

### SAFETY EDUCATION

The techniques of safety education for children is in no wise different from their education in any other remote or similar field. Instruction must proceed in a step by step manner at such a pace as to present the likelihood of success (offering understanding and a sense of achievement to the child), and frequently enhanced with the conquest of minor milestones. To attempt to teach a boy of six the principles of water safety that are set up for a nine-year-old, would be as discouraging to the child as trying to teach him algebra before he had been introduced to simple arithmetic.

To develop good safety habits and teach the proper safety attitude, adults must be aware of the prime role of parental example in influencing juvenile behavior. Most parents are pleased to hear their sons and daughters say, "I want to grow up and be like mommy - or daddy." But they often overlook the vital responsibility that such juvenile ambitions impose on them, the parents. It means that the little by will imitate his father in the handling of tools or driving a car. And, of course, the little girl will try to mimic her mother in the performance of household chores. Perhaps this is too obvious, but how many parents realize when they take their two-year-old for a walk, that they are starting the child's instruction in permanent pedestrian habits? And how many are aware that when they take the same child for an automobile ride that they are starting a fourteen-year course in driver education?

Educators agree that student or group participation is one of the most effective educational devices. How does this apply to Grand Champion of the entire safety education in the home? However, this is true only so long as the parent capatalizes on the event by explaining the cause and effect relationship of the incident. Sometimes these explanations seem ridiculously simple and obvious, but to a small child in the Camp Bowie maneuver lege, Belton, visited her parents, they form the safety-nucleus of his future life.

While children learn best by parental example and supervised experience, they can learn much by rote. This is possible, however, only when they have the background of supervised experience, the continuing example of parental safe behavior, and a well-founded confidence in the reasonableness and veracity of the parents.

J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association and one of the Southwest's leading safety-experts, recently stated: "The ultimate responsibility for juvenile accident prevention falls on the parents. But this should be conveyed to them in a non-frightening manner and with an assurance of a more rewarding future."

Thus, the thinking parent knows that he cannot teach a boy NOT to climb a tree, but HOW to climb it safely.



Foreign Policy Lead To Quit "While Even"

By HENRY CATHCART

Central Press Washington Writer WASHINGTON-Speculation is growing that Secretary of State John Foster Dulles will leave President Eisenhower's Cabin

Thinking is that Dulles can now claim a final achievement in results of the Paris "summit" conference of NATO nations—the agreement of Atlantic allies to put U. S. atomic missile launching site inside their borders.



But a better reason for Dulles leaving, it is said, is that the foreign policy leader has oullived his usefulness. 

### SAFETY EDUCATION

The techniques of safety education for children is in no wise different from their education in any other remote or similar field. Instruction must proceed in a step by step manner at such a pace as to present the likelihood of success (offering understanding and a sense of achievement to the child), and frequently enhanced with the conquest of minor milestones. To attempt to teach a boy of six the principles of water safety that are set up for a nine-year-old, would be as discouraging to the child as trying to teach him algebra before he had been introduced to simple arithmetic.

To develop good safety habits and teach the proper safety attitude, adults must be aware of the prime role of parental example in influencing juvenile behavior. Most parents are pleased to hear their sons and daughters say, "I want to grow up and be like mommy - or daddy." But they often overlook the vital responsibility that such juvenile ambitions impose on them, the parents. It means that the little boy will imitate his father in the handling of tools or driving a car. And, of course, the little girl will try to mimic her mother in the performance of household chores. Perhaps this is too obvious, but how many parents realize when they take their two-year-old for a walk, that they are starting the child's instruction in permanent pedestrian habits? And how many are aware that when they take the same child for an automobile ride that they are starting a fourteen-year course in driver education?

But this should be conveyed to them in a non-frightening manner and with an assurance of a more rewarding future."

Some fishermen use poultry netting to hold the brush together. In that event the entire project must be completed on land and then towed to its resting place.

We once heard of a fisherman who made an unusual, vet ideal, shelter in a lake that had just been lowered. He found a couple of old outhouses, filled them with heavy brush, then hauled them to a spot that would be just the right depth when the lake was refilled. There he anchored them down to stay. They were left flat on their sides, with the door open.

