Red Cross Makes Urgent Appeal For Emergency Hungarian Relief Aid

Mills County Red Cross Chapter has been assigned a quota of \$135.00 in the nationwide drive for \$5,000,000, which will provide food, clothing, medicine, and other essential supplies for emergency relief in Hungary and for Hungarian refugees in Austria.

School Children Gather Clothing Through This Week

The Yule tide season got into full swing here last Monday when the city utilities force began stringing Christmas lights around the courthouse and streets. The colorful lights at each intersection and all around the square gives everyone the impression that Christmas is a wonderful time for old and young alike, and that Santa will soon be here.

Cotton And Peanut Growers To Vote On Quotas Tues.

Tuesday, December 11th, is the day set by the Secretary of Agriculture for holding the Cotton and peanut referendum. Cotton growers will vote to decide whether or not they are to operate under quotas for the next year. Peanut growers will vote to decide whether or not they will operate under quotas for the next three years.

If quotas carry the price of cotton and peanuts will be supported between 75 and 90 percent of parity and there will be a tax on all excess cotton and peanuts. If quotas fail the price support will be 50% of parity to compellers and no tax will be required on excess acreages.

Cotton voters in the immediate Priddy Community will vote at the box in Priddy. All other cotton growers and peanut growers will vote at the courthouse in Goldthwaite. Regardless of how you vote—Please vote.

TEXAS CATTLEMEN'S PHILOSOPHY IS FREE ENTERPRISE AT WORK

Faith in what we are doing and confidence in our ability to do it are two prime requisites for success in any endeavor or enterprise, whether undertaken individually or as a group.

Long hailed as strong believers in this positive philosophy—expressed in the story of the little freight locomotive pulling up a long grade, panting, "I know I can, I know I can,"—are the rugged, hard-working individualists who make up the Texas cattle industry.

Several years ago, the cattlemen, concerned over beef surpluses, nettled by talk of price supports and subsidies and angered by proposed federal buying programs, gathered together and decided to tackle their problems in the good American free-enterprise way. The cow men decided they didn't believe there was over-production of beef—just under-consumption. Banding together under the banner of the Texas Beef Council, the industry set out to persuade Texans to eat more beef.

Pausing this week to observe "Beef Week in Texas"—the third such state-wide event to be proclaimed by the Governor—cattlemen are pointing to a recent survey of meat retailers strongly indicating Texans tend to agree with the Council's widely-circulated slogan, "Texans Eat Beef EVERY Day." Over 700 stores contacted report Texans are purchasing 16 per cent more beef this year than last, when we ate 17% more than in 1954.

Equally important is a second survey which points out that overall meat production during the next few months will just about equal demand. This is good news for everybody. It means the consumer gets a price break and the cow folk are building a stable, year-round market for their product.

It's been a good beef year in Texas.

BACK THE ATTACK ON TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS

From coast to coast America is rallying forces against one of its greatest enemies—traffic accidents.

The tragic rise in the death toll this year has made 1956 the darkest year in traffic accident history.

In an all-out effort to halt the mounting toll of dead and injured, the National Safety Council is launching a nationwide campaign called "Back the Attack on Traffic Accidents," which will continue through 1957.

The title for the new campaign symbolizes its purpose—to unite public officials and private citizens in an all-out fight against highway disaster.

Public officials are asked to back the attack by stepping up traffic law enforcement. Private citizens are asked to back the attack by setting a better personal example in their own traffic behavior, and by demanding, supporting and accepting more rigorous traffic law enforcement.

Since December is the most dangerous month of the year in traffic, the special hazards of the holiday season will be emphasized in the first month of the new campaign. These are speed, drinking, night driving and the risk to pedestrians.

We can't build an expressway to traffic safety—but we can keep our highways from becoming human "toll" roads if public officials and citizens will unite and "Back the Attack."

Post Office Staff Asks Cooperation With Holiday Mail

Postmaster Lucile Fairman said today that while the Post Office still has a tremendous job ahead of it, efforts are being redoubled to deliver all mail on time and in good condition by Christmas Eve. She points out that by taking a little extra care with your mailings now, you'll avoid disappointing friends and loved ones at Christmas time.

She asks for your special cooperation to be sure that your return address and the recipient's address are plainly typed or written on all labels and Christmas cards. Use zone numbers and it's a good idea to include an extra label INSIDE your packages. Parcel Post size and weight limits vary according to destination. Ask about them when you go to the Post Office to buy stamps.

Speaking of stamps, the Postmaster said, "Use three cent postage on all your Christmas cards. This way they will be delivered promptly, and forwarded or returned, if necessary, providing you include your name and address on your Christmas card envelopes." The First-Class postage on your Christmas cards enables you to include written messages, thus making your Christmas Greetings more personal. By including your name and address on your Christmas cards, both you and your friends can keep your mailing lists up-to-date.

