AUSTIN, Tex. — Today's favorite riddle among Capitol seers is: "How will the new legislature 'go' — Conservative or Liberal?"

First primary voting results assured substantial turnovers in both houses. Fifty-four newcomers are certain in the 150-member House. At least seven "freshmen" are assured in the 31-member Senate.

Second primary returns could boost the turnover to 65 in the House, 11 in the Senate.

One astute, non-partisan observer hazarded a guess that the 55th Legislature will be "slightly more liberal." But he emphasized this was only a guess, necessarily based on campaign statements. Many things can happen to change these positions.

Only way to be sure, he commented, is to "watch 'em vote a few times." This is especially true, he pointed out, for the newcomers.

Senate newcomers include three men who defeated incumbents outright. They are Charles F. Herring of Austin, who won over Sen. Johnnie B. Rogers; Henry B. Gonzales of San Antonio, who defeated Sen. O. E. Lattimer, and Hubert R. Hudson of Brownsville, victor over Sen. Rogers Kelley.

In the Lubbock area, Ex-Rep. Preston Smith and Rep. Carroll Cobb are in a runoff after both edged out Sen. Kilmer Corbin.

Two other senators are in runoffs. They are Sen. Doyle Willis of Fort Worth, contested by Rep. Joe Pyle; and Sen. William Sherman of Corpus Christi, opposed by Bruce Reagan.

Rep. Floyd Bradshaw of Weatherford won the post of the late Sen. Wayne Wagoner. Two other senators did not run again. Sen. Gus Strauss of Hallettsville will be succeeded by Culp Krueger of El Campo. Sen. Warren McDonald will be replaced by Rep. Bill Wood of Tyler.

Long-range guesses are that the conservative-liberal balance in the Senate will be "about the same as before." But the House is termed "still a jig-saw puzzle." Both conservative and liberal forces in the House will be without some of their staunchest advocates in past sessions.

Forty-three representatives retired. Among them were such liberal leaders as Reps. Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde, Maury Maverick Jr. of San Antonio and D. B. Hardeman of Denison. Twenty-eight men have been elected to fill vacancies; 15 are yet to be decided in the second primary.

Eleven incumbent representatives were voted out in July. Casualties included such known conservatives as Reps. J. O. Gillham of Brownfield, W. G. Kirklin of Odessa and Stanton Stone of Freeport. Other conservatives were among the 11 incumbents involved in runoffs.

This year's House turnover is only slightly larger than the average of one-third. Largest in recent history was in 1939, the year W. Lee O'Daniel first became governor and the House got 91 new members.

DANIEL CITES NEGRO VOTES—Bloc voting in negro precincts, dominated by members of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, will be a major issue in the run-off campaign. So stated

A good many folks were really surprised with the record, or near record, number of Mills County citizens who turned out to cast their ballots during the first primary election on July 28.

During the thirty day period before the primary there was a lot of politicking going on on the part of local as well as state candidates. Yet, from all indications the average citizen didn't take too much stock in the campaign for votes and support.

That picture lead many folks to believe that we would have a light turn-out of voters come election day. Election day came and the opposite was true. It was a heavy turn-out of voters.

The possibility of having a heavy vote in the primary became apparent when so many folks made application for absentee ballots which were cast in record number also. In fact the absentee vote this year was about one hundred per cent more than at the last election in 1934.

After the battle was over the inevitable proved to show up and some of them woke up realizing that not all of them can win and found they were "sucking the hind tit".

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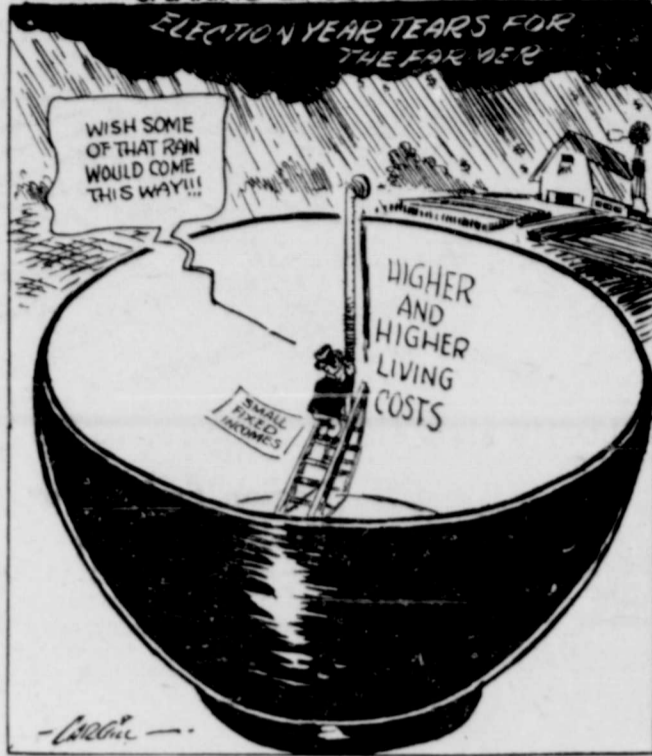

