## City and Senatorial Election Tuesday

### County Voting Strength Estimated At 1500; Poll Tax Payments Lower

Voters of Mills county will join forces with all Texas as they go to the polls next Tuesday to cast their ballots for city officials and also for U. S. Senator, to fill the unexpired term of Governor Price Daniel, in Washington.

Poll tax payments in Mills county are somewhat lower this year as compared to the regular presidential election years. An estimated 1,500 county residents are qualified to cast their ballots in the Tuesday election. This includes 981 who paid their poll tax, seven exemptions that were issued to underage voters who will cast their first ballots this year and an estimated 500 voters who are over age limit which exempts them from securing poll tax receipt.

#### CITY ELECTION

There is no contest in the city election with three aldermen to be elected this year. Two of these are for a regular term of two years and one is for a one year, unexpired term. Candidates for the regular two year term are F. D. Reynolds and Sam A. Edgington. R. L. Steen is the candidate for the one year unexpired term.

City election will be held at the City Hall on Fisher street with polls opening at 8 a. m. and closing at 7 p. m.

#### SENATOR ELECTION

Mills county voters will cast their ballot at their respective polling places throughout the county for their choice of twenty-two candidates in the race for the U. S. Senate seat vacated by Price Daniel.

Voting booths will be open from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m.

### Inspection Deadline

One-third of the total of vehicle owners in Mills county received their 1957 inspection stickers, Col. Harrison, Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety today. He warned the last minute inspection stations at the end of the inspection period April 15.

More than four million vehicle owners in Texas at 2,500,000 have had their trucks and other vehicles inspected, leaving more than 1,000,000 to act within the next three weeks.

# VIC'S . . . . SOLILOQUY



The major stock shows of the state for 1957 are being wrapped up and the boys and girls of Mills county, along with their parents and sponsors, are settling down to start their work for a new year—getting ready for another year.

The boys and girls of this county have done a great job during the past ten years. They have taken their share of the big prizes at nearly all of the major shows, sometimes several years in a row.

About a month ago, just before the Houston Show, the Houston Chronicle carried a special feature on Goldthwaite, in their Rotogravure Magazine which pointed out some interesting facts with respect to stock show honors. The story was written by Pete Gilpin with a number of photos by Bob Saitta. For the benefit of many of our readers we are presenting the story here as follows:

What the New York Yankees, traditionally, are to baseball and Notre Dame is to football—that's tiny Goldthwaite to the stock shows of Texas.

Since this West-Central Texas Town went into the business of producing champions, they've garnered top honors from Houston to Fort Worth, from San Angelo to Waco.

And Houstonians will have a top hand's chance of viewing the town's latest efforts when the 1957 Houston Stock Show starts Wednesday.

Goldthwaite stock raisers are no strangers to the stock show regulars, who have seen them win nine championships here since they went into high-gear beef production in 1947.

The secret for success in stock?

It's really no secret. Just folks like hardwareman Bob Steen and County Agent George Reese, with the rest of Goldthwaite's townfolks behind them, found one of the better ways for keeping their youths occupied. This, plus pampering the stock like bovine Madame Pompadours, which includes individual cattle sheds and daily combing and brushing, with regular visits and advice from agent Reese.

Mills County, of which Goldthwaite is the county seat, isn't strictly limited to beef. Sheep, goats and poultry also come into their own. As witness, a pen of three Goldthwaite turkeys were recent grand champions at the Dallas State Fair.

Guiding geniuses of Goldthwaite's championship cattle-winning streak are the members of the Mills County Breeders Assn., organized in 1936.

We just rocked along until the Houston Fat Stock Show in 1947. Steen recalls. "Then the kids became enthusiastic." "Enthusiastic" is an understatement. Look at the winning record:

In 1947—the first year they went into high gear—grand champion steers in both Houston and San Angelo; next year, the same, plus the reserve grand champ here; in 1948, reserve grand champs in Houston and San Angelo plus the champion Hereford in Fort Worth; in 1950, they again took top honors with grand champions in Houston and San Angelo, and added a reserve grand champ in Odessa.

