Eagles Open Conference Friday Night

Defeat McGregor Last Friday By Score Of 21-0

The Goldthwaite Eagles beat the McGregor Bulldogs with a score of 21 to 0 on the Eagle Field last Friday night.

Ferrell and Crelle were co-captains for the Bulldogs and Jerry Kight and Jerry Hammond were the Eagle co-captains.

High points of the game were when the Eagles' Tilmor Kirby went over the goal line in the second quarter for the first TD. Then in the third, Johnny Vaughan broke away from the Bulldogs and ran 41 yards for six more points. Tilmor Kirby ran 12 yards for another six in the fourth. Kirby kicked the extra points.

McGregor received the ball. The Bulldogs tried three passes in the first quarter but none were completed, and they received a five yard penalty for back field in motion. The Eagles got the ball on the 10 yard line and fought their way back to about the 50 before the end of the first. The Eagles made four first downs and the Bulldogs made three first downs in the first quarter.

At the beginning of the second, Kirby made 20 yards on a keeper play. The Eagles pushed their way down to the one yard line and Kirby went across the goal line and then kicked the extra point. The Eagles received a 15 yard penalty for holding and made five first downs to the Bulldogs one in the second quarter.

The Eagles kicked off to the Bulldogs at the first of the third and Skipper was stopped on the 38 yard line. Bartel and Skipper made yardage for the Bulldogs in the third. Cash made seven or eight yards on a keeper play. The ball went over and Vaughan made eight yards and Edgington six to bring the ball up to the Eagles' 44 yard line. Johnny Vaughan broke through the Bulldogs line and ran the 44 yards for the Eagles second TD. Kirby kicked the extra point to make the score 14-0. In the last few minutes

Star Tigers Beat Pottsville 41-0

The Star Tigers scored in every quarter while holding the Pottsville Bobcats scoreless to win 41 to 0 in a District 12-B contest on the Star field Thursday night.

The Bobcats, while playing football, never seriously threatened the Tiger goal line. Larry Kelso, Tiger quarterback, snarled a Cat pass on his own seven yard line to stave off the greatest Bobcat threat.

Star amassed a total of 333 yards from scrimmage and another 37 yards from two of four passes attempted. One of these was a 29 yard touchdown pass from Kelso to Clinton Miles.

The Bobcats were more aerial minded, attempting 15 passes, completing three and had one intercepted. The total Bobcat gain from passes was seven yards. Gain from scrimmage was held to 117 yards by the stout defense of the Tiger squad.

James Boykin led the winners in the yards gained per carry department. He collected 107 yards on 12 carries for a round nine yards per carry. Next to him was Larry Kelso who had 86 yards on 11 carries, followed by Miles with 140 yards on 20 times with the ball for an average of seven yards per carry.

The Tigers were waiting with bared claws to intercept the Bobcat passing attack. Boykin, Gilly and Shultz turned in a good account of themselves for the Bobcats, but could never quite get the size of the Tigers.

State ASC Committee Explains Soil Bank Normal Yield Program

In reply to many questions about determination of normal yields in the Soil Bank Reserve Program, the Texas State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, issued the following explanation using wheat as an example of the procedure in determining normal yields.

"County normal yields of wheat are determined by the Commodity Stabilization Service Administrator in Washington, D. C. for each wheat producing county in each of the 36 commercial wheat producing states. County average yields of wheat from available records are calculated for the 10-year period 1945-54 and then adjusted for any abnormal conditions such as flood or drought. In most cases the adjustments made for abnormal conditions result in a somewhat higher county normal yield for wheat than the actual average yield of wheat for the county.

"The County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, using the county normal wheat yield already established, determines community or township check yields

which reflect variations in wheat yields between the communities.

"With the community check yields as guides, the County ASC Committee determines a normal wheat yield for each wheat producing farm in the county. Farm records for each year 1946 through 1955, if available, are used and adjustments are made for abnormal conditions and trends in yields. If farm records are available for only a part of the 10-year period or if no records are available, the County Committee determines a normal yield for those years taking into consideration the productivity of the land usually devoted to wheat, the farming practices of the operator, and any abnormal conditions such as drought or floods.

