## Mills County Voters Favor Yarborough, Daniel, White, Crump, Sudderth In Saturday Primary

### "Bill" Yarborough Nominated For County Judge Over John L. Patterson

#### Brooks Defeats Egger In Race For Commissioner

Mills County voters turned out 1710 strong in last Saturday's first democratic primary to vote for candidates of their choice. They favored Ralph W. Yarborough, Price Daniel, Joe Greenhill, Bill Allcorn, John C. White and Robert W. Hamilton in state and federal offices. In the district state offices they cast their vote in favor of Louis Crump and Ben D. Sudderth.

ant Governor. In the race for Land Commissioner Allcorn polled 1,373, Dimmitt 76. John C. White, Agriculture Commissioner, led the field with a safe margin when he polled 732 votes. For Associate Justice, supreme court, place 4, Joe Greenhill polled 668 and Sarah T. Hughes 652.

Ben D. Sudderth won over his opponent, George W. Eiland, in the race for state representative as he polled 1,098 to 370.

#### TWO OFFICES IN RUN-OFF PRIMARY

According to reports there are two offices that will be on the ballot in the run-off primary contest in Mills County August 23. They are Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1, and State Senator, 16th Senatorial district.

Louis Crump, San Saba and Joe B. Swanner, Brownwood, led the field in the race for nomination for state senator and will be in the run-off in August. Mills County votes for state senate candidate were: Kennedy, 123; Swanner, 381; Lewis, 246; and Crump, 680.

In the race for Associate Justice the county vote was: Smith 324; Hamilton 712 and Hunt 241.

Walter A. "Toby" Bryant, unopposed candidate for county-district clerk, received the highest number of votes when he polled 1710.

Members of the Mills County Breeders Association held their annual meeting last Thursday night at the show barns where they elected officers for the new year, set show dates and voted to have a joint show which will include the county 4-H and FHA exhibits.

R. L. Steen, president of the association, presided over the meeting.

All present officers were re-elected to serve for the coming year. They are R. L. Steen, president; Norman Duren, vice-president; Glynn Collier, treasurer; and Carl Casbeer, secretary.

The group set Friday and Saturday, December 19 and 20, as the dates for the next annual show.

Miss Lucy May Burrus, county home demonstration agent, and a committee from the HD council met with the group to discuss plans for a joint show which would include the 4-H and FHA

groups. It was agreed to have the joint show and President Steen is to appoint a committee to work with the ladies to work out details for the event.

The following superintendents were elected for the various divisions of the show. Willis Horton, cattle; Glynn Sanders, sheep; David Watters, goats; and Jack Dickson, hogs.

Charles Conradt was named chairman for arrangements, Vic E. Koleber will have charge of publicity.

The group voted to again publish their annual catalogue and left the matter of prices for advertising space up to the committee in charge of the project.

Hubert Berry was named chairman of the catalogue committee. Working with him will be the four VA teachers: Thurman Head, Goldthwaite, Dick Vestal, Priddy, Jack Dickson, Star, and Argie Whisenhunt, Mullin. Other members will be named in each community to serve on the committee.

Membership committee is composed of Everitt Holland, Charles Conradt, Hawley Jernigan and Delton Barnett.

George Reese will have charge of securing ribbons. The group voted to extend the ribbon awards and details for this are to be worked out by Reese and the Ag teachers.

Entry fees will be the same as last year and the deadline for entries will be December 1.

Malcolm Jernigan and Delton Barnett were named auctioneers and S. D. Jernigan, Ray Duren and Charlie McLean will make up the sales committee.

### New Postage Rates Effective August 1

The new postage rates which become effective August 1, according to announcement by Postmaster Lucile Fairman are as follows:

First Class Letters—4c an ounce.

Post and Postal Cards—3c each.

Airmail (not exceeding 8 ounces)—7c an ounce.

Air Post and Postal Cards—5c each.

Third Class Mail (including unsealed printed greeting cards)—3c for first 2 ounces; 1½c for each additional ounce.

Weight limit for third class mail is increased from 8 ounces to 16 ounces but not including 16 ounces.

Under the plan as discussed club members would have a flock of five or more lambs which would be fed under 4-H or FFA supervision. The lambs would be sheared about November 15 and placed on feed. The overall program would include feeding, grading and marketing.

