## Walton Twins Awarded Eagle Badges In Scouting By Col. H. C. Newcomer

TOUL ROSIERES AIR FORCE BASE, France (Spl.)—A surprise packed banquet for Boy Scouts of Toul Rosieres AB was highlighted by presentations of five top scouting awards to members of the base's Troop No. 57.

Eagle Scout ratings, the highest rate possible in Boy Scouts, and Silver Awards were presented to three Explorer Scouts, Robert Walton, Roy Walton and Gary Smith. Air Scouts Clifford Meier and Robert Nipper received Silver Awards.

The quintet earned the awards nearly a year ago and had lost hope of receiving accreditation. Lt. Col. Raymond E. Smith, deputy base commander and institutional representative of Boy Scout Troop 57, and other Scout leaders here, had made numerous trips to Heidelberg, Germany (headquarters of overseas Boy Scouts) but it still took a year to obtain the Eagle and Silver awards.

At the banquet, which was arranged "for Boy Scouts soon leaving Toul Rosieres," the Explorers were obviously surprised when SM-Sgt. Robert Walton, advisor, unveiled a table which contained the badges and medals. Also taken by surprise, was Lt. Col. Smith who was given a special plaque recognizing his support of the base Scout program.

Air Scout Gary Smith, son of Lt. Col. Smith, is now equal to his father in American Boy Scouting—both held Eagle rates. All Scouts met the 21 merit badge requirements for Eagle, but Gary holds the highest number of badges—26. Sixteen-year-old twins Roy and Robert Walton, earned 23 and 22 badges.

Wing Commander Col. Henry C. Newcomer, congratulated the Scouts and gave the Eagles their insignia. Director of 50th Ops, Col. Richard C. Banbury, presented Silver Awards, remarking, "To my knowledge, this is the first time any members of Troop 57 have earned Eagle or Silver awards."

A-1c Thomas Willoughby, Troop 57 advisor, said he had not learned of any troop, especially in Europe, upgrading so many Scouts to Eagles simultaneously.

## Vote Set For 1960 Wheat Quota

As required by present law, a marketing quota referendum has been announced for 1960. Chairman E. L. Burkett of the Mills County Agricultural and Conservation Committee announced today.

Marketing quotas for the wheat crop have been proposed by the Secretary of Agriculture.

As required by legislation whenever the available supply of wheat is more than 20 percent above the normal supply. However, quotas will not become effective unless they are approved by at least two-thirds of the products voting in the referendum.

If quotas are approved for the

1960 wheat crop, it will mark the seventh consecutive year they have been used for wheat. Wheat quotas and acreage allotments apply in the 39 so-called "commercial" wheat States, of which Texas is one.

The present law, the Chairman explained, states that, to be eligible to vote in the referendum, a grower must expect to have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1960. A wheat grower who signs an application under the feed wheat provision permitting him to produce up to 30 acres of wheat as feed on his farm will not be eligible to vote. Every wheat grower will be informed of the individual wheat allotment for his farm in advance of the referendum date.

As usual, Chairman Burkett says, the ASC committee will set up polling places throughout the county for the convenience of farmers in voting. Location will be announced later by the county ASC office.

If quotas are approved in the referendum, the present law provides that farmers who comply with their wheat acreage allotments will be eligible to market all their wheat without restriction. A grower who exceeds his

allotment will be subject to marketing quota penalties on his excess wheat if he has more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain. If quotas are not approved, there will be no restrictions on wheat marketings.

## Mr. and Mrs. Bob Johnson Purchase Steam Laundry; To Open Washateria

The Goldthwaite Steam Laundry property to Mr. and Mrs. Bob Johnson of this city has been announced.

The Johnsons have purchased the entire property including building and equipment formerly operated as Goldthwaite Steam Laundry by Bill Schaeber. The business was closed several months ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson started this week in having the building plastered and painted in preparation for opening a steam operated washateria. It contains 20 washers and dryers and is expected to

be open for business in about two weeks.

