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

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

Approximately \$50,000 has been spent in developing Camp Wood Lake. The money for the most part, has come from the Annual Girl Scout Cookie Sale, conducted by the girls themselves. The camp will accommodate 48 campers per week. All fly-up Brownies, Intermediates, and Senior scouts are eligible to attend. One and two-week sessions are offered.

Camp program is planned by the girls under the guidance of their counselors. Swimming and boating instruction is a regularly scheduled activity with a certified Red Cross Instructor in charge. Other activities consist of archery, natural crafts, dramatics, singing, games, skiing, cookouts, and over-nights,

The Girl Scouts were among the first to establish high standards of health and safety in camping. Today the Girl Scouts are acknowledged leaders in good camping practices. Their national standards are founded on the best experience of local camps, and on the recommendations of the American National Red Cross and state and Federal health departments. Locally and nationally there is active cooperation with the American Camping Association to maintain these high standards.

"A MEMORIAL DAY FOR PREACHERS" I Thess, 5-25-Brethren pray for us.




