



A RECORD WILL BE SET

The traffice accident records of the next two months will decide whether or not Texans will plunge deeper in the traffic guagmire of death and destruction.

Frankly, the future isn't bright, for December has come to be regarded as the most deadly month of the year-from a traffic standpoint-with November close behind

In 1955, for example, 263 persons died on Texas streets and highways during December's 31 days, bringing the traffic fatality toll to 2547 for the year. In 1956, 252 were killed during the same period-for a record year's total of 2611.

Thus far, more than 2,000 people have been killed during the current year. The final outcome of a higher or lower toll depends on what the individual motorist and pedestrain does in the next 60 days.

Yes, believe it or not, we more or less have control of our own destiny. If we are careless, we are sure to meet with aceldents in every walk of life. But if we are careful and keep on the outlook for hazards, we may easily steer clear of those things which cause trouble. It is folly to say that it is all a matter of luck, because luck actually doesn't enter into it at all. The degree of safety we enjoy will be determined by our attitudes. A good safety attitude means being aware of poten-Tially dangerous situations we must face each day, and learning to act in advance so as to prevent accidents.

Consider, for a moment, this season of the year and your own attitudes. We may not have ice and snow within the next two months, but we will certainly have damp, cool and occasional foggy days and nights. We know that winter is on the way just as surely as we know it will be followed by spring. Too, shorter days create special hazards that are inherent with darkness on streets and highways. Therefore, it behooves each driver and pedestrain to be aware of these unsafe conditions and stay alert to their dangers. Slower speeds are necessary, autos need to be in exceptional mechanical condition and pedestrians must use extra caution when crossing streets.

It is true there won't be much vacation travel in the next 10 YEARS AGOtwo months, but traffic will be heavy during Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays, and over the football weekends. Also, there will be considerably more driving after dark. That is, the earlier hours of the evening will necessitate more nighttime driving. Records of the Texas Safety Association reveal that 14 percent of all rural fatal traffic accidents occur between 6 and 8 p.m.

One thing for certain, Texans are entering the most dangerous traffic period of the year. A record will be set-whether it is GOOD or BAD will depend on each of us.





GOOD BYE HUCK FINN!

Stephen Foster's "Old Black Joe" is a piece of immortal Americana, loved and sung by tens of millions of people over the generations. But it has been banned from certain air networks-on the grounds that it contains racially offensive phrases.

Now the New York City Board of Education has taken "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" from its approved textbook list for grade and junior high schools. A great many excellent critics regard Huck Finn as the greatest of all American novels, and practically all put it very high on the short list of genuine classics. The New York Times reports a publisher as saying the book was banned because, like Stephen Foster's wonderful old song, it was held to contain racially offensive material.

There is only one logical end to such trend. All literary and musical material which happens to offend anyone should be banned-whether those offended are white men, yellow men, or black men; Protestants, Catholics or Jews; business men or labor leaders, and so on ad infinitum. Then we can all live in a cultural vacuum comparable to the Dark Ages.



Mansfield proposes that the second session of the year be devoted entirely to appropriations matters while the first concern itself to purely legislative matters

"As it is at the present time," explains the Senator, "appropriations bills are sandwiched in between regular

legislative measures. This, in my opinion, makes for inefficiency and lack of proper consideration for budgetary requests."

In addition, Mansfield believes financial affairs of the nation should be placed on a calendar year basis rather than on the basis of July 1-June 30, as they are now.



A group of mass communications and legal experts told the government that this authority was needed to keep the networks from becoming too powerful and strangling improvement of tele-Senator Mansfield vision fare.

This finding is similar to a recommendation by the House anti-trust subcommittee and its chairman, Rep. Emanuel Celler (D), New York, an outspoken and frequent critic of the networks.

The gist of the recommendations is that the networks, principally through their methods of selling advertising time and network programs to subsidiary stations, are preventing local outlets from introducing good new local programs. This, the communications experts said, prevents local stations

from coming into their own and transforms them all into network satellites. At present, the government possesses little authority over the networks-hardly recognizes them, in fact, except as multistation owners.

STANDING ROOM ONLY-All the talk about outer space has failed to distract the concern of some U.S. population experts who fear the U.S. may soon be running out of living space.

The baby boom continues, with some four million new Americans expected to check in before year's end. Where will they—and their future little brothers and sisters-all go?, ask the experts.

Here is how the experts see the living space question: as cities expand, they take farm land out of production. Upstream industries drain needed water from downstream agriculture. Where does it all end?

One official predicts "water will become our most precious mineral." The answer may be the encouraging reports that the time is near when potable water may be cheaply converted from salt water.


