The value of a two-way radio system for county law enforcement officials in more successfully carrying out their work was very clearly demonstrated last week when a number of folks took part in saving a man's life.

In commenting on the matter, Mills County Sheriff C. F. "Stub" Stubblefield said: "For law enforcement officials to work without a two-way radio system this day and time is just about like folks going back to burning a coal oil lamp in their home."

When the emergency call came in for help the Sheriff called firemen and immediately started with Dr. R. Glynn Raley to the scene of the accident on the Colorado River.

From then on he kept up with his deputy Clyde Cockrum here in the city through the radio system and more help was speeded to the scene where volunteer workers kept up artificial respiration for more than two hours to save a man from being a drowning victim of the muddy Colorado River.

Modern law enforcement requires modern equipment and with that type of equipment local and state law enforcement officials can do a better job.

Norman Duren, Chairman of the Mills County Red Cross Blood Program, is beginning to remind folks of the forthcoming visit of the Bloodmobile to Mills County on September 18.

Seventy pints of blood is the quota set for this county for this visit of the Bloodmobile here.

Mills County citizens did a splendid job during the past fiscal year donating pints of blood for the Red Cross blood program in this area of which Mills County is a part.

A good many of our citizens have benefited a great deal from this program when they were in need of blood in the past and the program will continue to serve our citizens when the need arises.

Mr. Duren has been a tireless worker for the blood program and deserves the help and cooperation from everyone in Goldthwaite and Mills County.

Members of the Lions Club and their guests had some interesting facts presented to them at their last meeting by Joe Perry regarding the need for a more intense safety program for our motoring public.

Mr. Perry is the District Safety Officer of the Department of Public Safety in Texas. He is stationed in San Angelo.

In talking to the local service club Mr. Perry pointed out through charts with facts and figures the need for maintaining the present 60 mile per hour speed limit on Texas highways. Facts presented by him showed that in cases where there is a higher speed limit allowed on certain super highways in various states the number of fatal highway accidents in which speed was a major contributing factor is much greater than where the speed limit is lower.

Facts point out that in one car accidents, as well as where more than one car is involved, the largest percentage of accidents are caused by excessive speed.

According to the officer, some states where a 70 mile speed limit is now in force on turnpikes a move is underway for reducing the speed limit to 60.

**OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH**

Interest is running high in fall seeding of Blue Panic Grass. E. H. Haggood who has an irrigated farm in Big Valley is preparing his land now and will plant the grass in the near future. Blue Panic Grass has one of the highest protein contents of any of our grasses. It often runs higher in protein content than does alfalfa. It is relished by all classes of livestock. With sufficient moisture and plenty of fertilizer it has been known to produce ten tons of green matter per month per acre.

The seedbed should be prepared by listing some shallow beds so that in case of heavy rains or normal irrigation, the seed will not be covered too deeply, one-fourth to one half inch being the preferred planting depth. With soil temperature as warm as it is this time of the year and with adequate moisture the grass should germinate in from three to five days.

On dryland it should be planted before September 10th so that any September rain will bring it up to a stand. This will give the grass time to establish itself before the first frost.

The chief advantage of fall seeding Blue Panic is the absence of competition during the fall of the year. Spring planted seed has a great deal of competition from annual weeds and grasses and with the coming of hot weather is often taken out of the picture.

Fall planted grass does not have this competition and as the weather cools off during September, the grass can get along on less moisture. The only gamble is an early frost and since the average date of killing frost is November 6, this gives the grass some two months to establish itself. Cooperators with the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District who have indicated they wanted to give the fall seeding a trial are Jim Soules, Hardy Collier, and S. P. McCasland.

Although it is too late to draw any payment, deferred grazing is always in season. Timely deferments from now until frost can pay large dividends during the late winter and all during the spring.

Grasses are in their lowest condition of the year and with any September rain will try to make a little growth to store up enough food to pull through the winter. A deferment at this time will give grass the protection it needs to make that growth.