Queen Elizabeth, Churchill | Jamestown Festival to Be
May Visit U. S. Next Year | Big Anniversary in 1957

WASHINGTON—Queen Elizabeth and Winston Churchill may come to the United States next year to help celebrate the 350th anniversary of the birth of this nation.

And the president of France may also attend in recognition of the major role his country played in freeing the English colonies in America from British rule.

The occasion will be the Jamestown Festival of 1957, which will commemorate the first successful and permanent English colony in the new world. When English colonists landed at Jamestown, Va., in 1607, it marked the beginning of what was to become the United States of America.

The festival, which will continue from April through November, will also feature an International Naval Review in June in Hampton Roads in which the warships of 30 nations will participate. Among them may be a Russian vessel, possibly the famous cruiser *Ordzhonikidze*, which carried Bulganin and Khrushchev to England.

● PRESIDENT'S INVITATION—Next Sept. 29, Gov. Thomas Stanley of Virginia will sail from Hampton Roads aboard the liner *Noordam* for England with a party of state and national officials. Stanley will bear with him an invitation from President Eisenhower to Queen Elizabeth to participate in the festival. At the same time invitations will be extended to Churchill and to Virginia-born Lady Nancy Astor and to the president of France.

Mr. Eisenhower has endorsed the proposal and plans to attend the festival also. Negotiations are now underway with British Ambassador Sir Roger Makins. The queen would attend the Royal Dominion celebration on June 16. This will commemorate the dissolution of the London company in 1624 and the establishment of Virginia as a Royal Dominion.

Churchill and Lady Astor are being invited to attend the General Assembly celebration July 30. On that date the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Virginia will convene in the old church at Jamestown, built in 1639, to commemorate its first session in 1619. Next to the British parliament, the Virginia general assembly is the oldest legislative body in the English-speaking world.

The president of France is being invited to attend Yorktown Day on Oct. 19. This will commemorate the winning of independence in the last major battle of the war in which Lord Cornwallis and his British surrendered to George Washington's American and French forces.

President Eisenhower is expected to be present for the Jamestown Settlement celebration May 13 which will commemorate the founding of the Virginia Commonwealth and the birth of this nation at Jamestown in 1607.

The President will also formally dedicate the 23-mile Colonial Parkway which will connect historic Williamsburg with Jamestown and the Yorktown battlefield, three of the nation's most historic shrines.

● CAPITAL FOR 92 YEARS—Jamestown served as capital of the colony of Virginia for 92 years, from 1607 to 1699. Williamsburg, 19 miles from Jamestown, served as capital from 1699 to 1779.

Today there is no town of Jamestown. Only the old brick church, ruins, foundations and monuments remain of the site used by the early settlers. The fort in which the settlers lived in 1607 is being reconstructed and full-scale replicas of the three ships which brought them to America are being built and will be moored in the James river.

The Glasshouse of 1608, the first highly skilled industry in English America, is also being reproduced and blowers will fashion glass souvenirs for visitors. The British government plans an elaborate exhibition at the festival and nearby will also be an Indian exhibit, Powhatan's lodge.

Millions are expected to attend the festival during the eight-month gala celebration.

