Lions Club To Poll Merchants On Holidays To Be Observed In 1956

Announcement was made yesterday by Howard Campbell, president of the Lions Club, that members of the board of directors have decided to take a poll of the retail merchants of the city to determine what holidays are to be observed by closing during the coming year, 1956.

The board made a survey of surrounding towns to see what days they observed as holidays

this year with stores being closed, and their plans for 1956.

The survey shows the following:

Brownwood observed six holidays, New Years, Memorial Day, July 4th., Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas. They will use the same schedule next year.

San Saba observed four holidays, July 4th., Veterans Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Will probably drop Veterans Day and Observe Memorial and Labor Day, making five, in 1956.

Lampasas observed four holidays, New Years, July 4th., Thanksgiving and Christmas. Will include Memorial day, making five, in 1956.

Hamilton, Comanche and Goldthwaite had seven holidays, New Years, Memorial Day, July 4th., Labor Day, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Hamilton will take a new survey and will probably drop one day, Comanche reports they will probably drop Veterans day in 1956.

The consensus of opinion coming from the Lions Club board of directors is that six holidays should be observed next year as follows, New Years, Sunday January 1; Memorial Day, Wednesday, May 30; Independence Day, Wednesday, July 4; Labor Day, Monday September 3; Thanksgiving, Thursday November 22; Christmas, Tuesday December 25. When a holiday falls on Sunday the following Monday will be observed.

Merchants are invited to study this information and be prepared to cast their ballot on the holiday closing proposition when the survey comes up shortly after December 1.

Newsprint Price Increase Announced

A general increase in price of newsprint has been announced during the past thirty days by the industry in the United States and Canada.

Paper mills manufacturing newsprint, the paper on which newspapers are printed, made their announcements and informed their large users and wholesalers to that effect.

The price increase has been passed on down the line and during the past week management of the Eagle received word from their source of supply that the price of newsprint has gone up.

Price at the mills increased from \$5.00 to \$6.00 per ton. What the increase will amount to by the time it reaches the weekly press is yet to be learned.

The Yellowjackets scored again in the final minutes of play making them the winners and assuring them a place in the District 1A-23 title.

Grass Improvement - Brush Control Observed on Tour Of Graves Ranch

"There is more grass on Dr. Graves' ranch than there was on his place when I was last on it in 1951," says Henry Turney, supervisor of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District, from Dublin. Turney spoke to 50 farmers, ranchers and businessmen who made a tour of Dr. Graves' ranch, 10 miles northeast of Goldthwaite, on Thursday, November 3, 1955.

The group observed madrid clover that had been planted on cultivated land to build up the soil, open it up so that it will take up more moisture and provide grazing for livestock. Roy

Dellis, who manages the ranch for Dr. Graves, says, "The clover has opened up the soil so that the moisture penetrates deep and there is little runoff. The moisture is put down deep where the deep roots of the clover can go down and get it even during rather prolonged dry periods."

The group also observed a planting of Harding grass that was planted in 1950 as a seed source for seed to put in the pastures. Despite the drought, there was still a fair stand of Harding grass. A major problem on the ranch has been shinnery brush. Many methods have been used to try and control it. Goats by themselves were tried but they did not do good and the goats didn't do very well on straight diet of brush. Dr. Graves has been spraying his oak with 2.4 D mixture and has been sowing grasses. The group observed a pasture where this method had been followed. They found that where native grasses had been planted the grass was coming up thick in the brush and making a good stand. One of the essentials of getting this grass established in the brush has been pasture management. The grass was allowed to make as much growth as possible during the growing season. The pasture was grazed by goats only after the grass had matured seed.

The first house to burn was Parham Childre's barbershop and the flames were then communicated to R. W. Garretts' drugstore where the postoffice was located. A. J. Smith's store was the next in line and then came the big store of Miller and Soules. There was no insurance on any of the stores or buildings.

Two of the oldest and best men of this county have died since the last issue of the Eagle. Mr. John Mason, father of J. W. Mason, died at the home of his son, in the Center City community last Friday night. He was

86 years of age and his death was due largely to his extreme age.

Dr. S. A. Owens of Center City died at his home Sunday night. He was very old and had been a resident of the Center City community since 1885 and was highly honored by all who knew him.

It will be a great day for TCU students, former students and fans when they have their homecoming Saturday as they play SMU. One of the many former students who will play an important part in the between halves ceremony honoring Davey O'Brien on his selection to the "Hall Of Fame" will be our own coach Ray Standley.