San Angelo saw them score again with a grand champ in 1951, the next year they took the reserve championship and grand champion Shorthorn in the junior show, both in Houston, plus the Fort Worth reserve champ, junior show, and grand champion at Temple; 1953 was another grand champion in Houston plus a reserve champ Hereford, junior show, in Fort Worth.

A big year, in 1954, saw: Grand champion, Waco; champion and reserve, Temple; reserve champ, San Antonio; grand champion, Odessa; champion boys steer, reserve champion Hereford, junior show, and reserve champion Angus, junior show, all in Fort Worth.

In 1955, a Goldthwaite entry was reserve champion in San Angelo and another entry was Angus champ at Waco. Then came last year when Goldthwaite came through in Houston with grand champion, reserve champion Hereford, open show, and champion boys show, plus a champion boys steer at San Antonio.

All this from a town of about 2000 folks. In nine years Goldthwaite show profits have reached \$322,217 for beef and you can add another \$14,742 for turkeys and chickens.

There's one other item in Goldthwaite's drive for world's champion in the stock show sport. That's its show barn, built in 1949, where they view their products at home.

Some 150 youngsters participate in the cattle program conducted at Goldthwaite and there's one sure bet you can make on the town's entries in Houston's Fat Stock Show:

You'll get no bum steer!

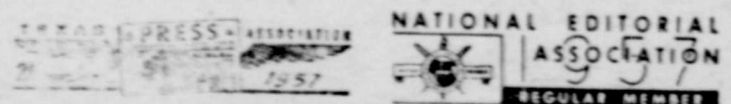

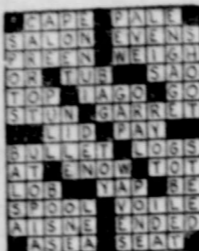
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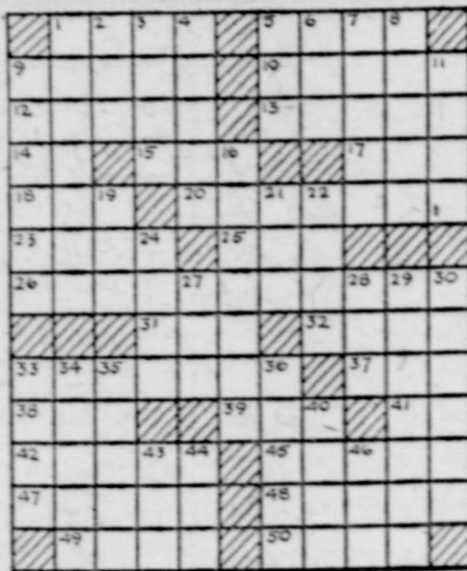

## WHEN THE OLD BIRD WAS YOUNGER

### 10 YEARS AGO—

(Taken from the Eagle files of March 28, 1947)

A pall of deepest gloom extended to the outer edge of the county and beyond spread over Mills County Monday afternoon when it became known that Dr. J. M. Campbell Mills County's beloved family doctor for 40 years, had passed away at his home in Goldthwaite at 12:45 p.m. Monday, March 24, 1947.

It's a boy for Mr. and Mrs. Warren Duren. The young man made his arrival at the Memorial Hospital at Brownwood, March 20. He weighs six pounds and 12 ounces and has been named Warren Phillip.

The Hub Tyson residence on the south side of Goldthwaite was a complete loss, with the exception of a few household goods, Tuesday morning after approximately one hundred spectators watched the fire department extinguish one of the worst fires since the burning of Jack Long Service Station.

Ernie Ray Casbeer was born, March 23, at Medical Arts Hospital, Brownwood. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Casbeer of Goldthwaite.

Effective March 17, Joe Shelby Langford replaces Warren Duren as manager of the Mills County Locker Cooperation. Langford a graduate of Ft. Worth, where he was employed by consolidated Aircraft, will take complete charge as manager April 1, at which time, Duren will be connected with the Trent State Bank.

