You live in a watershed. The area your home and your business occupies may even be a vital part of a small watershed. To some degree it is vital from the standpoint of providing needed water pyramiding industrial and municipal uses of replenishing soil moisture reserves that are so essential for profitable farming and ranching.

Floods, drouths and soll ero-

floods. You have only to read the daily papers or listen to the newscasts to be reminded of the terrible toll floods, drouths and soil erosion are taking.

solving the problems of flood. drouths and soil erosion with flood prevention being only a by-product of soil conservation.

Two steps are vital in this watershed program. First, put a conservation program on the watershed which will enable the soil to soak up that amount of water needed for profitable agriculture. The conservation land treatment program needs to be good enough that hard rains are tamed and made useful, thereby cushioning the effects of long dry periods which often follow.

Second, floodwater retarding structures, designed to temporarily detain flood waters not needed for growing crops, grass and trees and to reduce the load of sediment carried should be constructed where needed. The rancher and farmer lays first claim on needed water that falls on his land-his watershed. The work of soil conservation districts encourages conservation use of all soil, water and plant resources. Conservation ranching means ranching with grass, grass being the essence of conservation. Conservation farming is classified as "insurance against drouth" by many farmer who are learng now to make effective us of scant rainfall. Soil that is in condition to readily soak up water generally gets wet at least once annually, even in drouth years. Effective use of a particularly hard rain often spells the difference between a failure and a fairly good yield in crop or grassland. It is in this sense that an effective soil conservation program removes much of the gamble from dryland farming and ranching. We are fortunate indeed, because the principal remedy for drouths, floods and soil erosion are the same. First, treat the watershed so it will soak up more rainfall for growing plants, livestock use and recharging springs, seeps and underground water reserves. Second, apply mechanical structures in the nature of flood- | water retarding structures, levees and dykes to help control runoff water moving downstream to other uses which is in excess to agricultural needs. A third and certainly a very vital step could be providing storage for industrial and municipal uses from tributary watersheds yielding high quality water Agriculture and industry need to face the problem of soil, water and plant conservation in watersheds with open minds. It is a foregone conclusion that agriculture must have water for crops and livestock. Municipal water must be had or people will be out of employment. Electricity is now a necessity. Recreational standards require swimming holes and water must be plentiful for fishing. Legitimate needs for water are numerous. Conservation of all water resources seems to be a must if present living standards are to be improved or maintained. "New Farm" Wheat Allotment Must Be Sought By July 1

A farmer on land on which no wheat was seeded for any of the years, 1956, 1957 and 1958, may apply on or before July 1 for a "new farm" wheat acreage allotment for the 1959 winter wheat crop, Chairman E. L. Burkett of the Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee said today

Even if wheat was produced on the farm in 1958, the farm is still considered a new wheat farm if it did not have a 1958 wheat allotment, and the farmer must apply at the County Office as a new producer, Mr. downstream which otherwise Burkett said. An important requirement for

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
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
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

Proper use is attained when only a part of the current growth of the range vegetation is taken. Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting Soil District cooperators who made Conservation Districts have found that for most plants approximately one-half current protected and productive even growth can be grazed. This means leaving a stubble height past few years. on short grasses such as buffalo and curley mesquite of 11/2 to

2 inches. Taller grasses like little bluestem and Indiangrass should be grazed no shorter than 5 to 7 inches above the ground.

Properly grazed short grasses will produce approximately 1,000 to 1,200 pounds of usable forage per acre in a year while the taller grasses will produce 2,500 to 3,000 pounds of usable forage. Proper use of the taller, deeper-rooted grasses will encourage their spread and thereby increase total forage production on the rangeland

The remaining forage is not wasted but must be left to provide sufficient leaves for the plants to manufacture food and stay in a healthy condition.
