A new independent service station is scheduled to open in Goldthwaite within the next few days, it was announced today. Bert Ohlenbusch and Clay Limmer are in process of building the station on the corner of Sixth and Fisher Streets. Ohlenbusch and Limmer are former residents of Mills County. They have been in the area for some time. Ohlenbusch has been in the gasoline business for a number of years and operates some stations in Lubbock and surrounding areas. The Goldthwaite station is expected to open shortly and will be managed by Limmer and Mrs. Limmer and their two year old daughter will live in their home in Goldthwaite and are looking for a new home.

Residents Get Feel Of Water Shortage When Well Goes Out

Goldthwaite residents got a good feel of water shortage when the city well number five went out of production Monday afternoon. This happens to be the well and by far the biggest water source in the city water system. On this well burned out approximately 3 p. m. Monday city crews got the well back in production 24 hours later, about 3 p. m. Tuesday. When the well went out a replacement from another well placed on the pump but required a number of other repairs due to a combination of things that needed work and repairs. City crews worked from 2 a. m. Tuesday morning when returned to the job at 10 a. m. and stayed there until the well was placed in operation Tuesday afternoon. Due to the heavy demand the existing wells on the system miserably in providing approximately 75 per cent of the city was without water for the 24 hour period.

Cadet James F. Griffin Attends Summer Training Session At Luke

Luke AFB, Ariz.—James F. Griffin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Griffin of Priddy, Texas, and an Air Force ROTC cadet at Luke Air Force Base, is shown standing in front of an F-100, operational aircraft at the base. Cadet Griffin, who completed his junior year in advanced Air Force ROTC, is attending a four weeks of summer training at Luke Air Force Base, as part of his Reserve Officer training at college. While at summer training, Cadet Griffin observes and

actually participates in Air Force operations.

The Luke mission will be uniquely advantageous for the Summer Training Unit inasmuch as they will encounter several different type of aircraft - T-33, F-34, F-100 - in a training situation. They will be given indoctrination rides in the T-33 and perhaps the F-100.

While at Luke the cadets will have an opportunity to participate in the activities of the base. The cadets will not only be given their schedule of officer training instruction, but will observe the Combat Crew Training Program.

Following graduation at East Texas State College, he will be eligible for appointment as a Second Lieutenant in the Air Force Reserve, and for entry into flight training to win the coveted silver wings of an Aerial Observer.

Acreage Survey Made This Month

This month the U. S. D. A., in cooperation with the Post Office Department, is conducting an annual acreage survey. Rural Mail Carriers are delivering 30,000 cards to Texas farmers and ranchers. The cards list questions on crop acreages and livestock. Carriers pick up the completed cards and forward them to Cary Palmer, Agricultural Statistician for Texas in Austin.

Mr. Palmer urges farmers to answer and return cards to Mail Carriers. "This survey," he points out, "serves as a basis for estimating the State's farm production. Every report helps to make accurate estimates."

Engineering Plans Are Complete For Farm-To-Market Highway 574

Engineering plans for 9.1 miles of farm-to-market highway No. 574 west of Goldthwaite have been completed, according to announcement by John M. Arthur, resident engineer for the Texas State Highway Department.

The new FM road will run from Ridge west to FM highway

No. 45 just north of the Colorado River, where there will be a right angle intersection.

Arthur announced that the completed plans have been submitted to the design engineer where they will be reviewed and plans made for letting of contract.

If all rights-of-way are secured by November 1, or before, there is a possibility that contract will be let in November, Arthur stated.

The first three miles from Ridge west will follow the old Camp Bowie Perimeter road, according to Arthur. From this point west to the junction, or approximately six miles, the road will be on all new location.

Present plans for first letting call for only grading and drainage structures with base and asphalt surface to be contracted for at a later date.

Plans call for moving some 220,000 yards of earth, use some 176,000 lbs. of re-enforcing steel, 1,100 cubic yards of concrete for drainage structures and 1,400 linear feet of culvert pipe. Estimated cost of the project is in the neighborhood of \$200,000.

Lions Club Broom Sale This Evening

Truett Aldridge, president of the local Lions Club, has asked all Lions who will help with the Broom Sale to be on the courthouse square at 5:30 this evening. Norman Duren, chairman of the refreshment committee, will be in charge of the refreshments to be served to the Lions taking part in the sale.

The caravan will be located on the courthouse square all day Thursday and will feature brooms, door mats, mops, ironing board covers and pad combinations. These products are all made by the Texas Blind Workmen in Blind Shops or Light-houses which are non-profit organizations. The Lions Club is again sponsoring the sale here as they have in the past and all proceeds will be used for Lions Club projects during the year.

Those appointed to be in charge of the various functions are: Charles Conradt, chairman for churches and schools; Floyd Spradley, chairman for the business district and L. J. Ward, chairman for the residential district.

Eagles Beat Cross Plains 26-14; Host To Evant Elks Friday Night

In the third game of the season the Eagles downed the Cross Plains Buffaloes by a score of 26-14. This is the second year in a row for the Eagles to win over the Buffaloes.

