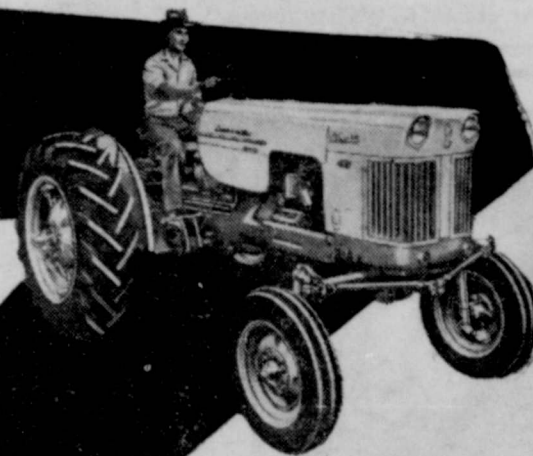

NEWS from YOUR COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT TEXAS A. & M. COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

Fifty years of 4-H progress in Texas will be presented as a pageant on the opening program of the annual State 4-H Club Roundup scheduled for June 10-12 at Texas A&M College.

From the first county agent organized boys corn club in 1908 has come the greatly expanded demonstration and character building 4-H programs of today. Membership has grown from the original 25 corn club members in Jack County to more than 111,000 in Texas and demonstrations and activities now cover every phase of agriculture and homemaking. Throughout the 50-year period, the demonstration has remained the basis for conducting the youth phase of Agricultural Extension work. Today, 4-H members still learn to do by doing and their classrooms are the farms, ranches and homes of Texas.

In 1910 in Coleman County the first beef club was organized and the first statewide rally for corn club boys was held at the State Fair in Dallas. A feature of the rally was a parade of 1,500 boys, each carrying a stalk of corn, through the downtown section of the city.

In 1912, girls for the first time were enrolled in tomato clubs. The first was in Milam County and Mrs. Edna Trigg was the first home demonstration agent. Growing tomatoes and canning were the major demonstrations.

Around 1911 the 4-H emblem was adopted nationally and a man who was later to serve as Extension Director in Texas, the late O. B. Martin, played a major role in this development. He was the first 4-H Club leader in the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

With the passage of the Smith-Lever Act by the U. S. Congress in 1914, the Agricultural Extension Service as known today came into being and 4-H development became more rapid and better organized. A state 4-H leader, H. H. Williamson, was appointed in 1912 and by 1914 he had made considerable progress in getting 4-H going in the counties where agents had been employed.

Texas 4-H club members made their first out-of-state tour in 1920 when 125 of the State's outstanding Junior crop and livestock producers made a 5,000 mile train trip that carried them through the Middle West, to Chicago, Detroit, Canada, New York City, Washington, D. C., the Southland and back to Texas. With the formation—about this same time—of the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work and National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Texas members became Congress participants, and today, one of the most cherished of all 4-H awards is a trip to Club Congress.

In 1927 the first National 4-H Club Camp was held in Washington, D. C. Texas 4-H members have been represented each year the camp has been held by two boys and two girls. This activity is now known as the National 4-H Conference. From the beginning, parents, adult leaders and friends of 4-H have all played important roles in developing the programs and activities which have kept 4-H abreast of the changes in agriculture and home economics. But today as yesterday, 4-H training is aimed primarily at making its members better citizens and the demonstrations are the chief teaching techniques.

These are but a few of the highlights of 50 years of 4-H in Texas. They and others will be portrayed by 4-H members when they bring to the stage of the G. Rollie White Coliseum on the evening of June 10, their birthday cake with the 50 candles. The members of the Mills County Livestock Judging Team will attend this pageant.

