M. Y. Stokes Jr., speaker for the sunrise service, was in the Holy Land during the Easter season of 1955. Out of his experiences he will lead all who share in the Mills County Union Sunrise Service in re-experiencing with him those events.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

White House Undergoes An Inventory in June Director of Park Service Gets the Job Every Year

WASHINGTON—Maybe Congress doesn't trust the occupants, but every June each item in the White House is checked to make sure nothing is missing. This annual task is entrusted to the director of the Park Service who has jurisdiction over "Reservation No. 1 of the National Capital Park System." That's the executive mansion.

Congress stipulated some years back that an inventory must be made of all furnishings in the executive mansion. "Tenants in the White House change," explained Frank T. Gartside, assistant park superintendent, recently to a committee of Congress.

Howell G. Crim, the White House chief usher, said, almost apologetically, that "the law compels us to have an inventory." When printed, it fills a printed volume three inches thick.

The inventory of June 30, 1955, the end of the last fiscal year, revealed that there are 26,655 pieces of property in the White House, including 18,964 items of glassware, chinaware and silverware.

The other items are furniture, table linens, lamps, rugs, drapes and curtains, pictures, portraits, ornaments, blankets, bed linens and towels, kitchenware and shop machinery. Nothing is overlooked. The oldest item is a 1798 portrait of George Washington.

NEITHER GARTSIDE NOR CRIM volunteered how many items are missing from year to year and no one asked. But they did reveal that the White House employs a domestic force of 37 people.

This force includes a maitre d'hotel, a housekeeper and assistant, five butlers, seven cooks, a valet, five doormen, five housemen, a head houseman, a head laundress, a pantrywoman, and eight maids.

Thirty-nine men help keep the mansion and grounds in tip-top shape as becomes the nation's No. 1 residence. They include eight operating engineers, a laborer, a carpenter-painter foreman, three carpenters and three helpers, one painter, four electricians, 12 gardeners, three plumbers, a storekeeper and assistant, and a clerk.

The domestic employees are paid on the average \$3,306 a year, while the average pay for the mechanical and maintenance worker is \$4,178.

The White House runs up an electric bill of about \$2,575 a month, but this includes the cost of the floodlights which beam incessantly on the famous structure.

LAUNDRY AND DRY CLEANING comes to \$5,200 a year. There is also an item of \$9,000 for decorative plants, palms, ferns and cut flowers that are used in the mansion.

Keeping up the beautiful grounds that surround the mansion is an expensive task. Eight thousand dollars are spent for plant material, garden and lawn supplies.

Paint, lumber, plumbing, etc., costs another \$7,500 annually and \$10,075 goes for soaps, cleaners, insecticides, napkins, uniforms, housewares, lampshades, curtains, bedding and ice.

All in all, keeping up the home of the President costs a lot of money. Gartside and Crim estimated it would take \$383,775 for the next fiscal year.

You can add \$150,000 to that for the salary the chief occupant gets each year.

**By LUCY MAY BURRUS CHECK LABELING ON MAN-MADE FIBERS . . .**

Fabrics of man-made fibers rate high in popularity with today's homemakers . . . Their so-called easy-to-care-for qualities are in great demand. However, unless you read the labels and interpret them as the manufacturer intended, you may be expecting too much from some of the fabrics.

Here are interpretations from manufacturers of labeling terms often used with reference to these fabrics:

- Wrinkle-resistance, a term often used, should not be confused with wrinkle-proof. Manufacturers remind us that no fabric is wrinkle-proof.
- There is a difference between permanently and durably

pleated fabrics. Nylon can be permanently pleated. Fabrics of orlon and dacron can be durably pleated. Manufacturers tell us that after 10 to 15 washings, it is best to take garments of orlon and dacron to cleaners for repleating. Pleating garments of these fabrics will require more careful handling and will perhaps be more expensive in the long run.

- Altering nylon fabrics may present some problems. Once creases and pleats are set in 100 percent nylon they are very hard to remove. In buying a dress where alteration will be needed, choose the larger size. It is easier to take in seams than to let them out.
- Fabrics of man-made fibers are often labeled as moth-resistant. However, manufacturers remind us that moths are attracted to some dyes or finishes on the fabric and to some blended fabrics. For example, if dacron is blended with wool, the moths will be attracted, as always, to wool.
- Directions for pressing are often misinterpreted. Most man-made fibers require little pressing—if they are drip-dried. They must be ironed as usual if they

are wrung or twisted after rinsing.