Plans call for the building to be partitioned off for a special department that will be equipped with a help-yourself washateria with wringer type washers. Plans are being discussed for establishing a steam laundry department for finished work also.

This phase of the project will be undertaken after the coin operated washateria has been installed and put into operation, Johnson announced. It will be at least a month before this part of the business is ready for opening.

You'd be surprised how large a crowd hiked up that hill. It was about 11 o'clock in the morning with a nice bright warm June sunshine to help us along. A little warm, but really quite pleasant hike, it was. I for one sure enjoyed it and my guess is most everyone else did too.

We saw way up the side of Pompey Mountain, some examples of King Bluestem grass that was planted about ten years ago. It survived the six or seven years of drouth and is making progress now in spreading out and down the mountain side.

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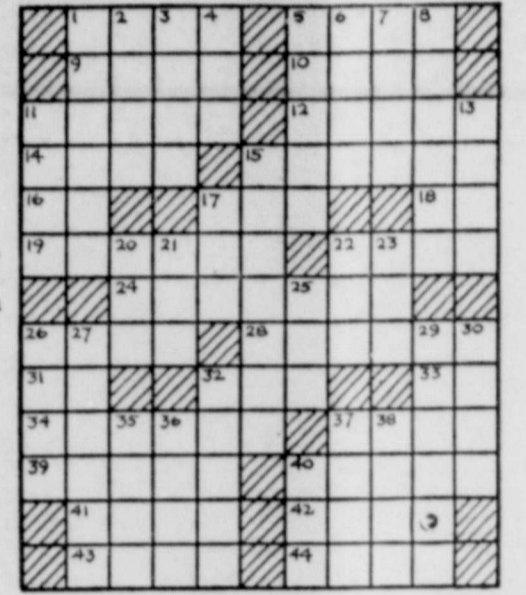

Public Is Less Informed As Government Expands

Press Conferences Becoming Rarer

WASHINGTON—Belief in the public's "right to know" is holding fewer press conferences and are becoming less accessible to reporters. Government agency information specialists are assuming more of the job of informing the public of department activities and their press releases are necessary colored by a desire to put their agencies in the best possible light.

This trend is not attributable to a political party although it is occurring, by incidence more than by design, during a Republican administration. Basically, as the business of government becomes more complex, department heads are less and less willing to face reporters' questions with off-the-cuff answers. They fear the consequences of hasty answers which may be poorly phrased and subject to unfavorable interpretations.

This desire for the correct answer is the beginning of the process that is resulting in more and more in no answer at all. For when a statement is undertaken, too many officials must review and approve it before it is issued.

Many times the news value of a government statement declines because of the time it takes to get it written, approved and issued. Too, close observance of federal information regulations influences the "no comment" reply where a spontaneous answer to reporter's question would have been responsive and informative.

The Washington press corps is itself responsible for some of this drift. If it is to be changed, reporters themselves must become more vigilant in demanding pertinent statements on departmental developments, and be ready to publicize some of the glaring failures in this field.

BOOK DEPARTMENT—Publishers are readying a raft of biographical books for this fall's and next spring's market. Biographies are of such people as Vice President Richard M. Nixon, N. Y. Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, Senators John F. Kennedy, Robert Humphrey and Stuart Symington, and Adlai Stevenson.

All have one thing in common—they are being prominently mentioned as leading contenders for the presidential nomination of the major political parties next year.

In fact, that's why the books are being published. It happens every four years, and one wonders whether sales justify the investment. There are some observers, who weren't born yesterday, who insist that the authors and publishers make some of their money from private donations from supporters of the principal characters.

SCIENCE PROBLEM—The government and some business organizations are wrestling with a tough problem—an outgrowth of the sudden vast expansion in scientific and medical research. The problem is how to keep track of the thousands of research projects to avoid costly duplication.

