#### DO YOU WANT TAXES LOWERED?

It would be possible to reduce income taxes by 25 per cent for every-one-without eliminating or weakening any necessary government service or activity.

How could that be done? The Town Journal explains it succinctly in these words: "Here are the figures: the personal income tax takes from the people's earnings about \$30 billions a year. The Hoover proposals for shaking out the waste and inefficiency would cut the cost of Government by \$7.5 billions, is 25 per cent of \$30 billions. Save that much and taxes could come down 25 per cent."

That \$7.5 billions could, instead, be applied to reducing the national debt, which many think should precede tax reduction. Or part could be used for debt reduction and part for

Some of the Hoover Commission recommendations have gone into effect. The prospect for others seem good. But many of them-including the most important, from the standpoint of saving money and making government more efficient-are dormant at this time. They can be brought to life by public interest and public demand for reform. "Vox populi vox dei" is still guiding rule in government.

### TWO WAY OBLIGATION

The president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States recently said that businessmen have both the obligation and the right to speak on political and other issues of the time. He then mentioned certain things that businessmen should be solidly against-among them, government in business, and high taxes.

This is a logical position. At the same time, businessmen must realize that what is sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander. If, as they should, they oppose costly special favors for other groups, they should be as adamant in opposing special favors for themselves. Business groups have often and deservedly lost public regard because they have supported proposals for government spending that would benefit them-while urging strict economy when it came to the other fellow.

May Eclipse Harriman's

Special to Central Press Association WASHINGTON-President Eisenhower's new request for funds for new "military propulsion reactors" increases speculation that the United States will test an atomic airplane in 1958 or early

While Mr. Eisenhower's request for an additional \$82.5 million was cloaked in secrecy by the White House, it is believed that the money will go mostly toward development of atomic-powered planes. Vital breakthroughs proving the feasibility of

nuclear-powered aircraft have been accomplished recently by United States Defense department The Atomic Energy commission is placing

major emphasis on developing atomic engines for planes. More than \$75 million was earmarked for nuclear aircraft in the atomic budget even before the President made his new request. ● DARK HORSE-Political observers are con-

vinced that New York City's Mayor Robert F. Wagner rather than Gov. Averell Harriman has the brightest political future among New Mayor Wagner Yorkers. They concede that Harriman is in the spot-

light this year because of his bid for the Democratic presidential nomination, but they believe that by 1960 Wagner well could be the most powerful political figure in the state.

Wagner, the son of the late, famed senator, is considered to have made an impressive record as mayor of the nation's largest city and probably will be able to win a Senate seat or the governorship whenever he wants to move up the ladder.



An abundance of cover is the word that describes the cover crop of Hubam sweetclover and rye on the L. B. Burnham, Jr. farm on the Colorado River. In keeping with the conservation plan Mr. Burnham developed with the supervisors of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District a number of years ago this 163 acre field was planted to Hubam sweetclover and rye. This combination of crops has yielded a large amount of temporary grazing and at the present has a good supply of residue to return to the soil.

Later this summer this field will be plowed to leave the residue on or near the surface of the soil. "Managing the residue of crops in this manner leaves the soil in a condition to take up the moisture when the rains do come", states Mr. Burnham.

Those who are preparing to break their stubble land should begin now to make ready for the fall rains by preparing their soil to hold the rains that falls.