### 25 YEARS AGO—

(Taken from the Eagle files of March 25, 1932)

The barn on the P. M. Morris' farm, about four miles east of Goldthwaite in the South Bennett community was destroyed by fire sometime during the night Monday and in the fire a fine horse and mule perished. The building was valued at fully \$1000 and it was well filled with grain and other feedstuff, together with Mr. Morris' spring clip of mohair, nearby a trailer stood that was also destroyed by the fire.

John Reeves, 80, pioneer of this county died at his home at Ebony Sunday March 20. Mr. Reeves came with his family from Tennessee and settled in this part of the county in 1883.

Mitchell Strives to Heal Labor-Administration Breach | Observers Think AFL-CIO May Expel Teamsters Union

WASHINGTON—Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell is working hard to try to heal the breach between leaders of the AFL-CIO and the Eisenhower administration.

Aside from acting as spokesman for labor in the administration, Mitchell has missed no bet in trying to eradicate the contentions of high labor ranks that the Eisenhower administration is biased pro-business and anti-labor.

An example of this missionary work was a recent conference between the President and a group of 13 AFL-CIO leaders on proposals for broadening the coverage of the dollar-an-hour minimum wage.

The President is for broadening the coverage and the AFL-CIO has made this a top priority item in its legislative program—so this was good point for a meeting, ground between the President and federation leaders.

Arthur Goldberg, AFL-CIO special counsel, approached Mitchell on the matter and the labor secretary immediately arranged the conference with the President. Moreover, he contacted President Richard M. Nixon and made arrangements for a luncheon conference of the federation leaders with Nixon.

Whether the two conferences changed the attitude of the labor leaders toward the administration may be questioned, but it didn't hurt.

**MORE ABOUT LABOR**—On the subject of labor, the special Senate investigation into tie-ups of some unions with racketeers may touch off demands for legislation curbing labor organization.

Washington observers say that the AFL-CIO may even expel its largest member—the Teamsters union—unless officials of that union at least partially purge their organization of gangster elements. Nevertheless, the AFL-CIO fears that the exposure—which is of the trade union movement feels is long overdue—may result in outlawing of the "union shop."

The union shop, permitted under the Taft-Hartley law, requires that persons who join a union must retain their membership, but clauses, it is admitted, permit unscrupulous labor leaders in a power far beyond that of legitimate management-labor negotiation and contract enforcement.

Tie-ups with vice, gambling, politics and even legitimate business operations outside the unions may bring on a strong congressional reaction—backed by much of the American public.

**PENNIES AND WASTEPAPER**—Senator Norris Cotton of New Hampshire, has flushed out some of the trivial but annoying pieces of the Washington picture. He points out, for instance, that the mint will produce 500 million pennies this year at a cost of pennies per 1,000 pennies.

The senator also notes that the Budget bureau expects an increase in the number of counterfeiters arrested in 1957, but a drop in the number of moonshiners nabbed.

For the economy-minded, the senator reports that about \$10 million will be netted by the government for sale of waste paper and scrap.

Cotton also adds that the Department of Agriculture will hire three more mycologists but will keep the same number of agronomists and cytopathologists. What's more, says he:

"I am not sure what these are but here's something I know about—the same department plans to spend \$125,000 to increase the production of castor oil in this country!"

### FUMIGATE GARDEN SOIL TO CONTROL ROOT KNOT DISEASE

Root knot disease can be controlled in garden soils by fumigation. The fumigant should be applied 10 days to 2 weeks before planting and the soil moisture should be adequate for germinating seed. More moisture is required in sandy soils.

Before fumigating, remove from the area to be treated all plant trash and infected roots. Prepare a good seed bed as if for planting. Use a hoe or plow to open furrows 6 to 8 inches apart. Apply the fumigant from a fruit jar. Two holes should be punched in the jar lid, one to let in air and the other for distributing the fumigant. Make the application by walking along the open furrow and dribbling the fumigant into the bottom of the furrow. Cover the furrow immediately to prevent loss of the fumigant gases.

A pint of the material should cover about 150 feet of row space. It is a good idea to test first with water in the jar to determine how fast to walk in order to make the proper distribution. Garden Dowfume, D-D, Solifume 60-40, Isobrome 40, and Bromofume 40 are effective as garden fumigants.

