Homecoming Game Is Friday Night

Eagles Lose To Cross Plains 18-14; Play Host To Mason Cowpunchers Next

The Goldthwaite Eagles journeyed to Cross Plains last Friday night to play their second conference game of the season against the Cross Plains Buffaloes. The Eagles lost by a score of 18-14.

Co-captains for the game were Connie Todd and Johnny Vaughan for the Eagles, and Clark Baum, Jim McDonald, and David Jennings for the Buffaloes.

The Buffaloes received the ball. They fumbled on their first play but recovered and then fumbled again and the Eagles took over. Johnny Vaughan picked up about seven and then Kirby booted the ball down to about the 32. The Buffaloes fumbled and the Eagles recovered on the 32. Then the Eagles fumbled and the Buffaloes recovered. Late in the first quarter, Harold Gary made a 25 or 30 yard run to make the Buffaloes first TD. They missed the extra point. The Buffaloes kicked off to the Eagles and Johnny Vaughan made a 50 yard run on the kick-off. Each team made two first downs in the first period.

The Eagles fought their way down to the one yard line and Timon Kirby carried the ball over the goal line for the Eagles first TD. Kirby kicked the extra point for a score of 7-6 in the Eagles favor. The Eagles kicked-off to Cross Plains and they were stopped on the 25 yard line. The Buffaloes made about five yards and were forced to kick. The ball went out of bounds on the 30 yard line. Kirby picked up about three and a pass was completed to Kight for 10 yards and then Kirby kicked the ball down the field where the Buffaloes were stopped on the 10 yard line. The Buffaloes made about nine yards and fumbled the ball but they recovered, and kicked the ball down to the Eagles 38. Johnny Vaughan made about 28 yards before the half. The score at half time was 7-6 in the Eagles favor. The Eagles made five first downs and the Buffaloes made none in the second period.

In the last half the Eagles received with Vaughan taking the ball and making his way up to the 36 yard line. A pass was completed to Kight for about 11 yards. Vaughan picked up six and another pass was completed to Jerry Kight for about 16 or 17 yards. Todd and Vaughan each picked up about four yards to bring the Eagles down to the nine yard line. Connie Todd sailed across the goal line for the Eagles second TD. Timon Kirby kicked the extra point, making the score 14-6 in the Eagles favor. The Eagles kicked-off to the Buffaloes and they were stopped on the 33. The Buffaloes fumbled and the Eagles recovered on the 33. The Eagles picked up about seven yards and the ball went over to the Buffaloes on the 26 yard line. The ball went back over to the Eagles on the 27. The Eagles had to kick on the fourth down. With the Buffaloes on about the 50 yard line, Darvel Hutchins made a 15 yard run, ending the third quarter. Each team made four first downs in the third period.

The Buffaloe worked their way down to the nine yard line and Clark Baum carried the ball over for a TD. They missed the extra point. The Buffaloes kicked-off but the Eagles had to kick on the fourth down. Pat Moore took the ball and ran all the way to the 20 on the kick. The Buffaloes fumbled and Connie Todd recovered. Then Vaughan fumbled and Cross Plains recovered. The ball went over to the Eagles on the 10. Kirby kicked on the fourth down and the Buffaloes were stopped on the 40. A pass was completed to Harold Gary and he made the Buffaloes final TD. Try for extra point was no good. The Buffaloes kicked-off and the Eagles were stopped on the 45. Vaughan picked up eight yards. Timon Kirby made a 25 yard run only to be called back by the referees. On the final play of the game Johnny Vaughan made 10 yards. The Buffaloes made four first downs to the Eagles one in the final period. The game ended with the score of 18-14 in favor of the Cross Plains Buffaloes.

Two steers from Mills County placed in the Junior Steer Show at the Texas State Fair in Dallas, Wednesday of last week according to an announcement received here.