"After normal yields of wheat have been determined for the wheat producing farms of a community by the County ASC Committee, the yields are subject to adjustments if the weighted average of normal yields for all farms in the community exceeds the community check yield of wheat."

FROM AN ELDER STATESMAN

In the view of Herbert Hoover, "the greatest issue in America and all mankind is the encroachment of government to master our lives."

That single brief sentence says more than a hundred windy political speeches—our tortuously phrased partisan platforms designed to offer all things to all men.

Those who look to government for doles, for favors, for special privileges, for cradle-to-the-grave security, will find that government will demand the death of liberty in return. Then we will have the security of the prison.

A VOTING YARDSTICK

Before one gets carried away with enthusiasm by all the things political candidates promise to have the government do for us, it might be well to consider what has made this country what it is as a yardstick in making a choice between candidates.

Most of the social and economic gain in this country have come from the efforts and initiative of the individual and not from government planning: Fulton invented the steamboat; Bell developed the telephone; Ford built the first low-cost car; Franklin discovered electricity; Wright created the airplane; Whitney designed the cotton gin; and so on, ad infinitum. Without the work of the individual, we would still be living under the feudal system that allowed us only a bare subsistence. It is the accomplishments of the individual that have lifted us to present levels—not the accomplishments of government.

Yes, American progress rooted in individual freedom. That points to a yardstick that can well be used in judging those candidates who would bring about a society where "do-all" government would reduce the individual to the status of a statistic.

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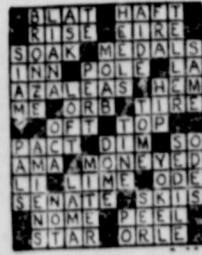
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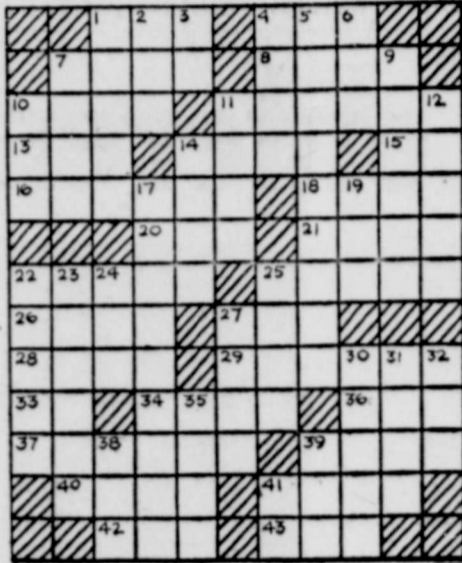

Minton's Supreme Court Successor to be Catholic?

Three Faiths Would Be Represented on High Bench

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower may revert to an precedent and name a Roman Catholic to the United States Supreme Court.

It was reported in usually well-informed circles that the President is thinking of selecting a Catholic jurist to fill the vacancy resulting from the retirement Oct. 15 of Justice Sherman Minton.

If he does, it will be the first time since 1861 that the nation's three major faiths have been represented on the high court. For years prior to that the court included seven members of the Protestant faith, one of the Jewish faith, and one Roman Catholic.

Frank Murphy of Michigan was the last Catholic to serve on the court. It had been anticipated that his successor would also be a member of the same faith, but President Truman instead chose Tom Clark, his attorney general and a Presbyterian, for the post. He also selected J. Howard W. Grath, a Catholic, to succeed Clark in his Cabinet.

Catholics have served with distinction and honor on the nation's top tribunal, two of them as chief justices. In addition to Murphy, two other Catholics have served on the court. The first was Roger Taney of Maryland, who was named chief justice in 1836 by Andrew Jackson. Taney handed down the famous Dred Scott decision.

GROVER CLEVELAND APPOINTED the second Catholic, Edward Douglas White of Louisiana, in 1894. White was named chief justice in 1910 by William Howard Taft. When White died, he was succeeded as chief justice by Taft, himself, in 1921.

The third Catholic to be named to the high court was Joseph McKenna of California in 1898. William McKinley picked him from his Cabinet, where he was serving as attorney general.

