Lamb Imports Could Deal Real Blow To Texas Sheep Industry

The announcement in recent days about U. S. Packers reportedly importing 350 to 400 thousand dressed carcasses of lamb for the U. S. market has caused real concern in Mills County and all Central and West Texas.

According to reports the lamb is being imported from Australia and New Zealand at a cost of 15c per pound. Water freight reported costs approximately 4½ cents per pound and duty 3½ cents per pound, making the total cost approximately 23 cents per pound delivered in the States.

Reliable local sources say that this price is about one half the cost of domestic lamb produced in the States.

All Central and West Texas as well as all other sheep producing states will be vitally effected if this trend of importing lamb grows.

Local sheepmen are urging all interested citizens to study the matter and to write their Congressman and Senators to ask for protective legislation for the industry.

Reports from local sheepmen show that with present high cost of feed, labor, equipment, repairs and living costs, our domestic grower cannot produce lambs for less than 22 cents per pound live today.

The sheep industry plays a most important part in the Mills County economy and an increased program of importing lamb would be a heavy blow to the local economy.

J. D. Nabors, Brownwood, has been elected as a representative for the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association and is in Washington now to check on the situation.

Mills County Bank Deposits Show Increase

Bank deposits in Mills County show a healthy increase over a year ago according to official call bank statement issued this week by Mills County State Bank.

Total deposits of Mills County State Bank were \$433,141.25 higher on December 31, 1958 than they were on the same date in 1957. The statement as of December 31 shows deposits in Mills County State Bank \$3,857,348.32 while on December 31, 1957 deposits were \$3,424,207.07.

Loans also show an increase with the total at the time of this call \$178,628.38 higher than on December 31, 1957.

The privately owned Farmers and Merchants Bank, Priddy, had \$271,365.63 on deposit as of December 31.

Total deposits for the two Mills County banks as reflected in statements appearing in this issue are \$4,128,713.95 while total resources are \$4,496,992.33.