Ray was a member of the TCU squad in 1938 when they were the number one team in the nation playing in the Sugar Bowl. He played guard as a sophomore that year. O'Brien was quarterback during the same year.

HELPING "THE LITTLE FELLOW"

There is much talk to the effect that if federal income taxes are reduced next year the emphasis should be on helping "the little fellow"—rather than people of larger means or business enterprises.

Henry Pahlitz, in one of his Newsweek columns, made an apt comment on that idea. He pointed out that it takes an investment of about \$12,500 to create a job in American industry, and said, "This tremen-

dous investment . . . is the main reason why the American worker's productivity is greater than that of any other worker in the world, and why his wages are correspondingly greater." He then summed up in these words: "By all odds the best way to 'help the little fellow' is to encourage the profits, savings, and investments that make his job and his income possible."

The President's Committee for Traffic Safety again is sponsoring a special day dedicated to safe driving—S-D Day. The date is Dec. 1, and the aim is to hold deaths and injuries to the lowest possible level for a 24-hour period.

While perfection probably is too much to expect—even for one day—from a combination of about 72 million drivers and 58 million motor vehicles, no sensible person would argue for a minute that the usual toll cannot be substantially cut by more sensible driving.

It's too bad that such a worthwhile effort must be limited to only one day. The sponsors apparently think so, too, because one slogan urges "Make Every Day S-D Day."

There lies the irony of our traffic accident problem—that it takes a Presidential blessing and a high-powered educational effort to achieve reasonable conduct on the highways for only one day of the year.

Safe driving should be the year-round rule, not the one-day exception. We could "Make Every Day S-D Day."

They expect to purchase one hundred thousand pounds of the green foliage, white berried, product for this years output.

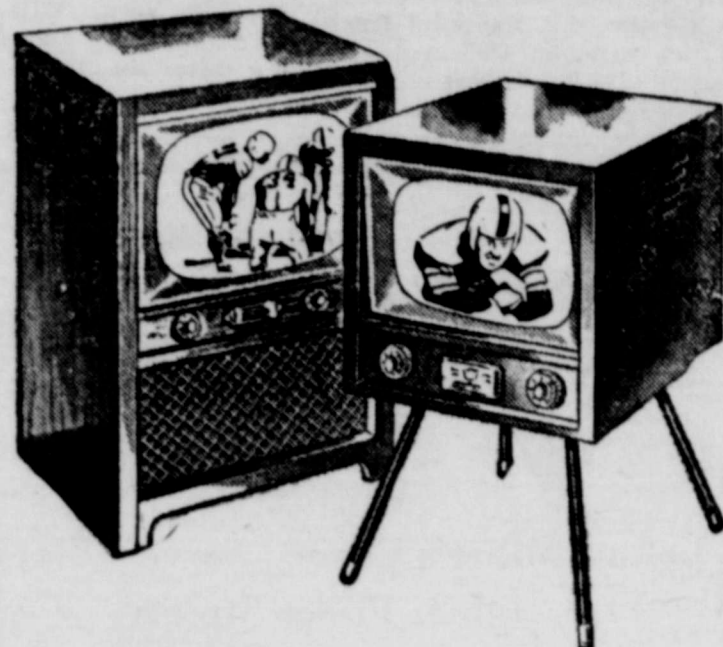

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Festive Fruit Cake

- 3/4 cup Pet Evaporated Milk
- 2 dozen finely cut marshmallows
- 1/3 cup orange juice (see note)
- 6 dozen 2 1/2-in. graham crackers
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon cloves
- 1 1/2 cups seedless raisins
- (1/2 golden and 1/2 dark are best)
- 3/4 cup finely cut dates
- 1 cup broken walnuts
- 1 1/4 cups ready-mixed, cut-up candied fruit, bulk or canned

Line with waxed paper bottom and sides of a 9-inch tube pan, or 6-cup loaf pan. Put into a bowl the milk, marshmallows and orange juice. Let stand until needed. Roll graham crackers into fine crumbs. Put crumbs into a large bowl with the cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves, raisins, dates and walnuts. Add candied fruit and the milk mixture. Mix with a spoon, then with hands until crumbs are moistened. Press firmly into pan. Top with fruit and nuts if desired. Cover tightly. Chill 2 days before slicing. Keep in cool place. Makes 3 1/2 lbs..

NOTE: Alcoholic flavoring can replace the orange juice if desired.
