CAPITAL INVESTED PER WORKER

Here is an interesting note regarding the trend with reference to the amount of investment capital that is required to provide a job in industry today as compared to 10 and 20 years ago.

Average capital investment per production worker has risen by more than 80 per cent in the past decade, reflecting the fundamental role played by savings and investment in the American economy, according to data compiled by the National Industrial

The per worker capital investment figure at the middle of last year was estimated at \$16,000. The comparable figure was less than \$9,000 in 1948, when the post-World War II boom in plant and equipment expenditures was getting underway. Petroleum, tobacco and chemicals were the industries with the largest investment per production worker, according to the latest data.

It must be remembered that these figures are calculated on a nationwide basis and do not necessarily reflect a true picture for each locality. However, this gives folk from a small business community some food for thought. While the figure may be somewhat smaller than this average the capital investment per worker has risen in the small town in the same proportion as it has in hig business.

Twenty years ago it was reported that it required an investment of \$7,500 to provide one job. Ten years ago the figure jumped \$9,000 and today it is up to \$16,000.

You can use your own calculations in striking a happy medium between the \$9,000 of ten years ago and the present \$16,000 and see for yourself how much money it takes as capital investment to provide one job for a worker. Multiply that by the number of workers in any business and see what it amounts to.

The only way any business, large or small, can continue to provide jobs is for that business, large or small, to realize a profit om its operation.

U. S. Scientists to Give Moon Its Own Satellite?

WASHINGTON-Scientists have decided that the United St can send a rocket past the moon this autumn and m satellite around the moon sometime next year. The first rocket will carry radio equipment and instrument

ing the brief period it is near the moon, the instruments will me the moon's gravity and magnetic field.

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

> Answer: If a child of a deceased worker is legally adopted by his step-parent, grandparents, aunt or uncle, the child or children may continue to receive monthly survivors payments. If the child or children are legally adopted by anyone other than these relatives, the payments stop.

Question: I am 60 years old and will have to retire because of ill health. If I should qualify for disability benefits, would could expect at age 65?

Answer: No. If you meet the disability requirements, the amount of your benefit would not be reduced.





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
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
