### Christmas Mail Expected To Hit Peak Next Few Days

With the expectation that the Christmas mail load will hit its peak within the next few days, Postmaster Lucie Fairman expressed her appreciation today for patrons' cooperation thus far in her annual "Mail Early For Christmas" Campaign.

The Postmaster said, "It's too late to talk about early mailing of Christmas gifts and cards, because time means everything now—even a few hours delay in getting your cards and gifts mailed may mean disappointment to your friends and loved ones on Christmas Day."

She suggests that last minute mailers use Air Mail for their Christmas cards or gifts that are going out of town. There's still time for local deliveries, but all Christmas cards should be sent by First Class mail. Be sure to include your return address on all Christmas card envelopes and package labels.

### Sheriff Stubblefield Issues Warnings For Busy Holiday Season

At this time of the year merchants and business men are warned to be on the lookout for hot check artists who are traveling through the country as the rush season gets underway. Sheriff C. F. (Stub) Stubblefield asks that everyone be on the watch for strangers wanting to cash checks.

He also warns all local service stations about buying tires or accessories from strangers. Through the cooperation of one of the local service station operators Mr. Stubblefield was able to apprehend an escaped convict from the Indiana State Prison and his woman companion last Friday, December 5. The escapee had been out for three weeks and had stolen cars in several states, selling tires and accessories off the cars in order to get gasoline and money to travel this distance.

Mr. Stubblefield also warns shoppers to lock their cars if they leave packages on the seats or to do the next best thing, "put your packages in the trunk of your car and lock it!"

Sheriff Stubblefield stated that he greatly appreciates the cooperation of all local people in the past and will appreciate their further consideration and cooperation in the future.

### Cotton Referendum Committees And Polling Places Have Been Selected

Community referendum committees who will be responsible for conducting the cotton marketing quota referendum throughout the county on December 15, 1958 have been selected by the Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. The Mullin Community Club is again sponsoring the annual Livestock Show at Mullin, on Saturday, December 20. The club met recently and made plans for the show. Around 100 head of livestock is expected to be exhibited, according to announcement by Argie Whisenhunt, VA teacher at Mullin.

There have been eight more classes added to the Sheep and Goat Show. Also premium money will be extended through the first five places on all classes.

No entry fee will be charged on the boys and girls entries.

The club is again offering a free barbecue lunch to those present at the show; the lunch will be served from 11:30 to 12:30. Everyone is invited to attend this show and enjoy the barbecue lunch. The ladies in and around Mullin have been furnishing the pies, cakes and cookies for the lunch each year. So, if you live in Mullin or surrounding area and would like to bring pies, cakes or cookies, the Mullin Community Club would appreciate it very much.

Judging of the livestock will begin at 1:00 p. m., starting with goats, breeding sheep, then hogs and fat lambs. In the breeding sheep show the following breeds will be present:

- 1—Delaine; 2—Rambouillet; 3—Corriedale; 4—Hampshire; 5—Shropshire; 6—Southdown; 7—Cheviot; and 8—Suffolk.

In the Fat Lamb Division four classes have been set up as follows:

- 1—Southdown and Southdown Crosses.
- 2—Shropshire and Shropshire Crosses.
- 3—Fine Wool.
- 4—Other Breeds and Crosses.

In the Hog Division there will be two classes of Barrows (light and heavy).

Two classes of Breeding Hogs are: 1—Gilts and 2—Sows.

There will also be two classes in the Goat division, as follows: 1—Doe Kids; and 2—Billy Kids.

The judges for the show will be A. D. Pettit for Sheep and Goats and C. H. Sargent for the Hogs. Mr. Pettit is the Agriculture teacher at Santa Anna and Mr. Sargent is the Agriculture teacher at Bangs.

Other officials of the show are as follows: Son Lee—Superintendent of Show; Melvin Pafford—Supt. of Sheep and Albert Spinks, Supt. of Hogs. The Barbecue Committee is composed of Bill Murray as Foods Chairman with Happy Heinrich, Andy Rowlett and Charm Whittenburg.