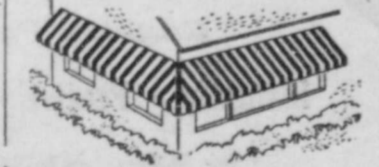

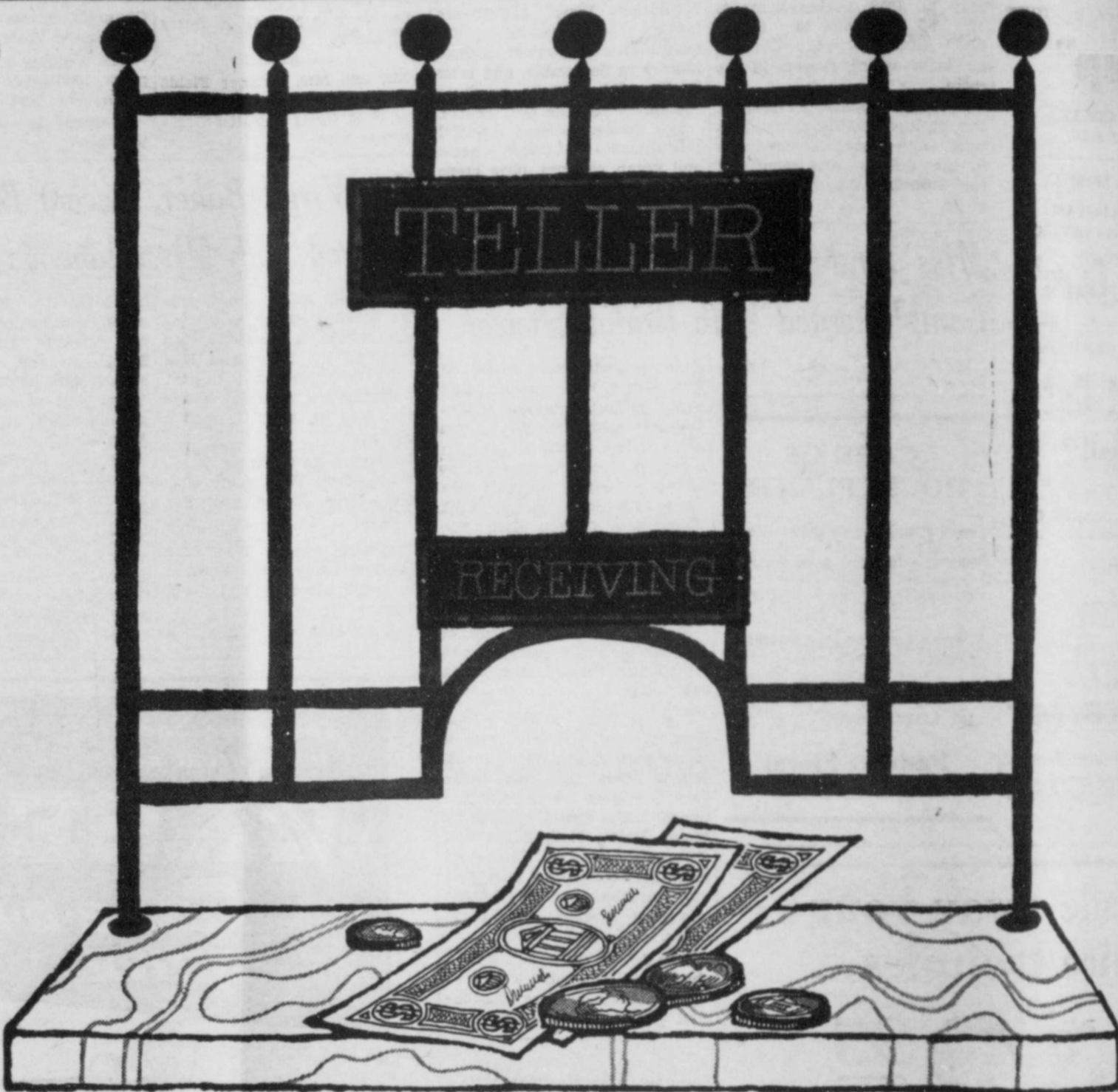

"mud." Then, here's what you do with it.

Get some old syrup buckets, paint buckets, or what have you—anything from gallon size on down, that will hold concrete.

Next, find some old metal clothes hangars and cut them into strips of varying lengths—depending on your needs. Bend the wires in the middle to make a loop. Take the two loose ends and twist the wires around each other a few times, about two or three inches below the loop. Then fan out the loose ends at right angles to the loop. This should give you a piece of wire shaped like a "T" with a loop at the top end.

