Texans always have been independent in spirit. They do not like for outsiders to tell them how to conduct their affairs. Most of them believe, and rightly so, that the closer government in Columbia University in New is to the people the better it will be.

That is why Texans should approve Constitutional Amendment No. 3 at the Nov. 5 election. This is the amendment that is designed to help solve our water problem. It places the responsibility for solving local water problems with local people. At the same time it makes available the resources of the State to those communities financially unable to completely help themselves.

This amendment provides for the issuance of up to \$200, 000,000 in bonds by the State of Texas for construction of facilities for storage and preservation of surplus waters.

These funds would be loaned to local municipalities and water districts to augment local funds. Proposal No. 3 is so written that this money will be available on an equitable basis and cannot be grabbed up by a few large projects.

The State will function primarily as a second-lien holder, taking revenue bonds on a given project over and above the amount | 1905 he was married to Miss Lee of money that can be raised on the community's own credit rating State participation is limited to one-third the total cost where they made their home of \$5,000,000, whichever is less.

It is an incontrovertible fact that Texas receives all the water it needs in rainfall. The difficulty lies in the fact that it usually is a case of feast or famine. When rains come the water rushes to the Gulf of Mexico, flooding valuable land and destroying life and property. Then come the dry seasons when crops, lawns, humans and animals die and suffer from lack of water.

The proposed amendment would change this picture by helping local communities build reservoirs for preserving the excess moisture for use when there is none from the skies.

Under terms of the amendment these storage facilities belong to the community. It alone can control the uses to which the reservoirs may be put. The State's position is nothing more B. Keith Jr. at Stephenville. than that of any other bondholder.

Snafu Over Distribution Of Asiatic Flu Vaccine? Careful Watch Necessary To Prevent 'Black Market'

By HENRY CATHCART Central Press Washington Writer

WASHINGTON—Some Washington observers are fearful that the United States Public Health Service may be laying the groundork for a snafu on distribution of Asiatic flu vaccine reminiscent of the botch that accompanied the allocation of the Salk polio vaccine two years ago.

They particularly note that the service is relying on "voluntary distribution" of the vaccine-just as was done with the polio shots. The experience with the Salk program was that an almost frantic rush for the vaccine began which caught manufacturers, doctors and community health officials unprepared. It took several months before the shortage situa-

tion could be straightened out. S. TOTAL

Some officials are concerned that the same pell-mell demand for flu vaccine may pop out later this year when the ailment begins to strike with epidemic force. They concede that the Public Health service has carefully gone over plans with state and local officials but they are still

They are also cautioning that authorities must keep a careful watch to prevent "black market" abuses from springing up when the demand for the flu shots becomes heavy.

• TARGET: INDONESIA?-While Syria has occupied the headlines as a trouble spot, State department insiders have become quietly concerned over pro-Communist developments in the Southeastern Asia nation of Indonesia. Recent local elections in the rich and strategic country saw the Reds score heavy gains and achieve a stronger voice in the Indonesian government. The Western Allies are particularly upset at these gains because

Indonesian Prime Minister Sukarno has been courted by the free world in an effort to keep him firmly in the anti-Soviet camp. Now, Sukarno who several years ago barred the Reds from the ballot, has shown signs of swinging to the left. U.S. observers fear he might adopt a neutralist attitude and make future trouble.

• FENCE-MENDING AND INFLATION-The mounting cost of living and President Eisenhower's popularity rating are shaping up as important issues for the 1958 elections, according to first reports from congressmen back home to mend their political fences.

Democrats are trying to determine whether the President's popularity has waned enough to make the chief executive a major campaign target. Meanwhile they seem ready to seize on inflation as evidenced in the mounting cost of living as a sure-fire issue.

BILL SIGNING BLOOPER-Both President Eisenhower and his staff showed signs of pre-vacation fatigue just before they took off from Washington for Newport, R.I., to rest.

The day before the vacation departure, the White House released a list of bills signed by the President but advised newsmen that

none of them were of any importance.

Accordingly, the newsmen were giving the list only minor attention until suddenly spotted among the bills was the measure providing protection for FBI files. The legislation, curbing the impact of the Supreme Court decision last spring giving subversive and other criminal defendants access to secret FBI data, had been one of Mr. Eisenhower's

must demands on Congress. The White House staff discovered that the chief executive had signed a key bill only when informed



Subsequently at his news conference, the President pulled a blooper of omission. He criticized the Democratic-controlled 85th Congress for failing to enact a number of bills he had deemed essential and then ticked them off.