"Mark December 20 on your calendar as the date for the Mullin Livestock Show and be sure to come as we will be looking for you," stated Mr. Whisenhunt.

## BE CAREFUL IN PLACING, DECORATING, CHRISTMAS TREES

It is the night before Christmas . . . But not everyone sleeps. In fire stations there's an air of uneasy tension.

Fires at Christmas time are particularly tragic at this the happiest holiday of the year. On this most sentimental day thousands of homes and apartments are carelessly and unwittingly converted into dangerous fire traps—regardless of warnings by fire department officials and safety authorities.

Two years ago fires on Christmas eve killed 23 persons, most of them children, and in the four-day weekend last year took the lives of 54.

This year, for instance, the nation's fire losses may well be over a billion dollars, the death toll close to 10,800, according to the National Board of Fire Underwriters. Over 300,000 fires, the National Board declares, were in the home.

Among fires victims at Christmas time a year ago were a mother and four children in Meriden, Conn.; three brothers in Allagash Plantation, Me.; three sleeping children in Great Falls, Mont.; two small children in Phenix City, Ala.; a sleeping mother and five children in Ironwood, Mich.

You can save your life and you can prevent fires by observing the following suggestions offered at this time by the National Board:

- The Christmas tree is a potential fire hazard and caution should be taken in its selection, placement in the home, and maintenance.
- Play safe by choosing a small one. There will be 30 million on the market.
- Keep the tree outdoors until ready to set it up. While it's outdoors, occasionally throw water over it. This will keep it moist, fresh.
- When you bring the tree inside, cut the butt slantwise to open the pores, then stand it in a tub of water or moist earth.
- Be cautious of chemicals or other substances sold for "fire-proofing" trees. In some cases this process is ineffective.
- In placing the tree, it's best to avoid "hot spots" such as those near the fireplace, stove, television set, radiator, or electric bulbs.
- Never use untreated paper ornaments or untreated cotton batting or gauze for decoration. Cotton and gauze can be made flame-resistant by dipping in a gallon of water mixed with nine ounces of borax and four ounces of borac acid.
- Use only electric lights, never candles. Be sure, too, that wires are in good condition, and bear the UL mark denoting Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc., which shows they have been tested for safety. Frayed electric cords are a fire hazard.
- The switch for turning on the tree lights should be placed some distance from the tree. Never use an outlet or plug under the tree or run electric trains around the base.
- If decorations are used about the house, do not permit them around or near chairs and other places where people may smoke. It is preferable to have them near the ceiling, well above the head of anyone standing up.
- Keep plenty of ash trays handy during the holiday season, as always.
- If lights are desired in windows, never use candles. Keep curtains and other flammable material pulled back at least six inches from any electric light.
- Use non-flammable decorations of glass or metal, and "fireproof" snow in decorating your tree for Christmas.
- After you have opened your Christmas presents, remove all the gift wrapping and packing materials from your living room and dispose of them.

### FOOD FADS EXPOSED

A nation-wide educational campaign to alert the public to what is estimated as the "billion dollar food faddist racket" has been launched by the American Medical Association, the Federal Food and Drug Administration and the National Better Business Bureau. State and county medical societies are taking the lead in carrying out the campaign at local levels.

The campaign is aimed at nutritional quacks who operate through an appeal to fear and lure the unwary into buying their products by advancing myths such as: (1) all disease may be due to diet; (2) soil depletion causes malnutrition, and (3) all modern foods are low in nutrients.

At least 50,000 door-to-door lecturers are selling a variety of "worthless" products to a gullible public, say the sponsoring organizations. Oliver Field, director of the American Medical Association's Bureau of Investigation, warns that food supplement sales men, using a "you are what you eat" pitch, are selling at high costs their inexpensive-to-produce and ineffective combinations of peppermint tea, herbs, vegetables, vitamins and minerals.

Absurd health claims, Field says, are made for everything from sea kelp to irradiated peat moss. While the products themselves usually are harmless, great harm can result if the salesman leads the purchaser to believe they have power to cure disease—causing needed medical care to be postponed.