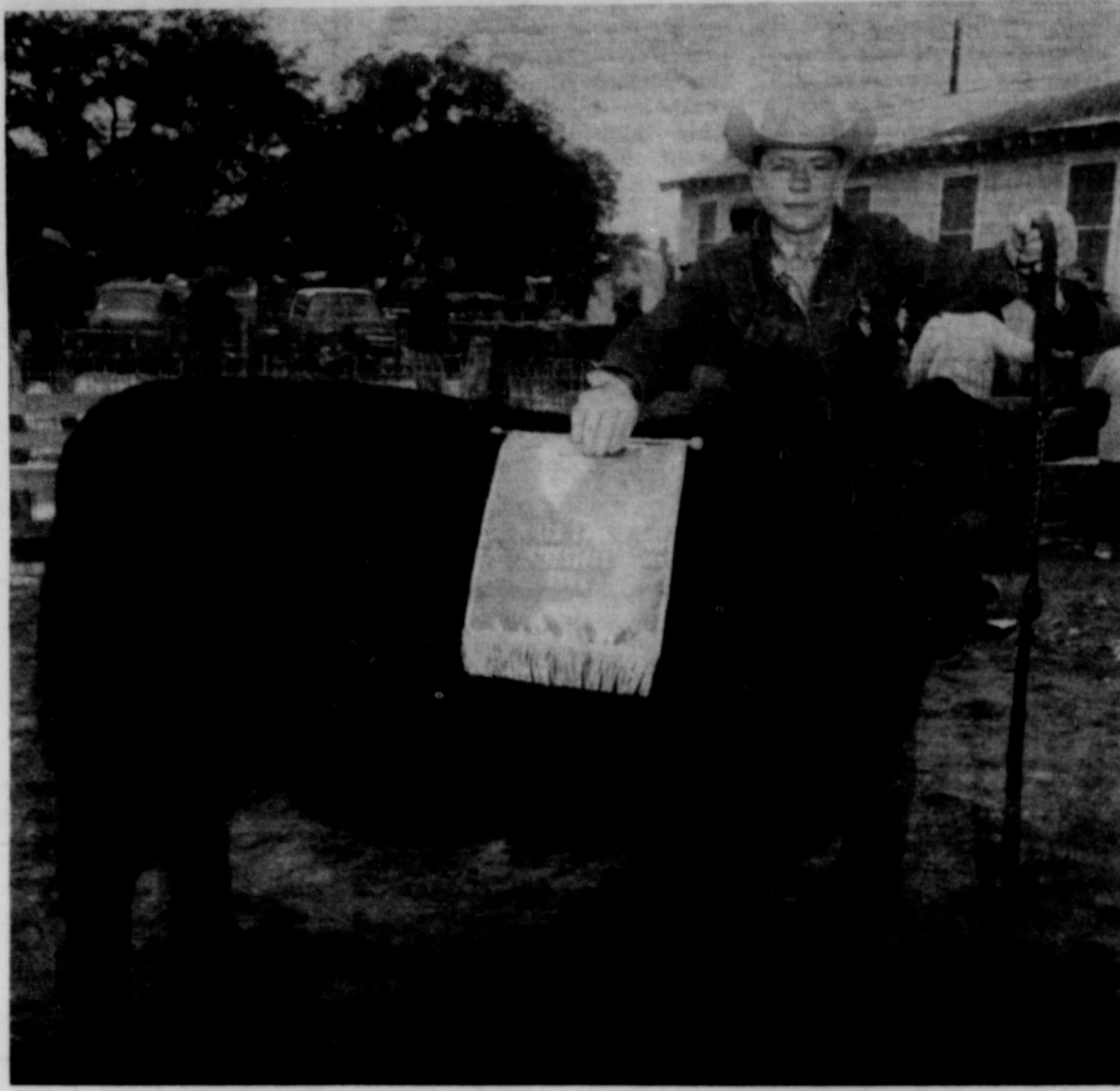
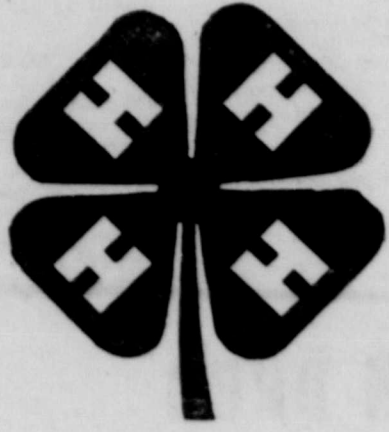

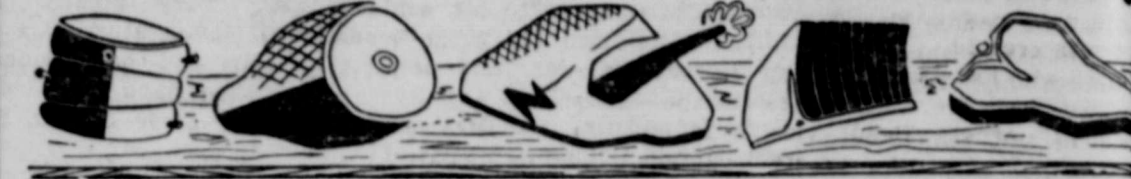

Election For Directors Of WCID, Is Tuesday

Interested Parties Urged To Make Contribution To Defray Expenses

Qualified resident property paying voters of Mills County Water Control And Improvement District No. 1, will go to polls Tuesday and elect five directors. This improvement project is more commonly known to Mills County residents as the Bennett Creek Watershed project or district. The election will be held in the Christian Fellowship Center of the Methodist Church at 8 a. m. to 7. p. m. Meeting officials are Ercher Casland, presiding judge, January Boykin, assistant member, Hardy Collier and Rev. T. M. Mitchell, clerks.

This is the first regular election of the district to name a board of directors. Directors who have served the past year were appointed by the Commissioners' Court as provided by law when the district was created.

Those who have served during the past year are: Jim Soules, president, Arnold Head, vice-president, J. S. Owens, secretary, and Bertram Geeslin and Homer McCasland, members.

There are seven candidates whose names appear on the ballot. Five are to be elected. Names on the ballot are: Bertram Geeslin, Arnold Head, Homer McCasland, J. S. Owens, Jim Soules, W. M. Tubbs and T. J.

