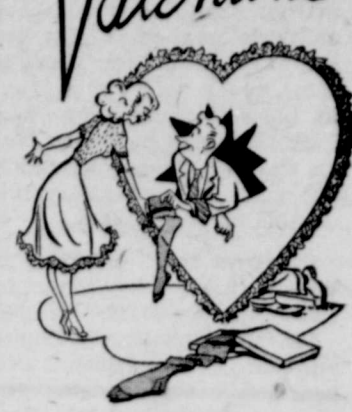

It was a matter of life and death to Albert E. Stine, executive representative of the Associated Press from New York. He had the scales tilted in his favor through the generosity of Santa Fe employes at Fort Madison, Iowa.

In September, 1944, Stine was taken, near death, from the Railway's Chicago-Kansas City train and rushed to Sacred Heart Hospital by A. E. Buckingham, then agent at Fort Madison.

Learning that immediate blood transfusions were needed, Buckingham donated his and quickly called other Santa Fe employes

to do the same. In all, 17 railroaders contributed.

"I'm a newspaperman," Stine said, "but you can see that I have plenty of railroading blood in me."

Stine and L. M. Olson, vice president and general manager at Galveston, recalled the eventful incident while Stine was in Galveston attending the Associated Press Managing Editor's Convention.

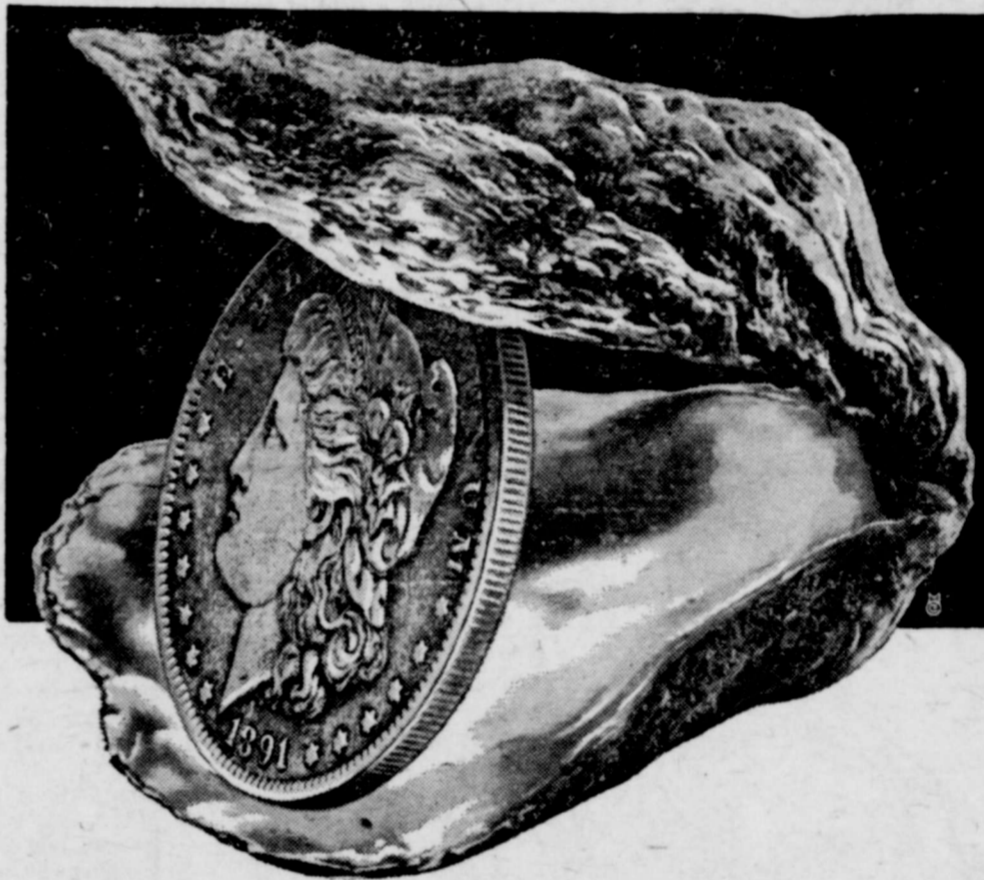

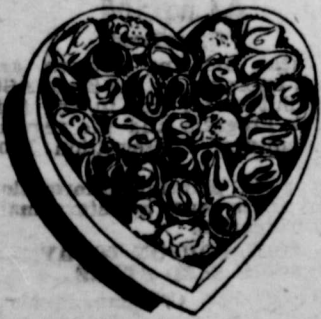

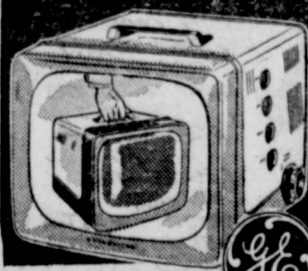

Colburn Ward Wins Science Award; Eligible To Compete For Scholarship

Allen Colburn Ward, son of Mr. and Mrs. Luther Ward, a member of the senior class of Goldthwaite High School, is the 1957 winner of the Bausch & Lomb Honorary Science Award Medal for achieving the highest scholastic record in science subjects with a four year average of 95% it has been announced by James W.
