

Mills County Retail Sales Show Increase

Report Released For Fiscal Year Ending June 30

New York, (Special to The Eagle)—Despite the recession, the level of income and spending in Mills County remained high in the fiscal year that ended June 30th, according to a new survey of business activity.

This economic strength is apparent from the volume of business registered by the local retail stores in the year.

The report, covering all parts of the county, has just been issued by the Standard Rate and Data Service. It is based on data gathered from Federal and state bureaus and from other sources.

Mills County retail merchants did a gross volume of \$5,921,000 in the 12-month period, it shows. The amount actually exceeded the \$5,712,000 mark set in the previous fiscal year, when there was no recession to cope with.

The gain, equal to 3.7 per cent, compares favorably with the record for the United States as a whole, a gain of 3.0 per cent. In the State of Texas there was a 3.5 per cent rise.

As in the past, the consumer proved to be the basic force in the local economy. He prevented the recession from developing into a full-blown depression by going right on buying.

Good earnings, on the average, made it possible. Although personal income, after taxes, declined during the first six months of the recession, it rose in the first half of this year. It is continuing upward as more people find jobs and as wage and pension boosts become effective.

Mills County residents had a net income, after taxes, of \$5,113,000 in the fiscal year, the survey shows.

Divided by the number of households locally, it amounted to a disposable income of \$3,432 per household.

This was more than was available per household locally in the prior year, \$3,381.

That the county is the trading hub for a wide area is seen in the excess of sales over earnings.

Now, with the upturn an established fact, powerful forces for expansion are being released. The public mood of confidence is being expressed through stepped-up spending along a broad front.

Hospital Investments To Close January 10

Citizens of Mills County and surrounding area who are interested in making an investment in the new Childress Hospital and Clinic will have until January 10, to do so, it was announced over the weekend by Dr. M. A. Childress.

On that date the investment part of the hospital financing project will be closed. After that date only prepaid hospitalization will be available to parties who are interested in contributing. Dr. Childress stated.

When Dr. Childress announced plans for building the new

hospital and clinic here he stated that in addition to family financing there would be an opening for interested parties to invest in the project on an interest bearing basis, or prepaid hospitalization.

A large number of interested citizens have taken part by investing while a number also have contributed for prepaid hospitalization.

When the program started it was hoped that about \$35 thousand would be contributed toward the investment fund. Dr. Childress has announced that

\$30 thousand has been paid in to date. A number of parties have indicated their interest or pledged to invest but have not made their payment to date. They will have until Saturday, January 10, to pay in their money as an interest bearing investment. It is hoped that an additional \$5 thousand will come in before the closing date.

Contract for construction of the 6,000 square foot hospital and clinic was let in November to W. H. Barsh, Waco, for \$70,111. Construction is moving along on schedule at this time and the building is expected to be completed within the required number of day.

The hospital is located on the corner of north Parker at Second Street. It will be a Roman brick structure completely air-conditioned and featuring the latest and newest requirements as approved by the State Health Department.

Several years of planning have gone into the project which will have facilities and accommodations for two doctors.

When the hospital and clinic

get into full operation it will require 10 or more employees and provide an annual payroll of from 30 to 35 thousand dollars.

BLACKEYE PEAS FOR NEW YEAR'S DAY

Many Texans have eaten blackeye peas for good luck on New Year's Day. These peas bring more than good luck because they are good food bargains budget-wise and nutrition-wise.

A pound of blackeye peas will provide seven to nine servings. Peas provide carbohydrate, which the body uses for energy, and contain some B vitamins. Nuggets of mineral value, they contain iron and calcium along with useful vegetable protein, which the body uses to build and repair organs and tissues.

Dried blackeye peas need to be soaked before they are cooked. A quick and effective way to do this is to start by boiling them for 2 minutes. Then remove from heat, soak 1 hour in the same water and cook until tender. This usually take one hour. The recipe below will serve 4 to 5 people.

1 cup dried blackeye peas
1 teaspoon salt
2½ cups boiling water

DRYING GRAIN WITH SOLAR ENERGY

A practical way has been found for drying grain with energy from the sun. It is a relatively simple method of converting an unheated-air grain-drying system into a heated-air operation without the necessity of artificial heat. Here's how!

Begin by fastening plywood to the underside of the grain bin roof rafters, leaving an open space about five inches thick. Then paint the bin roof black. The roof absorbs the sun's heat and the 5-inch thick area collects it. Next, reverse the bin fan, pulling the warm air down through the wet grain.

What are the results? On a 70-degree day, with bright sunshine, temperature of the air drawn through the roof "heater" was about 85 degrees. The 15-degree difference is the key to the whole system. Each cubic foot of the 85-degree air takes about twice as much moisture out of wet grain as the same amount of 70-degree air.

If the sun doesn't shine, keep the fan running to cool the grain until it does. In tests, engineers dried shelled corn down from 21% to 14% moisture content with only 3 sunny days out of 23 that it was in storage.

HAULING MILK IN A BAG

A giant rubber-fabric container resembling an over-sized tooth paste tube offers big promise of cost saving for dairymen. Called "Sealdank," it has been developed by joint effort of the rubber, trucking and dairy industries, and measures 56 inches in diameter, 35 feet long and holds 3,800 gallons of milk. When empty, the container lies flat or can be rolled into a compact package.

Sealdank means that for the first time a dry-liquid two-way haul can be accomplished transporting dry cargo in one direction and liquid cargo on a return trip—in the same standard trailer or truck. The upshot is that it converts thous-

ands of trucks, railroad box cars and gondola cars into a

potential liquid carrier of milk. "Bagged milk" may mean a saving in cost of getting milk to market. Since the milk can be hauled on the regularly scheduled run of a common motor carrier, rates need only cover the actual cost of the milk haul, an estimated saving of 20% more.

Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: Can a disabled child past age 18 receive benefits from the social security account of his parent who is getting social security disability payments?

Answer: If the child was disabled before age 18 and is unmarried and dependent on a parent, who is receiving either retirement or disability payments, he may be eligible for benefits.

Question: I am unmarried and live with my parents whom I support. They are both past age 65. I have been told there are family benefits under social security. What would my parents get upon my retirement or if I should die?

Answer: There will be no benefits to your parents in the event of your death, even if you are the sole support of your aged parents, they may be eligible for parents' benefits. It will be necessary for each of them to file an application and present proof of age and dependency.