The Mills County Breeders' Association voted last Thursday night to join the Lions Club in sponsoring the project.

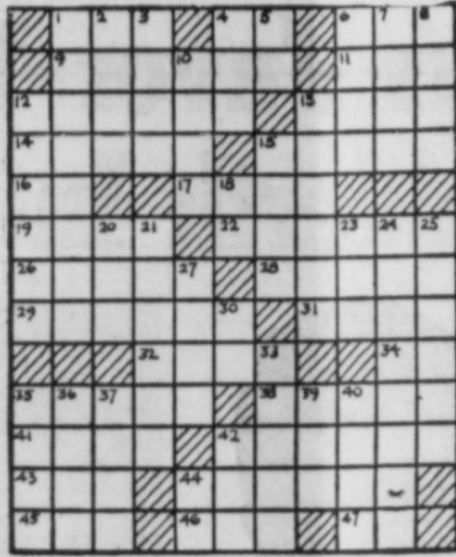

MARCH OF EVENTS

Assessing Russian Motives | U. S. Foreign  
Poses Most Difficult Problem | Makers Find Job

WASHINGTON—Perhaps the most difficult single problem facing the U. S. foreign policy makers is assessing Russian motives. This has been so since World War II, but with the advent of the atomic-missile age, it has grown in importance until it overshadows all U. S. planning in the diplomatic and defense fields. If a major war is to be avoided we must have extremely sound judgments of what the Russians are up to and how important that we know and act on their intentions.



Hungary's Negy

It is for these weighty reasons that Washington has taken a long second look at the shocking Russian announcement of the execution of former Hungarian Premier Imre Nagy who was killed despite solemn guarantees of safety.

The initial Washington reaction, from President Eisenhower personally, was that this act was a confidence of the world in the Soviet Union or intention to keep any promise, that the futility of a "summit" meeting.

While the administration has not publicly receded from this position, there is, nevertheless, a growing realization that the Soviet act of murder, callous as it was, is not to be equated with Russian desires for a summit meeting, and the relaxation of international tensions.

In fact, there is a growing feeling in Washington that the opposite is true, that Russia wants and needs settlement, at least a quieting in the cold war. The argument is that the execution, and the blatant form of its announcement, occurred in a time of deep unrest in some of the Soviet satellites.

This same unrest is believed to be pushing Russia toward quieting of the international waters, to give her time for mending at home and among her satellites.

• CUBAN KIDNAPERS—The Cuban rebels have now turned out of the Communists' book on how to alienate friends and enemies. They have taken to kidnaping American citizens.

This is an old Communist trick in Eastern Europe, and has been used for years since World War II in a futile effort to gain some kind of propaganda, or other advantage over the States. It never has worked, but East Germany currently is using the same old gambit again with the nine U. S. airmen who were forced down in their territory by a storm.

The Cubans actually have gone the eastern European route better. They have invaded American property installations to capture their hostages, and the number they have held captive has approached 60.

Their reason is to use the American hostages to win money that the U. S. government will not give assistance to the Fulgencio Batista's government. It is true that the American government has supplied the Cuban regime with some rockets for experimental purposes, agreed on before the rebels began their kidnaping activities. However, it is not true, as the rebels have charged, that Cuban planes being used in fighting the rebels have been serviced at the U. S. naval base at Guantanamo.

It is regrettable that American citizens should suffer and die at the hands of a band of mountain rebels, but it is faintly that United States policy will not be changed because of coercive kidnaping activity.

If anything, United States policy probably will harden toward the rebels because of these excesses.

RESOLVE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Article 10 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section...

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**  
HJR #17—Number Six on the Ballot.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17** proposing an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 66, to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions to certain retiring Texas Rangers and their widows; stating the maximum of such pension; and providing a fund from which such pensions may be paid.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section 66, to read as follows:

"Section 66. The Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as that retirement system was established by Chapter 853, Acts of the Fifty-fifth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, and who have had as much as two (2) years service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows; providing that no pension shall exceed Eighty Dollars (\$80) per month to any

such Texas Ranger or his widow, provided that such widow was legally married prior to January 1, 1951, to a Texas Ranger qualifying for such pension.

