From the looks of recent market reports, which give a rundown of activities at Mills County Commission Company, it appears that the peak in sheep run through the auction ring was reached about a month ago. On June 8th., the Commission Company handled 15,322 head of sheep on their regular Friday sheep sale day, not to mention the goat sale on Mondays.

That's a lot of sheep to be sold through the ring in a day's time and there is a keen possibility that this figure also sets an all time record in number of head of stock handled by the company in one day.

This may not mean much to some folks but as we see it it reflects a very good and worthwhile business enterprise for Goldthwaite and Mills County. Malcolm and Sig Jernigan, owners of the Commission Company, are responsible for bringing a lot of folks to our community in either bringing sheep and goats to the sale ring or coming to the sale to buy sheep and goats.

Routine that marks modern-day wildlife studies was typified by the report on a mourning dove banded in Texas six years ago and reported bagged in Mexico recently.

The Director of Wildlife Restoration said the dove was banded near Midland by Game Warden Bob Evins, now of Junction, on June 26, 1950, soon after it hatched in a Chinese elm tree.

The report on the band was made by Julian Fejeda of Santa Maria del Valle, Jalisco, Mexico. He forwarded the number on the band which provided the key to details of the origmal nest marking.

In complying with the instructions on the band, Fejeda wrote: "The ring on the bird's leg had the following inscription (notify Game Comm., Austin, Texas, 20405) so I am pleased to do it and I hope you will be satisfy."

The Director said this cooperation across the border is "very important" since returns on the banded game is vital to studies by technicians concerning nesting, migrating and feeding habits of the game birds.

Four Ex-Cabinet Chiefs In Next U. S. Senate? Wickard, Brannan, McKay Plus Clinton P. Anderson?

Special to Central Press Association WASHINGTON—The United States Senate faces the possibility that four former Cabinet members will be in its ranks when it convenes next January

One of the ex-Cabinet officers already is firmly established in the body, and now heads the joint congressional committee on atomic energy. He is Senator Clinton P. Anderson, the New Mexico Democrat who served as secretary of agriculture during the first two years of former President Truman's administration.



Anderson's immediate predécessor in the agriculture post, Claude Wickard of Indiana, is assured the Democratic nomination for senator in the Hoosier state, and is given about a 50-50 chance of defeating the incumbent Republican, Senator Homer Capehart. Anderson's immediate successor at the Agri-

culture department, Charles F. Brannan of Colorado, also is after a Senate seat-that now held by Republican Senator Eugene Millikin. Brannan is expected to win the nomination handily, and also is said to have a good chance of victory against Millikin-or another Republican, should the ailing Millikin retire.

Another former Cabinet officer with senatorial ambitions is Douglas McKay of Oregon. He resigned his Interior department post to run against Senator Wayne Morse. McKay also is given a 50-50 chance of winning.

• STEVENSON STRATEGY?-Now that Adlai E. Stevenson has disposed of Senator Estes Kefauver as a serious rival for the Demo-cratic presidential nomination, the 1952 nominee's strategists are plotting the elimination of Gov. Averell Harriman of New York and Senator Stuart Symington of Missouri as contenders. Plans under consideration include

1-A bid to ex-President Harry S. Truman, who leans toward Harriman, to accept "unanimous" selection as Stevenson's vice presidential running mate. 2-A similar offer to Symington, should Truman refuse to go

along with Adlai. 3-A whispering campaign to the effect that Harriman, at 64, is

"too old to run for President." 4-The possibility that Gov. Frank Lausche of Ohio might be offered the vice presidential nomination on the theory that if a Stevenson-Lausche ticket were in the works, all other projected combinations would be out in the cold.

• FRAUD CASES DOUBLED-Fraud cases handled by the Justice department more than doubled in number last year in comparison to 1954. Figures recently supplied to Congress showed that the department's frauds section got 2.299 new cases in 1955, in contrast with 1,129 in 1954 and 652 in 1953.

A statement accompanying the statistics said that "there has been a continuing increase in new business coming into this section." The department added: "The work of the frauds section deals with fraud in almost every phase of industry and agriculture.'

In order to cope with these cases, the department said, federal attorneys must "familiarize themselves with the production techniques and the accounting and fiscal practices of the industries

Furthermore, the department stressed that "prompt action is essential for successful prosecution" because "otherwise evidence becomes more difficult to procure and present properly."

However, for those who are buying land or for those who are sale, a word of caution is ad-

Of course, it is sometimes hard

Farm operating costs are almost certain to go higher. Labor wages are on the upward trend, and so are transportation, machinery and other supplies. The cost-price squeeze shows little or no signs of easing. Refinancing credit is less plentiful, and interest rates are higher.

Also, there is no land shortage in sight, probably not for two generations, and even then peracre farm output will have increased to such a level as to be more than plentiful for our population.

In short, unless there is a more rapid rise in farm commodity prices than now appears likely, it will take longer to pay out a farm on the present market than at any time in 40 years if the farmer relies solely on the sale of farm products. And that's about all they grow.