Within security limitations, the government is a tough job perfectly willing to publicize what it is working on, the status of each project, and what has been accomplished.

However, private business, which is spending money on research in the hopes of developing new products, takes a different view. Anyone who can come up with a workable solution has a guaranteed successful business.

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## Miss Love Gatlin Retires After 36 Years Of Teaching In County

After 36 years of service in the public schools of Mills County, 34 of which were in the Goldthwaite Public Schools, Miss Love Gatlin has retired from the teaching profession.

Miss Gatlin is a native daughter of Mills County. Her parents were pioneers in this area before there was a Mills County. She taught her first school in Big Valley and boarded with Mr. and Mrs. Bob Robertson. The next year she taught in Mullin and boarded with the late Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Patterson.

In 1924 the late J. E. Greathouse, a member of the Goldthwaite Board of Trustees, wrote Miss Gatlin, who was in school at NTSC in Denton, that the board would like to have her as a member of the faculty.

She taught under the following superintendents in Goldthwaite: D. A. Newton, who guided her beginning as a high school teacher in 1925; E. D. Stringer, the late A. H. Smith,

H. E. Patton and J. T. Jones. Miss Gatlin has given the best years of her life to the teaching, guiding and moulding the characters of the youth of Mills County. Her belief in the basic essentials of religion, ethics, and the principles of democracy has made her a valuable teacher in history and citizenship.

Miss Love is an ardent churchwoman, having served as Sunday School teacher and is now president of her Sunday School class and a member of the official board of her church. She exemplifies those integrities, virtues, and graces most prized in the field of education today.

Miss Gatlin will be missed by the high school student body and the patrons of the school, many of whom were her former students as she has served in most every capacity according to the needs in the school system. During the war years she was transferred to the principalship of the elementary school. When the war closed she was returned to the history department in high school in which she served until the time of her voluntary retirement from the profession.

Miss Gatlin's letter of resignation was read and accepted at the last meeting of the school board. She said in her letter "I would like to convey to you and the members of the Board of Education in past years my most sincere appreciation for the trust that has been placed in me and I hope that I have instilled into the minds of my students higher ideals and helped them to want to become better citizens.

Supt. J. T. Jones in announcing her resignation stated that Miss Gatlin is the type of person everyone should have in every class for every day of their public school life.

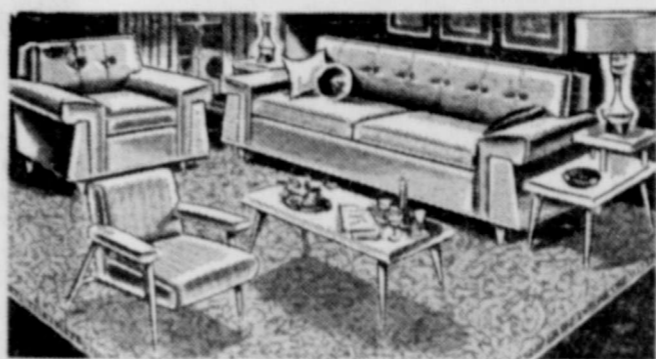

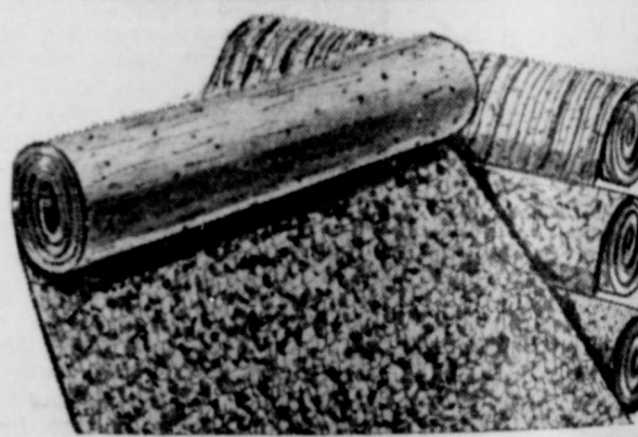

**SEARS 4-H SWINE PROGRAM**—An analysis of the Sears 4-H Swine Program in Mills county for 1958 shows some interesting facts.