Check the label or tag to determine washability of the fabric. If the garment is not labeled washable, or if the shoulder pads or finishes of the garment are not washable, have it dry-cleaned.

A final reminder—when buying fabrics of blended fibers, always read the labels for percentages of fibers used. The predominating fiber will largely determine the wearing qualities and care of the fabric.

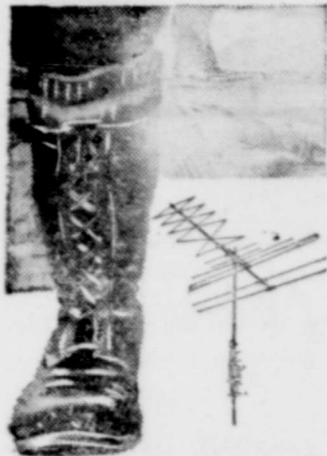

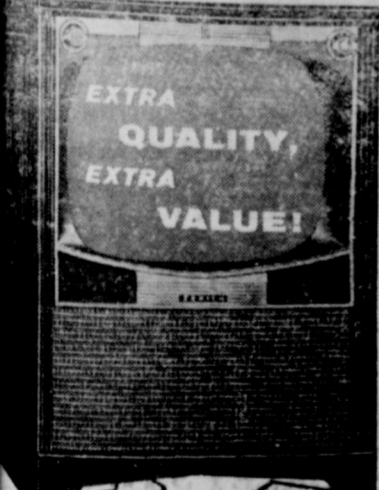

**GUNS OF DEATH**

The guns of death which I refer are the useless and unused guns. Quite often they are the unloaded guns. Do you have a useless death weapon in a dresser drawer at home, an almost forgotten gun which has lain there unused and unnoticed for months or years? If so, we pray that this unnoticed potential instrument of death will continue unused and unnoticed; unless, of course you would notice it enough to rid yourself of it.

I am not one of those who cry, "Do away with guns! Prohibit the possession of a pistol by law!" But this must eventually be done if a better way cannot be found.

Common sense tells me that they should be removed from the reach of the drunkard, the idiot, the careless and the children of the home, and years of experience have shown me that they are unsafe when the safety rules are not only used but unknown. A rattlesnake is not dangerous in a cage. A pistol is dangerous even where constant vigilance is exercised and all safety rules known and practiced. You just have to relax your vigilance a second and a death may result.

Our boys and our girls play cops and robbers now. They emulate sheriffs and bad men, outlaws and Indians. They have their own belts and pistols and they practice the fast draw. They are definitely gun conscious. They are interested in guns. They are not afraid of guns.

What is more natural than for a boy of nine or ten or even fourteen or fifteen to want to handle that old forgotten gun in the trunk or clothes closet or dresser drawer? What is more natural than for him to show it to the neighborhood gang. Death to most of them is something that happens on a TV screen, and it usually happens to the bad man, not the good man and is parsed over so lightly and seen so often that it seems almost unimportant.

They do not realize the potentialities of grandpa's old thumb buster or Daddie's automatic, a war souvenir.

But they learn. They learn too late! You read the papers. The tragedy touches you lightly unless you know the boys. But you read about the boy the eager, lively, good looking American boy who is suddenly terrified and sick when the gun goes off and his neighborhood playmate lies bleeding and gasping and dying.

This is not a TV story. It is

not imaginary. They do not run fairy tales on the front page of our newspapers, and that is where you see this story all too often.

Of course there are variations—"Dropped Gun Goes off and Shoots Man," "Accidentally Shoots Self With Unloaded Gun," "Crazed Killer Kills Four," "Killer Drunk and Does Not Remember Shooting," "Child Kills Mother With Gun Left Under Pillow."

Would you keep a rattle snake, or spread poison around where your children could get it? Do you advise them to play with matches?

Why not rid your home of that gun of death? The least you can do is lock it up out of reach.

Don't you agree that we are having too many unnecessary tragedies? I was shocked and frightened when a police detective of many years service snapped his unloaded revolver in head quarters, the bullet passing within inches of his captain's head to crash into the wall. I was sickened not too long ago when the only son of a neighbor was killed by a playmate as they examined a pistol found in the home. A lasting impression resulted from an incident many years ago when a young child killed his sleeping mother with the pistol left under his pillow by his daddy, a police officer whom I knew.

