YOUR VOTE IS IMPORTANT

Too many citizens are inclined to show distaste when the word "politics" is mentioned. They have the idea that politics is dirty and they, as clean and upright citizens, will have nothing to do with it.

Politics is only as dirty as the people permit it to be Webster defines politics as "the science and art of government." In practice, politics is government. The United States is a republic, governed by the elected representatives of the people. Ours is a government "of the people, by the people, for the people."

When citizens fail to participate in politics through the medium of the ballot box, they are leaving the field open to organized minorities acting as a political machine to capture

Apathy and indifference by the voters breed abuse of the representative system. Apathetic citizens must share the blame when government becomes corrupt

The apathy begins to make itself apparent when the time comes for citizens to qualify themselves as voters. Texas requires payment of a poll tax. Citizens may pay the \$1.50 tax from Oct. 1 through Jan. 31. Usually, only half of those eligible to qualify as voters pay their poll taxes.

The apathy shows itself again at the elections, when only a fraction of the qualified voters turn out to cast their ballots. Many important elections have been decided by a comparative handful of voters.

When voters are so apathetic, why should they be shocked by poor government or corrupt government?

You can't achieve integrity through legislation. Integrity in government is achieved by electing honest, capable persons to public office. An honest man will conduct his office honestly. A capable man will give his constituents the kind of government to which they are entitled.

The voter has a twofold responsibility. He should make a diligent effort to inform himself to the best of his ability on the background, qualifications and character of the candidates seeking public office. He should inform himself on the merits and demerits of the issues to be voted on.

Then the citizen should go to his polling place and cast an intelligent vote. Casting an intelligent vote does not necessarily mean that the citizen votes for any one faction.

It means that he has informed himself as well as possible to each candidate and issue, and votes according to his convictions for honest and capable candidates who hold views nearest his own.

Too many voters are prone to select candidates on the basis of prejudice or propaganda. Emotional votes are highly susceptible to deception by a demagogue. Reason, not emotion, should be the controlling factor in a voters decisions.

It is a civic duty for each citizen to inform himself on candidates and issues, then vote.

MAKE POSTAL SYSTEM SELF-SUPPORTING

A short time ago Postmaster General Summerfield made a statement endorsing in unqualified terms a resolution adopted by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. This resolution urged that postal rates be increased sufficiently to place the postal system "on a non-profit, self-supporting basis." It further said: "Postal rates, and charges for special services, should be set at levels which yield the Post Office Department total revenues equal to total expenditures. Rates on fourth-class mail should at all times yield the Post Office Department revenues sufficient to cover the full cost of the service." Parcel post falls into the fourth-class mail classification.

Another paragraph of the resolution said: "Cost of services performed for the Post Office by other government agencies should be added to postal costs, and services erformed for other government agencies by the Post Office should be deducted from postal costs. . . . The postal service should be conducted according to the highest standards of efficiency in either business or government, and constant efforts should be made to improve the service in the interest of the public."

What this amounts to is that the people who use the postal service, in any and all of its branches, should pay the actual costs of carrying on that service. It's difficult to see how there can be any logical argument in opposition.

WATCH THE STATE HOUSE!

It's all very well and necessary to talk about cutting the eost of the federal government. But we must not let that obscure the problem of local government spending.

The Tax Foundation reports that total state tax collections (excluding unemployment compensation collections) were 46.1 per cent greater in fiscal 1955 than in fiscal 1950.

Obviously, it won't help anyone if we manage to bring about some reduction in federal taxes-and local taxes eat up

Jet Transports by 1960? Atomic Planes by 1965?

World Population Rising Faster Than Food Supply

Special to Central Press Association

ASHINGTON-Jet transports already are scheduled for commercial airline use by 1960, and by 1965 the Civil Aeronautics administration is anticipating the use of atomic-powered commercial airliners.

The relentless search for something faster, smoother and cheaper also is expected to lead to more use by airlines of the powerful jet stream winds which travel about 200 miles an hour four miles up.

Jet streams are considered the "cheapest source of power" and already are used to some extent by transports flying from the Orient to the West Coast.

CAA officials predict that nuclear-powered aircraft should be in the experimental commercial stage by 1965, and will be able to land and take off in much shorter distances than present aircraft require because of their tremendous What about rocket planes? A CAA engineer

suggested that an inquiry into them might better be asked in 1965. Available in 1975, perhaps.

• BIG WORLD-A co-sponsor of the nation's immigration law says the world is faced with an "explosion of human fertility." Rep. Francis Walter (D), Pennsylvania, puts it in this fashion:

"Every morning there are 95,000 new mouths to feed (in the world). Every second a person dies and two are born. The world's population is growing infinitely faster than the food supply prouced by the globe's good earth.'

By 1970 the congressman expects India's population to reach 470 million; Mexico's population of 30 million to double. United States population, he pointed out, has leaped more than 16 million in the past six years, now totals some 167 million.

 UNITED STATES LOSING OUT?—Optimistic public statements by the administration that the United States will not be outstripped by the Communists in the race to develop more scientists and skilled technicians are not borne out by statistics.

According to statistics by the Atomic Energy commission the United States is not meeting a "quota" of 50,000 scientists and engineers needed yearly in this country. Graduates number closer Part of the trouble apparently stems from the fact the number

of qualified teachers in science and mathematics at the high school level, where the training of future scientists and engineers begins, has dropped even where enrollment in these courses is up.

Additionally, about half the nation's high schools don't even include some basic sciences, such as physics, in their course of studies.

• TAX STRATEGY-Democratic leaders in Congress fear President Eisenhower will cut the ground out from under them in their cat-and-mouse game over tax legislation. Each is watching the other to see who makes the first move to cut taxes. So far, the administration, with the President leading the way, has been acting

However, the feeling in Congress is widespread that he has simply been stalling the Democrats, who are anxious to please the voters this election year with some kind of tax cut.

Now the Democrats fear the President will come out during a news conference this summer with a strong promise to reduce taxes next year. He probably would say that the budget surplus is not big enough to justify one now but that all indications point to a good-sized surplus next spring. If the surplus does materialize, he could say, then he will ask for a tax reduction.

East Texas State Teachers col-Because valuable retirement and insurance protection is based on covered earnings, every worker should know the status of his account and what he and his family can expect from this protection. Mr. Marley further advises that a special printed postcard, used to request the earnings statement, may be obtained from the nearest office, located at Austin.

When your earnings statement is received from the social security accounting office in Baltimore, Md., check it against your personal records. If the statement is not complete or correct, contact the social security office so that immediate action can be taken toward correcting your account. Failure to take this action may reduce the amount of monthly benefits payable to you or your survivors since all benefits are based on your "average" earnings.