Now, stick the cross-bar part of the inverted "T" into an empty can and pour in the cement. Adjust the "loop" to a

sufficient height above the concrete so that there will be ample room in "the eye" for whatever size rope you plan to use.

Let the "mud" sit overnight. In the morning you'll have a homemade weight—or anchor, depending on its size—made of solid concrete, and at the cost of but little time.

Using smaller cans you can make whatever size weight you'd like for your throw line, or trot line. Larger cans make excellent weights for anchoring the boat while fishing, or beaching.

If the can is so large that a coat hanger may be too light to withstand the weight of the concrete, use an abandoned piece of heavy, galvanized clothes line, or a small chain.

Eventually the can will rust away. But you'll still have your anchor of poured concrete just as long as your wire "loop" remains intact. So, select as strong a wire for that purpose as you can find—and one that is as rust-resistant as possible.

If you want to get fancy with your home-made anchors here's something else you can do. Punch two holes in the side of the bucket, directly across from each other and some two inches from the bottom. Through these holes insert a piece of iron rod, such as is used to reinforce concrete. Let this rod extend out from the sides of the can about three or four inches.

Next, punch two more holes on opposite sides of each other, but at right angles to the first rod and an inch or so above it. Then place the second rod through the can. This gives you two iron rods at right angles to each other and only a short distance apart.

Now when you pour in the concrete you will have an anchor with four prongs extending outward. So, when you drop anchor and the boat begins to move with the wind or the current—and the anchor tips over—the prongs "dig in" and hold the boat in position.

Dead Minnow Bait—Do you throw away your dead minnows?

Most fishermen just toss out dead minnows that fail to survive in the old minnow bucket. However, we've encountered a few old-timers of late who report some mighty good catches of catfish, with dead minnows as their bait.

Their method is to use a leader, 24 inches or so long, with a lead shot where line and leader join. They use shot of just enough weight to enable them to cast a good distance into deep water and pull the line to the bottom fairly fast.

The procedure is to cast to a likely spot and just sit back and relax for a while. If they have not had a strike after five or ten minutes they reel in slowly and take a look at the bait, just to see what's going on down there.

Next cast is made in another area.

They say the biggest strikes come when things are real quiet. But they do get an occasional strike while reeling in. Catfish in the first instance; bass in the second. And with dead-minnow bait.

AGRICULTURAL REGULATIONS SELF-FINANCED

During recent years the Texas Department of Agriculture has been able to expand regulation and control for farm industries needing such attention and to provide services and benefits where none or few previously existed.

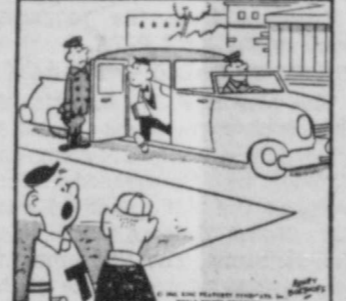

Prefer Homemade Soups? Try These New Recipes

By ALICE DENHOFF

ALTHOUGH the commercials and takes are wonderful and in great variety, there's a tremendous sense of satisfaction and achievement in baking your own. The same thing holds true for soups.

So here are some recipes for soups that you will enjoy making.

Easy to Make

Here is a very fine homemade cream of mushroom soup.

To serve 4, drain and measure liquid from an 8-oz. can mushroom stems and pieces and add enough water to make 2 c. liquid. Place in saucepan. Add chopped mushrooms and simmer 15 min.

Make a white sauce of 2 tsp. butter, 3 tsp. flour, ¼ tsp. white pepper, 1 tsp. salt and a tall can undiluted evaporated milk. Blend until smooth.

Add mushrooms and liquid to white sauce.

Serve in very hot plates with a garnish of paprika or chives.

Cheese Soup makes a tasty first course with a vegetable salad or other light dish is the main course. It's nice for company dinners, too, when it's garnished with fresh popcorn.

To serve 5, sauté 2 tsp. onion in 2 tsp. butter until tender. Add 2 tsp. quick-cooking tapioca, ¼ tsp. salt, ¼ tsp. white pepper, ¼ tsp. nutmeg, 1 tall, undiluted can evaporated milk and 2 c. boiling water.