Needless to say, he had an ideal cover for fishing and kle box. caught more than his share of crappie and bream.

Another good plan is to build the shelter directly under the end of the boat dock or pier. In this instance it is necessary o use heavy wire to keep the brush from washing out, and to keep hooks from snagging.

Anyway, now is a good time to build you a brush shelter. Just be careful where you cut your brush and where you put it. Do the job right and you'll have a good fishing spot.

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
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



Austin, Tex.-From the Pansafe topic for a rousing speech right now is "The Tidelands-They're All Ours."

Texans haven't been stirred up on this issue since 1953. That was the year Congress passed the Submerged Lands Act which recognized the coastal states' ownership of off-shore lands to defense. to their "historic boundaries."

Texas won title to land three leagues (101/2 miles) from shore its independence treaty with Mexico. Texans, at least, were convinced, this was the 'historic boundary." Hence, the state began operating in the three-league territory, leasing tracts to oil, gas and sulphur companies to gain money for the public school fund.

Now the fat's in the fire again. Last year outgoing U. Things were going along fine after passage of the 1953 law explained Wilson, until Louisianians (limited to three miles of tidelands) decided that if Texans could have three leagues, so should they. Louisiana filed suit for the extra land. Federal government replied that "no state" owned more than three miles out.

"This," observed Wilson, 'struck a tender spot."

But neither Louisiana nor other coastal states have the same sort of case as Texas, he emphasized. At the time Louisiana entered the Union, the commonly accepted boundary of a country was the distance a cannon could fire from shore -or three miles.

Texas, however, said Wilson, won right to three leagues in 1836 War for Independence, and U. S. officials recogn this when the state entered the

Today the value of the contested lands is estimated at \$500,000,000. Ruefully, Wilson noted he's been allotted only one hour before the court to argue for it.

LAND COMMR. EARL RUD-DER: If U. S. court knocks down Texas' claim to the 101/2-mile shoreline, then "Russia, Mexico or anybody else can claim it.'

Governor Daniel has express ed the belief that Brownell, who filed the Texas suit on his last day as attorney general, acted out of pure spite.

READY FOR BUSINESS- A new state board has opened up. It's business: to lend money for dams and reservoirs to hold some of the water that has been rushing wastefully into the

Water Development Board instructed its executive secretary to notify some 1,000 cities and water districts that it's ready to start considering ap plications for funds. Board can lend up to one-third the cost (with \$5,000,000 limit) of a water conservation project.

Newly - organized Development Board met jointly with an older group, the State Board of Water Engineers. Members ED - An Amarillo insurance of the two boards promised to firm has filed suit to prevent work harmoniously with no new, lower credit insurance

territory. Development Board will pass on the legal and financial angles of a proposed project; Board of Water Engineers | March 1. will study from the engineering viewpoint.

NEW "TRAFFIC DIRECTOR" Brad H. Smith, Rio Grande Valley newsman, and past president of the Texas Press Association, becomes Texas' first state traffic safety director on Feb. 1.

Governor Daniel said that Smith will spearhead one of the most intensive traffic safety campaigns in the state's history. Daniel has made war on road deaths one of the prime goals of his administration.

Smith will work with the Texas Traffic Safety Council created by the Legislature last Linda Ruth Hall spring to coordinate the safety activities of state agencies.

He has been doing volunteer safety work for 18 years.

"WEAKEST LINK"- Bearing on the same problem, speakers at a traffic courts conference in Austin said the courts must command respect for the law.

Traffic courts conducted by laymen or part-time judges in ill-housed courtrooms may be partly responsible for the casual attitude many have toward traffic offenses, said one speaker. Such courts, it was charged, are the "weakest link in the traffic enforcement chain."

SMALL FRY NOT WANTED -Texas Board of Insurance has problem of deciding whether to grant permission to charge lower rates to casualty companies which avoid the "little business."

Five companies are requesting the special rates. They said they plan to insure only more expensive homes. Loss ratios are higher in the \$5,000 and under bracket, they explained, and cost of handling offsets commissions.
