Every summer when the extreme dry season hits us folks are faced with the problem of needing more water, especially if they try to have a lawn, flowers or gardens.

It isn't the fact that the city is pumping less water. It is simply the fact that the people are using more water than ever before. The city is providing more water than ever before but when a long period of dry and hot weather hits us the demand is greater than the capacity to produce by city water facilities.

It seems that each year a number of new families drill their own wells and yet the demand for water still increases every year. This is not only a local problem, it is a problem being faced in every community throughout the State of Texas and many other states as well.

DOUBLE STANDARD

It has long been illegal for corporations to make contributions to candidates for political office. This legal restriction, obviously, is based on the theory that corporations otherwise would use their economic power to elect men who wuld serve special interests.

Whether or not such laws are wise is debatable. What it not debatable, however, is that similar restrictions do not apply to organizations which also have great economic power-the unions.

The head of a major union, the International Ladies' Garment Workers, has said that his union will have more than \$500 thousand available for contributions to candidates in this year's national election campaigns. He said also that the combined AFL-CIO political fund may reach \$3 million.

What conceivable justification can there be in forbidding corporations from financing political candidaciesand at the same time permitting powerful unions to spend money on a huge scale for political ends?

Cabinet Changes Probable If Ike Wins Second Term

Wilson, Weeks and Folsom Believed Eager to Retire

Special to Central Press Association TV/ASHINGTON-If President Eisenhower should win re-election this autumn, as most Washingtonians think, you can look for several changes in his Cabinet for his second term

Only three of Ike's original Cabinet appointees left during his first term in office-Welfare Secretary Oveta Culp Hobby, Interior Secretary Douglas McKay and Labor Secretary Martin Durkin. However, several others are known to be anxious to get back into

private life and it's a good bet that they will offer their resignations if Ike gets a second term in the White House.

Among these are Commerce Secretary Sinclair Weeks, Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson and the new Welfare secretary, Marion Folsom.

Folsom wants to return to his position with the Eastman Kodak company, Weeks is said to have tired of public life and its problems, and Wilson also is reported anxious to get back to General Motors.

There also have been reports that Secretary of State John Foster Dulles would like to retire, but the President is said to want his foreign policy chief to return. Also definitely certain of reappointment in a second-term Cabinet are

Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey and Attorney General Herbert Brownell. Other Cabinet members also are expected to
