

Far Eastern U. S. Force Cut Plan Military Worry

Special to Central Press Association

WASHINGTON-Some of the military men in the Pentagon are worried about the Eisenhower administration's recently announced decision to cut down on American ground forces in the Far East.

They point out that the reduction will leave United States Army strength in that area at about where it was when the North Korean Communist forces crossed into South Korea June 25, 1950.



When the cut is completed, the Army will have four understrength divisions manning a front of more than 1,000 miles from Japan to Okinawa. The Red Chinese and the Russians, on the other hand, are reported to have millions of troops under arms in the Far East. The Chinese Communists are said to have three million army regulars and nearly two million district troops, while the Russians are standing by with 34 divisions.

Move Would Drop Strength

· ATTACK ON MCKAY-Signs are stirring that, as the 1956 political pot begins to boil, the Demo-crats will devote particular attention to Interior Secretary Douglas McKay.

Secretary McKay Preparations are being made for hearings by a

Senate interior subcommittee on one of McKay's actions. This was the award of mining claims and timber rights to a California mining company. Testimony will be taken as to whether McKay overrode objections of government forest experts in making this grant.

Complaints to be aired are that tests from ore samples taken from the claims showed only small traces of the gold and silver the mining company said it wanted to develop, while at the same time the company has cut several thousand dollars' worth of timber off the land. This was said to be more than enough to cover the payment to the government for the claims. . . .

• PRAYERS FOR BENSON-Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson is vulnerable as the chief target for Democratic attack in 1956, though his controversial farm policies have been steadfastly supported by President Eisenhower.

The effect which the constant, drumming criticism has had on the Benson family was illuminated recently by a comment from his son, Reed Bensor

Young Benson said that, when he learned three years ago that his father had been chosen for the Cabinet post, he told him, "I'll pray for you, Dad." He added, "We've been praying for him ever since, I can tell you that."

Right now I want to define agricultural labor" as the term applies to social security under the old-age and survivors insurance program. The definition includes services performed on a farm in connection with the raising and harvesting of products and the raising, etc. of livestock poultry, bees .furbearing animals and wildlife; services in the care of the employer's farm and equipment if performed for the most part on a farm; services performed in handling, processing, or packaging agricultural commodifies produced in major part by the employer; services in connection with cotton ginning; and domestic service in or about the household of the employer if performed on a farm operated for profit.


If you operate an agricultural enterprise-either as sole owner or in a partnership-and you pay any one employee as form agricultural labor in 1955, you have an obligation to-meet before the end of January, specifically, you must fill out Internal Revenue Service Form 943, "Employer's Tax and Information Return for Agricultural Employees," and remit the Social Security tax. The amount of the tax is four percent; it applies to each of your agricultural employees to whom you paid cash wages of \$100 or more in the year. If you paid an employee more than \$4,200 do not report such wages on

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





AUSTIN, Tex. - Insurance firms of all types are feeling Pallbearers were James the effect of the public's reaction over the failure of U.S. Trust & Guaranty Co. There Moreland and Arthur Robbins, appears to be a public wariness of insurance salesmen at the moment.

Steps are being taken to resell the public on the insurance business. One such move was an offer on the part of 28 legal reserve companies to "take over" the life insurance policies of defunct concerns. Thus they would protect policy holders from loss of their life insur-

ance. Todate no policy holder in any legal reserve life insurance company in Texas has suffered any loss. Nevertheless the companies are feeling the pinch of the adverse publicity.

J. Ralph Wood, president of the Southwestern Life Insurance Co., was one of the 28 executives who presented the "guarantee" proposal to the insurance commission. "We want

to protect the good name of Texas insurance companies,' Wood stated, "and also protect the innocent life insurance policy holders."

J. Byron Saunders, chairman of the insurance commission, said "I am happy to learn of the project. It is a most laudable step. It will help relieve much public anxiety and concern.

In other developments, the insurance commission moved to force a change in management of the John K. Wilson Mutual Aid Association of Princeton while the state obtained court orders to shut down the American Atlas Corporation and J