According to Dr. Kenneth Milstead, Food and Drug Adminis-

tration official, the food faddist "threatens the lives as well as the pocketbooks of our people." He adds that despite the high educational level of the American people, quackery and spurious schemes still thrive in all parts of the United States.

"The food faddist makes the old-time medicine man a small-time operator," says Dr. Milstead.

The American Medical Association points out in a pamphlet that nutritional foods are available for Americans in abundance. "There are no shortcuts to health," say authorities. "An adequate daily menu is the best road to health and should include (1) milk and dairy products, (2) vegetables and fruits, (3) meat, fowl, fish or eggs, and (4) bread and cereals."

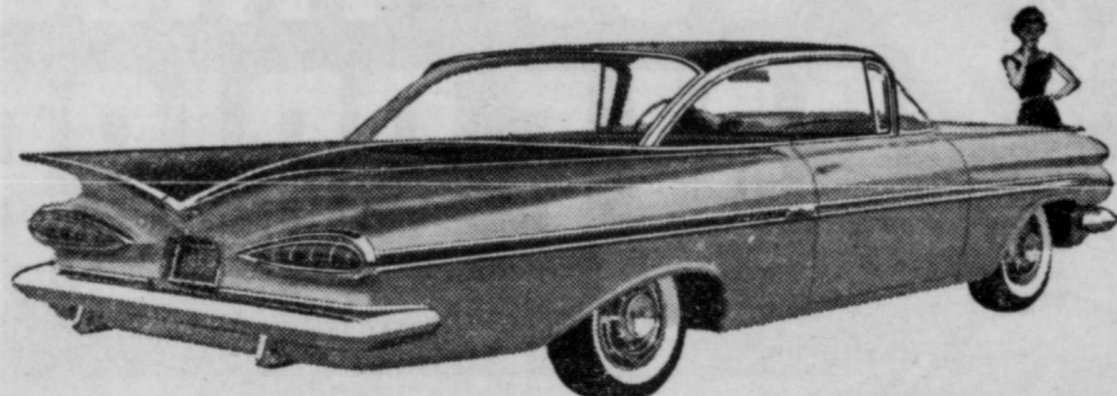

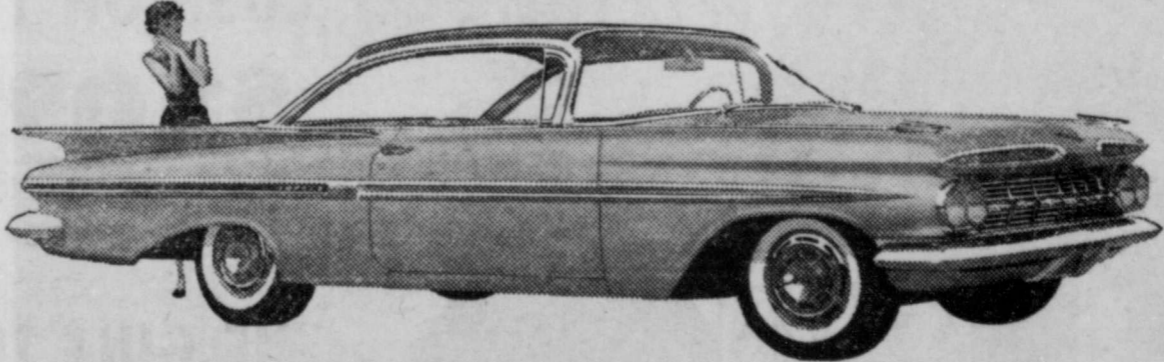

LEGISLATION—For safety in the years of the Governor's Highway Commission will ask the legislature to pass a six-year program.

in the program: (1) for driver education in public schools, (2) creation of courts of record to handle traffic violations, (3) use of chemical tests to determine intoxication,

(4) strengthening drivers license law, (5) revising and updating the uniform vehicle code and (6) increasing salaries for members of the Department of Public Safety and starting a program to bring the highway patrol to the national minimum standard of 1,600.

Essentially the same program also has been endorsed by the Texas Safety Association and the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers.