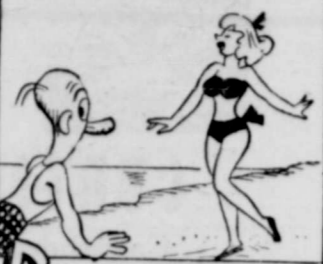

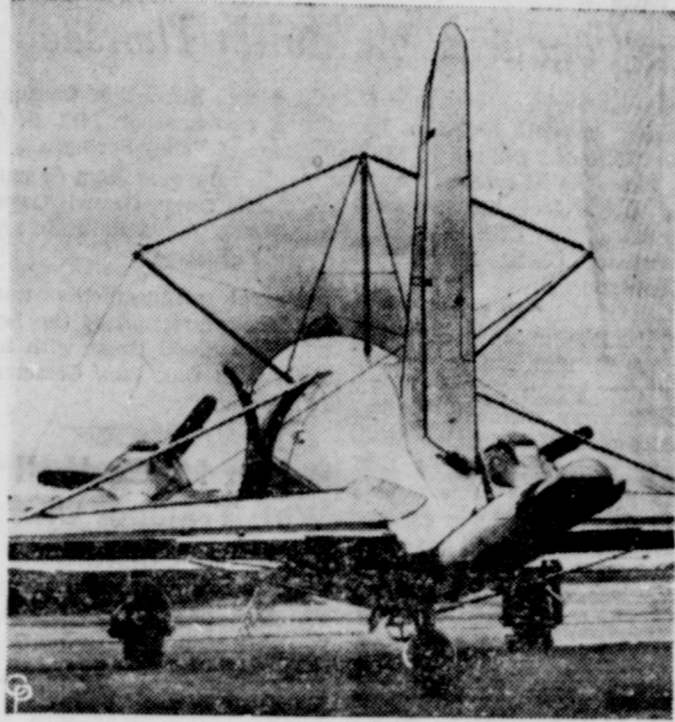

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

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL

AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED
ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE
HELD NOVEMBER 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9

proposing an Amendment to Section 11 of
Article I of the Constitution of the State
of Texas by adding a new subsection to be
designated as Section 11a, relating to denial
of bail to a person charged with a felony
less than capital who has been theretofore
twice convicted of a felony; providing for
the submission of the proposed Amendment
to a vote of the people and for proclama-
tion and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLA-
TURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11 of Article I
of the Constitution of the State of Texas
be amended by adding a subsection there-
to to be known as Section 11a and to read
as follows:

"Section 11a. Any person accused of a
felony less than capital in this State, who
has been theretofore twice convicted of a
felony, the second conviction being subse-
quent to the first, both in point of time
of commission of the offense and convic-
tion thereof may, after a hearing, and
upon evidence substantially showing the
guilt of the accused, be denied bail pending
trial, by any judge of a court of record or
magistrate in this State; provided, how-
ever, that if the accused is not accorded a
trial upon the accusation within sixty (60)
days from the time of his incarceration
upon such charge, the order denying bail
shall be automatically set aside, unless a
continuance is obtained upon the motion
or request of the accused; provided, fur-
ther, that the right of appeal to the Court
of Criminal Appeals of this State is ex-
pressly accorded the accused for a review
of any judgment or order made hereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional
Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of
the qualified electors of this State at an
election to be held on the first Tuesday
after the first Monday in November, 1956,
at which election all ballots shall have
printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution
of the State of Texas providing that a
court, judge or magistrate may deny bail
to a person who has been convicted of two
(2) previous felonies."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Con-
stitution of the State of Texas providing
that a court, judge or magistrate may deny
bail to a person who has been convicted of

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue
the necessary proclamation for said election
and have the same published as required by
the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11

proposing an Amendment to Article III of

of.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLA-
TURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

That Article III of the Con-
stitution of the State of Texas be amended

designated as Section 11c, which shall
read:

"The Legislature may
grant pardon and compensation to any person
who has been fined or served
a term of imprisonment, or who may hereafter
be so punished, for any offense
for which he or she is not guilty,
and may make such regulations and limitations
therein as it may deem expedient."

The foregoing constitutional
amendment shall be submitted to a vote of
the electors of this State at an
election to be held on the first Tuesday
after the first Monday in November, 1956,
at which all of the ballots shall
show the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amend-

who have served prison sentences
for offenses for which they were not guilty";

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amend-

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 13, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39
Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:
"Section 15-a. No person shall be committed as a person of unsound mind except on competent medical or psychiatric testimony. The Legislature may enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and may provide for a waiver of trial by jury, in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, by the concurrence of the person under inquiry, or his next of kin, and an attorney ad litem appointed by a judge of either the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:
"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT REQUIRING MEDICAL TESTIMONY FOR COMMITMENT OF PERSONS OF UNSOUND MIND, AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR TRIAL AND COMMITMENT OF SUCH PERSONS AND FOR WAIVER OF THE RIGHT OF TRIAL BY JURY BY A PERSON ALLEGED TO BE OF UNSOUND MIND OR HIS NEXT OF KIN, AND HIS ATTORNEY AD LITEM."
"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT REQUIRING MEDICAL TESTIMONY FOR COMMITMENT OF PERSONS OF UNSOUND MIND, AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR TRIAL AND COMMITMENT OF SUCH PERSONS AND FOR WAIVER OF THE RIGHT OF TRIAL BY JURY BY A PERSON ALLEGED TO BE OF UNSOUND MIND OR HIS NEXT OF KIN, AND HIS ATTORNEY AD LITEM."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machines in such manner that each voter shall vote on the machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Texas Safety Association Official Discusses Safety On The Highway

"Don't be a traffic misfit — the fellow who's out of step is out of luck!"

