## New City Well Is Completed

The new city water well, which was reported being drilled down to 408 feet last week has been completed to a depth of 462 feet, it was announced Wednesday by W. C. Barnett, City Utilities manager. It has been acidized and given a temporary baling test.

After tests were made it was considered good enough to justify building power line and making complete test with pumping facilities. The well has a stand of 97 feet of water.

Building of power line to the well is now in progress. When this line is completed the well will be tested with one of the pumps from the other city wells to determine whether production will justify permanent installation of pumping facilities and laying main lines to hook it up with the city water system.

## Vic E. Koleber To Represent Mills County On Governor's Committee

The appointment of Victor E. Koleber as local representative for the Governor's Committee for Refugee Relief Program has been announced by John H. Winters, Committee chairman. Mr. Koleber, who is Editor and Publisher of The Goldthwaite Eagle, will act on behalf of the State Committee in Mills County.

The Committee was appointed by Governor Allan Shivers at

the request of President Eisenhower to inform the people of Texas on the Refugee Relief Program. In addition to Winters, who heads the State Department of Public Welfare in Austin, members are the Rev. Henry Herbst, pastor of SS. Peter and Paul Church, New Braunfels; the Rev. A. O. Rast, Executive Secretary of the Texas Lutheran Mission Board, Leonard L. Holloway of the Baptist General Convention of Texas; Sam W. Levy of Houston; and C. W. Pfluger, Jr. of Coupland.

Under the Refugee Relief Act of 1953, 214,000 displaced persons were declared admissible to this country. Recent figures show slightly over 43,000 have obtained sponsors and have migrated to the United States.

Of this number it is estimated that less than 500 have been brought to Texas.

To be successful in helping displaced persons get a new start in life, the Refugee Program will need assurances from 30,000 to 40,000 sponsors by early in 1956.

A sponsor is required to give assurance that the refugee will be provided with employment and housing and will not become a public charge.

The refugee's qualifications to fill the job provided him are certified by overseas officials. The Governor's Committee noted that a large percentage of the refugees are classified as agricultural workers who could be absorbed easily in the farming and ranching regions of Texas. Many skilled craftsmen are also looking for new homes in America.

"These refugees have escaped, in many instances, from prisons and concentration camps to wind up spending years in refugee camps waiting for resettlement," said Mr. Winters. "Texas is lagging in doing its part in this humanitarian program to which our nation has committed itself. Mr. Koleber, as representative of the Governor's Committee for Refugee Relief Program in Mills County, will give the details of the Program to any employer or citizen interested in providing a new opportunity to a refugee."

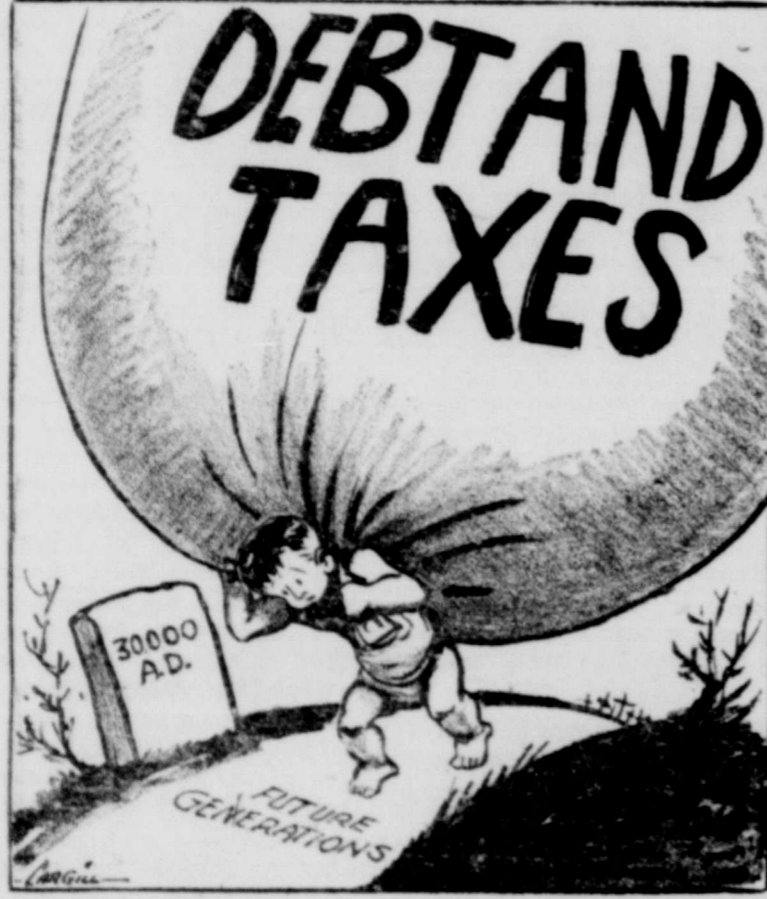

Foresee 'Stop Nixon' Candidate Coalition Eisenhower May Hold Key to '56 Outcome

WASHINGTON—Assuming that President Eisenhower does not run for a second term, Vice President Richard M. Nixon appears to be the front-runner at this point for the Republican nomination. However, this fact also makes him vulnerable.

