per foot, and \$3.00 per foot where 'Casing Off' is needed.

Location for the new well is on the Northeast corner of the J. R. Mills property, one mile northeast of Highway 84, in the same vicinity of the other city wells. The site is 2,880 feet from the present best well the city has.

Rig was moved on location the later part of last week and drilling got underway Tuesday. The test well will be drilled into the Trinity Formation with the hope of hitting Trinity sand water. The drilling job is expected to be done in three or four days. The new location is approximately 60 feet higher than the last well drilled by the city which is 404 feet deep. It is expected the new well will be 500 feet deep.

If sufficient water is found it will require about three days for acidizing the well and about one week of testing in order to determine whether the well will produce enough water to justify the expense of casing, water line, installing pump and building electric line.

The city water department has sufficient funds to drill the well and make the tests. If results from the test indicate the well will justify the expense then arrangements will be made to finance the project which is expected to cost \$15,000.00 to \$16,000.00.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Scarcity of Scientists, Soviet Training Future Engineers Seen Serious, Savants at Rapid Rate

WASHINGTON—Look for the federal government to take the lead in a new move to spur the call for trained scientists and engineers.

The nation's colleges and universities have long lagged in the demand for such men, but beyond occasional warnings that America may fall behind in the arms race, the government has done little thus far.

The fellowships and scholarships offered to prospective scientists have failed to produce the numbers of men needed to keep pace with today's march of science. However, now, say the experts, Russia has actually taken the lead in training engineers and scientists.

Atomic Energy Commission Chairman Lewis L. Strauss warns this could lead to "a national calamity, imperiling our security and freedom a generation hence."

Strauss recently quoted Central Intelligence Agency Director Allen Dulles as having reported that "between 1950 and 1960 Soviet Russia will have graduated 1,200,000 scientists and engineers, compared with about 900,000 in the United States in our present program."

● CAUGHT SHORT—Senator Milton R. Young (R), North Dakota, had a shutter bug's field day on his recent trip to Russia. The senator was allowed complete freedom in photographing the Soviet scene with his movie camera and as a result is the proud possessor of some wonderful shots.

However, Young is still moaning about the big one that got away. When he was invited to a Kremlin reception, the legislator was quite surprised that there was no objection to taking the faithful camera along.

Young poised himself for an orgy of photographing Nikita Khrushchev, boss of the Communist party, Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin, and other Red big-wigs at play. Just as he was ready to start rolling, Young made a frightful discovery—no film!

● BLAME THE HURRICANES!—Got troubles? Blame them on those recent hurricanes which hit the United States. You'll be right in style.

Even the Department of Agriculture is doing it, and quite legitimately, in connection with a sudden buildup of mosquito and house fly populations in many storm-swept states.

Says the department: "Severe flooding in many areas of Massachusetts contributed to severe infestations of mosquitoes and house flies. Mosquitoes have been numerous and annoying in the Norfolk area of Virginia."

"They have appeared in great numbers throughout the Rio Grande valley of Texas after floods caused by hurricanes."

The department went on to say that some Delaware counties in the path of the big hurricanes have the heaviest infestations of mosquitoes of any time in the past 10 or 15 years.

Other states plagued by hurricane-inspired insect hordes were listed as Rhode Island, Pennsylvania, North Carolina and Florida.

Far once there was no promise of any immediate offer of federal assistance to help the states attack this particular aspect of the post-hurricane problem.

