At the time the assessment went to the State offices, the projected damages were estimated due to the droughty con-However, on ditions. September 21, an early freeze hit the County. dropping temperatures to degrees. and damaging crops in the

Due to the early freeze and the resulting damages. the first damage estimate sent to the State has now been revised. Nobles says, however, that a true assessment of damages will not actually be possible, nor accurate until after the crops are harvested. Farmers in different parts of the county have reported their crops. Early cotton or other early planted crops which were already near full growth were not as badly hit as those crops which were planted at later dates. Bailey County Extension Agent Spencer Tanksley told the Journal that vegetables and soybeans were likely to be the crops suffering the worst damages from the early freeze, but also indicated that a complete damage assessment would not be possible until after harvest.

Members of the Bailey County Emergency Board held another meeting Wednesday, September 28 revise the original damage estimate so that the damages caused by the freeze would be reflected

In the September 19 estimate, the yield per acre on the 87,616 acres of cotton in Bailey County in 1983 was estimated to be 206 pounds per acre. This figure was revised to reflect 185 pounds in the latest estimate. For corn. an estimated 140 bushels per acre on the 16.374 acres in the county was first estimated. County Gets \$6.2 Million In 1982 Tourist Trade

Bailey County last year received an estimated \$6.2 million in spending by U.S. travelers, a national study has disclosed.

Its rate of growth, 18 percent over 1981 receipts. was nine percent over that for the state as a whole.

The travel study, done by the U.S. Travel Data Washington, Center in D.C., found that the county last year had 87 travel-related jobs, with a payroll estimated at \$911 thousand.

It also realized an estimated \$29 thousand in local and county taxes paid by travelers.

The study measures the economic impact of all overnight trips and day from home. Thus it includes spending by Texans as well as by out-of-state visitors. Trips for all purposes are in the picture.

For the state as a whole 1982 travel meant \$13.7 billion to the Texas econo-

The nine percent increase over 1981 traveler spending was five times greater than the 1.8 percent growth of the U.S. travel industry.

Travel industry employment last year in Texas rose to 283,917. The figure was up four percent over 1981 - six times above national travel industry employment which fell two percent last year.


Muleshoe Man Draws 12 Year Sentence

Ag Vehicle Width Ruling Is Amended

Recent controversy over House Bill 1602, passed during the last session of legislature, was settled on Wednesday, when the Texas Highway Commission, meeting in Austin, ruled that farm equipment would be exempt from the width restrictions previously imposed. The bill, if enforced would have meant that farm equipment owners would have to purchase an annual \$480 per vehicle permit to drive their over-sized equipment on any public road. This would have included farm to market and county roads.

Highway commissioners maintained that the bill was not intended to exclude the incidental use of the highways by farm equipment, to begin with.

Prior to June 19, Texas laws had an exemption from vehicle width requirements on Texas public highways for transportation of ag implements at a distance of not more than 50 miles, allowing farmers to carry out agricultural operations. However, effective June 19, it was made unlawful for any vehicle to operate on a public high-way in Texas if the total outside width, including the load exceeds 102 inches (8.5 feet), unless the vehicle is operated on a highway specially designated.

The Wednesday session of the Texas Highway and Public Transportation Commission, however, reinstated the agricultural exemption, enabling farmers to drive overwide equip-







New process takes 'beany' flavor out of soybean protein

COLLEGE STATION—A process that takes the 'beany' flavor out of soybean protein products used in baked goods, ground meats and other foods has been patented by a Texas A&M University researcher.

"Flavor has been cited as one of the main factors limiting wider use of soybean protein products in foods," explained inventor Jim Lawhon, a veteran oilseed protein researcher with the Food Protein Research and Development Center of the Texas Engineering Experiment Station.

"We believe this process may be the long-awaited missing link in development and marketing of vegetable protein products without objectional flavors," said Dr. Ed Lusas, director of the food protein center.








Cotton harvest is here and the Coop urges extreme caution when operating farm equipment near electric lines.

> In recent years, many incidents have involved cotton module builders. The extended portion of the cotton module builder can easily come into contact with overhead electric lines if the operator is not careful. The same problem exists with overhead baskets on cotton strippers.



We urge farmers and their employees to be alert to these potential hazards and take every possible precaution to avoid serious injury or death. When moving a module builder, be sure the packer arm is lowered as far as it will go. When using a stripper with an overhead basket, be sure to check for overhead lines before dumping.



National 4-H Week Observation Set

4-H has a proud 75-year heritage that forms the basis of this year's National 4-H Week theme, "4-H: Building on Experience."

National 4-H Week, Oct. 2-8, is a special time for 4-H members and leaders to promote the nation's largest youth organization and to bring some recognition to its contributions, points out Kirby Rankin, county 4-H program coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Over the years millions of 4-H'ers have gained valuable leadership experiences and learned practical skills that have improved their quality of life, notes Rankin.

Today almost five million youth across the nation between the ages of 9 and 19 are gaining valuable learning experiences through 4-H--187,000 of those are in Texas, and 150 live in Bailey County. The Bailey County 4-H program reaches boys and girls through community based clubs and short-term project groups.

4-H'ers are engaged in some 50 different project areas in which they gain lifelong skills through the program's "learning by doing" concept, points out Rankin. These projects had their beginning 75 years ago when special Corn Clubs were organized for boys in Jack County. First focusing on such traditional areas as crop and livestock production and canning and sewing, 4-H projects now deal with a wide range of subjects, including small engines, rocketry and veterinary science--even the use of computers.

The 4-H program is conducted in each county through the Cooperative Extension Service and is backed by the state's land-grant university (Texas A&M University for the Texas program) and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Adult and teenage 4-H leaders shoulder much of the responsibility for the 4-H program in Bailey County says Rankin.
