MORE CONSIDERATION NEEDED-As the Wall Street Journal observes, the labor bill passed by the Senate and sent to the House "is neither the Kennedy bill, nor the Administration bill, nor is it a McClellan bill. It is a product of many minds, hammered out on the anvil of compromise, and its value may be gauged by the view many Senators hold of it: "It will wholly please neither labor nor management." On balance, the paper adds: "The public interest is better served by this measure than if there were no new labor laws at all." At the same time, it would seem that the public interest deserves a good deal more consideration than the Senate bill provides.

At a press conference, President Eisenhower pointed to grave weaknesses that still remain in the blil-namely, the failure to curb secondary boycotts, the failure to outlaw blackmail picketing, and the failure to clarify the no-man's area where the authority of the National Labor Relations Board and that of the states meet in cloudy confusion. The President said that he was very disappointed in the bill as approved by the Senate, and that he hoped the House will rectify the weaknesses.

Last year the House did the nation a great service by voting down a woefully weak labor bill that had been virtually railroaded through the Senate, with next to no time allowed for analysis and testimony. The House can perform another great service by following the President's reasoned proposals on this year's bill.

HOW MUCH MORE TAXES?-Just how much additional tax burden can the people of this country stand?

This is no idle question. State and local taxes are soaring. And current proposals would swell the federal tax bite by heavy amounts

Take, for instance, the plan to provide government medical and nursing home payments for elderly people through the Social Security System. It would be financed by raising the Social Security taxes on both employes and employers.

The cost of the program, according to the Health Insurance Association of America, would be \$1,883,000,000 a year. Another estimate, from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, places the bill at more than \$1 billion a year. Incidentally, this report is of a factual character, and makes no recommendations. But it does include a significant statement-that "in our society the existence of a problem does not necessarily indicate that action by the federal government is desirable." The intimation is that the Department is highly dubious of the virtues of the proposal.

Here's how the vote adds up: 55% want total abandonment of supports and controls, and a return to the free market; 15% favor supports on an emergency basis only; 8% want adjustment supports which would permit a gradular return to normal markets over a period of time. In sum, therefore, 78% favor plans calling either for no support or for less support.

For the answer as to why farm land prices are out of reason for farming purposes, most people concerned have named mineral activity. Mineral value in land for sale, however, is mostly speculative, because once minerals are found on a parcel of land, production begins and the land involved is practically frozen in ownership and is removed from the land market.
