Eisenfawer and Stevenson Again in '56 - Forecast

Capital Politicians Predict Return 'Match' Next Year

WA MINGTON-Most Washington politicians are more and more envinced that the 1956 presidential candidates again will be Eisenh wer and Stevenson. While the President has not announced his intentions. GOP strategists are pinning their hopes on his candidney and don't believe he'll let them down. Stevenson is also emerging ass the Democratic nominee, with his close friends saying he is available.



Senator

With the withdrawal of Senators Richard Russell and Stuart Symington, Stevenson appears far and away the best bet for the Democratic nomination. Govs. Averell Harriman of New York and G. Mennen Williams of Michigan also have said they will support Stevenson thus eliminating two other top possibilities.

Senator Estes Kefauver of Tennessee still remains in the picture, but it is doubtful that he could muster enough support to win the nomination if Stevenson goes after it.

> The new seed provisions, ameding the Texas Seed Act, also cut down the permissive presence of many other weeds in commercial seeds. These noxious weeds are divided into two groups: "primary" and "second-

"Secondary" noxious weeds in excess of 200 weed seed per pound are prohibited from sale.

This means that presence in commercial seed of more than 100 seeds-per-pound of dodder, curled dock, blueweed, Canada thistle, or Johnson grass-all primary weeds- make such seeds unsalable. However, crops containing Johnson grass in excessive quantities may be sold when labeled "Pasture Mixture."

Secondary noxious Weeds, or weeds that can be controlled by good cultural practice in spite of their objectionability, include such familiar species as Russian thistle, Bermuda grass, wild oats, wild onion and garlic, wild carrot, wild mustard, goat grass, puncturevine (goat head). cocklebur, and wild radish. 

Establishing a new lawn requires the use of adapted grasses, proper watering, mowing, fertilization and drainage, E. M. Trew, extension pasture specialist, says.

Texas home owners have a choice of two popular lawn grasses. Bermuda-grass is most widely adapted to growing conditions of the state. The other specie, broad-leaved St. Augustinegrass, is recommended in the eastern and southern areas of the state. Buffalo, prennia! ryegrass and Kentucky Bluegrass are varieties of lesser import-

A sandy loam type soil high in organic matter forms an ideal foundation for lawns. Most soils need more organic matter. Its addition in the form of peat, compost or well decomposed gin trash, sawdust or leaf mold is

To insure proper drainage and smoothness, most lawns will require some grading or leveling.

If the lawn is seeded, use high quality seed of a single grass, not a lawn mixture. Spread seed evenly. Sodding, laying grass in solid strips, is expensive and time consuming but gives the desired grass cover quickly. If you sprig, the grass runners should be packed firmly into the soil.

Sprinkle lightly and frequently until the grasses become established. As they take a foothold, water less often and increase the amount.