Severe injury may result if the fumigant application is made closer than two feet to growing plant roots. Keep the material out of the eyes and mouth and should it be accidentally spilled on the hands or clothing, remove it immediately with soap and water or kerosene.

Since such warm weather crops as tomatoes, peas cucumbers, and okra are more susceptible to root knot damage, it might be a wise idea to fumigate the rows where they will be planted. Finally, do not mix treated and untreated soil and use disease free transplants.

### RECIPE OF THE WEEK

#### Lemon Cups

1 cup sugar, 1/4 cup flour, 1/8 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 5 tablespoons lemon juice, grated peel of 1 lemon, 3 well-beaten egg yolks, 1 1/2 cups milk, scalded, 3 stiffly-beaten egg whites.

Combine sugar, flour, salt and butter; add lemon juice and peel. Add to combined egg yolks and milk; mix well. Fold in egg whites and pour into greased custard cups. Bake in pan of hot water in moderate oven (325-o) 45 minutes. When baked, each dessert will have custard on the bottom and sponge cake on top. This may be baked in greased shallow baking dish. Serves 8.

Realizing that I would have to explain to my parents if I tarried too long, I decided to go home. Back at the corner of the "square," farmers and ranchers were bunched in front of "Old Dan Trent's Bank." Men were smoking or chewing tobacco; some of them were whittling and there was explosive laughter here and there. I stopped to listen. (Maybe I would hear a new joke—a funny story.) Noah Karnes, an old time friend of the Bulls was there from over Langford's Cove way. He saw me, and came over and said:  
"Ain't you Sam Bulls boy?"  
"Yessir, Mr. Karnes, I'm Ed."  
"Well, Ed, you tell your daddy that he's got an old sow an' her family over on the mountain by me; she's got a big family—thirty-two or three pigs to grown up hogs—they come to my tank for water; come most ever' day. I know she is Sam Bull's sow, she's got his mark: swallow-fork an' under bit in each ear."  
"Yessir, I'll tell him, an we're much obliged to you, Mr. Karnes," I said.

I saw a crowd gathering over between Bill "Jeems" barber shop and the I. C. Everly store, and I ran over to investigate. A tall, thin, blind man with a guitar slung around his shoulder was being helped up into the back end of a farm wagon. People were packed ten deep all around the wagon, so I got up on the high sidewalk to see over the crowd. The way that man strummed his guitar, I knew I was in for a treat. He sang, "And I Went with Him." The story relates an escapade that took place in a hotel, the two pals had met with a couple of "dames," but it developed that the girls had other friends, and so:

"They caught poor Jack and swung him from the middle floor. And I went with him, because I could not leave my friend Jack." I stood entranced. Next the man sang "Sweet Marie" and "When You and I were Young, Maggie." Everybody knew these songs. Then the poor fellow offered his song books for sale: a dime a copy. He sold a few, poor man, and I was so sorry for him that I wished I had "Old John Dees" money—"I'd buy 'em all and give 'em away to the first hundred kids I met," I thought. The man strummed his guitar for attention, and said:

"My friends, ever' song I sing is printed here in my song book; the books are only ten cents apiece and they are worth a quarter; this is the only way I have to make a living; I gotta eat, an I want to catch the next train for Temple. Can't you afford a dime?" Then the man straightened up, and his face was sad as he said: "Now I'll sing the latest 'hit' back east: 'The Cat Came Back!'"  
There were a dozen or more verses. I didn't have a dime, but I stood there attuned to the song, and I memorized every word of it. The poor blind man then "sold out," and a man helped him down from the wagon. I looked up into his blind eyes, as the man led him up onto the sidewalk. I had never seen a blind person before. With mixed emotions, I stood gazing after the man until he turned the corner at "Old Dan Trent's Bank."  
I got my groceries out of Kirby's store, and loaded them into the gig. I waited 'til I got to the south-west corner of the "Square" before I ventured to sing; then, I let forth at the

top of my voice with The Cat Came Back, and when I had finished every verse I switched to: "And I Went with Him." I sang those two songs all the way home, the happiest boy in Mills County. I had two brand new songs to add to my repertoire.