The fourth of his faith to be selected for this high honor was Pierce Butler, who was chosen in 1923 by President Warren G. Harding. When Butler died, President Franklin D. Roosevelt chose Murphy to succeed him.

Upon Murphy's death in 1949, the Court was without Catholic representation for the first time in 55 years. The Jewish faith represented on the court by Felix Frankfurter.

THE PRESIDENT has a large number of federal jurists from whom to select a Catholic, if he so desires. Some of them are now at hand.

Serving in the nation's capital are five jurists of the Catholic faith. They include Charles Fahey and John A. Danaher of the U. S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia, and Matthew McGuire, Edward Tamm and Edward Curran, all federal district judges.

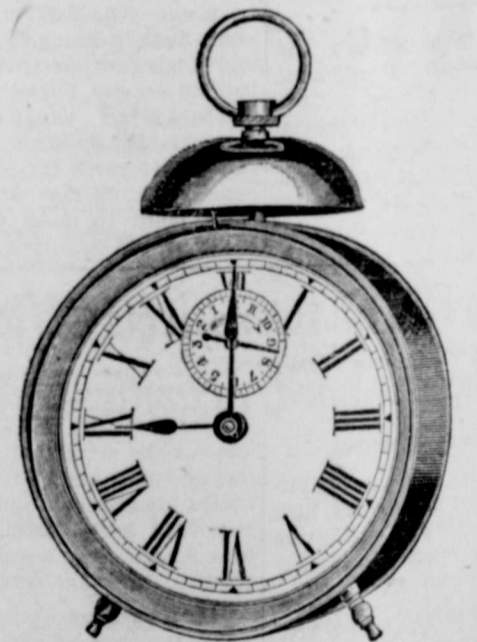
Fahey, a Democrat, is a former United States solicitor general who from 1941 to 1945 represented the Justice department many times before the Supreme Court. Danaher is a former United States senator from Connecticut who was prominent for many years in the Republican party.

Other Catholic jurists from whom the President could make a selection include Edmund Warren Flynn, chief justice of the Rhode Island supreme court; George Sweeney, chief justice of the U. S. district court in Massachusetts; and Judge Joseph Smith of the U. S. district court in Connecticut.

Ike Can't Make It Rain, But He's Still Best Man

The other day I asked a farmer if it was dry out his way. He said it sure was. "Looks like we just can't get any rain," he said. "Why, when Noah had his 40-day flood, we didn't get over half an inch."

There's no mistake about it, Texas is having itself a real drought. Some of the farmers and ranchers in our county are in such bad shape that they may vote for Stevenson.

Old Man Jones, from across the river, said he wasn't going to go to any such extreme. He said he needed rain as bad as anybody else. He claimed water was so scarce in his community that the preacher was baptizing new members with a wet handkerchief. But he was holding out awhile longer, anyway.

"I may be stubborn," said Old Man Jones, "but I just ain't been convinced that President Eisenhower is keeping it from raining."

He said he knew that Stevenson and Kefauver acted like they thought so, and they had a right to their opinion. Lyndon Johnson, he figured, knew better, but he was sticking with Adlai and Estes for the sake of unity. He said he didn't figure Mr. Sam Rayburn had known whether it was raining or not for the last 25 years.

"I hate not to go along with such a widely known crowd of weather observers," Old Man Jones said. "If there's anybody

who keeps up with which way the wind is blowing, generally speaking, it's Stevenson, Kefauver and Johnson."

Then he went on to say that he realized the national farm program hadn't pleased everybody—including him. If he was in the White House, he would do things different, at least in our county. He allowed that the \$61,000,000 spent by the Eisenhower administration for drought relief in Texas could have been doubled and still not made all the farmers happy and prosperous.

"But," said Old Man Jones, "I keep remembering that the main reason for our troubles, besides the drought, is the fact that we are not at war. Now, if Adlai and Estes really want to jump on President Eisenhower, there is a real issue. They've sure got the goods on Ike in that respect. If he hadn't stopped that Korean War, farm prices would be higher, no doubt. I wonder why they never mention that."