Five 4-H club members received five registered gilts, all of these gilts farrowed and they farrowed 51 pigs. That is an average of ten plus pigs per litter which is very good for litter size. Thirty two pigs were weaned and that is an average of six plus pigs per litter which is too low as it takes five pigs per litter to pay expenses.

I think the feeding was excellent, four litters were weighed and these thirty one pigs weighed 1,480 pounds, an average of 48 pounds per pig at 56 days of age. This is a very good weight for 8 weeks of age.

The part that we need to work on in our Sears Swine Program is to try to save more pigs per litter. This can be accomplished by using guard rails around the farrowing pens and using electric brooders during the cold part of spring.

**BUILD UP OF BEEF HERD CONTINUES**—One of the best barometers we have on what size the cattle breeding herd might be one year ahead and further into the future is furnished by statistics on cattle slaughter. Any future increase or reduction in numbers of cattle and calves on farms and ranches is tied directly to these slaughter statistics. In anticipating changes in the size of the cattle herd, it is particular-

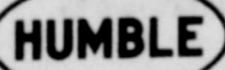

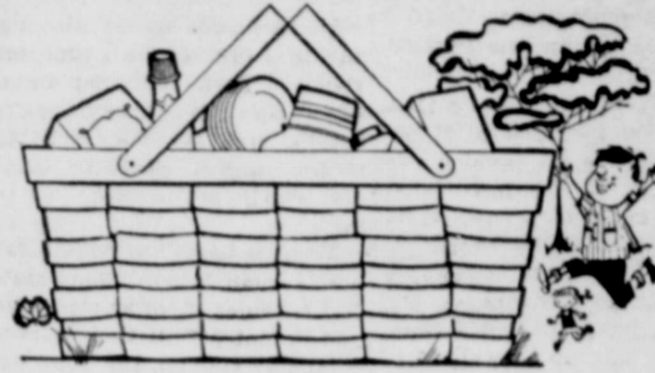

We are in the midst of the fishing season, but there is no better time to talk about quail. The size of our quail crop for next season is being determined right now.

Already young birds are being hatched off and are beginning to run around. Their future depends on many things. First, the weather must be favorable. If they are able to survive the elements, there is the predator problem. House cats are about the worst.

After a quail is grown, or nearly so, it becomes a food problem. By that time usually the hot dry weather has begun. The quail requires cover and protection. It has been living almost entirely on green stuff. Seeds haven't ripened as yet.

All this adds up to the quail having a pretty rough time surviving. Then by September, when the dove season begins, there'll be a few trigger happy, reckless and irresponsible hunters who'll pot a few for the skillet.

Texas is lucky to have a favorable quail season. Some states still consider them as song birds and do not permit their harvest. Strangely enough, the quail survival and carry-over in those states is no greater than in the states where we do have a legal harvest.

Landowners have done a great deal for the quail within the last few years. They have realized that quail can be a money crop.

They have planted cover crops and feed. They watch over the birds and try to prevent predation. In addition, several thousand birds are produced each year at the state game farm in Tyler. These quail are available to land owners at 50 cents each. That's about half the price of production.

Still another asset is the shooting resort, which produces pen hatched quail for release to shooters during the prescribed season. During the past year these resorts became more popular, and for the next season there will be a number of them scattered throughout the state.

If you are interested in increasing your own quail stand, get in touch with your game warden. He can tell you just what to do.

Another surprising, yet pleasing report on the quail situation comes from North-Central Tex-

There was a heavy rat infestation in that area during the late fall and early winter. They were in direct competition with the quail for food. The rats usually got to the table first, and as a result, the quail suffered heavily.

