sider my salary in arriving at the net profit on which we will pay social security tax as selfemployed persons? Answer: The salary you re-

ceive may be deducted as a business expense for the partnership, but your salary will be added to your share of the profits and reported as a self-employment income on your income tax return. If the partnership does not make a profit, your salary is still net earnings from self-employment to the extent that it does not reduce your capital investment in the partnership.






