



FLOOD OR FAMINE

Texas is a paradoxical State. It is plains and mountains; tropical and near-Artic at times; desert and swamp; drouth and flood. Illustrative of this fact is the experience Texans have had this year

In the early part of the year virtually the entire State sustained immeasurable loss from excessive rainfall and the accompanying disastrous floods. A number of rivers, dry for years, were above flood stage for a month.

Then as suddenly as they began, the rains ceased and much of the state experienced a far more serious condition of drouth than at any time during the past nine years. Now within the past week, the state has again been hit by floods.

The need for water has long been proclaimed the No. 1 problem in Texas. Fantastic proposals to correct the situation have been advanced. These range all the way from pipelines to the Great Lakes, cross-country canals, to the building of huge reservoirs in the Panhandle area for the storage of water imported from other States.

But Texas does not need to import water. Texas gets all the water it needs. The solution to the Texas water problem is not more water, but rather the proper use of what it gets from the skies each year. Proper utilization of this water means it must be stored to be available as needed.

This is what House Joint Resolution No. 3 proposes to do, if adopted by the public as a constitutional amendment at the Nov. 5 election

This proposed amendment would authorize the issuance of up to \$200,000,000 in State bonds for construction of facilities for storing and preserving flood waters. The money derived from the sale of these bonds would not be spent by the State, but would be loaned to local governing bodies, such as towns, cities, and water districts, where it would be used in such manner as local needs dictate.

We believe this amendment offers a sound approach to ourproblem. It leaves control of local problems to local people. It provides safeguards against the larger communities getting more than their share, to the deteriment of the smaller ones. It is not 10 YEARS AGOa give-away program, but one that will be self-liquidating. It is Texan in its approach in that it recognizes the ability of local communities to solve their problems by themselves, with just a little help.

We think it should be approved by an overwhelming vote. 合 合