The Postmaster urges that you mail all of your out-of-town cards and packages immediately. Certainly not later than December 10. Christmas mail for local addresses should be started on its way at least a week before Christmas.

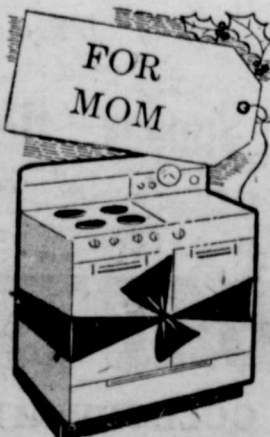

Grandson of John Philen Is Honored As Correspondent Covering Olympics

Vic Holchak, son of Noma Philen Holchak, Los Angeles, California, formerly of Goldthwaite and grandson of the late John Philen of Caradan and Goldthwaite, was recently named by a committee of the Scholastic Sports Association Advisory Council to cover the 1956 Olympic Games at Melbourne, Australia, for the Los Angeles Examiner prep sports section and International News Service. He has been a member of the Scholastic Sports Association for over a year and will

give the teen-age viewpoint in exclusive stories for the Examiner's Scholastic Sports Association and International News Service.

The youth was awarded the all expense paid trip after competition with an original field of 200 eligible candidates. Competition was based on scholarship, performance in the SSA program, personality, character, and writing ability as demonstrated in two special stories. The competition and trip are the first of its kind in journalism history, and he is the youngest accredited correspondent in the world's history of journalism.

Each candidate was first required to write a newspaper style story on "How the United States will win the Olympic track and field championship". As their final writing assignment they covered the Whittier-Occidental football game at Whittier College.

Since his selection for the trip the 16-year-old junior high student has become a much hon-

ored lad. He received citations from the Los Angeles City Council, the Board of Education and the County Board of Supervisors. He was also given \$100 for "pocket money" by his sponsor and a surprise party by his classmates and presented a stop watch by Washington High coach.

At present, he is the Scholastic Sports Association's City football editor, and last June represented the SSA at the American Legion - sponsored "Boys State" in Sacramento. He is reported a first rate writer and intends to continue in the sports writing field as a career.

Census Bureau Conducts National Housing Survey

The National Housing Inventory, authorized by the Congress to provide the first measurement of the Nation's housing since the 1950 Census, has begun locally according to Regional Supervisor James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's field office at Dallas Texas, which will participate in the survey.

The survey, to be carried out on a sample basis, will furnish information on the number and characteristics of dwelling units and the gains and losses resulting from new construction, conversions and demolitions since 1950.

The survey will show size and age of houses, rents paid, value of homes, conditions of houses, vacancies, plumbing facilities and characteristics of families living in the houses covered in the survey. Information will be gathered also on outstanding mortgage debt, interest rates, use of conventional and government-insured mortgages, second mortgages and monthly payments, if amortized.

Statistics collected in the National Housing Inventory will be used by government home builders, mortgage lenders and realtors to study trends in housing construction. Preliminary figures will be available during the summer of 1957 with final reports scheduled for publication in the fall. Information will be provided for the Nation as a whole, for urban and rural territory and for nine large metropolitan areas.

Supervisor Stroud pointed out that all information furnished to the Census Bureau is kept confidential by law and only statistical totals and averages are published. National Housing Inventory information is being collected locally by Mrs. Nella P. Casbeer, Lampasas, Texas.

EAT HEARTY AND "STARVE"

Three "heartly meals a day" is no guarantee of good health. It is "what you eat" and not "how much" that counts.

Strangely enough, in the richest agricultural nation on earth, an alarming percentage of the population is deficient in consumption of vital nutrients such as calcium and vitamin C. Even over weight people who eat high-calorie foods rarely get a real balanced diet.

The current popularity of high-calorie foods only tends to make some people fat, according to recent diet studies. A danger point is approached when these rich but unbalanced eating habits prevent a person from getting enough protective foods necessary for good health.

It is generally accepted that people should maintain in later years the weight that was ideal for their height and bone structure at age 25. Yet, regional studies show that a large number of older people are seriously overweight. The problem today is to encourage people with low energy requirements to plan diets that eliminate surplus calories but do not curtail essential nutrients.

For example, the National Research Council recommends a daily intake of 8 grams of calcium as necessary for good health. Yet, only about one person in six takes that much cal-

cium daily—and calcium is abundant in eggs, milk and in cheese.

It is well established that vitamin C is important in maintaining healthy teeth and gums. Most people are 10 percent below normal in Vitamin C intake except in areas where citrus fruits are plentiful.

