Wool Markets
 The sheep sale at the Mills County Commission Company showed a slight decrease in the number of head last Friday with a total of 7,717 head sold. At the goat sale on Monday of this week a total of 3,000 passed through the ring, an increase of nearly 100 head from the week before.

Market prices were variable in all classes of sheep and goats.

Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: I am 40 years old and was injured in an accident which kept me off work for 8 months. Can I draw social security benefits for that period?

Answer: No. Benefits are not payable for a temporary disability. Also, benefits are not paid to a disabled wage earner who is under 50 years of age, and not paid earlier than the sixth month of his disability.

Question: I am getting checks for social security because my husband died three years ago. What happens to my checks if I marry?

Answer: If you remarry, the checks you receive as a widow end. However, if you marry a man who is now receiving social security, you will be able to receive wife's benefits from his social security account immediately. If the man you marry is not now receiving social security, your payments will stop but you may be able to qualify at a later date for benefits from his social security record if he qualifies.

Drive Started To Boost Egg Prices

A stepped-up drive to increase the consumption of eggs has been undertaken jointly by the poultry industry and the Government in order to strengthen market prices, according to a U. S. Department of Agriculture announcement received at the Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office.

The egg marketing campaign is the result of a recent special meeting of poultry industry, food trade and Government representatives. The meeting was called by Secretary of Agriculture Benson to take steps to strengthen egg markets currently burdened with unusually heavy supplies.

The Department of Agriculture said egg production from January through April this year was nearly 6 per cent greater than a year earlier. As of May 1, the Nation's laying flock was almost 3 per cent larger than a year earlier and the rate of lay was slightly higher also. It is expected that a considerable increase in the demand for eggs will be required to absorb the extra production, and strengthen the prices farmers get for eggs.

Bank Call Shows Big Gain In Deposits And Total Resources

The statement of financial condition of Mills County State Bank as of Wednesday, June 10 shows a big increase in deposits and total resources over a year ago.

Condensed statement appears on another page of this issue. Total resources as of June 10, were \$4,465,864.70 as compared to \$4,041,702.90 when statement of condition was published for June 23, 1958.

Loans and discounts on June 10, 1959 were \$1,977,603.72 while a year ago loans and discounts were \$1,691,632.81.

Deposits as reflected in this latest statement were \$3,908,-

763.22 compared with \$3,730,-726.94 a year ago.

This report showing substantial gains in deposits, loans and discounts and total resources of the bank indicates a generally good or healthy financial condition for Mills County, according to W. P. Duren, president of Mills County State Bank.

In comparing the statement just released and the one of last year with statement of condition in July, 1952 there is a surprising overall increase.

In July 1952 deposits were \$2,536,282.86; loans and discounts, \$1,135,071.58; total resources were \$2,728,752.47.

Mayfield Family Leaves June 14 For Tour Of Europe And Holy Land

CONROE, Texas (Special)—A family of the First Baptist Church in Conroe is making possible a trip of a life-time for Pastor Rev. Ray V. Mayfield Jr., and his family. Through the generosity of this couple, the Mayfields left June 14th on a six-week tour that will carry them through Southern Europe, the Near East and Central Europe. The Mayfields moved to Conroe from Goldthwaite where

he was pastor of the First Baptist Church for several years.

The Mayfield children, Kathy, 10 and Ray III, 6 (Trippi) are wide-eyed with anticipation of such a story-book trip which will go through Portugal, Spain, Southern France, Central Italy, Greece, Egypt, Lebanon, Syria, Jordan, Israel, Northern Italy, Switzerland, Central France, Belgium, Holland and England.

The local radio station in Conroe has provided a transistor powered, miniature tape recorder for the Mayfields to carry on their trip. At various places of interest during the trip, an on-the-spot recording will be made, describing local points of interest and interviews with some of the citizenry. The tape will then be air-mailed to KMCO which will run a series of these tapes week-days following the Noon local news.

One of the major purposes of the trip, however is to make color slides of places of interest in the Holy Land. Three series of slide sets are being planned, including a set dealing with the Holy Land itself, entitled "Walking Where Jesus Walked", then a set depicting Southern Baptist Mission work along the itinerary, and finally a set describing places of culture and historical interest.

In the six Sundays of his absence, Pastor Mayfield has arranged for Dr. Kyle M. Yates, Distinguished Professor of Religion at Baylor University to preach the first three Sundays; and for Dr. W. J. Wimpee, Chaplain of Baylor University to preach the last three Sundays. The Mayfields will return to Conroe on or about August 1st.

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TEN MISTAKES—An elderly gentleman was asked what he considered the ten most important errors in life. Here is the list he compiled.

1. To set up your own standard of what is right and what is wrong, and to expect everybody else to live up to it.
2. To try to measure the enjoyment of others by your own.
3. To expect uniformity of opinion.
4. To look for judgment and experience in those not old enough or experienced enough to have acquired them.
5. To attempt to mold all peoples' dispositions alike.
6. To refuse to yield or compromise on trifles.
7. To demand perfection from all your actions.
8. To worry, and to worry others, about things which cannot be remedied.
9. To believe only what the finite and limited mind can grasp.
10. To live as if the moment, the time, the day were so important that they would go on forever.

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TWELVE RULES FOR RAISING DELINQUENT CHILDREN—The following 12 rules were reportedly prepared by the Police Department of Houston on the subject of raising delinquent children.

1. Begin with infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up to believe the world owes him a living.
2. When he picks up bad words, laugh at him. This will make him think he's cute. It will also encourage him to pick up "cuter" phrases that will blow off the top of your head later.
3. Never give him any spiritual training. Wait till he is 21 and then let him "decide for himself."
4. Avoid use of the word "wrong." It may develop a guilt complex. This will condition him to believe, later, when he is arrested for stealing a car, that society is against him and he is being persecuted.
5. Pick up everything he leaves lying around—books, shoes and clothing. Do everything for him so that he will be experienced in throwing all responsibility on to others.
6. Let him read any printed matter he can get his hands on. Be careful that the silverware and drinking glasses are sterilized, but let his mind feast on garbage.
7. Quarrel frequently in the presence of your children. In this way they will not be too shocked when the home is broken up later.
8. Give a child all the spending money he wants. Never let him earn his own. Why should he have things as tough as you had them?
9. Satisfy his every craving for food, drink, and comfort. See that every sensual desire is gratified. Denial may lead to harmful frustration.
10. Take his part against neighbors, teachers and policemen. They are all prejudiced against your child.
11. When he gets into real trouble, apologize for yourself by saying "I never could do anything with him."
12. Prepare for a life of grief. You will be apt to have it.

Not a very pleasant subject to talk about, but, one must agree that the 12 rules, if read and studied, contain some pretty pointed facts that can and should be heeded.
