

The tips come from professionals—the state patrolman, the test track driver, the trucker. Here are some of them:

1. Don't show off or clown behind the wheel. 2. Have guts enough behind the wheel to chicken out when common sense tells you it's time to give in. Never mind who's right-Be smart-stay alive! 3. The public highways are for sharing, not competing. 4. The squeal of tires and roar of the exhaust may sound like hot stuff to a driver who needs it to build up his ego. But it tags him as strictly an amateur to the real pro. 5. The pro gives in to bad weather, bad roads, and traffic jams, and slows down. 6. Would your coach send in a player who has been drinking? Well, it goes double for driving. Remember - a half-loaded driver is more dangerous than a loaded gun.

Teenagers are involved in twice as many fatal accidents for the number of miles they drive as drivers over 25. This tragic and needless picture will change in a hurry if the young drivers will follow sound and simple tips like these.

PRICED OUT OF THE MARKET-Labor hurts itself by pressing for increases in the minimum wage.

That statement comes from a top authority-Lawrence C. Lockley. Dean of the School of Commerce of the University of Southern California. He expresses it in an interview published in the June issue of Nation's Business.

His point is that unrealistic wage pressure can cause workers to price themselves out of the job market. To quote directly: "In the first place, a minimum wage of any size will eliminate the lowest grade of workers.

"When they are sifted out because they can't earn a minimum wage, there appears to be no place for them to

"In the second place, the minimum wage inevitably adds price rigidity and makes it more difficult for management to adjust labor application to the best advantage. "Therefore, labor itself ultimately suffers."

The big issue here is not whether any particular foreign aid proposal is good or bad, or whether it should be approved or disapproved. There are some indications that the Russian leaders now look t Nixon's visit as a substitute for a summit meeting. Should the vis president undertake serious talks with the Sovi leaders, it undoubtedly would be looked upon a a diplomatic exchange at least somewhat abo

the foreign ministers level. The prospect presents great opportunities for Nixon in furthering his political aspirations, b there are also great dangers. If Nixon sho produce some accommodation with the Commu ists in easing East-West tensions it would hailed as a great achievement and enhance his

stature in foreign policy matters. However, an effort culminating in failure would be a serious blow to his prestige and his pres

dential ambitions. There is the danger, too, that such two power talks would serve the Russian objective of splitting the Allies. In the past the United States has flatly rejected a

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



Can You Stop In Time?



It takes more than the distance between goal posts on a football field (100 yards) to stop a car traveling at 60 miles per hour under the best driving conditions, 4-H Club members point out. At 60 mph. a car travels 88 feet per second. There's not much "time" to come to a dead stop upon approaching a tractor or other slow-moving farm

machinery. 'Highway safety is everyone's responsibility," 4-H leaders de-clare, and during the summer when traffic is at its peak the obligation becomes greater. The devastating fact that three out of four traffic fatalities occur in rural areas makes the 4-H Safety program the "number one crop" for nearly a million conscienti-

Statistics reveal that there are nore teen-age drivers on highways today than ever before.

It is also true that drivers under 20 years of age have a worse safety record than older drivers. each 4-H boy and girl enrolled in the safety project encouraged to become a "self-policing committee of one." These 4-H'ers make certain that the family car, truck, and tractor are in safe operating condition at all times.

For the past 15 years the 4-H Safety program has been sup-ported nationally by General Motors, which among other things provides incentive awards for top ranking club members in each state. The awards consist of \$400 college scholarships, allexpense paid trips to the Na-tional 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, medals of honor, and plaques. The program is under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service, United States Department of Agriculture.

There are other nearby spots on the Texas coast which also have been overlooked by many fishermen. They include Bay City, Palacios, Port Lavaca and Port Aransas, Incidentally, Port Aransas now has another modern motel, It is the Paradise Isle, managed by W. C. Price, who formerly lived in Dallas. It is modern in every respect.

Such places as the Paradise Groups of men usually went there, hired a boat and didn't spend too much time in their cabins. They weren't particuarly interested in comfort.

Now times have changed. Families go to the coast today and trail their own boats. They want a swimming pool for the kiddies as well as comfortable rooms and good eating places.

They launch their own boats, with a pair of 35 horsepower motors and the whole family goes fishing or boat riding. Some of the boat owners don't fish. They like to ride around and look at the islands and the birds, or just leisurely play

As a result, business has picked up even for the commercial boatmen, who find they still have about all the customers they can care for.

Right now most of the fishing on the coast is for kings, mackerel and trout. Of course, there are those who want the fighting bill fish or the big tarpon.

If you are just looking for tonnage, then go out for snapper. Raymond Muchowich, who operates the Party Boats at Freeport, says the hot weather hasn't affected deep sea fishing and that every day fishermen going out from Freeport come in with huge loads of red snapper and quite a few ling.

This is a trip that can give you more thrills and make you as tired as you've ever been in your life. You hook that big snapper down on the botton, at about 150 feet. Then you hoist him to the top and over the side of the boat. By the time you've landed your third one you feel you have had enough punishment - but you can't quit. It's

hard work - but it's fun, too! Party boats leave the docks at 2 a. m. Some of the fishermen sleep on the way out. They are fortunate because they don't get quite so tired. Those who stay awake enroute to the banks and then catch a tub full of fish, usually are very quiet when the boat starts back in about noon. They are plenty tired, and usually are ready to "hit the sack.

Yes sir, the Texas coast is an ideal place to take your family for this year's vacation if you haven't already had one. Or you can run down there for a couple of days at the weekend. It is worth the trip whether you fish or not. And it's worth a lot more if you fish.