Incidentally, I found in college, that there were many who could sing, so I switched successfully to story telling, which is no mean art in itself. There is a sequel. I digress to relate it:

In August, 1906, I arrived in Salvador, Central American, with perhaps ten Spanish words at my command. I must learn the language. Avidly, I began memorizing folk songs and tunes; within six months I could sing many songs, even before I knew the meaning of half the words. Needless to say, this was of incalculable value to me in my determination to master La lengua Espanola, my only accomplishment.

Reader, if you would learn the Spanish language, I suggest you begin by learning to sing their songs. If you do, you will be amused at many of their songs entitlements. "A la sombra de sus pestanas" (In the shade of thy eyelashes), is one of my favorites; another: "Your eyes are my handcuffs, your arms my chains."

Today is St. Valentine's day, birthday of my dear old grandmother, Eliza J. Bull. My own birthday comes along a little later this month.

"Once upon a time," I knew a charming gal of about my age, eleven or twelve; she was just about my style, evidently she found out that I liked her, but the opinion was not reciprocal. When my next birthday came along, she said to one of my friends:

"He should'a been born on the fourteenth—he looks like a comic valentine."

Suffice to say: that was one romance that never even "budded."

That, too, had its sequel, forty years later—retribution can be sweet. However, I am not vindictive and I am compassionate.