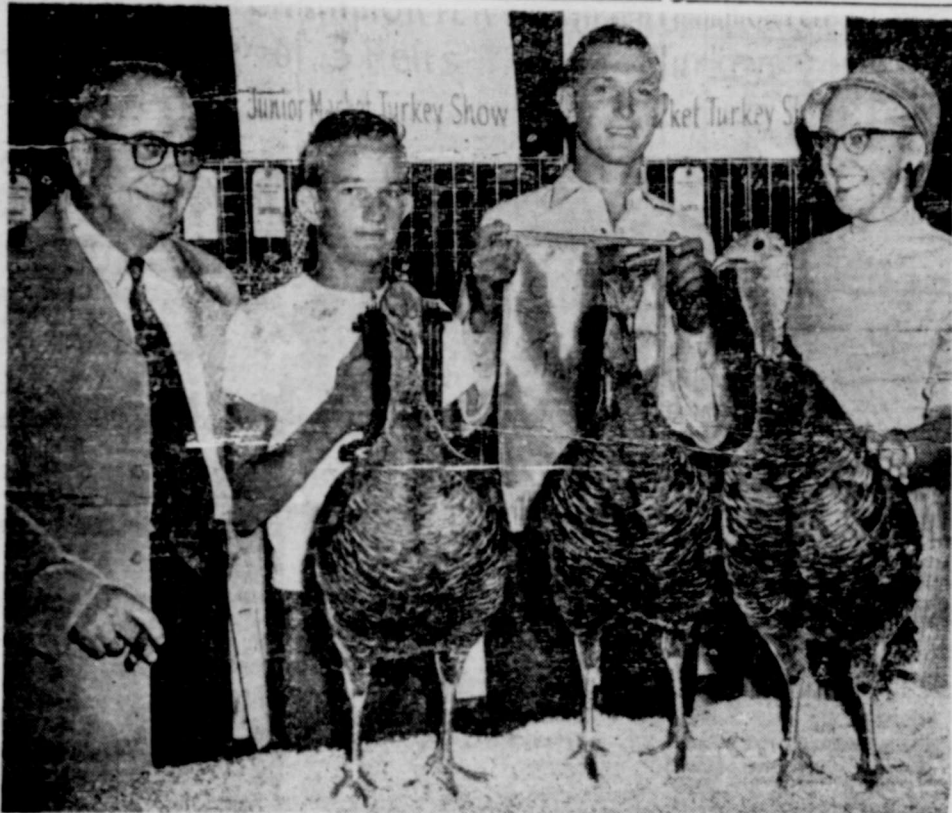

Fifteen Santa Fe Freight Cars Are Derailed South Of Goldthwaite

Fifteen cars from an extra Santa Fe Railway freight train on their way from Brownwood to Temple were derailed Sunday night at 9:17 o'clock between Goldthwaite and Lometa.

Five of the derailed cars were loaded with various types of fuel oil. One car ignited and exploded, causing fire to spread over a number of cars. Most of the 71 cars in the freight were loaded with Milo, potash, silica sand and salt.

No one was injured in the accident which Trainmaster L. Cenno, Temple, said apparently was caused when a draw bar came down, causing the derailment.

Ten of the 15 cars were seriously derailed while five were partially off the track. The main line was closed to through rail traffic from the time of the accident Sunday night until late Monday afternoon.

Salvage and repair crews from Brownwood and Temple were on the scene shortly after the accident and continued their work of clearing the roadbed and laying new tracks until the road was reopened for through traffic about 5:00 p.m. Monday.

Fire departments from Goldthwaite and Killeen reported to the scene of the accident. Members of the Goldthwaite fire department put out a brush fire along the railroad right-of-way Sunday night. The Killeen firemen worked with railroad crews Monday in extinguishing the blazing cars and tankers.

VA Credit Services Expanded Under Recent Changes In Laws

Recent changes in the laws governing Farmers Home Administration will enable the agency to serve the credit needs of a larger number of farm families, Walter T. McKay, State director, said today.

The expanded credit services cover the worst drought in the history, McKay stated. The new law provides broader authority to assist family-type farmers with loans to improve their farms. It authorizes, as a part of the Rural Development program, loans for operating and developing farms where the farmer has part-time employment off the farm. Included in the broader authority are loans for refinancing existing debts and an increase in the maximum amount that can be advanced for operating loans.

County office staffs of the agency have been brought up to date on these changes at meetings held throughout the state, and are now operating under the new authorities and policies.

Types of loans which can now be made include:

1. Operating loans to full-time farmers. Initial operating loans may be made in amounts up to \$10,000 to one borrower, with subsequent loans authorized as needed so long as the total amount of indebtedness does not exceed \$20,000. Operating loans are used for the purchase of equipment, livestock, or to refinance debts owed on equipment and livestock, and for fertilizer, seed and other farm and home operating expenses needed to carry out efficient farming operations on family-type farms. Interest is at the rate of five percent, and these loans are repayable over periods up to seven years. The new law increased from \$7,000 to \$10,000 the amount of the initial loan; from \$10,000 to \$20,000 the limitation on the indebtedness.

2. Farm ownership loans. These loans are made for the purchase, enlargement, or development of family-type farms, and to refinance existing debts for farmers who have adequate real estate security but who are unable to meet present credit obligations and need credit on more favorable terms. Payments are scheduled according to the ability of the borrower to repay, up to 40 years. Insured loans are made from funds provided by private lenders. The loans bear 3½ percent interest, plus a one percent insurance charge. In the past, the agency has only refinanced existing real estate debts, and only then when the refinancing was incidental to the making of a real estate loan for purchase or improvement of family-type farms.

3. Farm Housing Loans. These are made for the construction and repair of farm houses and other farm buildings, including farmstead water supplies. Interest is four percent on the outstanding principal, and repayments may be scheduled over periods up to 33 years, with the loan secured by a deed of trust on the borrower's farm. This loan program was reactivated in May of this year.

4. Soil and Water Conservation loans. Made to carry out measures for soil conservation, water development, conservation and use, and farm drainage. Individuals can borrow up to \$25,000 for these purposes. Interest and insurance charges are 4½ percent with repayments scheduled according to the borrower's ability to pay, up to 20 years.