Guns are fired in anger which would not have been fired had they not been so accessible. Guns are fired by sick people, old people, despondent people and drunk people which would not have been fired had they not been at hand.

Your kids love to play. Help them to play, to be happy, but keep the gun out of reach. Keep them playing and laughing!

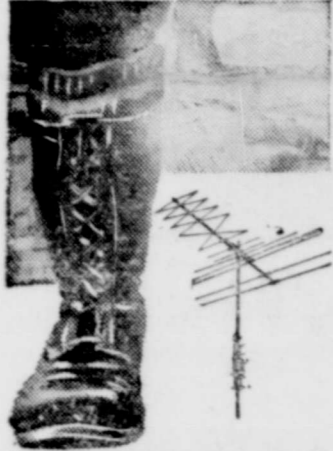

**GUNS OF DEATH**

The guns of death to which I refer are the useless and unused guns. Quite often they are the unloaded guns. Do you have a useless death weapon in a dresser drawer at home, an almost forgotten gun which has lain there unused and unnoticed for months or years? If so, we pray that this unnoticed potential instrument of death will continue unused and unnoticed; unless, of course you would notice it enough to rid yourself of it.

I am not one of those who cry, "Do away with guns! Prohibit the possession of a pistol by law!" But this must eventually be done if a better way cannot be found.

Common sense tells me that they should be removed from the reach of the drunkard, the idiot, the careless and the children of the home, and years of experience have shown me that they are unsafe when the safety rules are not only used but unknown. A rattlesnake is not dangerous in a cage. A pistol is dangerous even where constant vigilance is exercised and all safety rules known and practiced. You just have to relax your vigilance a second and a death may result.

Our boys and our girls play cops and robbers now. They emulate sheriffs and bad men, outlaws and Indians. They have their own belts and pistols and they practice the fast draw. They are definitely gun conscious. They are interested in guns. They are not afraid of guns.

What is more natural than for a boy of nine or ten or even fourteen or fifteen to want to handle that old forgotten gun in the trunk or clothes closet or dresser drawer? What is more natural than for him to show it to the neighborhood gang. Death to most of them is something that happens on a TV screen, and it usually happens to the bad man, not the good man and is passed over so lightly and seen so often that it seems almost unimportant.

They do not realize the potentialities of grandpa's old thumb buster or Daddy's automatic, a war souvenir.

But they learn. They learn too late! You read the papers. The tragedy touches you lightly unless you know the boys. But you read about the boy the eager, lively, good looking American boy who is suddenly terrified and sick when the gun goes off and his neighborhood playmate lies bleeding and gasping and dying.

This is not a TV story. It is

not imaginary. They do not run fairy tales on the front page of our newspapers, and that is where you see this story all too often.

Of course there are variations—"Dropped Gun Goes off and Shoots Man," "Accidentally Shoots Self With Unloaded Gun," "Crazed Killer Kills Four," "Killer Drunk and Does Not Remember Shooting," "Child Kills Mother With Gun Left Under Pillow."

Would you keep a rattlesnake, or spread poison around where your children could get it? Do you advise them to play with matches?

Why not rid your home of that gun of death? The least you can do is lock it up out of reach.

Don't you agree that we are having too many unnecessary tragedies? I was shocked and frightened when a police detective of many years service snapped his unloaded revolver in head quarters, the bullet passing within inches of his captain's head to crash into the wall. I was sickened not too long ago when the only son of a neighbor was killed by a playmate as they examined a pistol found in the home. A lasting impression resulted from an incident many years ago when a young child killed his sleeping mother with the pistol left under his pillow by his daddy, a police officer whom I knew.

Guns are fired in anger which would not have been fired had they not been so accessible. Guns are fired by sick people, old people, despondent people and drunk people which would not have been fired had they not been at hand.

Your kids love to play. Help them to play, to be happy, but keep the gun out of reach. Keep them playing and laughing!

