PRICED OUT OF THE MARKET

The National Association of Manufacturers recently held a convention in New York. According to a Wall Street Journal report of the proceedings, "Most of the nation's industrialists seem to be planning to hold a damper on their prices this year." Some are seeking ways to lower prices, or to offer more for the same price. This isn't because industrialists are any more public-spirited than the rest of us. It is because danger signs have appeared in the form of consumer resistance and tougher competition. In other words, producers don't want to be priced out of the market.

The AFL-CIO big union held its convention in Atlantic City at about the same time. A proposal from one delegate that labor hold the wage line was buried under denunciations. Following that, the AP reports, a unanimous vote was given to " . . . a resolution making 'sizable' wage boosts, a shorter work week and fringe benefit improvements their 1958 collective bargaining policy."

We have yet to see what the fruits of this policy will be. But one thing is sure-labor can be priced out of the market, with soaring unemployment as the result, just as surely as can industrialists. Will the labor bosses have to learn the hard way that buyers of a product or a day's work can't be forced to consume 10 YEARS AGOor employ beyond their ability to pay? * * *



58 Wool Incentive Program nounced Through ASC Office

1958 wool incentive pro- [the U. S. Department of Agrirecently announced by culture will be similar to the shorn wool incentive price in

As announced earlier, the

program in effect during the 1958 will be 62 cents per pound, current marketing year, ac- as during the past three years. cording to Lee W. Tabor, Mills The payment rate for shorn wool will be the percentage required to bring the national average price received by all producers for sales during 1958 marketing year up to the 62cent incentive level.

Producers who market wool during the 1958 marketing year will be eligible for a payment which will be an amount equal to the percentage rate times the proceeds from the sale of their wool. Payments will be made on the 1958 wool in the summer of 1959, when the tabulation of producer returns is completed.

Mr. Tabor urges wool producers to get the best possible price for selling their wool. This is important to the grower because, under the percentage method of payment, the higher the price the individual producer gets for his wool in the market, the larger his incentive payment is. This method is designed to encourage producers to do the best possible job of marketing their wool.

The payment method on lambs under the 1958 program will also be the same as under the current 1957 program. Each producer who owns lambs for 30 days or more and sells the lambs unshorn will be eligible for a payment. The payment will be made on the weight increase of the lambs during the period of each producer's own-

Payments to producers who buy unshorn lambs and then shear them will be subject to a downward adjustment in any shorn wool incentive payment they apply for. The payments on unshorn lambs will be a fixed rate per hundredweight of live lambs sold.

Mr. Tabor again reminds wool growers "to keep all sales records in a safe place." The accounts of sale must have the information needed to support the producer's payment appli-





Operating on so tight a production and employment schedule as has American business in recent years, the least sign of downward adjustment invariably throws thousands of workers out of jobs and causes us to wonder just what is wrong with our economic system, employment-wise.