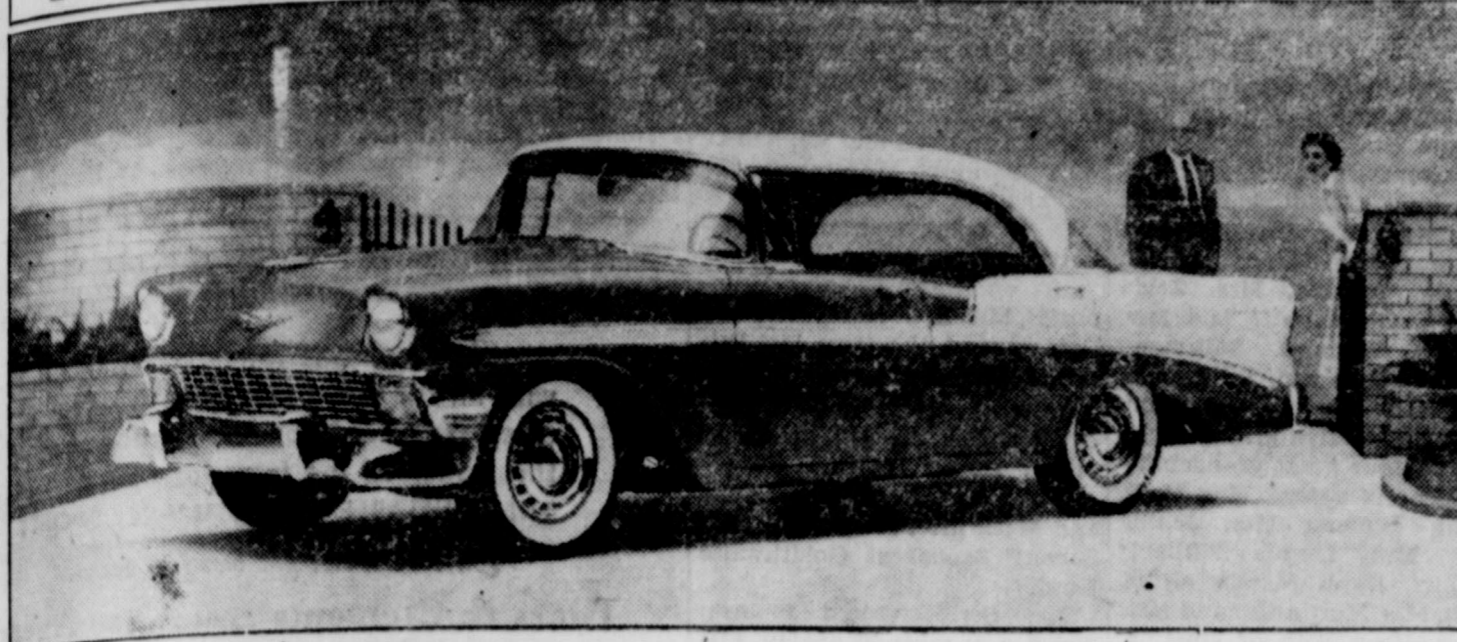

The Show, sponsored by the San Saba Chamber of Commerce will be inaugurated to stimulate interest in the pecan industry in this area, and also to acquaint the public with the numerous varieties of improved pecans that are being produced.

The counties from which entries will be eligible for competition are San Saba, Brown, Mills, Lampasas, Burnet, Llano, Mason and McCulloch. Entries will be welcomed from counties other than these, but will not be eligible for the prizes.

Ribbons, cash prizes, and merchandise prizes will be offered for ten or more classes of pecans, including the following varieties: Burkett, Mahan, Western Schley, No. 60, San Saba Improved, Halbert, Onilwon, Squirrel's Delight, Seedlings. A class will be set up for any other variety of which three or more entries are made. The grand champion and reserve champion entries will be selected from the winners in the individual classes. The owners of the first place entries will be asked to let their pecans be entered in the State Pecan Show at Texas A. & M. College.

Copies of the Show rules have been mailed to all Vocational Agriculture Teachers and County Agricultural Agents in the eight county area. Should you desire more information on the Show, contact the V. A. teacher or County Agent in your area, or write the San Saba Chamber of Commerce, or the San Saba County Agent.

Entries to the Show close on December 1st. They may be sent to or left at the San Saba County Agricultural Agent's office or the San Saba Chamber of Commerce. Growers must send enough pecans to weigh one pound. Judges for the show will be from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A. &

M. College Horticulture Department and the U. S. Department of Agriculture Pecan Experiment Station at Brownwood.

Growers planning to make entries should be selecting their pecans now before they market

their pecans. You need not be a large producer to enter. Anyone producing pecans is eligible and welcomed. Your entry will help publicize the pecan industry in this area.