Texas is a big producer of citrus fruits. The diet study seems to suggest that foods rich in vitamin C should be promoted and made more attractive to adults, and that frozen and dried citrus concentrates and other dependable year-round sources deserve more attention.

Greater calcium consumption should be encouraged through increased public education on the value of milk and milk products, and perhaps also through development of new calcium-rich foods. Overeating of the wrong foods may make a person fat, but he still may be starving for the essential nutrients.

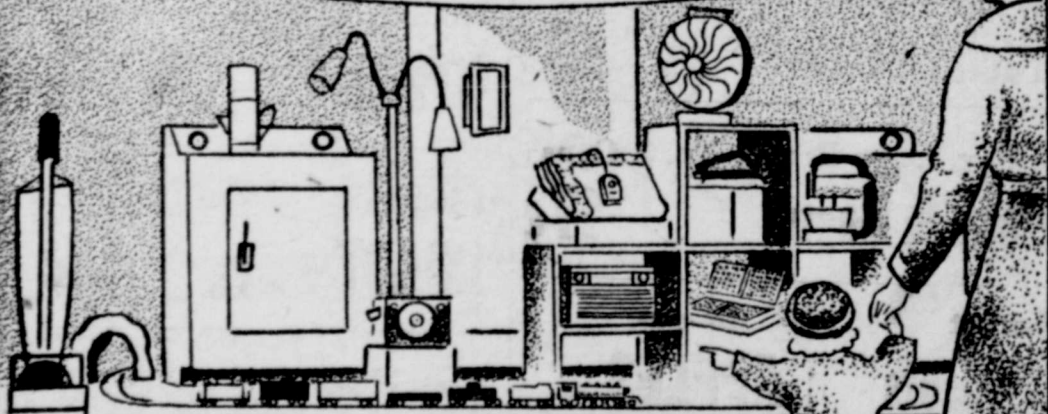

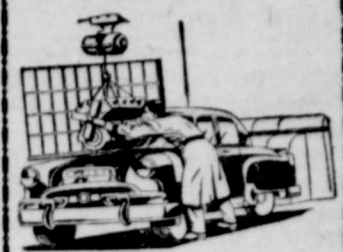

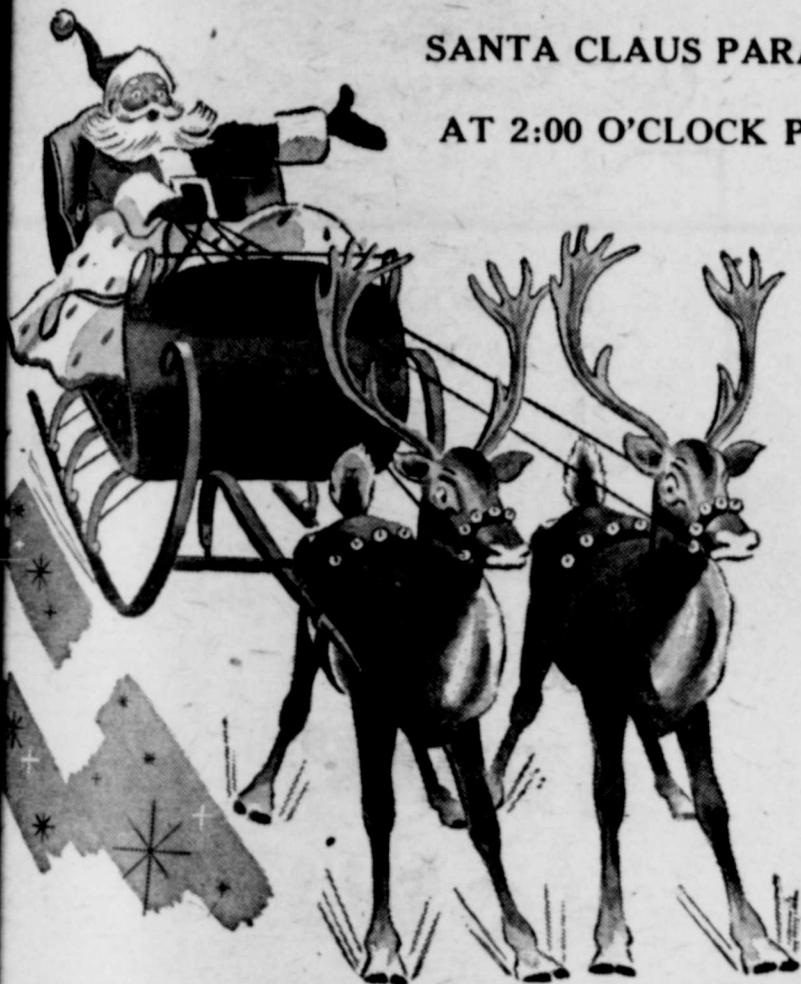
