WHY WE SHOULD SEND FLOWERS

GOOD MORNING. I wonder if you have ever heard anyone make a statement like this: "What a waste of money to send flowers. It could be used to some good and lasting purpose, It could be given to the poor. Why throw away money on a basket of flowers which will be faded and dead within a few days?" Ever hear these words? Sometimes they seem to have a practical sensible, down-to-earth sound about them. And I'm sure you've heard

But one of the events of the last week of Jesus' life upon earth revealed that he thought that flowers are as important to life as bread and meat, that sentiment is as indispensible to life as the very air that we breathe.

The event was out at Bethany, where Jesus visited in the house of Simon with some of his disciples and friends. Supper had been served by Martha and now they were sitting about the table Mary, Martha's sister, came into the room bearing a treasure . . an alabaster box of precious ointment, a rare and expensive perfume. She knelt beside Jesus and broke the box and anointed his head with that expensive oil. It was a beautiful act of friendship done in appreciation of all that Jesus had meant to her and her

But among the disciples was a good, practical hardheaded man. When he saw what Mary was doing, he said: "What's going on here? Why this waste of money? This ointment could have been sold and the money given to the poor. Why this waste?" It was Judas speaking-Judas Iscariot.

I can imagine that Judas expected Jesus to say to him: "You're right, Judas. This is a foolish waste of money. Mary has done a terrible thing." But, Jesus did not say that. Instead he said: "Let her alone. Why do you trouble her, criticize her? She has done a beautiful thing for me. She has done what she could. And truly I say unto you, wherever this gospel is preached in the whole world, what she has done will be told in memory of her."

In these words Jesus gave a rebuke to those who know the price of everything, but not the value . . . to those who imagine that life is only a matter of bread and meat. 



R. T. Padgett, Goldthwaite flower merchant, handed us a copy of a sermonette by Dr. Robert Goodrich, Jr., pastor of the First Methodist Church, Dallas, Texas. It has some food for thought and we want to share it with our readers. It's title is-

WHY WE SHOULD SEND FLOWERS

GOOD MORNING. I wonder if you have ever heard anyone make a statement like this: "What a waste of money to send flowers. It could be used to some good and lasting purpose. It could be given to the poor. Why throw away money on a basket of flowers which will be faded and dead within a few days?" Ever hear these words? Sometimes they seem to have a practical sensible, down-to-earth sound about them. And I'm sure you've heard

But one of the events of the last week of Jesus' life upon earth revealed that he thought that flowers are as important to life as bread and meat, that sentiment is as indispensible to life as the very air that we breathe.

The event was out at Bethany, where Jesus visited in the house of Simon with some of his disciples and friends. Supper had been served by Martha and now they were sitting about the table. Mary, Martha's sister, came into the room bearing a treasure . . . an alabaster box of precious ointment, a rare and expensive perfume. She knelt beside Jesus and broke the box and anointed his head with that expensive oil. It was a beautiful act of friendship done in appreciation of all that Jesus had meant to her and her

But among the disciples was a good, practical hardheaded man. When he saw what Mary was doing, he said: "What's going on here? Why this waste of money? This ointment could have been sold and the money given to the poor. Why this waste?" It was Judas speaking-Judas

I can imagine that Judas expected Jesus to say to him: "You're right, Judas. This is a foolish waste of money. Mary has done a terrible thing." But, Jesus did not say that. Instead he said: "Let her alone. Why do you trouble her, criticize her? She has done a beautiful thing for me. She has done what she could. Saturday afternoon. And truly I say unto you, wherever this gospel is preached in the whole world, what she has done will be told in memory of her."

In these words Jesus gave a rebuke to those who know the price of everything, but not the value . . . to those who imagine that life is only a matter of bread and meat. In these words, Jesus was saying that sentiment and love and devotion, flowers and music and beautiful things have

Jan. 31, Deadline For Farm Operators To Report Wages

Farm operators, farm crew leaders, and farm labor contractors have only until January 31, 1958, to report the wages and pay the 41/2% social security tax on the cash wages that they paid certain employees during 1957, Maurice M. Chastain, manager of the Temple district office of the Social Security Administration, stated today.

These reports, which filed with the Internal Revenue Service, must be made by any farmer who paid his farm employees \$150 or more in cash wages, or who paid cash wages of any amount to a farm employee who worked for him on 20 or more days in the calendar year and who was paid on a time basis—that is, by the hour, day, week, etc.

Mr. Chastain also explained that these reports must be filed by a crew leader or labor contractor who furnished farm laporers to a farmer, and who did not have a written agreement with the farmer making him an employee of the farmer.

Of the total 41/2% tax rate 2 1/4% should be withheld from the farm employee's wages and the farmer, crew leader, or labor contractor pays an additional 2 1/4%

Wages paid to farm employees on a piece-rate basis need not be reported unless the total cash wages amounted to \$150 or more for 1957.

The San Saba-Brady Soil Conservation District began accepting full responsibility for maintenance of the dams and spillways on Deep Creek by formal agreement with the Soil Conservation Service in 1952. Since that time, a maintenance plan has been worked up on Brady Creek between the Concho and San Saba-Brady Soil Conservation Districts. The districts ask the Brady Creek watershed association to help them carry out reponsibilities of operation and maintenance. The same maintenance pattern was followed on the Clear Creek with the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District assuming responsibility for maintenance and asking for help from the Clear Creek watershed association.

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






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