Watson. The three candidates receiving the highest number of votes will be elected for a two year term of office while the two others will serve for one year. At the next election two directors will be named and the following year three will be elected, all serving two year terms.

CONTRIBUTIONS NEEDED FOR EXPENSE FUND
Although voters of the district approved a \$5,000 bond issue for preliminary expenses of the district the present board of directors has issued no bonds to date.

Board members and other interested parties have contributed personally to help defray expenses and keep from issuing bonds at this time.

Officials are requesting a few more interested parties to come forth and make a contribution to the fund so that it will not be necessary to issue the bonds and start a tax levy on property in the district.

If enough interested parties will kick in a few dollars officers hope to get by for some time without issuing bonds, they stated.

SMALL GRAIN PESTS

A survey covering the principal small grain growing areas of the State shows that greenbugs are becoming quite abundant in some fields south of Amarillo and on the South Plains. Extension Entomologists C. F. Garner and J. H. Hawkins report the survey showed infestations ranging from 5 to 20 greenbugs per linear foot in fields north of Lubbock.

They also noted that a good population of predatory insects was present. They pointed out that the reproduction and feeding abilities of these beneficial insects are greatly reduced when temperatures are 65 degrees F. and that greenbugs, on the other hand, are able to reproduce at 40 degrees F. temperature.

The entomologists advise wheat growers in the area to make periodic checks of their fields in order to keep a close watch for greenbugs. Control measures, they say, should be applied when the average number of greenbugs in fall-sown small grain reaches 100 per linear foot at any time before the boot stage. High populations do more damage early in the season.

Control measures may be warranted in very young wheat and spring-seeded grains when greenbug population of 25 and 50 insects per linear foot are reached.

The entomologists said that winter grain mites were found in many Central Texas counties and in Kerr and Kendall counties, but damage was not ap-

parent. These pests were described as capable of reducing or even destroying a stand of grain. Brown wheat mites were found on only one farm.

Garner and Hawkins said insecticides are available which will control the greenbugs and mites should populations increase enough to warrant their use.

Supplemental Feeding Advised For Stocker Calves On Pasture

The high prices which have been paid for stocker cattle makes high winter gains a must, say U. D. Thompson and John H. Jones, extension animal husbandmen. They advise stockmen that the early cold weather has not only delayed the development of small grains, reduce rye and Texas winter grasses but has also dehydrated these plants. Thus, their grazing value has been reduced.

High winter gains are needed, point out the specialists, to help reduce the original cost of the animals and also to insure favorable returns at market time. Too, they say that younger cattle are efficient users of concentrate feeds.

The use of up to six pounds of concentrate feed per head daily as a supplement to hay or pasture, according to Thompson and Jones, will practically insure the needed winter gains. If sufficient green grazing is available, the only supplement needed would be six pounds of ground sorghum grain or ground ear corn.

Where green grazing is limited and cattle are on native pasture and sorghum stubble, the animal husbandmen recommended that one pound of cake or meal be fed along with five pounds of either of the above named ground grains.

They point out that this limited method of feeding will insure high rates of gain, one to two pounds daily, which are advisable under the present conditions and those expected for 1959.

Eight fat calves will leave Mills County on January 3rd for the Sand Hills Hereford Show at Odessa. These Hereford steers will be shown by Charles Cornelius, Jerry Duren, Alvin Glenn Tiemann, Leo Reynolds, Wayne Poe and Billy Roy Gholson. These steers will be judged on January 8th and sold on Saturday, the 10th of January.

The opportune time to sod waterways with bermuda grass is from now until March. Whether you use coastal or the common variety of bermuda, the sod should be completely covered when put down during the cold dormant season. Results are ordinarily much better if this procedure is followed than if seeded or sodded after the ground becomes warm in the spring. Many times the soil dries out too quickly during the warm windy spring for good results.

Farmers planning to plant perennial grasses in the spring should begin now to get their land ready. Soil prepared for row type grasses such as blue panic and sorghum alnum should be bedded now. This will permit maximum efficiency in storing winter moisture. Adapted native grass seed should be located well in advance of planting time. Invariably quality seed of a local variety are scarce. Check with your feed dealer or the S. C. S. office for seed sources.