Old Man Jones was kidding a little, of course, in his usual way, but I think he had something there. We have got to adjust to peace-time, which is taking awhile but President Eisenhower is working at it. And meanwhile our boys aren't fighting and dying on foreign soil. It's worth thinking about.

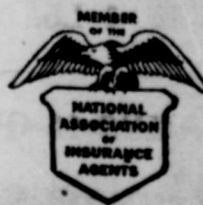

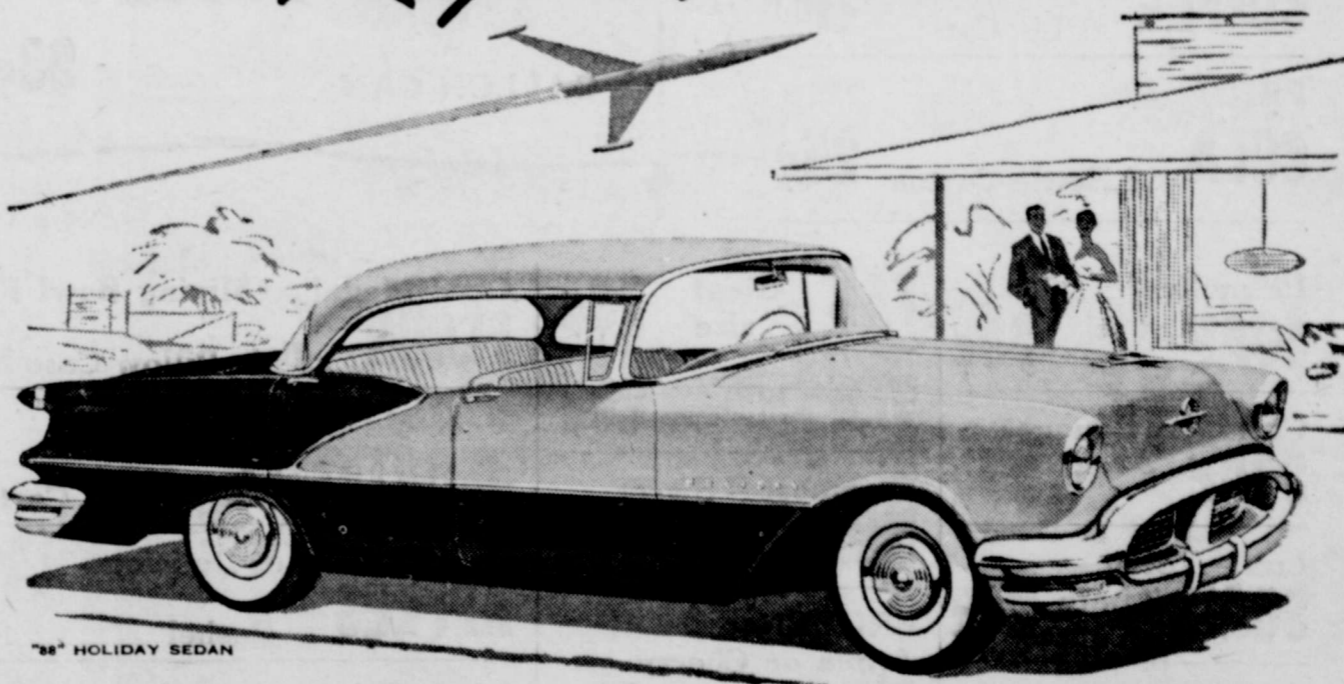

SUMMER CLOTHES

Store cottons and linens unironed. Make certain all starch is removed. It can cause fabrics to deteriorate and may attract silverfish.

Fairman for the guidance of mailers:

Time:—The importance of mailing Christmas parcels during the designated period—cannot be stressed too strongly—the earlier the better. No assurance can be given that surface parcels mailed after Nov. 15, or air parcels mailed after Dec. 1, can be delivered in time for Christmas, for in addition to the heavy volume of Christmas mail, it is necessary that medical and military supplies be given the highest priority on the available overseas airlift. Also after an airmail parcel arrives overseas, final delivery, in many cases, must be made through the use of such surface transportation facilities as are offered by shipping, railroads and motor vehicles. Parcels for delivery in Japan and Korea and the islands of the Pacific should be mailed not later than Nov. 1, in view of the distance involved.