That warning was given to motorists today by E. C. McFadden of Dallas, President of the Texas Safety Association, as he discussed the Share the Road program of the Texas Safety Association, the Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council. This program is being conducted in cooperation with the Slow Down and Live program of the National Conference of State Safety Coordinators.

"Safety on the highway depends to a great extent on the smooth, even flow of traffic," McFadden said. "Whenever you interrupt this flow, you're in trouble — and so are the drivers around you. Here are a few examples of stunts that will foul up traffic in a hurry.

"Stopping suddenly can cause an aggravating pile-up of the cars behind you. Making a turn from the wrong lane is sure to jam things up in the lane you barge into. Hugging the bumper of the car ahead makes you a sitting duck for a serious accident if the fellow in front stops suddenly."

"Speed is another thing that must be adjusted to the traffic flow," he said.

"If you go barreling down the road faster than the drivers around you, you're likely to tangle with them," he said. "But it's not safe to drive too slow, either. You can throw a monkey wrench into the traffic pattern if you force every other car on the road to take chances getting around you."

He advised motorists to drive at a rate of speed that fits in smoothly with the speed of the cars around them. He said this is especially important when driving on superhighways, where higher speed gives the driver less time to think in an emergency situation, and increases the severity of any accident he may have.

"Remember, you're not alone on the highway," McFadden said. "Share the road if you want to stay safe."

Troops are expected to enter the Swim Meet in San Saba from Lampasas, Lometa, San Saba, Richland Springs, Goldthwaite and Priddy. Troops from Brownwood, Bangs, Blanket, Brooksmith, May, Early, Rising Star and Comanche took part in the activity held in Brownwood. Judge A. O. Newman, Brownwood and J. B. Hunting & Fishing Licenses To Be Shipped August 21

AUSTIN, (Spec.) — The new hunting and fishing licenses for the state's fiscal year beginning September 1 will be mailed from Austin, August 21, according to the Chief License Clerk for the Game and Fish Commission.

Approximately 350,000 fishing and 350,000 hunting licenses in all will be shipped to the state's 2500 licensed agents in 254 counties.

Old licenses will be void after midnight August 31.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD NOVEMBER 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11
Proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:
"Section 15-a. No person shall be committed as a person of unsound mind except on competent medical or psychiatric testimony. The Legislature may enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and may provide for a waiver of trial by jury, in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, by the concurrence of the person under inquiry, or his next of kin, and an attorney ad litem appointed by a judge of either the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:
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"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT REQUIRING MEDICAL TESTIMONY FOR COMMITMENT OF PERSONS OF UNSOUND MIND, AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR TRIAL AND COMMITMENT OF SUCH PERSONS AND FOR WAIVER OF THE RIGHT OF TRIAL BY JURY BY A PERSON ALLEGED TO BE OF UNSOUND MIND OR HIS NEXT OF KIN, AND HIS ATTORNEY AD LITEM."

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Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

curity benefits in the 21 counties served by the Austin District office, according to James B. Marley, manager.

These persons, Marley continued, filed their 1955 tax returns, paid the self-employment tax thereon, and have already grossed \$800 in creditable farm income in 1956. By a special provision in the law, farmers past 65 who meet the two conditions just outlined may file their claims now, without having to wait until the end of 1956, their second year of coverage under social security.

Payments are in the process of being certified to those who do not expect their net earnings this year to exceed \$1200, and to those other farm and ranch operators who have passed their 72nd birthday. If the farmer thinks he may net over \$1200, but cannot make a reasonable estimate of the expected net for 1956, his claim is still approved, but no checks are released until the end of the year when exact figures become available, or at such earlier time as he can make a fairly accurate estimate.

As there may be advantages

to having a claim filed at this time, Marley urged all self-employed farmers who are over 65, who have filed their 1955 tax returns, and who are still operating their lands, to get in touch with the Austin social security office in the very near future. A copy of the 1955 tax return and cancelled check or money order stub showing payment should be presented when the application is filed.