5. Loans to part-time farmers. These are designed to help farmers in areas designated for the Rural Development program, who are unable to obtain enough land resources to develop full-time farms. Loans may be made for operating and developing less than family-type farms, if

the applicants are established bona-fide farmers who have historically resided on farms and depend on farm income for their livelihood, and who are conducting substantial farming operations and spending a major portion of their time farming. Such operators must have dependable sources of outside income. When such loans are made for operating expense, they bear interest at five percent and are repayable over periods up to seven years. Loans for real estate development bear interest of 4½ percent and are repayable over periods of up to 40 years.

6. Special Livestock loans. Initial loans of this type will be available until July 14, 1957, and loans to indebted borrowers can be made until July 14, 1959. Such loans are made to help established producers of cattle, sheep and goats maintain their normal operations. Loans are made for replacement livestock and for purchase and production of feed and for other operating expense. Interest is five percent and loans are repayable in one to three years. They are not made to pay existing debts.

7. Emergency loans. These are made to enable farmers to continue normal operations but not to refinance existing indebtedness. They bear interest at the rate of three percent. Emergency loans for crop production are due when the crop is harvested.

Eligibility for all types of loan assistance available is determined by a three-man county Farmers Home Administration Committee.

Farmers Home Administration credit supplements but does not replace other sources of credit.

Loans are made only when the applicant is unable to obtain credit from private or cooperative sources of credit. While Farmers Home Administration requires less security than is usually required by other lenders, no loan is made unless it appears that the loan can be repaid.

Veterans To Get Insurance Dividend

The first dividend in 25 years will be paid in 1957 to policyholders of 5-year term US Government Life Insurance, Dr. George T. McMahan, Manager of the Veterans Administration Center in Waco, said today.

He also revealed a \$25,000,000 increase in the regular annual 1957 dividend for some 5,009,000 policyholders of National Service Life Insurance (World War II). About \$210,000,000—a 13 percent increase over 1956—will be distributed.

The disbursement to holders of World War I insurance, both term and permanent plan policies, will amount to \$26,000,000.

Term policyholders have not shared in a dividend since 1932. A better trend in mortality and disability experience allowed payments this year.

Dr. McMahan stressed that both the World War I and World War II insurance dividends are regular annual dividends, not special dividends. He said payments will be made during 1957 on or about the anniversary date of each policy, beginning in January and ending in December 1957.

The VA manager requested policyholders not to inquire in advance about their dividend payments so as not to delay the

processing time. The only GI insurance policyholders who will not share in the 1957 dividends are those who have the nonparticipating

post-Korea NSLI term and permanent plans. The law under which these policies are issued prohibits the payment of dividends.

RECIPES... HOUSEHOLD HELPS

Breakfast and supper are important for good nutrition of the school child, so is an early lunch. This midday meal would be a substantial one if it included approximately one-third of the food needs for a day. Cafeterias carefully balance nutritious meals. Careful planning for those who take their lunch

is necessary if the lunches include a balanced share of the nutrients so important to the strong, robust growth.

Supplementing cold lunches with a hot dish is a good idea, especially in cold weather. A lunch taken from home may have a hot dish added from the cafeteria or hot soup, or hot chocolate can be taken in a small thermos.

The noon meal of the school child should be considered with the other two meals of the day. Necessary nutrients for a day's balanced diet can then be provided with each meal contributing a significant part.

For lunches that go to school, keep up the interest and appetite of the child by packing a variety of foods. Try sandwich fillings on different kinds of sliced bread, on buns, on hot dog rolls and on nut breads. First and second graders are much impressed by sandwiches cut in different shapes. Use a cookie cutter to make rabbits, chickens, hearts and others.

Avoid the morning rush of sandwich making by fixing and freezing a week's supply of sandwiches at a time. Whisk a frozen sandwich into a lunch box at breakfast time and it will be thawed by noontime.

Motorists Should Heed State Law With Respect To School Buses

Texas school superintendents, news editors, and other citizens have been requested to give state-wide emphasis and interpretation to the oft-neglected Texas law which requires all vehicles to stop when approaching a school bus loading or unloading children. Three state agencies—The Texas Education Agency, the Texas Highway Department, and the Texas Department of Public Safety—joined in making the appeal.

Texas school buses were involved in 379 accidents in rural areas (outside city limits) during 1955. Three children and two adults were killed in these accidents.

"Even one preventable accident, as we all know, is one too many," said J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education. "A study of the various replies which have been made to the question of what drivers of other vehicles should do when they approach a school bus which is

loading or unloading children reveals a startling lack of understanding and a great deal of misunderstanding what the statutes require."

The law says, in effect, that upon meeting or overtaking from either direction a school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging children, the driver shall stop immediately before passing, then proceed with due caution at a speed which is prudent and does not exceed 10 miles per hour. The law does not apply within city limits.

Vehicles are not required to stop on highways with separate roadways when the bus is on a different roadway from that of a passing vehicle. Vehicles are not required to stop if the