A fumble on opening kick-off which was recovered by Cross Plains and a bad pass from center on a punt which also gave Cross Plains the ball kept Goldthwaite in a hole during the first quarter. At the end of the first quarter Cross Plains led 6-0.

About the middle of the second quarter Goldthwaite got possession of the ball about mid-field and drove to the Cross Plains 5 yard line before losing

the ball on downs. On the first play after Cross Plains gained possession of the ball, they fumbled and Goldthwaite recovered on about the 4 yard line. Alfred Stark hit the center of the line for three yards, then QB Tom Graves kept on a QB sneak and carried over from the one for the Eagles' first TD. Gerry Head ran the two point conversion over.

Following the Goldthwaite kick-off, Cross Plains had possession of the ball deep in their own territory and with approximately 20 seconds left in the half, Tom Graves intercepted an attempted pass and ran it back 20 yards for another TD for the Eagles.

During the third quarter, the game developed into a see-saw battle with neither team able to score. In the fourth quarter, Tom Graves threw a 35 yard pass to John Burdette for the Eagles' 3rd TD.

Late in the fourth quarter,

Tom Graves turned a miscue in the Eagles' backfield into a 50 yard run for another TD; Graves' jump pass for the extra point to John Burdette was complete but he was attacked before he could step over the line for the extra points. Following this TD the Eagles kicked off to Cross Plains and half-back Grady Scott returned the kick 90 yards for a Buffalo TD. The pass for extra point was good, and the final score read, Eagles 26, Buffaloes 14.

DIET

Food has three main jobs: To provide fuel for the body's heat and energy, (2) supply materials for growth and upkeep of the body, and (3) provide regulators that enable the body to use other materials and run smoothly. Not any one, or any few foods will accomplish all these jobs. It's the daily selection and balance that counts.

Make sure of a proper daily balance of food. Use the Texas Food Standard as a daily guide to good eating. It provides adequate fuel food, body regulators, and building and repair materials.

CARE OF LEATHER ACCESSORIES

Leather accessories are expensive items in the clothing budget these days. Fall and winter costumes call for more leather belts, bags, gloves and shoes. Shoes especially receive hard wear. An economical plan is to have two pairs for alternate daily wear, allowing each pair to rest or dry out between wearings. Perspiration weakens leather, and causes shoes to crack and rip. Use a good shoe cream frequently to protect the leather. Preserve the shape of your shoes by using shoe trees or paper pads in toe and heel. On belts, bags and gloves, use cream or wax polishes to protect the leather and keep it pliable and soft. To remove spots from leather articles clean with benzine or gasoline, air well and re-polish. Saddle soap can also be used to remove dirt and grease from leather articles between polishings. Prevent cracking and preserve the finish on patent leather articles with vaseline. Use a cloth pad to apply a light, even coating once or twice a month.

September 30 is Last Day For Wool Referendum Vote

Chairman E. L. Burkett of the Mills County ASC Committee today reminded wool growers that all ballots in the wool and lamb market development referendum must be voted not later than Wednesday, September 30.

The referendum has been conducted through the month of September to give all growers ample opportunity to vote. Ballots were mailed to all

known wool and lamb producers. After the ballot is voted, it should be mailed or brought in person to the county office. If the ballot is mailed, it must be postmarked not later than September 30.

In the referendum, farmers who produce wool have the opportunity to vote YES or NO on approval of a new agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep

Producers Council for the advertising and sales promotion of lamb and wool. If the agreement is approved, deductions will be made from government wool and lamb payments for the 1959, 1960 and 1961 marketing years to finance the Council's activities.

Deductions for this promotion program have been made each year since the wool incentive program began in 1955. Deductions amount to 1 cent per pound for shorn wool and 5 cents per hundredweight for unshorn lambs and may be no higher than that if the agreement is extended.

An eligible voter in the referendum is any individual, corporation, partnership or legal entity which had an interest as owner or partial owner in one or more sheep six months of age or older for any period of at least 30 days from January 1, 1959 until the day his ballot is cast. Any wool grower who believes he is entitled to vote and has not received his ballot should notify the county ASC office.

Extension of the agreement requires a favorable vote by growers having two-thirds of the volume of production represented in the referendum.

OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

By H. L. BERRY

Farmers and ranchers of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District are again preparing to plant winter legumes.

For the average farmer, clover and vetch can be planted along with small grain. If rowcropping, Austrian winter peas work in well because of early spring growth. Regardless of the legume you use, it should be planted between now and December 1. Cost share assistance is available through the A. S. C. office.

For a short duration conservation crop, a legume is the best route for protection and improvement. Nitrogen, the building block of protein, is the element most needed on the majority of our soils.

Another benefit derived from legumes is the improvement of soil structure. Without proper soil structure, the water intake rate is reduced to such an extent that high intensity rains do little good. Water stored in the soil this winter is the best insurance for a crop next summer.
