

Two-Fold Plan Aimed To Get Ike to Run

Would Cut Job Burden; Refrain From Politics

Expected

Special to Central Press Association WASHINGTON-The men close to President Eisenhower are

working on a two-fold program which they hope will convince the President that he can serve a second term

First, they are taking over a larger share of the work due to Mr. Eisenhower's convalescence. Second, they are refraining from discussing Republican politics with the "boss."

They reason that if the President sees that many of his duties can be adequately handled by his staff he will be less reluctant to run for re-election. They feel that Mr. Eisenhower can then be persuaded to give more time to leadership and mak. ing final decisions on critical issues. According to this plan, he would receive complete briefings on all government matters and then set the course

of administration policy. · BENSON'S WOES-While the nation's farm roblem has been treated primarily as a purely domestic matter, it has its international aspects, too. For one thing, there is the problem of how to dispose of United States food surpluses overseas

without undercutting foreign producers.

The economics of many of America's allies depend to a large extent on their ability to sell agricultural products to other nations, and they would find it difficult, if not impossible, to compete with any glut of American foodstuffs.

Benson recently took note of another international factor. In a letter to the United Nations Food and Agricultural organization in Rome, he warned other nations not to increase food production now just because United States production is being cut back to reduce

Benson pointed out that American output could be stepped up at

• ECONOMY-Government economists are facing a dilemma, and this is one reason why confusing reports are coming out of Washington on whether credit controls will be relaxed or continued in force. There has been fear that credit was in danger of being overextended. So there came orders to make borrowing more difficult and hints to business to stop low down-payments and long-term in-stallment sales of automobiles and other costly items.

However, there is also the fear that if brakes are applied too tightly, sales of cars and houses, important to the entire economy, might drop off. Long-term credit has become a part of such sales.

• TAX OUTLOOK-President Eisenhower is expected to hold out some hope for tax cuts in 1956 when he sends his State of the Union message to Congress in January.

However, there is expected to be no definite decision until April or May, by which time Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey will know how close the administration can come to a balanced budget.

Officially, the administration estimates a \$1.7 billion deficit for fiscal 1956, which ends next June 30. However, this figure, according to private economists, is on the "high" side. They say the government is likely to net more revenue from taxes this year than ever before in peacetime.

If the deficit can be whittled close to the break-even point, the odds are that there will be an election-year tax slash. However, if it comes, it is not likely to be a big one.

# Farm And Ranch Operators Have Social Security Responsibility Now

Cheatham of the Brownwood office of the Revenue Service is Many operators of farms and the deadline for paying the ranches have a social security responsibility to meet for the first time in January. These are employers of farm or ranch labor who heretofore have not been required to report wages because their employees did not meet the regularity-of-work test which applied to farm labor before 1955.

> The 1954 changes in the social security law did away with that test and substituted another one whereby the work of most farm and ranch employees started to count toward oldage and survivors insurance protection beginning with January 1, 1955. Any farm or ranch operator who paid \$100 or more cash wages to an agricultural employee in 1955 is required to report all cash wages paid the employee up to \$4200 in the year and pay the social security tax on or before January 31, 1956.

> The social security tax on agricultural employees' wages is, percent. If a self-employed farmer or rancher had more than one agricultural employee in 1955, the \$100 cash wages test applies separately to each of them. The law provides for the employer's sharing of the social security tax with his employee. He may have taken the employee's share (2 percent) out of his wages each time he paid him during 1955. Or he may waited until the cash wages paid to the employee totaled \$100. Or he may have failed to deduct any amount at all from his cash wages. 

The research showed that when only two-thirds of a cow's protein requirements are fed, a 64 percent calf crop was produced. When the cows received enough protein to meet their requirements, the calf crop rose to 93 percent.