Size and Weight: Air postal is limited to 30 inches, length and girth combined, and to two pounds in weight. Check at the post office for maximum size and weight limits for ordinary parcels to APO's.

Addressing:—Hand print addresses directly on the wrapper rather than on labels pasted to the parcel as labels frequently fall off when subjected to moisture. A slip of paper containing the names of the addressee and the sender and a list of the articles in the parcel should always be enclosed in each parcel. A letter also may be enclosed in the parcel provided the postage for the letter is paid on the outside of the

box and the box endorsed, "Letter Inside—Postage Paid."

Containers:—Use heavy double faced corrugated cardboard, metal, wood, or solid fiberboard, with plenty of cushioning material. Unless tightly packed and completely filled, boxes are likely to be crushed. Boxes should be securely tied before and after wrapping with heavy brown paper. Ask at the post office about customs declarations, registry and insurance fees.

Greeting Cards:—These cards to armed forces overseas may be mailed at any time, but should be deposited before Nov. 15, if they are mailed with first class postage, and those with airmail postage should be mailed not later than Dec. 1, if they are to be delivered by Christmas.

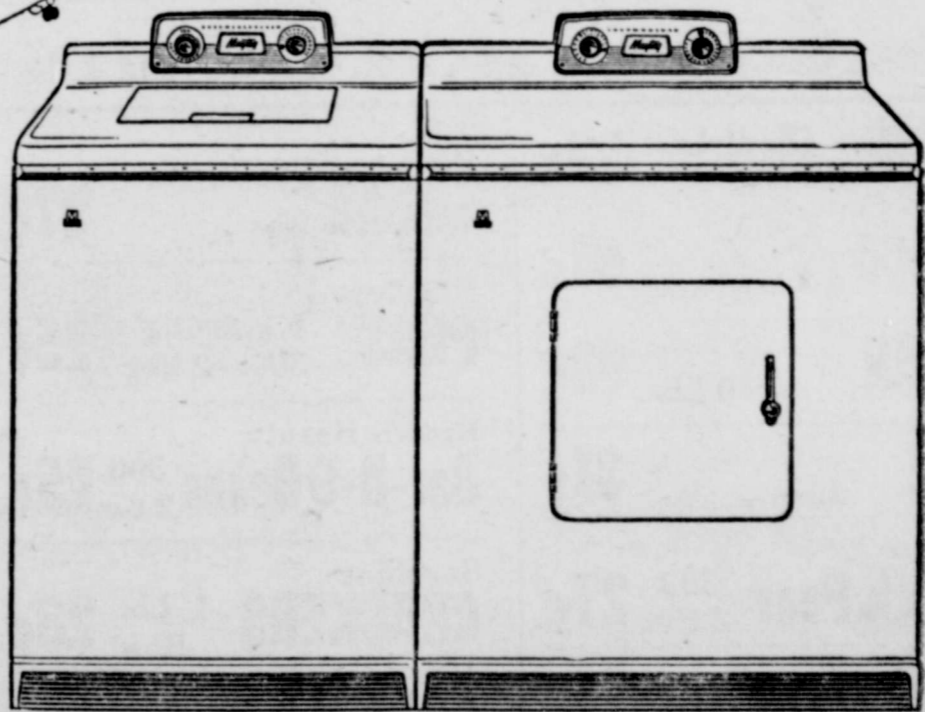

THE BUSINESS OF NOT RAISING HOGS

Is history repeating itself again? A certain "famous" letter is back in circulation

again which would indicate we are completing another agricultural cycle.

Back when Henry Wallace was Secretary of Agriculture, one Ramon Ortiz de la Munoz inquired about the possibility of "not raising hogs." The letter appeared again recently in the Gorman Progress in Eastland County and, in these days of soil bank when it is profitable not to raise wheat and cotton, it has a very timely note. Here is the letter:

Amigo Mior: My amigo, Pedro in Brazoria County received a check for \$1,000 from the government this year for not raising hogs. So I am going into the "not raising hog business" next year.