Other aspirants will now concentrate on beating Nixon in presidential primaries and lining up next year's convention delegates. Thus, there is a definite possibility of a coalition developing, composed of factions of the GOP, whose principal drive will be to "Stop Nixon."

Observers, however, believe that Mr. Eisenhower himself holds the key to the outcome. If he openly endorses Nixon, his prestige is believed enough to swing the majority to the Californian. However, if the President makes no endorsement, then a wide open fight is in prospect at next August's convention in San Francisco.

THE VEEP—Senator Hubert Humphrey's recent statement that he is available for the Democratic vice presidential nomination shows the new emphasis that politicians are placing on the No. 2 post in government.

President Eisenhower's illness has focused attention on the important role played by the vice president and both parties are sure to look for strong men as running mates.

If Mr. Eisenhower does not run again and Vice President Richard M. Nixon obtains the presidential nomination, then Gov. Christian Herter of Massachusetts appears to stand a good chance of getting the No. 2 post.

In the Democratic camp, politicians are mentioning Gov. Frank Clement of Tennessee as a running mate for Adlai Stevenson if the former Illinois governor again is the presidential nominee. Clement might also be a good vice presidential possibility if Gov. Averell Harriman of New York should head the Democratic ticket, but not if Senator Estes Kefauver gets the nod, since the latter is also from Tennessee.

STEVENS—Democratic politicians are now convinced that Adlai Stevenson will announce his candidacy for the presidential nomination next month and that he will probably have the support of top congressional Democrats.

Stevenson met recently with House Speaker Sam Rayburn of Texas and Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson at the latter's Johnson City, Tex., home. No one doubts that they discussed Stevenson's nomination despite protestations the visit was social.

Although some powerful Southern Democratic leaders don't care for Stevenson, they are expected to prefer him to either Harriman, whom they regard as too liberal, or Kefauver, whom they just don't like.

Rayburn and Johnson will be two of the most powerful behind-the-scenes operators at next year's Chicago convention.

Last lingering doubts about what Stevenson would do were removed following reports that several magazine articles about the former Illinois governor and 1952 nominee are being timed for release on the same weekend as his expected announcement.

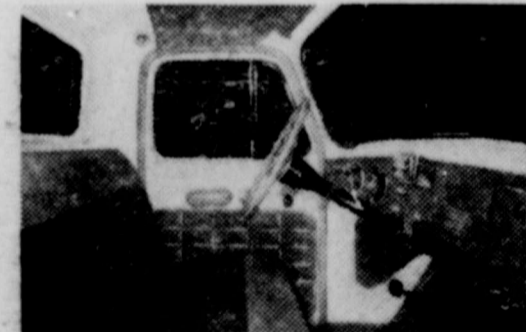

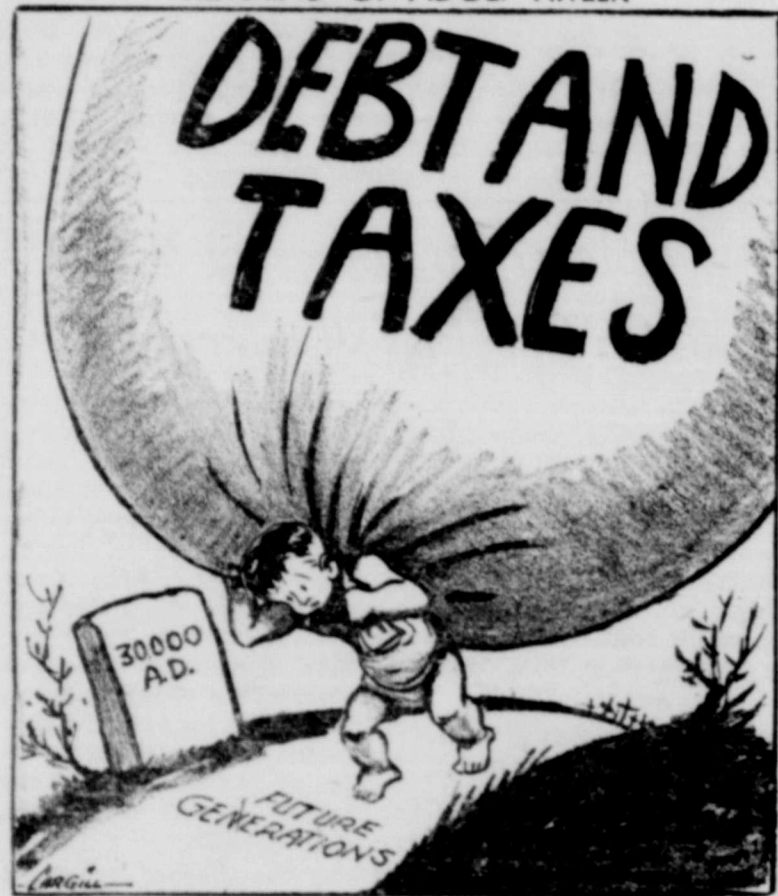

Foresee 'Stop Nixon' Candidate Coalition Eisenhower May Hold Key to '56 Outcome

WASHINGTON—Assuming that President Eisenhower does not run for a second term, Vice President Richard M. Nixon appears to be the front-runner at this point for the Republican nomination. However, this fact also makes him vulnerable.