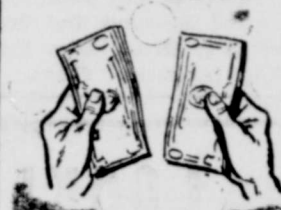

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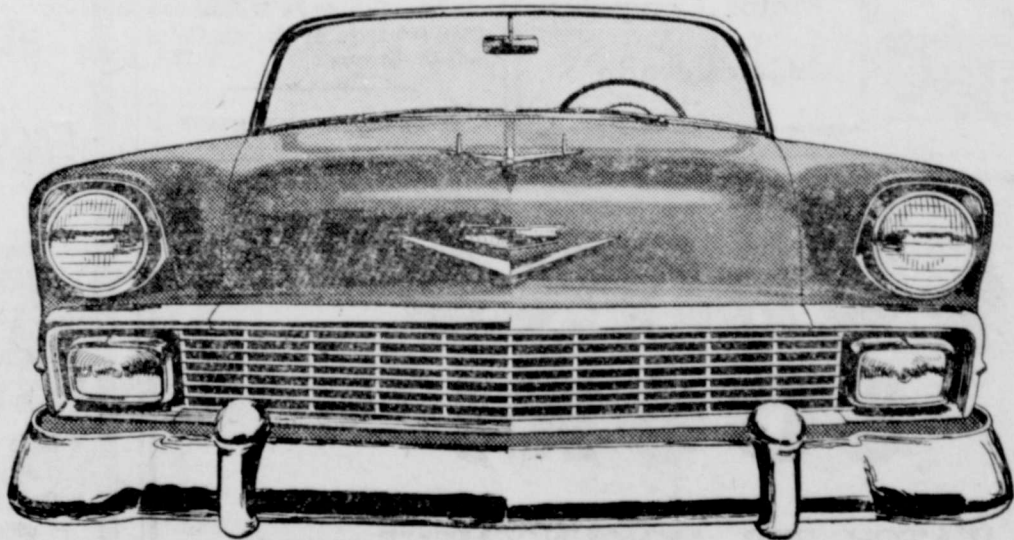



### Motorists Must Obey Signs Of Life To Assure Their Safety And Others

"Motorists must obey the Signs of Life to assure their own safety and that of others!"

That statement was made today by Mr. E. C. McFadden, Vice President, Employers Casualty Company, Dallas Texas and President, Texas Safety Association, Inc., speaking in behalf of the Signs of Life program being conducted in Texas by the Texas Safety Association, Inc., Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council. This program is the March emphasis phase of a year-round drive against traffic accidents and is aimed at convincing the public of the need for increased observance of traffic signs and signals, the "Signs of Life."

"Much of the terrible traffic toll can be traced to a laxness on the part of motorists and pedestrians in knowing and obeying traffic signs and signals," Mr. McFadden said.

He advised motorists to observe the following rules in order to protect themselves and others in traffic on our streets and highways:

1. Learn the six basic traffic signs, and be able to recognize them by sight. When you see one of these signs on the road, you should obey it instinctively.
2. Know the meaning of the other traffic safety devices such as pavement markings, lights, signals and special warning and regulatory signs.
3. When you drive, be alert at all times for Signs of Life on the street or on the highway.
4. Adjust your speed to conditions. Speed limit signs indicate the maximum speed for safe driving under good conditions.
5. Keep your vehicle in top mechanical condition. Your safety depends upon the safe functioning of your car. Brakes, tires, and steering must respond immediately to your demands, and your headlights, windshield, windows and rear view mirror must enable you to see other vehicles and pedestrians clearly and to allow others to see you.
6. Extend every courtesy to other motorists and pedestrians when you drive. Be ready to yield your right-of-way to prevent an accident. Make courtesy your code of the road.

"If motorists would follow these simple rules, Mr. McFadden said, "it would materially reduce the danger of traffic accidents on our streets and highways today."

### Turkey Situation Warrants Study

COLLEGE STATION, (Spec.) —Turkey producers may profit materially by watching the developing poult placement picture and basing operations accordingly, says Kermit Schlamb, extension poultry marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

As of the middle of March, hatcheries were reporting excellent poult sales and placements. This just means, says the specialist, that poulters are going into brooder houses at a rapid clip.

The mid January survey by the U. S. Department of Agriculture on the intent of growers indicated that about 67 million turkeys would be raised in 1956 as compared with 63 million in 1955 . . . an increase of about 6 percent for the nation. The number of turkeys to be raised is important but of more significance is the breakdown between the heavy and light breeds.

The intentions showed that the number of heavy breeds would increase by 14 percent while the light breed numbers would drop 16 percent. This, points out Schlamb, could mean tonnage increases greater than the increase in numbers. Since 25 percent of the heavy breeders tested between July and February were whites, many of these could move as light roasters.