What I want to know is, in your opinion, what is the best kind of farm not to raise hogs on and the best kind of hogs not to raise? I would prefer not to raise razor-backs, but, if that is not a good breed not to raise, I will just as gladly not raise any Berkshires, Durocs or Poland China.

The hardest work in this business is going to be in keeping an inventory on how many hogs I haven't raised.

My Amigo Pedro is very joyful about the future of this business. He has been raising hogs for more than 20 years and the best he ever made was \$400 back in 1918, until this year, when he got a thousand dollars for not raising hogs.

If I can get \$1,000 for not raising 100 hogs, etc. I plan to operate on a small scale at first, holding myself down to about 4,000 hogs, which means I will have \$80,000.

Now, one other thing. These hogs I will not raise will not

eat 1,000,000 bushels of corn. I understand that you also pay farms for not raising corn. So will you pay me anything for not raising corn not to feed the hogs I am not raising?

I want to get started as soon as possible as this seems to be a good time of the year for not raising hogs.

Yours truly, Ramon Ortiz de la Munoz P.S. Can I raise 10 or 12 hogs on the side while I am in the business of not raising hogs? Just enough to get a few sides of bacon to eat?

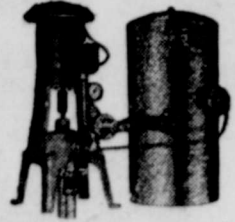

The National Home Demonstration Convention was held in Hotel Gunter in San Antonio September 23 to 26, with delegates from 39 states, Hawaii and Puerto Rico attending.

Reports were given by the Southern States first and all the states reported that Home Demonstration work was proving helpful, especially to farm women.

Thomas B. Stanley, governor of Virginia, extended an invitation to all to attend the 350th anniversary of the founding of Jamestown.

A very interesting report was given by a Spaniard from Puerto Rico. She said, "deaths in farm families were greatly reduced, a county-wide safety program

was established, improved standards of living were noticeable, they help with Red Cross, health, education and 4-H work."

Governor Shivers spoke encouragingly to Club members Tuesday morning. He cited school building, hospital expansion, road construction figures of the last 10 years to point up Texas progress. He said "the number of class rooms in Texas increased from 35,000 to 65,000; hospital beds from 14,000 to 40,000. Last fiscal year saw \$196,000,000 spent on Texas as compared to \$38,000,000 spent 10 years ago."

Highlights of the National Convention Day Wednesday was an address by Congressman Omar Bureson of Anson. He urged delegates to the National Home Demonstration Convention to take an active interest in global affairs because "rural homemakers across the country are such a big part of America." Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby, former secretary of Health, Education and Welfare with President Eisenhower's cabinet, spoke Wednesday night at the closing banquet.

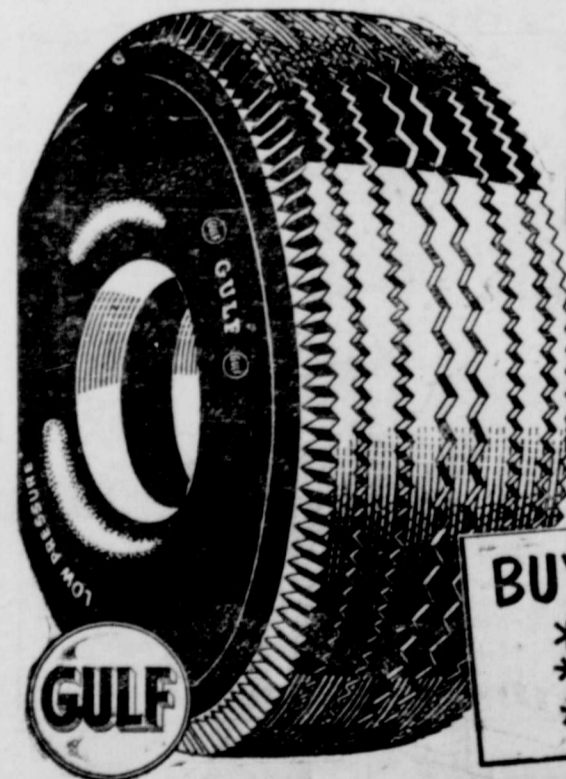