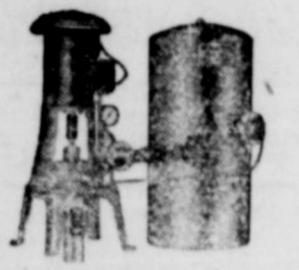

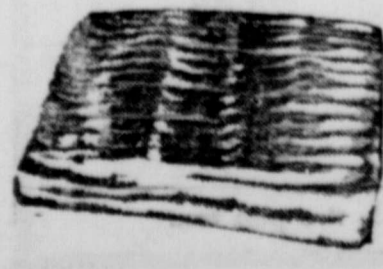

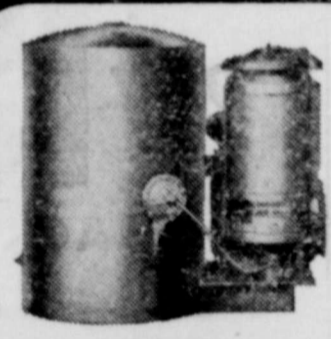

Improvements In Credit Services Made For Farmers

Further improvements in credit services to farmers are being made by the Farmers Home Administration, Walter T. McKay, the agency's Texas state director, said today.

Improvements in the management of the agency's operations were discussed at a training meeting held in St. Louis, Missouri, last week which Mr. McKay attended. A new employees training program, careful calendaring of state and county office work, public information responsibilities of agency employees, and how to get maximum use from administrative funds were discussed.

Farmers Home Administration officials attending the meeting were urged to take every step possible to further increase the participation by private lenders in the Insured Lending Program. These funds advanced by private lenders and insured by the agency along with funds appropriated by Congress are used by farmers to buy, develop and operate family-type farms.

"With the expansion in our activities that has taken place in the last two years it is more important than ever before that we place our operations in high gear and give prompt and careful attention to every loan application," McKay said. During the past year the agricultural loans made and insured by the agency reached a record total of \$293,190,000 throughout the United States. Loans in Texas totaled \$47,480,000.

The increased cost of developing farming systems that will make full use of a farm family's land and labor resources and provide a good income, and the emergency conditions brought on by the drought, were the main reason for the increased credit activity.

Farmers in Texas are served through 135 county offices located throughout the State.

NEW SEED PROTECTION FOR TEXAS

Texas planters will soon realize benefits afforded by new seed protection from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

A revised law enabling our seed division to strengthen controls and testing requirements for commercial seed will aid farmers to get better quality seed with less weed pollution than ever before.

Under present law, specimens of all seed offered for sale must be tested in a TDA seed laboratory once every nine months instead of annually as previously required. Further and probably more important provisions include prohibition of certain weed seed in commercial seed and reduce permissible rate of occurrence of other weed seed.

These noxious—or poisonous—weeds are divided into two groups: primary and secondary.

Of the primary noxious weeds—two-field bindweed and nutgrass—are totally prohibited in seed offered for sale. These two weed pests have spread across our state at an alarming rate during the last 20 years. Thousands of acres of once productive land have been rendered useless from infestation. We hope by prohibiting presence of these weeds—and that includes seed coming into Texas—to stop the spread of these menacing weeds.

Other primary noxious weeds include Russian knapweed, Johnson grass, wild garlic, wild onion, dodder, and Canada thistle. Commercial seed with more than 100 of any of these weed seed per pound is barred from sale.

Sale of seed with a higher

Johnson grass content is permissible, however, when labeled "Pasture Mixture." Such pasture mixture would still maintain permissible allowance of other primary and secondary weeds.

Secondary weeds, or weeds that can be controlled by good cultural practice in spite of their objectionability, include Bermuda grass, blueweed, bracted plantain, buckhorn plantain, chess or cheat, cocklebur, corncockle, dandelion, dock, wild carrot, downy brome grass, goat grass, mustard, horse nettle, purple nightshade, wild oats, goathead, wild radish, red rice, and Russian thistle.

Seed which is offered for sale must not include more than 300 of these secondary noxious weed seed per pound. A combination of primary and secondary noxious weeds will not be allowed in excess of 500 per pound.

This tightening of Texas seed

laws makes our seed restrictions conform in general with those of surrounding states and thereby prevents Texas from becoming a dumping ground for polluted seed.

