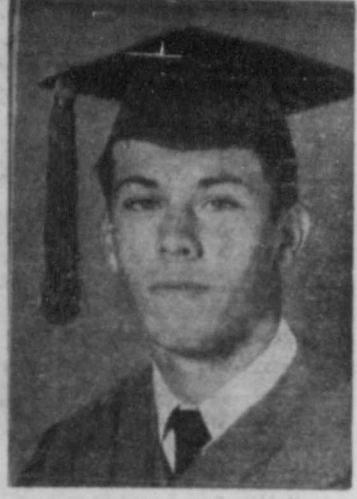

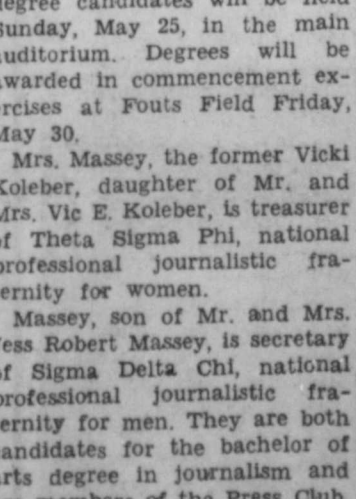

Carolyn Hurst New Beauty Operator At Ola Mae's Beauty Salon

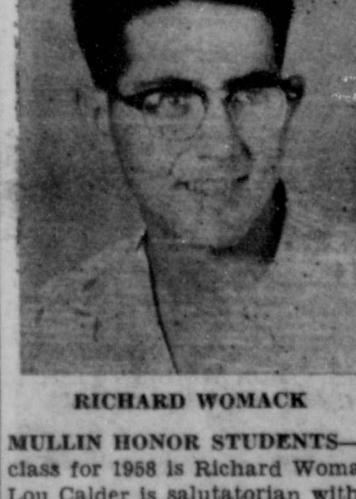

While attending beauty college she was honored as having the highest average in her class. She also attended night school where she took a course in hair styling.

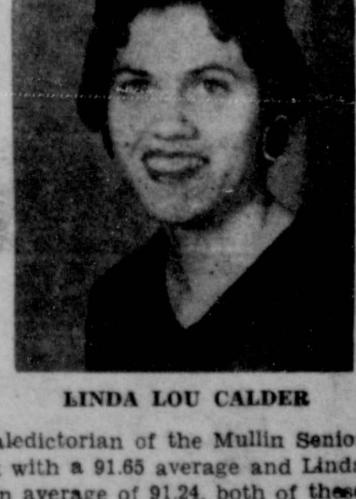

Use Of Grass In Soil And Water Conservation

In the past ten years more conservation farmers in Central Texas have found that grass is an effective tool in soil and water conservation.

Proper soil management for water conservation includes: (1) erosion control, (2) adequate moisture for plants, (3) adequate provision for keeping soil in good physical condition when properly used.

Grass when properly used contributes much to each of the above.

When a rain splash detaches soil particles on bare land, these particles are carried by the wind and soil pores sealing the soil surface enters very slowly. The water and soil carried off the land, the constructive action of rainwash, is controlled by a cover of grass. The leaves break up the raindrop into particles which trickles into the soil. The litter on the soil holds back the water and soil particles which it may carry. Grass roots and the life in the soil which under good grass cover porous soil structure channels and pores allow the water to enter.

Grass cover helps to moderate extremes in soil temperature by shading in hot weather and insulating against cold in winter. This is beneficial soil organic matter which help to build soil and maintain soil fertility. The shading provided by grass cover reduces evaporation, leaving more moisture available for plants.

Where wind erosion is a problem a good grass cover will reduce the velocity of the wind at the surface of the soil and protect it from blowing.

A good grass cover is the only practical means of waterway protection in cultivated fields.

Small areas that are eroding rapidly in cultivated fields can be protected and made productive by growing grass on them. Many acres now in cultivation could produce more in grass.

To be effective in controlling erosion and building soil fertility grass must be properly used. It is estimated that most of our grassland could produce two to four times as much as it does now. Grass cover on much of our native rangeland is not even adequate to control erosion.