Fortunately, however, the winter wasn't too severe. The carry-over has been much larger than expected, according to wildlife workers. If the reproduction this season is good, we may have another bumper quail crop this fall.

A word of advice to motorists. Be careful in driving along the roads, to let mother quail and her covey of chicks get across the highway. Some automobile drivers plow through these little broods, killing off almost an entire hatch.

Game department biologists predict a heavy population of furbearers this year, too. In fact, it looks like we may have a good hunting season all around.

Speaking of hunting, Raymond Davee, game warden at Zapata, recently called a mountain lion with one of the Burnham Brothers wolf calls. He and another man were working in known wolf territory. Davee was working the caller when the lion came into view. His companion snapped a shot, but missed.

The Burnhams, hunting in Mexico earlier in the year, had a similar experience. Looks like the mountain lion has a jinx on these callers.

Incidentally, the Burnham call is made at Marble Falls. They are sold nation-wide and have been responsible for the death of many predators.

We might also drop the hint that snakes are just about as plentiful this year as we've seen them for a long time.

Use utmost care when going afield, or even in the water. There are only four real poisonous snakes in Texas—the moccasin, rattler, copperhead and coral. The others may give you a scare, but generally they are considered harmless.

Many woodsmen carry a snake bite kit with them, and I don't mean the kind that comes in a bottle. I'm talking about the little pocket size Cutter Kit . . . not whiskey. Doctors warn strongly against the use of whiskey. By all means don't take a drink of liquor, as alcohol speeds up action of the heart. This moves the venom-filled blood faster through the body.

If you are bitten by a snake, get to a doctor quickly. (But don't run or get overly excited.) He can save your life, although you may be a very sick person for a few days.

Have you dropped a few flower seed by the wayside yet this year? Last year we mentioned a fellow who carries a packet of flower seed every time he goes onto the lake. He scatters them at some likely looking spot a long the shore.

### A NEW PLAN TO HALT BRUCELLOSIS

Ultimate eradication of the dread livestock brucellosis disease is possible if new plans—already successful in limited trials—will succeed when available to Texans and other cattle states this summer.

The new anti-brucellosis tactic being initiated by federal-state cooperation involves tagging range cattle as they go to market and sampling blood as a routine during slaughter, thereby maintaining area status information on the costly disease of eventual elimination.

As planned, the animals to be shipped to market will be identified by tags showing state, county and herd of origin. This will provide the means for routine retesting as required for brucellosis-free recertification. When blood tests reveal reactors among the cattle, it will then be possible to trace and eliminate the infection in herds of origin.

Trials for the past three years in eight states showed that slaughter-house testing of dry and cull cows effectively discloses the brucellosis status of a range area and that the coding system is the most practical of several satisfactory ones tried.

This is how the recertification plan works: When blood testing for three years representing at least 15 per cent of the breeding cows in a particular range area shows that not more than one percent of the animals and five per cent of the herds have brucellosis, that area can be approved for recertification for three years. Other requirements to be met include vaccination of heifer calves and semi-annual milk-ring testing of all dairy herds.

When slaughterhouse blood tests reveal reactors, federal-state officials will assist owners by helping to free their herds of brucellosis. The method thus provides constant vigilance on the brucellosis status of a range area.

Individual states will work out details of their own procedures but, in general, tagging is to be done by ranches or other designated persons as cattle move from ranch to market. The thin and pliable but tough plastic tag will be glued over an animal's ribs and must stay put long enough for the animal to reach the most distant market.

Blood collection procedures will be worked out cooperatively by local, state and federal officials with individual plant managements to meet each

### slaughterhouse situation, the procedure should be simple.

Cooperation of range cattlemen will be a major factor in the success of this plan, from an industry which has long been anxious to get out costly and troublesome brucellosis, this cooperation virtually assured.

if she wins there then State for the final contest.

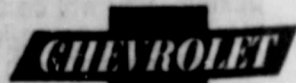