Sen. Price Daniel in an Austin speech to campaign workers.

The candidate for governor cited election returns to show that the big-city Negro precincts, where the NAACP is strongest, gave his opponent, Ralph Yarborough, 87% of the votes, compared with only 5.8% for the Senator.

Typical of the Negro boxes, said Daniel, were Box 157 in Houston, which gave Yarborough 398 votes to only 2 for Daniel.

Others mentioned were Box 68 in Houston, with Yarborough receiving 926 votes to Daniel's 35; Box 120 in Fort Worth, where Yarborough scored 458 to Daniel's 6; Box 59 in Fort Worth; Yarborough 454, Daniel 3; Box 309 in Dallas; Yarborough 436, Daniel 3; Box 226 in Dallas; Yarborough 322, Daniel 8.

POLIO VACCINE FOR ALL — The lid is off on polio vaccinations.

State Health Commissioner Henry Holle reports that federal allocation of Salk vaccine had ended. Shots are now available commercially for any person of any age. More-than adequate supplies make the change-over possible.

For Dr. Holle it was the end of a several months' fight to get shots for persons 20 years of age and more.

Health Department statistics show that 16 per cent of all Texas paralytic polio cases this year and 29 per cent of polio deaths hit persons over 19.

So far this year Texas has had 668 polio cases, 15 of them fatal. During the same period last year 701 cases were reported. Health officials credit vaccinations for the drop.

STATEWIDE RAIN MAKING BACKED — A statewide rain making effort may be launched

to combat Texas' prolonged drought.

Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas has called a September meeting of the Texas Water Resources Committee to study this possibility.

First to advance the idea publicly was O. G. McClain, Corpus Christi member of the committee. A petroleum geologist, McClain contended that rain making is the "most economical, permanent and equitable way to get more water."

Even "with with complete conservation and development," he said, "the water supply still would be terribly inadequate. What we need are some good rains. We cannot legislate them. They are not coming naturally. The only alternative is to work for them."

EMPLOYMENT DOWN AFTER PEAK—Rain and strike settlements are the twin keys to Texas' unstable employment outlook.

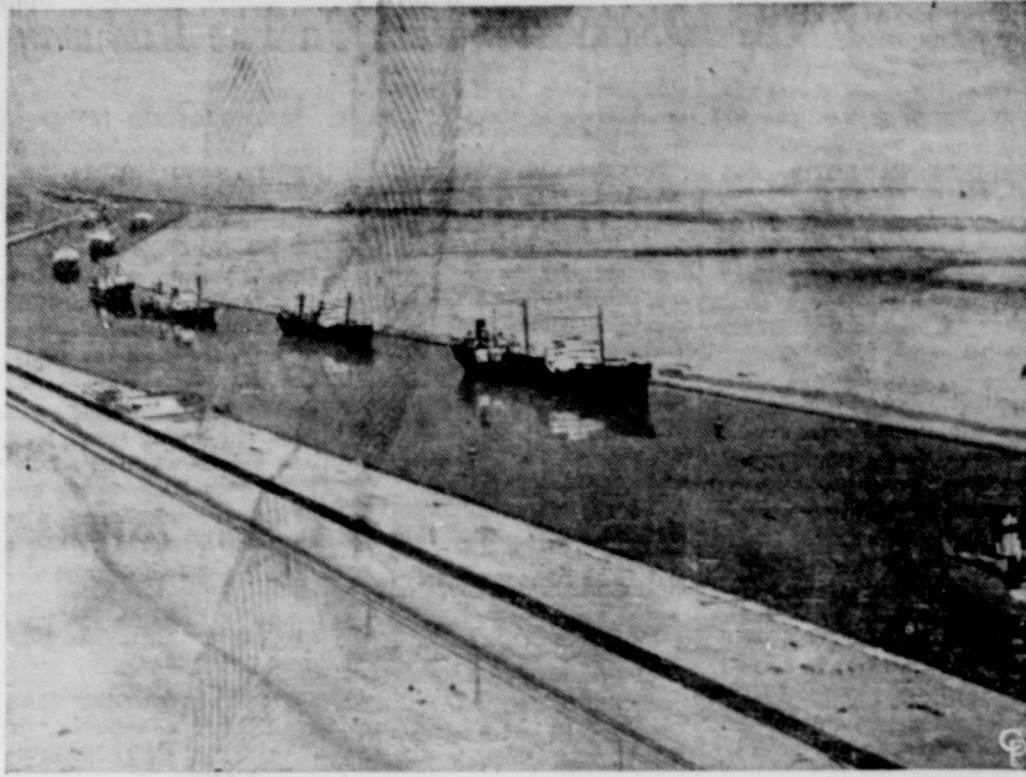
Texas jobholders hit an all-time high in June. More than three million, said the Texas Employment Commission. But by July the drought and the steel strike had dragged the figure down.