A combination of such practices as deferred grazing, rotation grazing, proper stocking, and uniform grazing by fencing, distribution of watering places, salting, etc., are necessary in proper use of grass. But it is most important to watch the grass and adjust its use to the amount produced. Research has indicated that about a ton of cover and litter per acre is necessary for soil protection and maximum use of rainfall. Most crop rotations do not have enough grass and legume crops to protect the soil and maintain its productivity.

Under virgin conditions soil in this area should contain 20 to 50 tons of organic matter in the top six inches of each acre. This amount represents an accumulation over many years. Under row crop cultivation, organic matter is depleted and the natural crumbly structure of the soil is gradually destroyed so that the soil will run together and seal over during heavy rains and will crust badly when it dries.

Grass in a rotation with row crops helps to maintain organic matter and keep soil in good physical condition. Grass roots alone may add as much as a ton of organic matter to each acre in a year. If you leave the tops you may add several tons.

Much of that added as fresh organic matter, however, is rapidly decomposed. The rate of decomposition levels off to a much slower rate when about 10% of the weight of the fresh material remains.

If, under cultivation, crop residue equals or exceeds in volume and quality the residue of the original vegetation, the supply of humus in the soil will

be maintained at or above original levels. Usually the volume and quality of crop residues is much less than that of the original vegetation and humus supplies in the soil decline unless additional organic matter is furnished from other sources.

Grass and legume crops used in rotation with row crops help to maintain the organic matter supply in the soil if they are used in a way that will return large amounts of organic matter to the soil.

Grass grown in long term rotations nearly always increase the overall productivity of a field, and when used for special purposes such as waterway protection or protection of small badly eroded areas, grass will nearly always return more than these areas would have under cultivation.

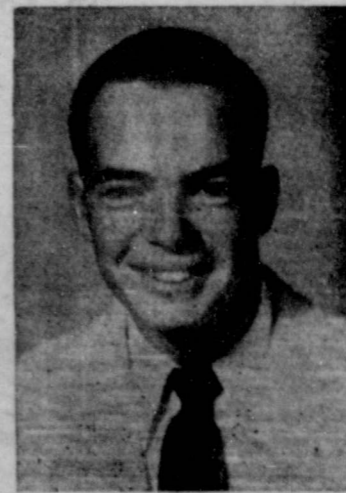

Fifty years ago an event took place in Jack County which established the youth phase of Agricultural Extension Service work in Texas. The occasion was the organization of the first boys' corn club in the state by a county agent and resulted from the failure of an adult corn show held in 1907.

The late Tom Marks was the county agent and the remark, "You can't teach old dogs new tricks," prompted Marks to come up with the statement—"Then I'll start with the pups"—and that is exactly what happened. He enrolled 25 boys and by demonstrations taught them the latest practices then known in corn production. The Corn Show held in Jacksboro in the fall of 1908 in the caboose of a train proved Marks' point that youth could put into practice the better known methods of production.

This method of teaching among the rural youth of Texas is now in its 50th year and is known over the world as 4-H Club work. The first of many special observances, honoring the pioneer workers, members and leaders of the early day clubs, will come during the annual 4-H Club Roundup scheduled for June 10-12 at Texas A&M College.

While the major emphasis and activities of the 1958 Roundup will be devoted to determining state winners in 22 different judging and team demonstration contests, plans are being perfected to initiate a series of observances to carry recognition and attention to the importance of 4-H Club work. The theme of the Roundup and for the activities to follow in the counties will be, "Learn Today—Lead Tomorrow."

Total attendance at Roundup, according to Extension Service officials, will approximate 2,200 with 4-H members making

up a majority.

Insect and disease control is essential in the successful production of fruits and nuts. Health and vigor of trees and quality of fruit depend largely on a well-planned and well-executed control program.

Losses due to insects and diseases can be reduced by carrying through a spray program and following good orchard sanitation practices.

But this arouses several questions in the minds of producers. For example, when is the best time to spray? What equipment is necessary? What precautions should be observed?

These are just a few of the questions that are answered in a leaflet recently released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It is entitled "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Diseases on Fruits and Nuts."