Other aspirants will now concentrate on beating Nixon in presidential primaries and lining up next year's convention delegates. Thus, there is a definite possibility of a coalition developing, composed of factions of the GOP, whose principal drive will be to "Stop Nixon."

Observers, however, believe that Mr. Eisenhower himself holds the key to the outcome. If he openly endorses Nixon, his prestige is believed enough to swing the majority to the Californian. However, if the President makes no endorsement, then a wide open fight is in prospect at next August's convention in San Francisco.

THE VEEP—Senator Hubert Humphrey's recent statement that he is available for the Democratic vice presidential nomination shows the new emphasis that politicians are placing on the No. 2 post in government.

President Eisenhower's illness has focused attention on the important role played by the vice president and both parties are sure to look for strong men as running mates.

If Mr. Eisenhower does not run again and Vice President Richard M. Nixon obtains the presidential nomination, then Gov. Christian Herter of Massachusetts appears to stand a good chance of getting the No. 2 post.

In the Democratic camp, politicians are mentioning Gov. Frank Clement of Tennessee as a running mate for Adlai Stevenson if the former Illinois governor again is the presidential nominee. Clement might also be a good vice presidential possibility if Gov. Averell Harriman of New York should head the Democratic ticket, but not if Senator Estes Kefauver gets the nod, since the latter is also from Tennessee.

STEVENS—Democratic politicians are now convinced that Adlai Stevenson will announce his candidacy for the presidential nomination next month and that he will probably have the support of top congressional Democrats.

Stevenson met recently with House Speaker Sam Rayburn of Texas and Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson at the latter's Johnson City, Tex., home. No one doubts that they discussed Stevenson's nomination despite protestations the visit was social.

Although some powerful Southern Democratic leaders don't care for Stevenson, they are expected to prefer him to either Harriman, whom they regard as too liberal, or Kefauver, whom they just don't like.

Rayburn and Johnson will be two of the most powerful behind-the-scenes operators at next year's Chicago convention.

Last lingering doubts about what Stevenson would do were removed following reports that several magazine articles about the former Illinois governor and 1952 nominee are being timed for release off the same weekend as his expected announcement.

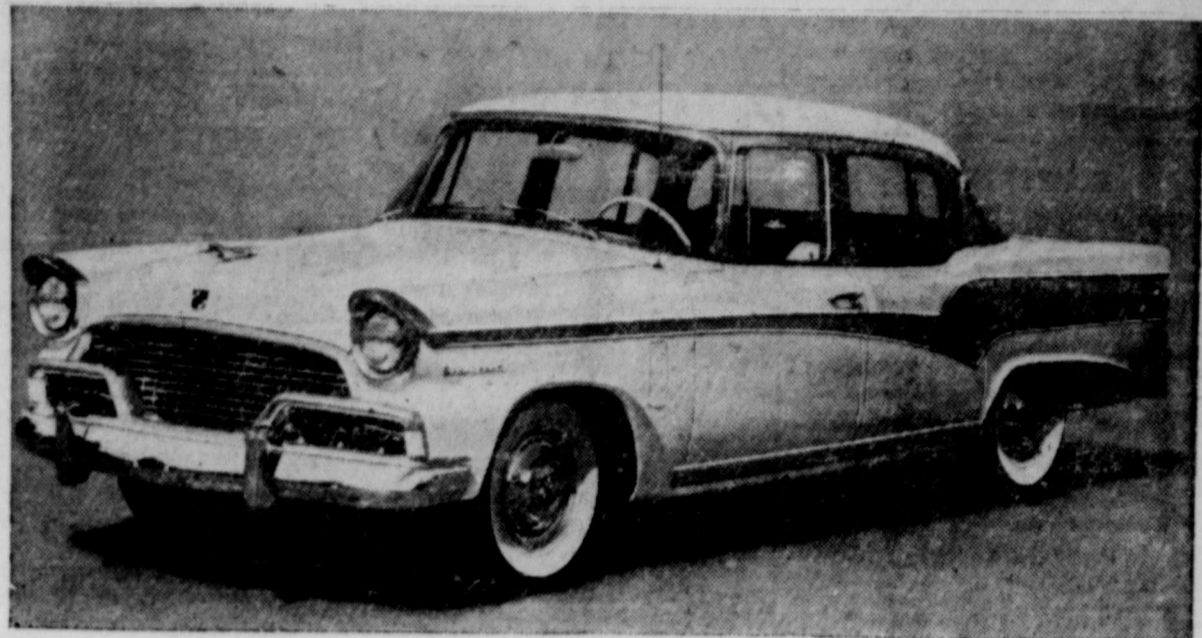