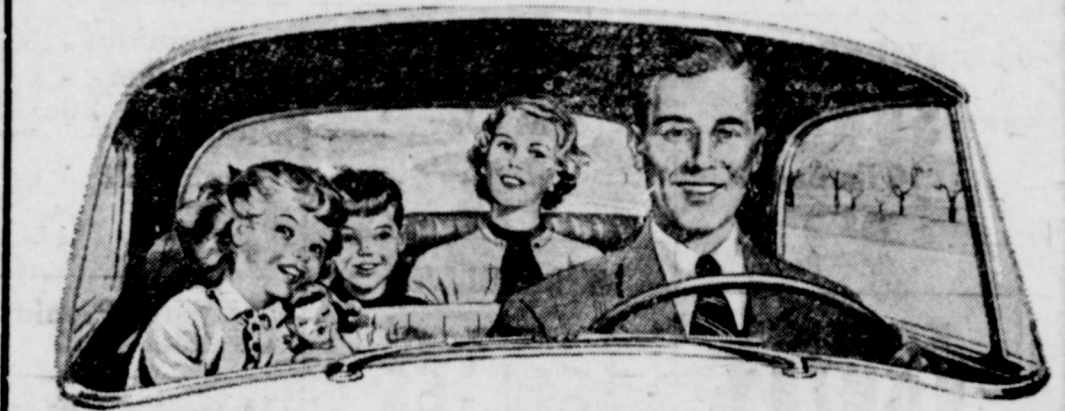

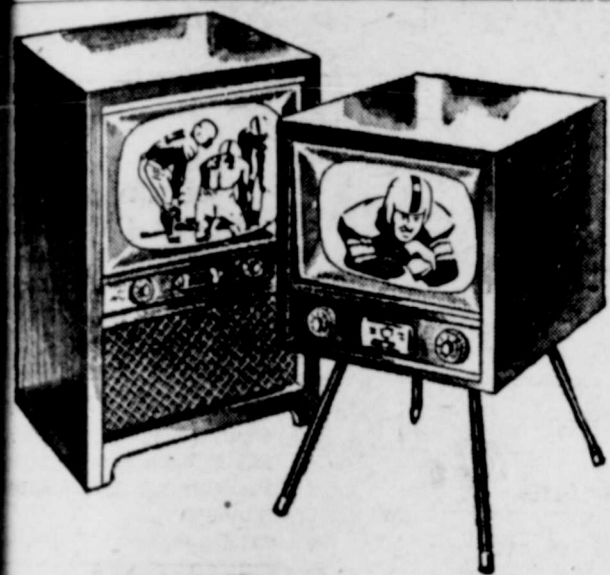

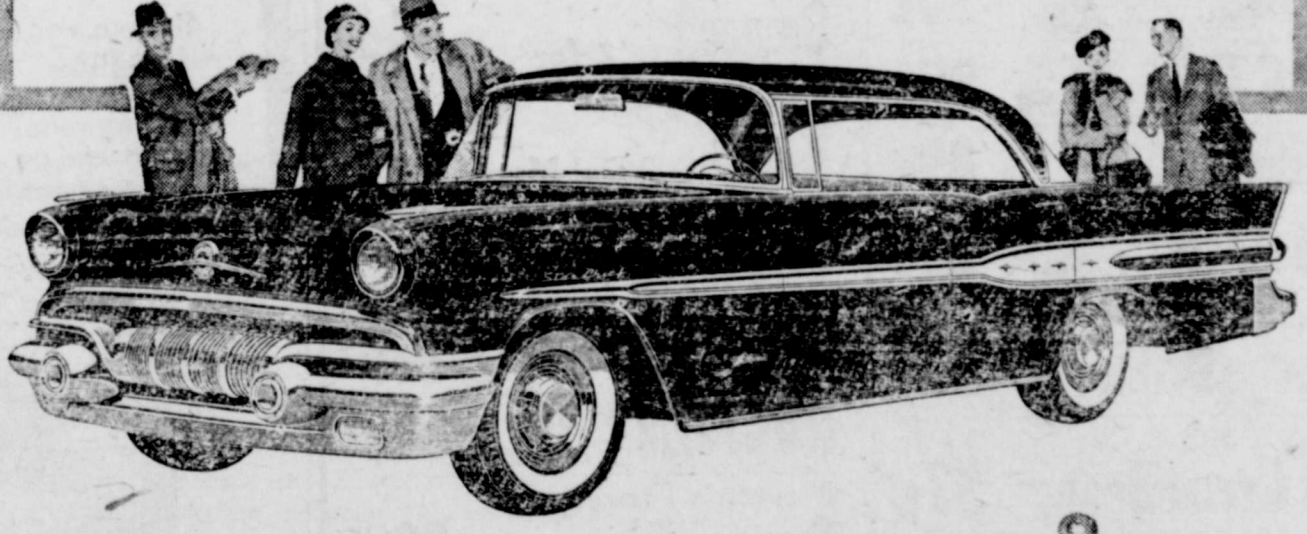

## TODAY'S Menu

### Three Unusual New Cakes

**BY ALICE DENHOFF**  
We have a friend who bakes exquisite cakes, working out her recipes until she achieves perfection. Then, and only then, does she serve the results of her skill. Here are three of them.  
**Tangy Taste**  
The first is a tangy, delicious Orange Marmalade Cake, just the thing with a cheery cup of tea.  
Cream 1/4 lb. butter or margarine and gradually add 3/4 c. sugar.  
Add, one at a time, 2 eggs, beating well. Add 1/4 c. orange marmalade and 2 tsp. orange rind.  
Cream 1/2 lb. butter or margarine and gradually add 3/4 c. sugar.  
Add, one at a time, 2 eggs, beating well. Add 1/4 c. orange marmalade and 2 tsp. orange rind.  
Sift and measure 1 c. flour. Add 2 tsp. baking powder and 1/2 tsp. salt.  
Add dry ingredients to creamed mixture alternately with 1/2 c. water. Add 1/2 c. mixed chopped nuts. Bake in 9-in. square pan at 350° F. for 45 to 50 min.  
Frost with orange cream icing and cut in squares.  
**Devil's Food Cake**  
Red Devil's Food Cake with Baked Frosting is next. To bake it, you'll need a 12 1/2 x 9 x 2-in. cake pan.  
First, mix together 1/2 c. water, 1 1/2 tsp. baking soda and 1/2 c. cocoa and allow to stand while mixing other ingredients.