"These pensions may be paid only from the special fund created by Section 17, Article VII for a payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations, and the militia of the State of Texas, and for widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

The ice maker produces semi-circular disks of ice automatically, deposits them in a handy storage bin, then fills itself with water and freezes a new supply, repeating the process until an automatic control signals that the ice bin is filled.

Other features of the Imperial model include two glide-out aluminum shelves with safety stops, tilt-out compartments for butter and eggs, full width door shelves, adjustable cold control, twin porcelain enamel crisper drawers and porcelain enamel interior. **Information On GI Home Loans**

A veteran selling his home and GI mortgage should first contact the Veterans Administration if he wishes to be released from liability to the Government on his GI loan.

Such a release protects the veteran in the event the new purchaser defaults in payments, Dr. George T. McMahan, Manager of the VA Center in Waco, said today.

A 1956 law allows veterans to be released from liability to the Government, provided the new purchaser meets credit requirements and assumes the veteran's obligations to the Government on the GI loan. The new purchaser need not be a veteran, he pointed out, and the Government's guaranty of the loan is not affected by releasing the veteran from his liability.

In most states the only cost of obtaining the release is a small fee, usually not more than \$5, for a credit report on the proposed buyer, he said.

Release of the veteran from liability to the Government does not automatically release him from liability to the lender.

However, Dr. McMahan emphasized, VA will furnish the prospective buyer's credit report to the lender, and otherwise assist any veteran who wishes to seek

his lender's release. VA makes no charge for this service, Dr. McMahan said, although the lender may require the payment of a nominal fee

for the processing of the release. Veterans Administration office, Brownwood, is located at 207 Brown Street.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**  
SJR #4—Number Two on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31 proposing an amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 51-b of the Constitution of Texas, authorizing each county to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for elective officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, and providing for the submission of the amendment to the voters at the next general election, and providing for the necessary election, form of publication, and publication.

Section 1. That Subsection (b) of Section 51-b of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Each county shall have the power to provide for and administer a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for the appointive and elective officers and employees of the county or precinct, provided such fund shall at least equal the amount contributed by the county to such fund for the same purpose as the amount of such person shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7 1/2%) of the compensation paid to each such person."

"Each county shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment."

Section 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have notice of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas and laws of this state.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32 proposing an amendment to Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new subsection to be known as 51-a-1; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance on behalf of persons eligible for Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children as provided in Section 51-a of Article III and for persons eligible for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided in Article III, Section 51-b of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such payments; providing that the payments for such medical care shall be in addition to the direct or vendor payments for such purposes; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51-a-1, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51-a-1. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children as provided for in Section 51-a of Article III and on behalf of needy recipients of Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided for in Section 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas. The payments for such medical care on behalf of such recipients shall be in addition to the direct assistance to such recipients, and shall be such amount as may be provided by the Legislature."

HJR #31—Number Four on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas to provide that all county officials for whom four-year terms of office were authorized in 1954 must resign such office prior to announcing for a different office when more than one (1) year remains unexpired of the term for which they were elected, and providing for the filling of such vacancies in the manner now provided by law.

Section 1. Section 65 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 65. STAGGERING TERMS OF OFFICE.—The following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, and thereafter, shall serve for the full term provided in this Constitution: (a) District Clerks; (b) County Clerks; (c) County Judges; (d) Judges of County Courts at Law, County Criminal Courts, County Probate Courts and County Domestic Relations Courts; (e) County Treasurers; (f) Criminal District Attorneys; (g) County Surveyors; (h) Inspectors of Hides and Animals; (i) County Commissioners for Precincts Two and Four; (j) Justices of the Peace. "Notwithstanding other provisions of this Constitution, the following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, shall serve only for terms of two (2) years: (a) Sheriffs; (b) Assessors and Collectors of Taxes; (c) District Attorneys; (d) County Attorneys; (e) Public Weighers; (f) County Commissioners for Precincts One and Three; (g) Constables. At subsequent elections, such officers shall be elected for the full term provided in this Constitution. "In any district, county or precinct where any of the aforementioned officers is of such nature that two (2) or more persons hold such office, with the result that candidates file for 'Place No. 1,' 'Place No. 2,' etc., the officers

# NEWS from YOUR COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

**WARNED OF CHIGGERS**  
 Practically all Texas turkey growers face the possibility of chigger damage during the summer and fall months. Unfortunately, most flock-owners do not realize their birds are infested with chiggers until it is too late to do anything. An attempt is made to sell them at market time. Chiggers attach themselves to the skin in clus-

adult chigger hatches out in weedy or grassy areas and attaches himself to the bird. It remains on the bird for a period of three to eight days, then drops off to continue its life cycle on the ground. Because it takes two to five weeks for the scabs to heal the flock should be checked periodically as long as they remain on the range.

