VACATION TRAVEL-How many times have we heard this story when a co-worker or neighbor got back from vacation? "Boy, what a two weeks I had! Drove to Denver for two days, then out to Los Angeles to visit the wife's family . . . really had to "barrel it' to get back on time. Now I need two more weeks to rest up from the vacation."

Exaggerated? Perhaps, but it is typical of our times. We go at such a pace that we really don't take time to live. Grandma and grandpa used to take a trip 50 miles from home and would talk about it for years. Nowadays we drive a 1,000 miles over the weekend and what do we talk about? The terrible traffic we encounter except on those beautiful stretches of long white concrete.

However, it is not our purpose here to tell anyone what to do with their vacation. What each person does on his vacation is strictly his own business, but we do believe that careful, sensible planning and unhurried driving will help make a vacation more restful . . . certainly a lot safer. With the help of the Texas Safety Association, here are a few suggestions we believe will make your vacation trip a safer one.

- 1. Begin your traffic safety thinking before you take off. That means seeing that your car is in topnotch mechanical condition. Have your service or garage man give your car a thorough check-up before starting your trip. It's no fun to spend vacation time sitting around a garage waiting for a car to be fixed.
- 2. Emergencies do arise, so be prepared. Take along such equipment as a first-aid kit, flashlight, flares, and don't forget to check that spare tire. Keep such equipment and tire tools stored where they can be reached without much trouble.
- 3. Don't overload your car. Make sure that luggage and other vacation gear doesn't obstruct your view while driving. Vision must be clear in front, sides and in the rear.
 - 4. Plan a day by day travel schedule that will give you time to get out and relax occasionally. Prolonged driving periods tend to have a hypnotic affect on drivers and build up nerve tension-driver efficiency declines after about six hours at the wheel.
- 5. Make up your mind to have a pleasant relaxing trip by being patient and courteous with other drivers. Above all, pack along a healthy load of common sense—it takes a lot less time tin spent Sunday and the 4th to prevent an accident than it does to report one.

"LIKE THE COIN-CLIPPER OF OLD"-As everyone knows, wage rates have undergone big advances since World War II. For instance, the average U. S. production worker's gross weekly earn. ing three cars. ings increased from just under \$54 in 1948 to about \$83 last year. But that doesn't mean that this worker's purchasing power has shown anything resembling such improvement. For, as the Tax narrow escape when his bus Foundation points out, inflation "shadowed his almost every crashed into the back of a waadvance.

In 1951, the wage earner's weekly pay was \$4.28 over that of 1950. But increases in prices and taxes more than offset his gain, and he actually lost 31c in purchasing

In 1958, weekly pay was up \$2.17 over 1957. But the inroads of inflation again more than wipes out the gain, and the worker's purchasing power was down 6c.

All in all, says the Foundation, in 9 of 11 years since 1948 "inflation, like the coin-clippers of old, has taken its toll of these Wright, and Charles Griffin, wage boosts.'

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



By the "tens of thousands," Americans are flooding the U. Land Management Office here with requests for information about homesteading in the new state of Alaska.

Homesteading lands are available in Alaska and they are by cally free, although the government insists Uncle Sam has no free lands anywhere.

For about \$50 in fees, an adventurer can a claim to 160 Alaskan acres. 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

must originate in the House. Governor Diniel's action changed this, and the Senate went back to work on the bill. A similar bill was passed by the House last session.

Land Sale Approved- House passed a bill that would allow the state to sell a tract of about 40 acres just north of the State Hospital in Austin,

State Hospital Board has declared the system does not need the land. Austin city officials would like to see it privately owned so property taxes could be collected on it. Location is such that it could be used for a shopping center.



By an overwhelming majority (85% of the votes) the nationwide membership the National Federation of Independent Business has endorsed a bill known as H. R. 1823 permitting broader local control of labor disputes.

Under its provision, the Na-Relations Board could turn over to lo. cal states with the proper machinery set up, some labor dispute matters.

Perhaps the but to the nation's independent ousinessmen, it is a step in the right direction . . .

For about 25 years now, the National Labor Relations Board has been the power to step into labor disputes. Seldom, if ever, has the NLRB gone against laoor, or decided against the union leader's demands.

That is perhaps understand-able because the labor leaders who pay close attention to who s in this bureau, are not prone to be happy with impartiality.

* * * But over and beyond all this s the fact that often the economy of a community, even a whole state, or a region, can be tied up in a labor dispute and the local people being damaged by it can do nothing but sit on their hands and wait for wheels in Washington to ponderously move toward some solution.

Actually, the powers of the NLRB were all set up in the mid thirties on a rather fuzzy defini-

tion of the right of the federal government to regulate interstate commerce

When the U. S. Constitution was written this clause was inserted to prevent individual states from levying tariffs against each other.

But when NLRB was set up, this clause was interpreted to mean that the Federal govern-ment has the right to step into any situation remotely concerned Thus a manufacturer may

make a unit sold only in the state, but in all likelihood, some of his raw materials come across state lines, so voila, he's in interstate commerce whether he knows it or not. And this permits the NLRB to come into his plant and hold elections to determine which union he shall deal with, and to do a host of other things.

Now by and large, the NLRB suits the big labor leaders just fine. It is much easier for them to deal with the bureaucrats of NLRB than to try and sell their bill of goods to the local heads of

Obviously, it will be a long and bitter fight, because it is a cer-tainty that the labor bosses will not endorse this bill.

Public opinion could not only be a powerful force in many labor disputes, but in most cases, in this day and age, public opinion would be quite fair on issues involved in a labor dispute.

But the NLRB is impervious to affairs are handled at a local level that the common sense factor of public opinion can enter into such matters.