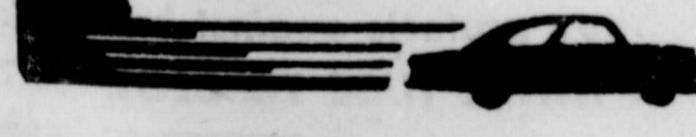

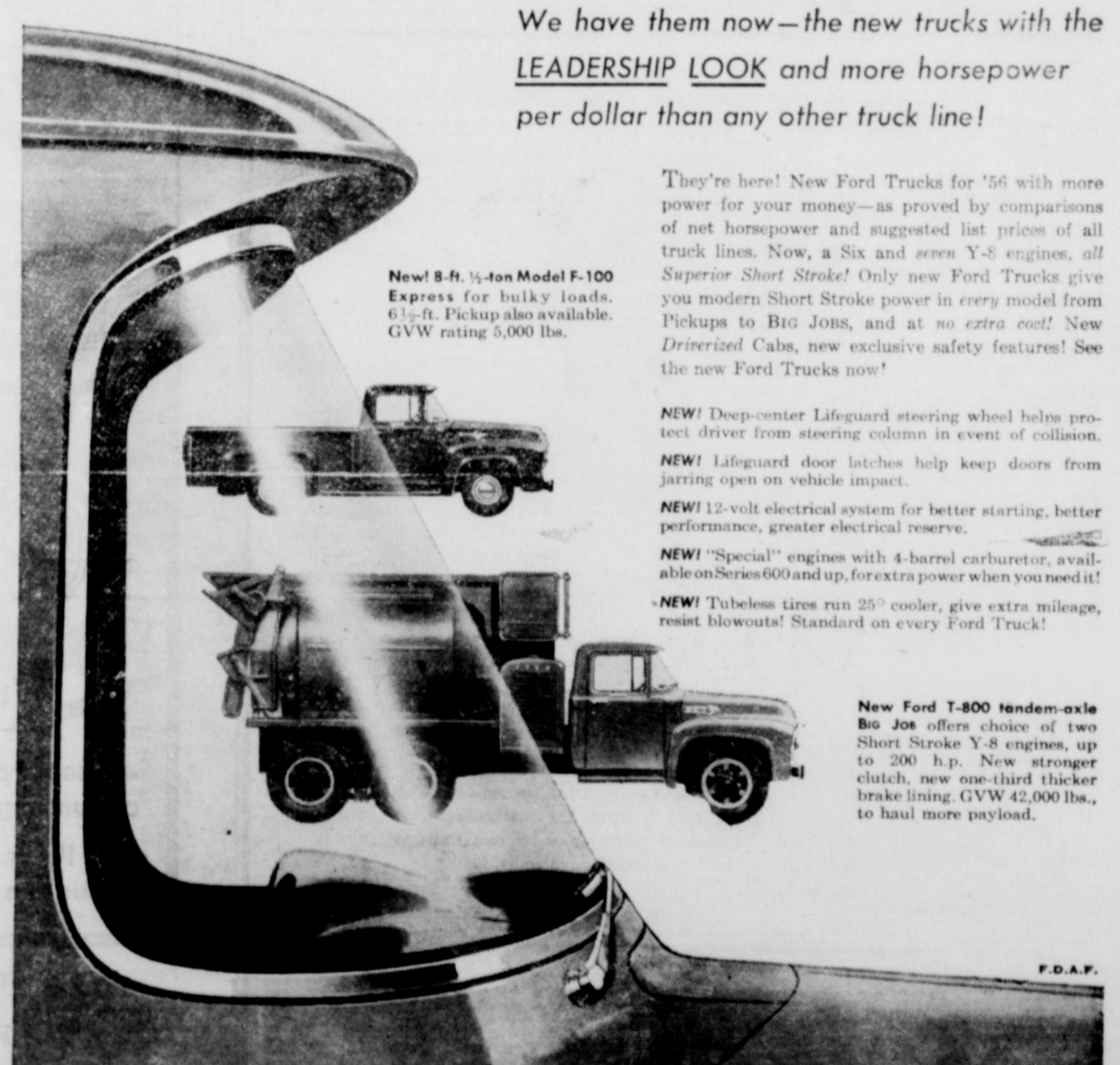

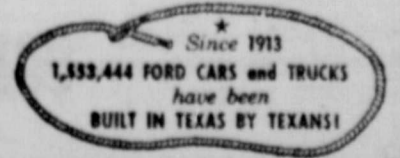