Since poultry is susceptible to insecticide poisoning, the best place to control chiggers is on the ground. If there is no practical way to keep the birds out of weedy or grassy areas, the range should be sprayed or dusted with one and one-half to two pounds actual toxaphene or chlordane or 25 (25 hundredths) pounds actual lindane per acre as a spray or dust. Since these materials are toxic, the birds should be removed from the treated area for at least seven days. Avoid contamination of feed, feed containers and water.

If birds can't be removed, the area may be dusted with 325-mesh flowers of sulfur at 40 to 50 pounds per acre. Mowing also will help hold down infestations.

**WALNUT CATERPILLARS**  
 I would like to remind you again that damaging numbers of walnut caterpillars are present on pecans in Mills County. That is especially true along the Colorado River. The insect is capable of causing extensive damage to pecans by partly or completely defoliating the trees. A large number of pecan trees were defoliated early by the walnut caterpillar, and in some areas the insects are so numerous the trees were defoliated a second time. Either a partial or complete defoliation of pecan trees during the growing season will almost always result in the loss of the whole pecan crop. The tree is also materially weakened and future crops may be seriously affected. Sun-scald on trees which have lost their foliage is also an ever present danger from the hot summer sun.

The insect overwinters as a pupa from 3 to 6 inches below the surface of the soil in the vicinity of the tree upon which it feeds. Emergence from this stage may be from April to August. The adults are brown colored moths with a wing spread of about 1 1/2 to 2 inches which lay their eggs in masses on the underside of the leaves. In 5 to 6 days the eggs hatch into young reddish white-striped worms with black heads. At maturity, generally about three weeks, the worms are about 2 inches long, the color has changed to black and they are covered with soft, long white hairs.

The walnut caterpillar may be controlled by spraying with a solution of DDT, malathion or lead arsenate. Use 3 pounds of DDT, malathion or lead arsenate per 100 gallons of water and

Mr. Hoyt Cockrell has already sprayed terraclor, at the rate of 10 pounds, on 20 acres of peanuts and 18 pounds on 8 acres of peanuts. He plans to apply 20 pounds of actual terraclor on all 20 acres. This is a new control for the southern blight that attacks peanuts and reduces the yields drastically.

The application of this material is still in the experimental stage. It seems as if we have the material to use for control but the means of application still need to be improved.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #30—Number Three on the Ballot.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas to require that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justice of the Peace be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Section 28 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 28. Vacancies in Offices of Judges of Superior Courts To Be Filled By The Governor.

"Vacancies in the office of Judges of the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the District Courts shall be filled by the Governor until the next succeeding General Election; and vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justice of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next succeeding General Election."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justice of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justice of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of said amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed amendment to be published in the manner required by law and shall cause said election to be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to require that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justice of the Peace be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to read as follows:

"Section 11. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become candidates for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

Sec. 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #1—Number One on the Ballot.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1** proposing an amendment to Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for annual sessions of the Legislature, changing the compensation, travel and travel expense of the Members of the Legislature, and the residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol, providing for an election, prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Legislature shall meet every year, under the condition and limitation hereinafter set forth, at such time as may be provided by law, and at other times when convened by the Governor.

"During the First Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January, 1959, and each succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the first thirty (30) days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, setting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty (30) days of the First Regular Session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty (60) days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths (4/5) of its membership.

"During the Second Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January 1960, and each succeeding two years thereafter, the Legislature shall be authorized to consider and act upon the following only:

"A. Make annual appropriations for the general operation of the State government; which appropriations may be passed by a majority vote of each House.

"B. Consider emergency matters submitted by the Governor; bills embodying such matters shall become law only if the same shall be passed by a two-thirds vote of the Members elected to Each House.