This leaflet gives instructions and recommendations for insect and disease control for peaches, plums, apples, pears, pecans and grapes. It can be a big help to anyone confronted with this problem. This leaflet may be obtained from my office. Ask for L-245.

Weather conditions over Mills County this spring have been favorable for many fungus diseases which normally are not too common.

Reports from over the county indicate that peach leaf curl is common in the county this year. Peach leaf curl causes peach leaves to curl, thicken and become distorted and a whitish or pinkish color shows on the leaf surface. The disease can cause misshapen fruit. Leaf curl can be prevented or controlled by using a winter spray of copper fungicide of either a 6-6-100 bordeaux spray or three pounds of fixed copper (45 to 50 per cent) in 100 gallons of water. This spray is applied

STATE CAPITAL
Highlights
AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, TEXAS—At least one segment of Texas economy—highway construction—is booming. One reason: the Texas Highway Department isn't letting grass grow under its feet in getting federal emergency projects under way.

Low bids tabulated at the Department's May letting totaled \$19,187,933. State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer, in opening the May letting, said that about \$25,000,000 in road projects would be up for bids next month.

This figure, if reached, would set a new record.

A big chunk of this upsurge comes from Texas' \$36,000,000 share of the Federal Emergency Fund, authorized by Congress this year to get extra money into the economy fast and provide needed roads. All of this work must be put under contract by December.

Texas highway officials hope to beat the deadline by several months. Greer announced that \$8,000,000 of the May lettings represented the first of the extra federal projects. He noted with quiet pride "the speed with which the projects were made ready." Bids were taken just four weeks after the federal bill was signed. Department officials expect all the \$36,000,000 to be under contract by the end of the summer—bringing record or near-record lettings for the next few months.

A short time back monthly highway lettings of \$9,000,000 to \$12,000,000 were about average. Time was, too, when the emphasis was mainly on the need for fine, new roads to accommodate the growing stream of fine, new cars. Today, there's also emphasis on the number of people who will be put to work, the money they'll spend on groceries, cars, clothes.

High Tension—With millions involved, the highway lettings are scenes of high tension. Sunburned, sport shirted contractors, plus materials men and insurers flock to the Department's hearing room where the sealed bids are opened and read, item by item.

Department personnel have an electronic computer to add up the item bids and determine the low bidder. Results are announced later in the day. But contractors or their representatives take down the bids on the spot and make rapid calculations.

It isn't hard to spot the man who's just realized he missed a million-dollar job by bidding a few hundred dollars too high. Typical muttered comment: "He can't do it for the money!"

Bumpy Road—Though the mammoth highway building program is moving forward, top speed, there are problems along the road.

Chief bone of contention, now in the courts, is whether cost of relocating utilities to make way for new construction should be borne by the cities and utility companies or the state.

A law passed by the last Legislature authorizes the state, with 90 per cent federal aid, to pay for utility re-location on the federal projects.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has ruled that part of the law invalid in "donating public moneys to corporations and individuals . . . for private and individual purposes." Wilson filed a test case in an Austin district court.

City officials, through the Texas League of Municipalities, take the opposite view. They contend that in other states cities get this money for utility moving and that Texans, through federal taxes, contribute to the cost. Besides, they add, it'll cost the cities some \$20,000,000.

Hospital Officials—The Texas Board for State Hospital and Special Schools has a flock of new names topping its roster of officials.

W. W. Heath of Austin was named chairman of the Board. He succeeds Dr. Raleigh Ross, also of Austin. Howard Tellepsen of Houston is the new vice chairman.

Raymond W. Vowell was appointed executive director of the hospital system. This post has been vacant nearly a year.

It was announced, also, that Dr. C. J. Rulmann, now commissioner of mental health for Tennessee, will become director of Texas mental hospitals in June.

circles as an attorney, banker and rancher. He also is a former county judge, secretary of state and assistant attorney general.

Short Snorts—A slight downward trend in joblessness was noted in the Texas Employment Commission's latest report. Number of persons receiving unemployment compensation checks dropped from 90,949 to 90,913.