**SCHOOL REPORT COMPLETE**—Hale-Alkin Committee has completed its study and agreed—with some difficulty—on a proposed program for improving public schools.

Final report is 37 pages long, detailing improvements and expansions that would increase school spending by \$110,000,000 a year. Suggestions for upgrading the quality of public education include more days of school, more pay for teachers, driver education, special programs for the gifted, pre-school teaching of non-English speaking children, clerical assistance for teachers, etc.

Full final report will be printed within two or three weeks for distribution to legislators and interested citizens. Copies may be obtained from the Texas Education Agency, Austin.

**SCHOOL LAW TESTED**—Texas officials are studying carefully the similarities between Texas' and Alabama's pupil placement law.

U. S. Supreme Court declared the Alabama law constitutional "on its face." But the court indicated the law might later be considered unconstitutional in the way which it was applied.

Texas' pupil placement law, in the same general pattern, was passed in 1957, has never been tested in court. It allows local school officials to assign students to certain schools on the basis of 17 factors—apti-

tude, intelligence, home environment, personal conduct—almost everything except race.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson said all the court tests of similar laws are being watched. By the end of the year, he said, "we should know pretty well what the law is."

**PRISON FUNDS RUN SHORT**—Texas Board of Corrections will ask the Legislature for a half-million-dollar emergency appropriation to finish out the fiscal year.

Untimely fall rains caused heavy losses in the Prison System's cotton crop. Result is that the system, which pays more than half its own way with prison industries and agriculture, will run short by an estimated \$506,000 by Aug. 31.

Department of Corrections also will be asking for funds to expand its over-crowded facilities. Needed, says the Board, is \$9,050,000 to build two new units for prisoners and one tuberculosis unit.

**GO SLOW**—"Like pay for like work" is a great idea, says the Texas Public Employees Association. But its members, the state employees, are wary of any effort to put a job classification system into effect in a hurry.

TPEA says it will study carefully the job classification study made by the Texas Employment Commission at the request of the last Legislature. Employees said they might have some recommendations of their own by the time lawmakers meet.

TEC's study makes no salary recommendations but is simply an individual description of some 26,500 state jobs.

Some employees fear that attempts to adjust pay inequities between similar jobs would only result in more inequities. Others say the task of adjusting and supervising job classification would create another mushrooming, money-spending bureau.

**RE-TREAD FOR ROADS**—Texas Highway Commission has okayed a \$20,000,000 program for improving 3,061 miles of existing farm roads.

Age and heavy use has brought need for re-surfacing, bridge widening and shoulder replacement, said the commission.

Texas' farm-to-market road system has grown from 3,060 miles in 1958 to the present 28,203 miles.

**SHORT SHORTS**—Texas Independence Day Association has announced a \$280,000 program for improving Washington-on-the-Brazos State Park, site of the signing of the Texas Declaration of Independence. It hopes to raise the money priv-

## BY GEORGE G. REESE SHEEP INVENTOR-OUTLOOK

Sheep numbers are expected to be up about two million head on January 1, 1959 over January 1, 1958. By January sheep and lamb numbers are likely to total about 33½ million head. This will be our largest inventory since 1949. Texas alone will account for over 1/3 of this increase. This increase is due primarily to two reasons: The 1958 lamb crop showed about a four per cent increase over 1957 or an addition of almost one million head, whereas, the number slaughtered in 1958 was down about one million over the pre-

vious year. Lamb prices are expected to hold up well for the next few months. However, the impact of larger supplies of meat, especially pork, will likely cause a decline in lamb prices during the second half of 1959.

## COTTON ALLOTMENTS

Cotton growers will receive official notice of their 1959 acreage allotments for cotton in the next few days. Chairman Searcy M. Ferguson of the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee urges all growers to study Choice A and Choice B and if more information is needed to ask the local ASC office for the details. Ferguson also urges all eligible cotton growers to vote in the December 15 referendum on marketing quotas.