"Whenever the term 'Biennial Session' appears in Article 37 of this Constitution, it shall be construed to mean 'First Regular Session.'

"Any bill considered in the Second Regular Session of the Legislature must be introduced in the session of the Legislature to which it is referred by Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas as amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a salary of Seven Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) per annum and expenses of office, amount and manner as determined by law. The Legislature shall not provide for any per diem for any member thereof, except in the case of members who are called to temporary residence in the State Capitol during their term of office in such quarters and under such conditions as the Legislature may provide.

"Section 24a. In addition to other compensation provided herein, the Lieutenant Governor of the State of Texas and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to temporary residence in the State Capitol during their term of office in such quarters and under such conditions as the Legislature may provide.

"Section 24b. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for annual Sessions of the Legislature, prescribing the compensation and expenses for Members thereof, limiting the per diem for each Session, and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives in the Capitol."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for annual Sessions of the Legislature, prescribing the compensation and expenses for Members thereof, limiting the per diem for each Session, and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives in the Capitol."

WHAT ABOUT  
THE PEST SITUATION?

Some expressed opinions to the contrary, there are not armies of imported fire ants gnawing at the very steps of the Texas State Capitol Building nor are there frightened South Texas mothers guarding their cribs against hordes of rats which come in the night. The pest situation is not at such hair-raising proportions.

But we do have serious problems with fire ants, rats, and other of nature's pests which will cost Texas agriculture hundreds of thousands of dollars in damage alone in this critical area.

The imported fire ant, subject of a great deal of national notoriety during recent months, has established itself in eastern Texas, and a concerted effort is being made, through quarantine inspections of soil-bearing plants, to curb any further

westward movement. Where he finds a home, the fire ant builds its near-impenetrable mounds and makes misery for every creature that comes near. Results of the anti-ant push in recent weeks are encouraging.

Down in the Winter Garden area have appeared a number of nature's most unpredictable and most despicable pests — rats. Much too cagy for street-roaming, these vermin have taken to the fields, wreaking serious damage to melons, peanuts and other crops. This worst Texas rat infestation in forty years is being combated through the best known means of control through combined efforts of the U. S. Rodent Control Division, the State Health Department and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

On the West Texas plains it has been the grain-hungry grasshopper, and the fight against this prolific pest has

been a costly necessity this year. Spray units blanketed the Panhandle this summer to prevent the grasshopper from reaping man's harvest.

And there are others — at least one serious pest for every major commodity.

South Texas pecan growers, for instance, are uniting to fight the destructive walnut caterpillar which has forsaken his namesake in favor of the best of all edible nuts—the Texas pecan. Cotton farmers have the boll weevil and the pink bollworm to contend with.

There is no point in denying the annoying presence of unde-

sirable pests. The important thing is not to accept or give in to them. Because they can and will be coped with.

**ASC Committeemen To Be Elected By Farmers Through Mail Ballot**

The election of community Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committeemen in Mills County will be conducted by mail ballot again this year, according to an announcement this week by E. L. Burkett, Chairman of the county ASC committee.

Farmers in each community will elect a committee consisting of a chairman, vice chairman, and regular member. In addition, first and second alternates will be elected in each community.

The community committee chairman will also be the community delegate to the county convention. A county ASC committee consisting of a chairman, vice chairman, a regular member and two alternates will be elected at the county convention.

Voting for community committeemen will be done by mail, the same as in recent years, with the county ASC office sending a secret ballot and return envelope to every eligible voter on its records. Members of these committees are elected for one-year terms beginning October 1, 1958.

Supervision and direction of the election is in charge of a county election board composed of officially designated persons outside the ASC organization. This board consists of the following: George Reese, county agent, Chairman; Homer McCasland, Farm Bureau President; A. W. Cole, Farmers Home Administration supervisor; and Hubert Berry, Soil Conservation Technician.

The county election board will appoint an election board in each community, composed of three farmers who are not now ASC officers. Each community election board will nominate at least 10 candidates for community committeemen. In addition to the nominations of the community election boards, candidates may be nominated as late as Aug. 22, 1958, upon petition of 10 or more farmers. Voters may also write in the names of candidates on their ballots.

Any farm tenant, operator, or owner may vote in the community elections if he is now participating in or is eligible to participate in any of the programs administered by the county ASC committee.