A former TEC attorney, Lee G. Williams, has filed suit in an Austin district court for reinstatement to the job from which he was fired last month. Williams contends that his position in Texas Merit System corresponds to federal civil service status and he cannot be fired for the reasons given. A majority of the 3-man Commission said they had "no confidence" in Williams.

Twenty-two bus companies operating in Texas have asked the Railroad Commission for permission to hike interstate (within the state only) fares by 10 per cent. They're being squeezed by increased operating costs, say the companies.

Fred Erisman of Longview has been named chairman of the new Texas Council on Administration of Justice. Council's purpose is to work with other groups in curbing crime and delinquency.

Maco Stewart of Galveston, former assistant attorney general, was elected new president of the liberal-dominated Young Democrats Club at its Austin

meeting. Young Democrats officially criticized legislation designed "to circumvent the U. S. Constitution as interpreted by the Court."

THE PECAN CASE BEARER

There are four stages in the life history of the pecan nut case bearer, the adult or moth which lays the eggs, the larval or worm stage, and the pupal or resting stage. The larval or worm stage is pinkish in color when it is first hatched, but in a few days it turns to an olive gray which is retained until it is nearly grown, when it turns to a jade green color. There are four generations of this insect each year if the weather conditions are favorable and if there is an adequate supply of nuts for the larva to feed upon. This insect thrives best when there is a plentiful supply of moisture. A shortage of nuts or a season in which July and August are dry and hot will reduce the number of larvae very considerably. When such conditions result there may be only

two generations, or two and a very small number of larvae in the third.

Whenever adverse conditions overtake these larvae they spin a tough inverted, saucer-shaped cocoon that is usually attached to the surface of a bud, but sometimes it is spun in a cavity in a limb. These cocoons are called hibernacula because they are primarily for the purpose of enabling the larvae to live over the winter; but the term is not entirely appropriate, because if adverse conditions overtake them they spin these hibernacula in July and August and live over in them from that time until tree growth begins the next spring. All of the larvae which emerge in the spring from these overwintering hibernacula are called the "spring brood" larvae.

Spring Brood—When tree growth first begins in the spring the larvae in these hibernacula cut through the places where the hibernacula are attached to the bud and begin feeding on it. As soon as the new succulent growth starts they bore into the new growth and tunnel back and forth in it until they are full grown. Their presence is indicated by the excrement and frass they push out of the entrance hole where they entered the twig. They finally plug up this entrance hole and spin a filmy cocoon and pupate within it.

First Generation—From the pupae in these twigs the moths of the first generation begin to come out in the latter part of April and May. They lay their eggs on the little nutlets after they are set. Most of the eggs are laid on the second or third night after the moths emerge. The eggs hatch in five days, and the little larvae crawl down the nut stem and begin feeding in the axils of the buds on the nut stem. The young larvae feed for two or three days on the buds and then cut round holes in the nuts at the base and enter the inside of the nuts and hollow them out. They go from one cluster to another and one larva may destroy five or six clusters of nuts. When the larva is full grown it selects a hard dry nut and pupates within it.

Second Generation—From these small nuts emerge another set of moths which lay

eggs in the crevices of the sides of the nuts and start a new generation, the larvae of which tunnel out the nuts in the same way as do the larvae of this generation. The larvae pupate inside the nuts, and the moths which emerge from these pupae start the third generation of moths.

Third Generation—These moths lay their eggs in the crevices on the sides of the nuts, usually near the tip of the nut, and the young larvae begin to feed at the same place. They usually feed until cold weather begins and then spin hibernacula on the buds.

Damage—The most serious damage is in the month of May and in early June, when the small nuts are destroyed. Sometimes the second generation also damages the crop during the last part of June and the month of July. The third generation is usually not serious in dry years, but in years when there is a plentiful supply of rainfall this generation may do serious damage.

Control—The best method of control is to spray the trees with DDT at the rate of three pounds, of 50% wettable, per 100 gallons of water; or two lbs., 15% wettable parathion; or 3 lbs. of 25% wettable malathion; or 5 lbs., 40% wettable toxaphane.

Remember that sprays are ineffective after worms have entered the nuts, and that one spraying may be sufficient to control the case bearer if the infestation is not too heavy.
