PRESIDING JUDGES: Judge W. L. Jack Thornton of Dallas, first administrative judicial district; Judge Howard P. Green of Cuero, fourth district; and Judge Floyd Jones of Breckenridge, eighth district.

BOARD OF REGENTS (State Teachers College): H. L. Mills of Houston, Miss Elizabeth Koch of San Antonio, and Henry Sears of Hereford.

VETERANS AFFAIRS COMMISSION: Marcus Weems of West Columbia.

DUST STORM DISASTER

Alarmed by dust storms, John C. White, Agriculture Commissioner, says "Much of the land in West Texas is in far worse shape now than at any time in history, including the dust bowl era of the 1930s."

Following a tour of West Texas, White made recommendations to the State and Federal governments that steps be taken to remedy the drought situation.

The State Future Homemakers of America met in Galveston for their annual meeting April 21-23. Those from the local chapter who attended were Sherry Heatherly, voting delegate, Linda Edgington, the chapter's incoming president, Rosaline Saylor attended as a member of the State Executive Council, and Miss Patty Wright, the sponsor.

The guest speaker for the first general session was Reverend Walter K. Kerr, whose subject was "Peaceful Thinking Peaceful Living," the theme for the three day meeting. The theme was brought out in skits, talks, and reports of various committees.

Another guest speaker who was highly welcomed by the 4,000 girls present, was David Risinger, president of the brother organization, Future Farmers of America. David gave a very good motto, "Believers Succeed."

The meeting ended on Saturday with installation of officers.

The new and old officers were each presented with red roses, the flower of the organization.