Cream 3/4 c. butter with 1 1/4 c. sugar. Add 2 eggs, one at a time and beat well.  
Sift and add 2 1/2 c. flour and 1/2 tsp. salt alternately with 3/4 c. sour milk. Add tsp. vanilla.  
Bake at 350° F. for 45 min., then spread with frosting and return to oven for another 15 min.  
To prepare frosting, beat 2 egg whites until stiff. Add 1/2 tsp. baking powder and 1 c. brown sugar, then beat again. Spread over cake.  
To bake an excellent Coconut Cake, cream 1 c. butter. Add, gradually, 2 c. sugar and 4 eggs, one at a time. Beat well.  
Sift and measure 3 c. flour and 2 tsp. baking powder. Add alternately with 1 c. milk. Add one c. coconut and tsp. vanilla. Bake in 12 1/2 x 9 x 2-in. well-greased baking pan in 350° F. oven for 1 hr.  
**Caramel Filling**  
You might like the special recipe for a fine caramel filling.  
Mix together in a saucepan, 2 c. sugar, 1/2 c. brown sugar, 1/2 c. butter, 1 c. buttermilk and 1/2 tsp. soda. Cook until mixture forms a soft ball or to 80° F.  
Cool, then add tsp. vanilla and beat until creamy. Spread on cake.



AUSTIN, Tex. — Legislative digging into the affairs of ICT Insurance Co. has reached the pick-and-shovel stage.

Previous sensation-a-day pace could hardly be maintained. In prospect now is an exhaustive turning over of every detail of the bankrupt company's financial history. Goal is to discover if crash was due to any violations of law or lack of adequate laws or enforcement.

One possibility for fresh sensations would be the return of Ben Jack Cage, former manager of the company. Cage is in South America. He said he would be glad to talk with the committee, but was busy right now and couldn't get away.

Cage's successors at ICT have accused him of squandering the company's funds in numerous bizarre promotional schemes.

Recent disclosures from testimony:

(1) Former Insurance Commission Chairman J. Byron Saunders received some \$7,000 from ICT Discount Corp. in monthly checks. Saunders said it was in payment for his interest in Wood County oil wells. Atty. Gen. Will Wilson questioned Saunders closely as to why the money was listed on his income tax return as legal fees rather than money from a property sale.

(2) Two former Insurance Commission examiners were asked to explain if they were the same men whose names appeared on checks from a Ben Jack Cage interest. A doctor certified the two, L. W. Blanchard and Robert Butler, were too ill to testify. Both had been discharged from the commission for alleged connections with another company that went broke.

(3) Renne Allred Jr., court-appointed liquidator for ICT, charged the company was organized with borrowed money, a procedure contrary to state law. He also said year-end statements were fattened by short-term loans.

(4) Several legislators and former legislators testified concerning fees from ICT. Most were small in amount and received some time ago.

COKE'S CO. IN TROUBLE—Physicians Life Insurance Co. of Dallas is to appear before the Insurance Commission Thursday (March 28) to show cause why it should not lose its license.

This is only one of the difficulties faced by the company headed by Former Gov. Coke Stevenson.

It is one of several Dallas-based insurance companies that are to be investigated by a special Dallas County grand jury.

Governor Stevenson said the original founders of the company sold some of their stock through the company at a tremendous profit and retained the money themselves. None of these people is in authority now, he said, and the firm has sued for recovery of the money. "It will go a long way to get

things straightened out," he said.

Stevenson also told stockholders the company's future solvency requires it to get loose from a commitment to take over assets of American Atlas Ins. Co. from the state receiver. Federal tax liens against American Atlas were discovered after the deal was made.

Another Insurance Commission order gives Legal Security Life of Dallas until April 15 to clear up charges it falsified its books to show assets in excess of their true value.

CONFUSED HISTORY—House bribery investigators are having slow going with the Texas Naturopathic Association.

Efforts to uncover details of the TNA's past legislative activities have been repeatedly balked by faculty memories and lack of records.

On the committee's recommendation the House formally censured ex-Rep. James E. Cox of Comroe. Cox has been indicted on charges of agreeing to accept a bribe from the TNA.

Panel then turned its attention to reports of a fund raised by the Naturopaths to "educate" the Legislature in 1935. Fund was variously estimated from \$8,000 to \$59,000.

But only hazy and conflicting testimony was received. No records were kept, said a former office secretary.

Irked by it all the committee prepared contempt charges against a Dallas naturopath Dr. Robert Spears, for refusing to answer questions about his background.