## BROILERS

If all of the broilers raised in the nation this year could be gathered into a single flock, the AMS estimates it would contain 1,600,000,000 birds. Ben Wormell, extension poultry husbandman, says that Texas growers furn-

## PREVENT RATHER THAN CURE SOIL COMPACTION

Excessive use of heavy machinery in farming operations tends to pack certain types of soil into unproductive hardpans or to form hard layers of soil just below plow depth. This condition cuts the soil's ability to absorb water at the surface as well as slows down the permeation into the subsoil. Too, in some cases normal root development in planted crops is restricted.

Once soils become compacted, the hard layers must be broken by subsolling, deep tillage or plant roots. But prevention is still the best way to deal with the problem.

Machine operations should be delayed if the soil is wet. Damage is frequently done shortly after rainy spells when farmers become alarmed about the lateness of the season or vigorous growth of weeds in cultivated crops. The soil's resistance to compaction can be increased by adding to its organic matter content through rotation with grass or pasture plants. Too, cover crops can be grown in off seasons and turned under as green manure before cultivated crops are planted.

Jack Barton, extension soil and water conservation specialist, suggests developing a minimum tillage system for the farm. That is, tilling the soil as little as possible. This, he says, requires judgment on the part of the operator.

For those who already have compacted soil, research is developing machinery and other means to meet the problem more effectively, under varying conditions. More attention to this problem is needed if we are to avoid permanent and serious injury to some of our best soils.

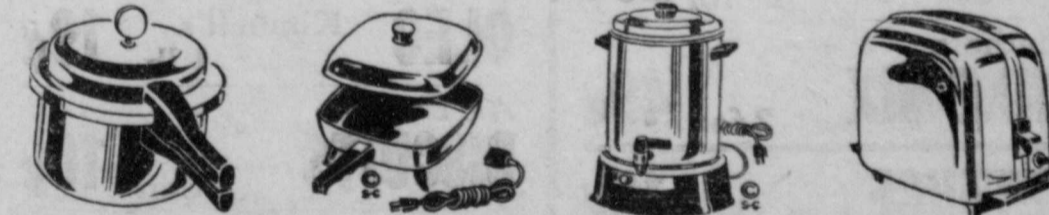

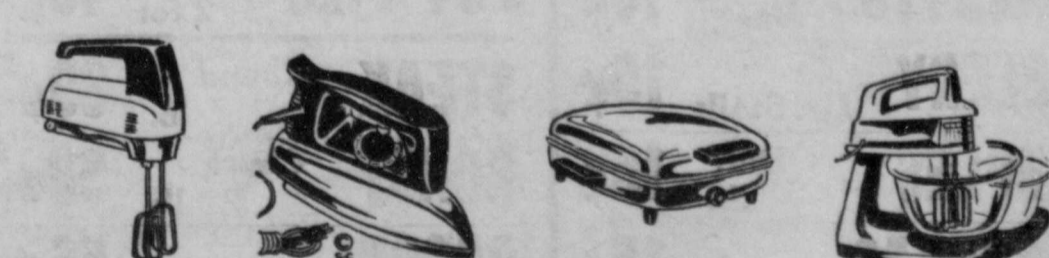

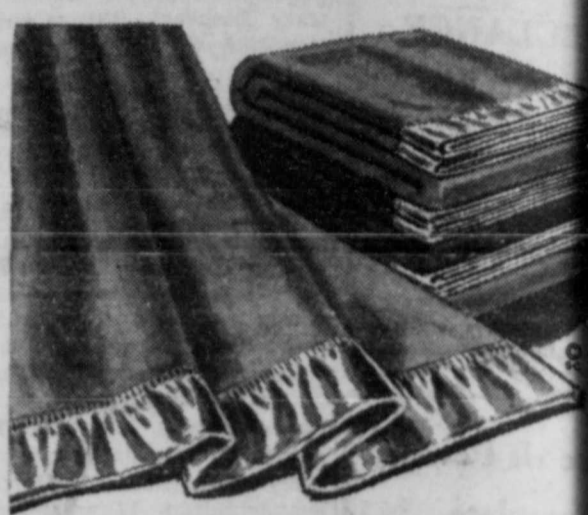