Whether employment picks up in August hinges on improvement of agricultural conditions and ending of labor disputes. Although the strike in the steel industry has been settled, two Texas plants are affected by the steel union strike against aluminum manufacturers.

WESTERN SUPER-ROAD — A superhighway to El Paso is being considered under the new federal-state building program.

"We've been looking for a long time for an East-West alternate route to U. S. Highway 80 through far West Texas," says DeWitt Greer, state highway engineer. "And our chances are increasing with all this new fed-

eral money for interstate and defense highways."

VETERANS' LAND JUDGMENTS—State recovery of veterans' land funds eventually could total \$3,000,000.

An Austin district court has just awarded the state \$112,742 from a South Texas dealer. This brings the present recovery total to \$1,770,000.

Still pending are suits involving another \$1,130,000.

This recovery program has been a mammoth job. Few people realize how intensive this investigation has been. "Investigations of the Land Office and the Veteran's Land Program," says Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepherd, "have been the most extensive and thorough in the State's history."

Latest reports from the Attorney General's office show that 35 cases have been filed, 24 have been tried, and the state has won them all. Twenty-three grand juries have been active in 18 counties. Every transaction of the Land Office has been checked. Over 200 witnesses have been called in to testify. And every bidder on every type of lease has been contacted.

How thorough the investigation has been is indicated by the fact that the bank accounts and income tax statements of employees of the Land Office for the past ten years were voluntarily submitted and carefully examined.

In addition each of the 16,000 veterans who purchased land under the program has been con-

tacted. Also the 3,000 whose applications had been denied.

A total of 800 depositions and 30,000 questionnaires were examined and four separate courts of inquiry held.

Making independent investigations have been the FBI, Internal Revenue Department, U. S. Post Office, State Auditor, Department of Public Safety, five Legislative Committees, the AG's office and the American Legion.

PARK IMPROVEMENTS SUGGESTED — Local community management and better fire-fighting equipment have been suggested for the state parks system.

In his annual report of the State Parks Board, State Auditor C. H. Cavness observed that fire-fighting apparatus generally "seems to be inadequate."

He also called attention to "several parks, including certain historical parks, that we think would better serve their com-

munities if given to the communities for complete operation and management."

SHORT SNORTS — Prices received by Texas farmers crept up one per cent during the month ending in mid-July, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Price increases were noted for potatoes, commercial vegetables, hay, wool, cotton and most small grains. . . . Texas Game and Fish Commission will begin mailing out some 700,000 new hunting and fishing licenses on Aug. 21. New permits will be needed beginning Sept. 1. Applications for the fall antelope hunts now are ready, said the commission. Deadline for requests is Aug. 31. . . . Texas lawyers will show off their swanky new Austin headquarters to National Bar executives Aug. 25. An air trip to Austin is dated as part of the American Bar Association convention Aug. 24-26 in Dallas.

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Price Daniel Thanks Texas Voters For Overwhelming Lead In Primary

Senator Price Daniel this week thanked the 622,000 Texans who gave him an overwhelming lead in the first primary race for Governor, putting him more than 162,000 votes ahead of his run-off opponent.

"This is the widest lead a candidate for Governor ever has had in a run-off," Daniel said. "I am confident that, with hard work,

we can win a landslide victory on August 25."

Daniel, a native of Liberty County, maintains his family home on a small ranch near his birthplace and is a member of the REA.

As a U. S. Senator, he supported 90 per cent parity on basic crops, authored an amendment to the farm bill which placed grain sorghum supports at a comparable level as corn, and helped obtain more realistic farm credit provisions.

Daniel is advocating a statewide water and soil conservation

program, and a state drought relief program that would include loans to farmers and ranchers facing mortgage foreclosure.

His program also includes stepped-up research into proposals to create additional water supplies, such as conversion of salt water and artificial "rain-making."

Daniel said that as Governor he would "put the full power of the State Government behind our farmers and ranchers, to help them regain their fair share of the national income and to
