During the past month newsprint mills in Canada and the United States announced another price increase on print paper, used to print newspapers, effective as of March 1. One of the major companies made the initial announcement and before long all the other mills came along and joined in the move.

The \$4.00 per ton increase, F. O. B. New York, means a lot of money in increased expenses to the U. S. Papers. There have been a number of statements issued by metropolitan papers with respect to what it means to their cost picture and what they will have to do to over come the increased cost of operation.

Some large and small papers have announced increases in their subscription and advertising rates as a result of the print price increase. Others foresaw the increase several months ago and started to make plans to protect their operations by adjusting their prices to help offset the additional cost

While we hear a lot about what it means to the large papers little has been said about what it means to the little papers such as ours-the little country papers scattered all over the United States.

The little papers are also effected. It would be nice if it were not so but when paper prices go up it effects the little users as much in proportion as the big ones.

We have received notice from our suppliers that the price of newsprint is going up effective March 1. The only difference with our case, and that of many other small users, is that by the time the print is delivered to us the price increase will add up to practically double the \$4.00 per ton F.O.B. New York.

In the face of this situation the small country papers will also be faced with the problem of adjusting their rate structure in order to continue operating on the profit side of the ledger and continue to serve their respective com-







> Cooperators of the District pect to receive a number of benefits from this crop. A sixty acre Johnson grass field on the T. C .Graves ranch near Mt. Olive was planted to Madrid sweetclover in the fall. One hundred and fifty pounds of 0plied. In the summer, two thousand bales of Johnson grass-Madrid sweetclover hay was harvested from the sixty acres. The field averaged thirty three and one-half bales per acre.

During the summer when most cooperators want to defer a pasture, a field of sweetclover will furnish a large amount of temporary grazing. David Watters of Pleasant Grove, supervisor of the district, planted ten vember. This was fertilized with 100 pounds of 0-20-0 per acre In June the oats were combined and the clover was grazed with twenty-two head of goats for a period of sixty-one days. twenty-eight head of lambs for another thirty days. The ten acre clover field furnished a total of thirty-six animal months of grazing or 3.6 animal months of grazing per acre.

An increase in yield of crops following sweetclover can also be expected. C. G. Partin, near Priddy, was surprised at his cotton yield following clover. Cotton following two years of sweetclover produced a bale per acre. A field adjoining Mr. Partin's farm produced only onehalf bale per acre which also was the community average. Mr. Partin felt that his yield was doubled simply because of the two years of clover that had preceded the cotton.

In addition to the above benefits, fields planted to sweetclover are conditioned to take rainfall. Tests on the Roy Weidner farm in the Washboard community showed that soil planted to sweetclover increased in the infiltration rate as much as 4.05 inches per hour. The water intake on that portion of a field not planted to sweetclover was 1.2 inches per hour. That portion that had been in clover for two years recorded 5.25 inches per hour, This additional moisture could mean the difference in producing a crop.





Sam and yourself, says Jim Cheatham of Internal Revenue Service. The tax returns should be accompanied by a check, for any tax due, payable to Internal Revenue Service, 2101 Pacific Avenue, Dallas, Texas.

"The vast bulk of this area's taxpayers will find no difficulty in making out their own returns," Cheatham said. "But for those who have difficulty, our office stands ready to give help or advice."

"To obtain aid and avoid the last minute crowds, call or come in now while our personnel are better able to assist you.

"It's true that the filing deadline is April 15, but little or nothing is gained by waiting until the last minute to pay up. Taking care of your payments now will help your government to carry on its important defense and construction programs and many other activities, and will let you plan your budget for the rest of the year with assurance.

The Internal Revenue Service representative stressed that, his place. careful reading of the instructions, accompanying the forms recently mailed out, will enable most taxpayers to prepare their own returns, often in less than an hour.

In several instances, at least, Texans have managed to make tanks of water from mere trickles by proper treatment of nature's forgotten irrigation ditches which run through most everybody's land.

Use of small check dams is nothing new, but seldom have they taken so individual a turn as in the case of J. G. Brunson, Lamar County farmer who subirrigates 50 acres of corn and bottomland alfalfa from an old horse-shoe shaped creek bed on

Brunson created his irrigation supply by damming up the low-er end of the creek so that water stands 10 to 15 feet deep in the old channel, now by-passed by the Red River. The dam raised the water table in nearby bottom lands to within 10 to 12 feet of the surface, creating a natural situation for sub-irriga-

Small dams are also being spot-placed to retard the runoff waters in order to give them a chance to sink into dwindling underground supplies.