On the brighter side of the picture, Schlamb says turkeys are moving from storage at exceptionally good rates and that storage holdings now are 1 3/4 million birds less than a year ago. If the present rate continues, another million birds may be removed by heavy turkey marketing time. A better job of direct selling by producers in areas of deficient production might also help, says Schlamb.

Feed prices are expected to change but little during the year. Supplies are approximately the same as for last year. Another major factor in the outlook has to do with competition from broilers, pork and beef. Broiler placements are running from 20 to 40 percent above last year and cheap broilers do affect the price of turkeys. Pork and beef are expected to continue in heavy supply for the outlook has to do with watch developments before expanding, concludes Schlamb.

**FARM INCOME**

Texas and U. S. farmers are just like business men—everyone is interested in making a return on invested capital. How did the farmer come out in 1955?

Agriculture demands a big investment in land, improvements, tools and machinery. Last year the nation's farmers had an equity in farms of about 95 billion dollars. In addition, farm operators and their families did 11 billion hours of unpaid work on their land.

For this capital investment, and for all this labor investments the farmers collected a total of 11 billion dollars in 1955.

This means that if we allow farmers and their families a return of \$1 per hour for their labor, then they had nothing left at all for a return on their capital last year.

However, let's say we allow farmers a 3 percent return on their \$95 billion investment. This would be giving them 2.85 billion dollars on their

capital.

In such a case, subtracting the capital gain from total income, the farmer would have earned only 74 cents an hour for 11 billion hours of labor.

All this points out a curious situation. It appears that the best thing for farmers to do is to sell out and invest all their money in a good safe company that would give them a 3 percent return. Then, any side job, including ditch-digging, would at least pay them the minimum wage of 90 cents or more an hour.

These figures, are of course, national totals. It is true that many of our farmers get returns to capital and labor that are higher than average. But also, many farmers obviously get returns that are far below the national average.

Unless some immediate relief is found in the form of a new national farm program, the forward look for American farmers is not much improved over the dim picture immediately past.

Scattering seed hay where plant litter is absent has given fair results in some areas but it's expensive. Scattering seed under protecting brush or on rocky areas usually gives poor results.

The chances of success by any method depends upon the moisture supply and the management practices used while the grass seedlings are becoming established, says Walker.

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**Moisture Is Determining Factor For Successful Range Reseeding**

COLLEGE STATION, (Spec.)—Presently there is an estimated 10 to 12 million acres of abandoned cropland and an additional several million acres of denuded or barren rangeland in Texas. Reseeding with adapted grasses is one method which may be used to bring at least a part of this land back into profitable forage production, says A. H. Walker, extension range specialist, provided mois-

ture conditions are favorable. In the case of the abandoned cropland, Walker suggests reseeding the best land first. A soil test is a logical starting point. He points out that if reseeding is to be a success, the operation must be carried out in the same thorough manner as the seeding of any other crop. Use the best soil, adapted seed, methods and equipment available.

The land should be prepared by disking and harrowing. The grass should be drilled or seed-roller used to firm the soil. Planted in rows and culpacker or only adapted grasses and cover the seed from a fourth to three-fourths of an inch deep. Most grasses should be planted in the winter or early spring before the rainy season. Mowing the first year will aid in controlling the weeds and spray with chemicals can be used for this job the second year. If the grass is to become established, controlled grazing and good management are musts, says Walker.

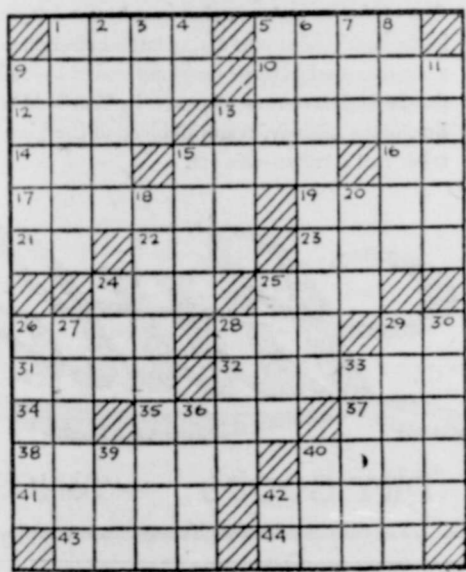