Place over very low heat and cook until mixture comes to boil, stirring constantly.

Remove from heat. Add 2 tsp. chopped parsley and ½ c. grated American cheese. Stir until cheese is melted, then serve at once in hot soup dishes.

Festive Touch

A platter of cheese puffs adds a festive touch to any soup, canned or homemade.

To make the puffs, cream together ½ c. cream cheese and ½ c. butter or margarine. Add 1 c. flour and ¼ tsp. salt. Chill thoroughly and roll very thin. Cut in tiny circles.

Bake at 425° for 8 min.

Sweetclover Is Well Adapted As Deep Rooted Legume For This Area

By I. HUBERT COPELAND
SOIL CONSERVATIONIST

Sweetclover, the versatile legume, has proven itself to be well adapted to this area. Farmers and ranchers in the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District who have used this crop in the past will agree to that statement. Sweetclover is one of the deep rooted legumes adapted to this area that can be used in a cropping system to protect and improve the soil. Hubam and Madrid sweetclovers are two of the most popular sweetclovers used by cooperators in this district.

Crops following Hubam or Madrid frequently double in yield. David Waters reported a large increase in production of corn on land that had been in Madrid four years previously. Waters said, "The corn on the clover land had a deeper color, stayed green longer and produced more corn than on land not previously in clover." Waters feels that the reason the corn did better on he clover

continues to improve.

land was that the corn plants were provided with the things they needed to produce—water and plant food.

Landowners are also discovering that cropland following clovers "soak up" more of the rain that falls. Tests made on the L. B. Burnham farm near the Colorado River, shows that the water intake on cropland following three years of clover was three inches per hour compared to only three-fourths inch per hour on land that had never been in clover. The deep roots of the clover opened the soil and allowed the rain to "soak in" rather than to run off. Burnham observed that the additional water on the clover land could be the difference between success and failure of a crop.

Organic Matter—essential to good soil structure—is also increased by the proper management of sweetclover residue. Charley Swindle near Priddy found that when he plowed his clover stubble near the surface of the ground, the soil seemed to be given new life. The added organic matter greatly improved the physical condition of the soil and increased the number of helpful soil organisms.

Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: My sister died recently. She had been a widow for four years and had twin girls, age 5, whom my husband and I plan to adopt. If we adopt these children, will they lose the payment they have been drawing on their father's social security account since his death?

Answer: If a child of a deceased worker is legally adopted by his step-parent, grandparents, aunt or uncle, the child or children may continue to receive monthly survivor payments. If the child or children are legally adopted by anyone other than these relatives, the payments stop.

Question: I am 60 years old and will have to retire because of ill health. If I should qualify for disability benefits, would the amount be less than what I could expect at age 65?

Answer: No. If you meet the disability requirements, the amount of your benefit would not be reduced.

HOME ECONOMIC BRIEFS—

Broilers and fryers are popular spring and summer main dish items. Here are some signs of quality to look for when buying chickens:

Flexible breastbone—indicates a young bird.
Soft, pliable skin with few pinfeathers.

A "meaty" look.
Avoid chickens that have a hard breastbone, are bruised, have dry or purplish skin, or scaly legs.

Preserve surplus "greens" easily and quickly by freezing. For best flavor and highest food value, freeze as soon as possible after gathering.

It's easy to do. Simply wash, remove tough stems and imperfect leaves. Cut, if desired. Blanch greens by heating in boiling water for 2 minutes (very tender spinach requires only 1½ minutes). Then cool immediately and thoroughly

drain, package and freeze immediately.

WASH AND WEAR FABRICS

Wash and wear fabrics are still growing in popularity and this spring are even more abundant in clothing and yardage. Here are a few tips on wash and wear finishes.

Wash and wear finish on most fabrics is a resin treatment much like that on fabrics labeled crease resistant and water repellent. It is a kind of "built-in" quality that gives the fabric a neat look, and at the same time resists wrinkles and spots. But most important it reduces the labor of long tedious hours of ironing!

This finish may vary on different fibers. Used on cotton, man-made fibers, and blends, it may vary with the type of
